Terry Reese Killed in Auto Crash

A Kewaskum man died late Saturday afternoon when thrown out of his car in a one- car crash on County Trunk H, 11/2 miles west of Kewaskum

He was Terry W. Reese, 40. of 711 Memorial Drive.

Reese was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, with head and internal injuries, according to Coroner Robert Boltz.

According to the Washington County Sheriff's Department report. Reese, traveling east, had just crested a hill about 1,200 feet west of County Trunk B when for some unknown reason he lost control of the car.

The car went into a fourwheel slide, entering the ditch on the right side of the highway, and hitting a stone fence, and then went airborne. Reese was thrown out of the car, which rolled over several times and came to rest on its roof.

The accident occurred at 5:04 p. m.

It was the third traffic death in Washington County this year, compared to nine by that date last year. others were Alice M. Stange 72. of R. 1. Elkhart Lake who lost her life in a crash on Hwy. 28, one mile east of St. Michaels on Feb. 21, and Mrs. Gerald Backhaus. R. 3 Kewaskum, who lost her life in a crash on State 33, onehalf mile east of the Wash. ington - Ozaukee county line on Sunday, March 5.

Some changes seem to be in store for the layout of the new park this spring. Originally intended for on the near.

construction southeast side of the wading pond, the bath-house and dressing rooms will probably have to be built somewhere else due to ground conditions created by fill and everpopping springs. At Saturday's on-site inspection by the full Village Board and James Arthur, the architect in charge of the project, it was agreed that the building would have to be able to "float" in order to retain present plans. A number of suggestions were bantied about, but costs of sewer/water line extension and additional cyclone fencing were prime concerns in the selection of an alternative construction site.

Although drainage of surface water seems to be improved with the laying of culverts, the dimensions of those culverts have been prohibitive as far as gravel contractors are concerned. "I wouldn't even want to drive my car over one of them," Dan Schmidt said of the 16inch conduits. Arthur agreed that if heavy trucks could not safely cross the ditches to distribute loads of crushed stone and gravel needed on the north side of the park something would have to be

Remodeling, Staffing Questions Tackled by School Board Monday

The School Board tackled a few remodeling and staffing questions Monday night, prior to drawing up next year's budget.

A bid of \$1587.71 from Johann Plumbing and Heating. Inc. was unanimously accepted for the revitalizing of the ventilation system in the chemistry room at the high Although Principal school. Clark Pearson had indicated at a previous meeting that estimates could be had from several sources the board decided to act on the figure presented by Jean Goeden to the need for adequate ventilation in the lab. Charles Ogi said there was "no ruling we have to get estimates."

Other remodeling of the art room, library and study hall areas could be a matter of a different arrangement of room dividers. It is anticipa ted that once any major electrical or plumbing work is done by a contractor, much of the work could be finished by staff maintenance people Pearson agreed that the class studying building which did work in the band room last year, could handle part of the carpentry task.

Pearson said that he'd already conducted one interview for the position of parttime business education instructor. He indicated that he will probably "run an ad in the local newspaper" to draw out potential candidates for

staff at Kewaskum will be set aside for awhile. Gerald Secor asked the board to wait before voting on adding a position to aid Brenholt in his duties. Assistant superintendent and business manager positions were voted down last year. Brenholt asked that the board not "get hung up' on the title in granting him the assistance he "firmly, absolutely, positively" believes necessary in handling the business and educational duties centered in his office Theusch said that he would like to see some of the things presently handled by Brenholt taken elsewhere. He said he would favor the hiring of a business manager because someone in that position could handle "maintenance problems." Brenholt said that he favored handling "the business end" of administrative duties himself and would favor fill ing the broader position of asssitant superntendent. "The sharing of duties, if the position is approved, could be based on the strengths and weaknesses (of both parties)," Brenholt emphasized.

Goeden said she had received "a few calls" concerning the ventilation in the old gym. Pearson explained that the duct system is controlled by regulators located in the individual outlets. Brenholt said that cost estimates could be had for improving the situation, which Pearson suggested be alleviated by using "floor fans," and the project "could go into this year's budget."

Last year's discussion of resurfacing the track at the high school will be continued in this year's budget talks. A new surface of blacktop, as opposed to the present mix ture of clay and cinders. would be measured in the metric system of meters since all tracks will be converting by the spring of 1980. A cost of \$20 thousand to \$25 thousand was anticipated by Bren-


