KHS Fine Arts Festival Sunday

KEWASKUM - This year the music, art and drama departments at Kewaskum High School are combining their efforts to present a variety of programs the entire family will enjoy.

Almost every area of the high school will be a bee-hive of activity during the annual Fine Arts Festival, which will run April 23 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Included in this year's offerings will be a continuous demonstration in the 700 area of various art techniques. These include drawing, painting, sculpture, ceramics, batik, pastel, water color, reed weaving, rug making, print making, wall hangings, copper tooling, and jewelry.

In addition, student works of the past year will be judged on Saturday, preceding the festival, and these will also be on display on Sunday. Ribbons for first, second, and third will be awarded.

The gymnasiums will be filled with music as the band and chorus present half hour concerts. The schedule includes symphonic band, 1:30; mixed chorus, 2:00; concert band, 2:20; girls chorus, 2:50; and swing choir and jazz ensemble at 3:10.

Along with the music and art presentation, students in theatrical literature will stage several one act plays during the afternoon. Using an improvised theater, festival-goers will be able to view the short plays in a section of the 700 area. Selections will include both comedy and melodrama.


sional presentation" of their services in a recent one-hour meeting with the board Bob Danielsen indicated he felt Kewaskum could always have notice of state and federal money that might become available because Foth, et. al., "have a full-time person researching grants." Mark Kral was impressed with their "lab facilities" which could "save some time" when sample analysis might be indicated. Dissenters were most concerned with the extra distance that would have to be traveled: Dan Schmidt and Raynor Herriges, while they felt both firms were qualified, feared that physical distance might be a factor in delaying solutions to problems that might arise on individual jobs.

Two projects that will be of primary consideration by the engineers-elect will be the updating of the wastewater treatment facilities and the problem of surface-water drainage on Kewaskum's west side.

Marvin Martin reported that Kewaskum's emergency warning device may be inadequate to reach all areas of the village. "It's not reliable or as powerful as it might be," cautioned Martin, director of Civil Defense. Having access to literature offering alternative systems, Martin said he would alert the members of the board to the equipment available from Alerting Communications of America.

The facilities at the wastewater treatment plant, the municipal garage and the historical museum will be open for the public's inspection April 30, from 1-4 p. m. Kewaskum area citizens are encouraged to tour the plant that pleased the E.P.A. Augie Bilgo promises to have all the new equipment shined up

Candidate Flynn Addresses County Labor Council Here

Matthew J. Flynn, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the 9th District, addressed a meeting of the Washington County Labor Council last Monday night at the Labor Center in Kewaskum.

Flynn noted the gains that had been made by working men and women over the past 20 years, but warned that those gains could be erased by inflation.

Addressing himself to the problem of inflation, Flynn noted that an immediate priority was to reduce the U. S. trade deficit, which is heavily influenced by U.S. imports of foreign oil. Flynn advocated more research into the "safe, responsible use of nuclear energy," and he advocated various conservation measures through tax incentives.

Flynn said that another problem that contributed to the trade deficit was the unwillingness of some foreign yer. countries to open their markets to American products. while flooding American markets with low priced goods. Flynn noted that he believed in fair trade, as well as free same advantage that foreign lus.

goods enjoy in American markets. In particular, Flynn noted that our courts now permit foreign countries to sue American businesses in the United States under the U. S. Antitrust Laws, and called for reciprocity between trading countries of legal rights.

Addressing himself to the performance of Congress itself, Flynn called the Congress "arrogant," and completely out-of-touch with its home districts. Flynn blasted the Senate for voting itself a new \$130,000,000 office building, and criticized the approximately one billion dollars which it now takes to run Congress alone

Flynn, 30, graduated from college in 1969, and served three years in the Navy as a navigator. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin Law School in Madison, and works in Milwaukee as a law-





Red Cross Rural Fund Drive Underway

McKenna Hosted By Reigles at Cocktail Party

State Senator Dale Mc-Kenna (D-Jefferson), who represented Washington County in the State Senate from 1969 to 1972, returned Monday night, this time as a candidate for Lt. Governor. Mc-Kenna was the guest of honor at a fundraising cocktail party hosted by the Ron Reigles at their Kewaskum home from 6 - 8 p. m.

McKenna, who was first sent to the Senate by Washington County voters in 1969. and again in 1970, has made an impressive record in his 81/2 years as a senator.

In 1972, he floor led to passage the landmark Consumer Credit Act, now used as a model by other states. In 1975, he founded the Legislative Audit Committee, a watchdog panel that has assisted the Legislative Audit Bureau in cutting waste in government. Last year, Mc-Kenna played key roles in passage of the Civil Service Reform Act and Wisconsin's new anti-drunk driving law.

McKenna is making property tax relief a campaign priority. He noted that the prospect of declining school enrollments is a factor that will force the issue of property tax relief in the years ahead. Earlier this year, McKenna suggested using part of the budget surplus to finance school-related property taxes paid by senior citizens. The plan carried a price tag of \$182 million, less than half of the proposed surplus.

"All across Wisconsin. communities like West Bend are faced with declining school enrollments, empty school buildings, and an educational system that relies too heavily on the property tax to pay for itself. Yet those same property taxes are forcing elderly citizens, who no longer need schools, out of their homes," McKenna observed. "In an age of the computer and space travel. our government ought to be able to solve this dilemma. If it doesn't, our citizens would have a right to consider a tax revolt."


McKenna says the Lieuten-

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ant Governor's job can be an important one if the person who holds it will listen to people and share their concerns with the Governor, who simply can't be everywhere.

"Walter Mondale is proving to be very important to the country because of the advice he is giving Jimmy Carter. A Lt. Governor can do the same thing by telling the Governor the hard truth on major issues. He can be one more pipeline from the average citizen at a time when state government badly needs it," McKenna conclud-

Petri Announces Candidacy for Lt. Governor

State Senator Thomas E. Petri (R-2nd District) has formally announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for lieutenant governor.

Petri is the first Republican to announce that he is seeking the state's second highest political post. He has run a state-wide campaign once before, in 1974, when he was the Republican contender for the United States Senate. In that race, Petri walked over 1500 miles across Wisconsin in an effort to learn, as he said, what the people of Wisconsin want their government to do."

In his five years as a state senator, Petri's proposals have included a welfare reform package designed to give more responsibility to, and to provide for more accountability from welfare recipients; a bill to split the DNR and create a separate environmental protection agency; a bill to eliminate the sales tax on home heating fuel; and legislation aimed at reducing the tax burden for senior citizens, small businessmen, and farmers.

Petri was born in Marinette in 1940 and grew up in Fond du Lac. He graduated from Harvard College and Law School before going to Africa as a Peace Corps volunteer. While there, he served as an economic advisor to the government of Somalia in East Africa. Petri later was Director of Crime Studies and of Drug Studies for the

White House, and a Fellow of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington. Senator Petri now practices law in Fond du Lac.

Petri recently attended the National Republican Governor's Conference in New Hampshire, and earlier this year, presented a program for neighborhood government at the National Press Club in Washington, D. C.

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


