Sidewalks Voted Down

Re-elect Ogi, Oelhafen, Goeden to School Board; Danielsen, Herriges, Mlodzik Named to Village Board

A fairly heavy vote was cast in the village in Tuesday's spring election, with a total of 603 ballots cast.

Kewaskum School District residents returned all three incumbent members to three-year terms on the school board. Charles Ogi led with 1,112 votes, James Oelhafen was just 44 behind with 1,068, and Jean Goeden was next with 1,063. The other three candidates trailed as follows: Gerald Stollenwerk 753, Maryanne Merwin 451 and Geraldine Flynn 394.

In the village Stollenwerk bested Oelhafen. The results were: Ogi 376, Goeden 349, Stollenwerk 339, Oelhafen 335, Merwin 166 and Flynn 127.

In the village trustee race, incumbents Robert Danielsen and Raynor Herriges were re-elected to two-year terms and a first-time candidate, Donald Mlodzik, won the other post. The fourth candidate was Merle Miller. Danielsen received the most votes with 494, followed by Herriges 465, Mlodzik 451 and Miller 243. Greg Nigh, the third board member whose term expires this year, did not seek re-election.

In an advisory referendum held in conjunction with the election in the Village of Kewaskum residents voted "No" to sidewalks. To the question "Should all village residents and businesses be required to install sidewalks?" 361 voted no and 237 yes. Five ballots were blank.

Two county board supervisors were upset. John Oelhafen, supervisor of Dist. 9 of the Towns of Wayne and Kewaskum, was defeated by challenger Harold Westerman, 387-241. In the Town of Addison John Gorman probed incumbent Alfred Ederer, 224-221. In Dist. No. 10, Village and Town of Kewaskum, incumbent Charles Miller was unopposed, receiving 509 votes in the village. Other incumbents won re-election unopposed.

In the village on the judicial ballot, for Justice of the Supreme Court John L. Coffey received 352 votes to 197 for James W. Rice. Coffey was easily elected to the seat.

For Court of Appeals, Dist. II, 6-year term Clair H. Voss, unopposed, polled 458 votes in the village. Four-year term John G. Bucher received 248 votes to 229 for Richard S. Brown. Two-year term Harold M. Bode received 293 votes to James W. Recor's 177. Voss, Brown and

Bode were state winners.

For County Judge, Branch I, James B. Schwalbach, who was unopposed, was elected to a full six-year term. He received 481 votes in Kewaskum.

On the state referendum question, "Shall section 23 of article IV of the constitution be amended to allow that there be more than one system of town government?" the local vote was yes 153, no 373. The referendum was voted down statewide.

8 Rescue Squad Members Attend Seminar on Shock

Accidents are the fourth leading cause of death, and the first cause of death in people between the ages of one and 37. The annual rate of motor vehicle fatalities alone each year exceeds that of all American soldiers killed in all of the years of the Vietnam War! The knowledge and equipment necessary to prevent many of these deaths and disabling injuries does exist today.

Most of these victims enter some stage of shock. Shock is defined as the failure of the cardio-vascular system to provide sufficient blood circulation to every part of the body.

On Thursday, March 18, eight members of the Kewaskum Fire Department Rescue Squad Unit attended an all day seminar at Moraine Park Technical Institute in Fond Du Lac. The seminar was an introductory course on M.A.S.T. (Medical Anti-Shock Trousers).

The M.A.S.T. is a garment or wraparound blanket that when put on applies circumferential pressure around the body below the diaphragm to help control shock.

When applied correctly, it may: (1) control or stop internal bleeding, (2) transfer blood from the lower part of the body to vital organs in the upper part of the body, and (3) stabilize fractures of the lower extremities.

The Kewaskum Fire Department as well as other ambulance providers hope to put these Medical Anti-Shock Trousers in use in the near future.

Village to Have Computerized Billings for Water and Sewage

Kewaskum will be taking advantage of another service offered by S.E.W.R.P.C. in the form of computerized billings for water and sewer metered through village homes and industries.

Monday night the Village Board unanimously accepted a plan outlined by John Ernst, data processing manager for S.E.W.R.P.C. Cost breakdowns were: \$500 for programming set-up and \$225 for staffing time (both figures are initial, one-time charges); \$225 for 5000 billing cards or \$250 for 10,000 cards bought in bulk; 16c per card for each bill processed; and 8c per card for postage if a bulk permit and postage meter would be purchased from the post office. Commissioner William Martin was unsure of the exact cost of a bulk rate permit initially and annually.

Greg Nigh roughly estimated quarterly billings to cost the village about \$200 using the new method. Since the computers could handle the process in only two days while hand-processing now takes three weeks, it was generally agreed that savings would be realized once the initial costs were absorbed.

The proposed fire contract between the village and the Town of Auburn will be slightly changed when renewal time comes July 1. In keeping with the contract between the village and the Town of Kewaskum, Auburn's contract will also pro-

Questions About Zoning Ordinance Changes Answered

Roland Tonn, Planning Technician from the S.E.W.R.P.C., was on hand Monday evening to answer questions from Kewaskum-ites about the proposed zoning ordinance changes.

Only one gentleman questioned the "rigidity" of lot size required in the case of apartment houses. He hinted that units designed to house small-family units which could prove "beneficial to the community" tax-wise would not necessarily need the amount of lot space called for in the ordinance. "You could be limiting a developer," he said, and then asked about procedures for gaining a variance to the rules.

"Don't be misled," Tonn warned about the granting of variances. "The rules will not permit higher densities (of population) than what are allowed in the ordinance." The ordinance itself states: "No variance shall be granted solely on the basis of economic gain or loss."

Tonn also emphasized that the lot sizes required for apartment dwellings were included in the total amount of "developed space" in the form of parking lots, etc. "There's no point in building apartments without parking space for cars," Tonn cautioned.

Thor Otto of Exodus House commented just before the hearing closed: "I think you did a terrific job." Everyone present was in agreement with that assessment of the 18-month project.

NUTRITION IN A BROWN BAG
For many people who carry their lunch, the brown bag is an essential carrier of their daily nutrition. One third of the daily nutritional requirements should be in that bag or consumed at the lunch time.
To be assured of a good nutritional lunch, a variety of foods should be included. The balance of nutrients in the body is more efficiently achieved by foods that contain varying levels and types of nutrients. For instance, grains and breads are low in protein, but served with a meat, poultry, fish or egg, the proteins of the bread and meats complement each other. The combination is a dish of good protein value.
The sandwich so often found in the brown bag meets the standards of good protein and good nutrition. It cannot stand alone. With the sandwich of whole grain or enriched bread and another source of protein, there should be a vegetable. Lettuce, tomato, celery sticks, carrot sticks, radishes, all help provide bulk and nutrition.
A fruit is a must. Of course the citrus fruit is highest in vitamin C. That type should be included often.
For the beverage at the lunch time, add a glass of milk, either whole, skim, or buttermilk. This is our best food source of calcium.

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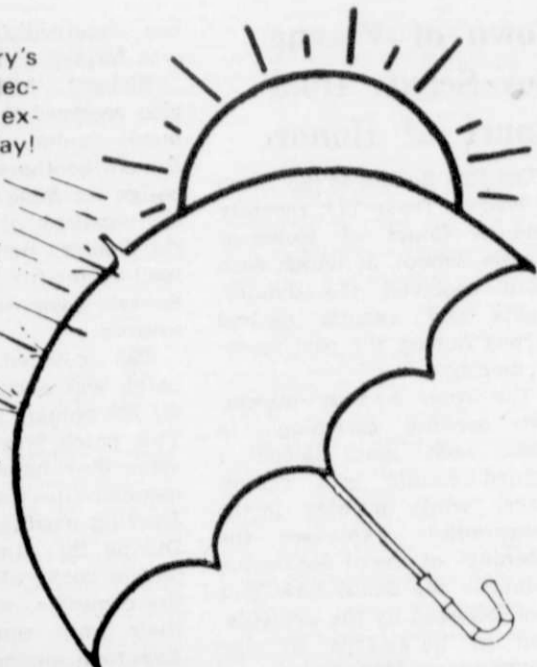

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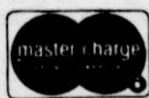

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Dettmann Attends NACD Convention

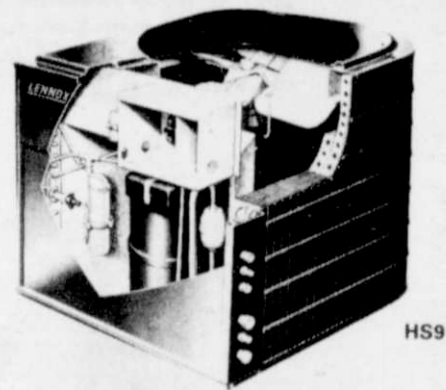

This law will require the Soil Conservation Service, with the assistance of local conservation districts, to gather data to appraise the condition and qualities of America's soil and water resources by 1979. Through this information, a five year plan for the USDA's conservation assistance can be developed.

This year's convention was highlighted by two keynote speakers - Senator John Culver, sponsor of the Culver Amendment, and Douglas Costle, Administrator for the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency.

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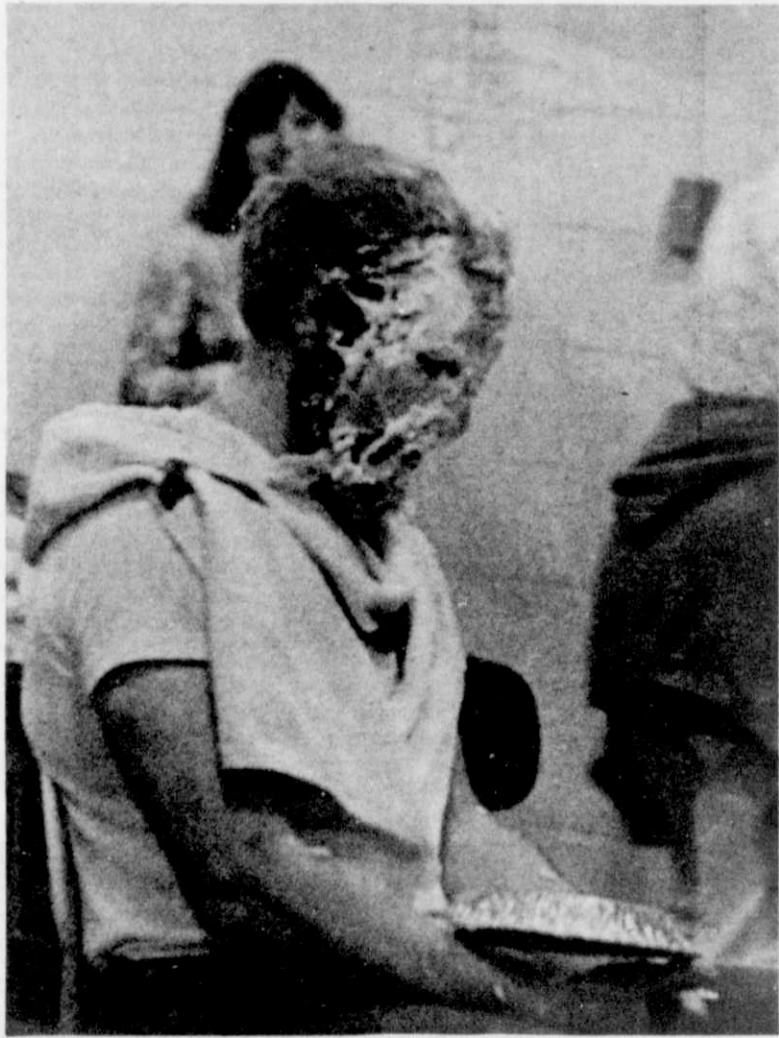

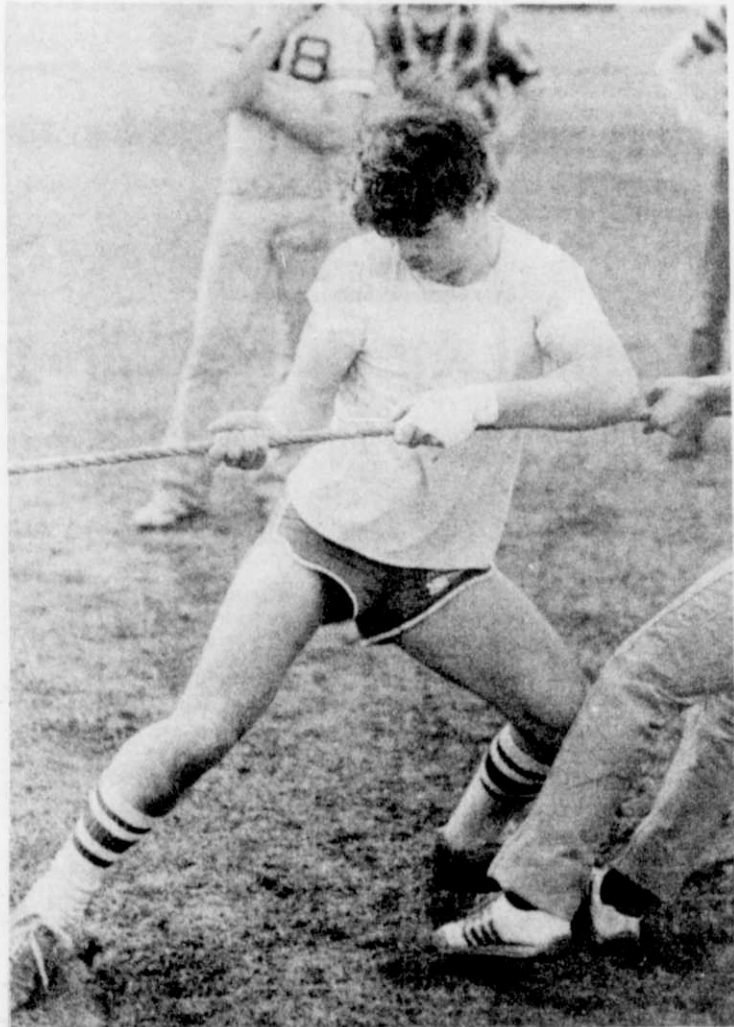

To Build New Masonic Temple in West Bend

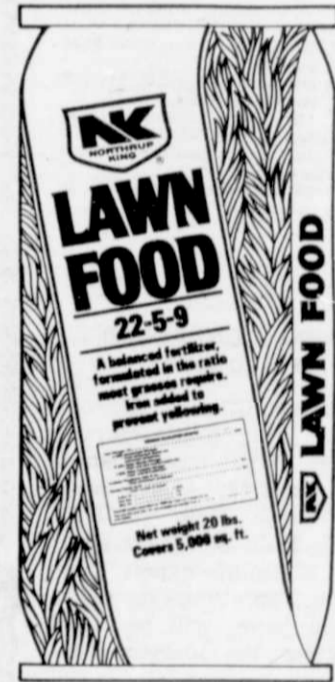

Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Midmonthly Meeting
March 20, 1978
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in midmonthly meeting in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Charles F. Miller presided. Trustee Danielsen had asked to be excused and was absent. All other Village Board Trustee members were present.

One correction was noted in the minutes of the meeting of March 6. The motion by Trustee Gregor Nigh and seconded by Trustee Robert Danielsen with reference to glass breakage insurance on the large windows at the fire station was not to purchase this type of coverage but merely to obtain a premium estimate for this type of coverage. In all other respects the minutes of the March 6 meeting were approved as printed. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee G. Nigh. Unanimous vote.

John Kratz, President of Kewaskum Malting, discussed with the Board several billings for sewage service charges which he felt were excessive because of surface water entering the sanitary sewer manhole where the sewage metering device is located. Mr. Kratz was advised that the repair of the manhole to prevent this infiltration was his obligation and that he had been so advised several months ago. Mr. Kratz agreed to make the necessary repairs and would consult with the Board at a later date.

The Police Department was authorized to send two of its officers to a three day seminar on sexually motivated crimes and child abuse at Glendale on May 24, 25 and 26. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous vote.

Upon the recommendation

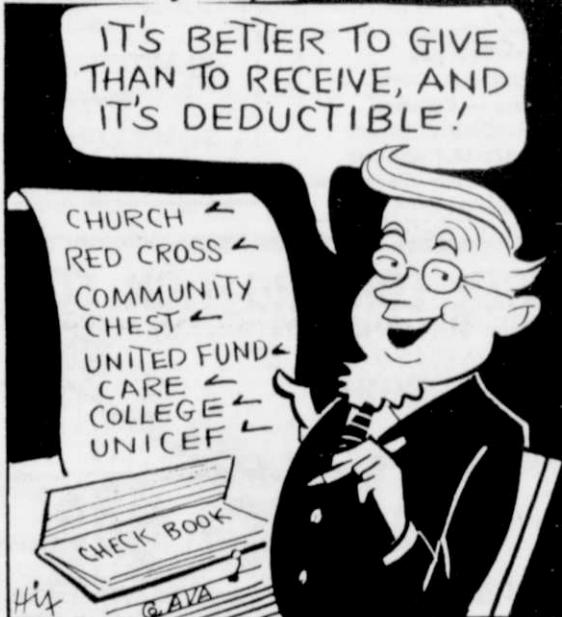

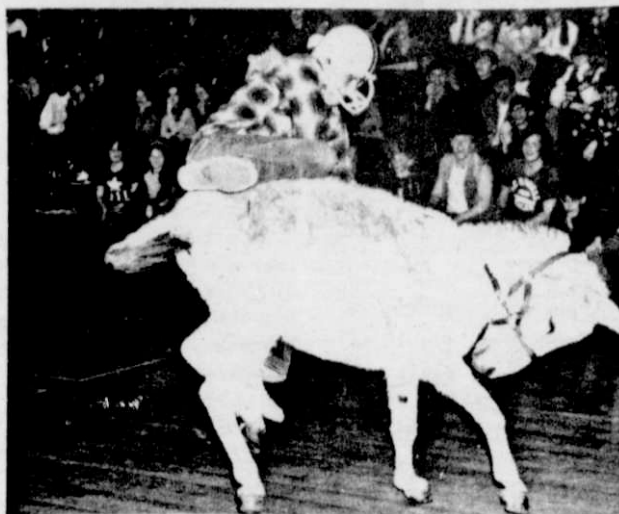
