New Engineering Firm to 'Wade' Into Kewaskum's Water Problems

With Monday night's Village Board approval the engineering firm of Foth & Van Dyke & Associates will soon be wading into Kewaskum's water problems.

Already having made a recommendation concerning the drainage of surface water from the land west of Kewaskum known as the Spoerl Subdivision, Foth, et. al., has sent two consultants to the area to look over the situaion. Donald Waller and James Monarchs will be returning to get the ball rolling on the expansion of the Wastewater treatment facilities as given guidelines by the Environmental Protection Agency. And, according to Robert Danielsen, the drainage problems of the Knights Avenue area are "under study by the new engineers."

Attorney Gerald Kiefer, representing Spoerl's interests. requested that the village "pick up the cost" of storm water drainage to Hy. H from the Spoerl property. Sewer and water conduit would run along Hy. H to the developing Charles Miller asked that the Board get some idea of cost before committing municipal funds to the pro-

In order to alleviate some of the problems with surface water running down Brooklane, an easement was ap-

Kiwanis Club Elects Officers

proved for installation of storm water drains through the property of Dennis and Dorothy Sharpe. Water is expected to be directed just south of the conduit under Edgewood Drive. Contracts for the project are expected to come from Westra Construction which will include rough cost estimates for bringing sewer and water mains to the park site as well.

Daniel Schmidt reported that the Plan Commission has indicated recently that storm sewers could be recommended In the new areas on the south side of Kewaskum if the land there faces development. The Commission will check the layout of sewers for the connecting streets checking the flow of existing sewers.

A recommendation from the Commission for "the creek on the south end of town" would probably need a \$2,000 endorsement in next year's budget, according to Schmidt.

John Kratz' water problems at the Kewaskum Malting Company were discussed by the Board but no conclusion was reached. Requesting a refund for wastewater treatment bills he claims are high, Kratz will be asked to wait until the Board can compare this June's tabulation with last year's figure now that repairs have been made on the manhole above the company's sewer line.

When informed by Nancy Malvick of the Junior Woman's Club's switch to a new receiver for recycling glass. the village went on record pledging their "cooperation" in the form of occasional help from the street crew and their front-end loader. Although colored glass will be accepted by the new firm. less profit is expected by Juniors.

Permits for spring buildng were granted to Robert Kirst, who was present at the meeting to "answer any questions." Robert Schmidt.

Rites for Frank Heppe, Former Postmaster

Frank Heppe, a resident of Kewaskum for over sixty years, died at his home on Tuesday, April 25, after a short illness. He was eightynine years old.

He was born Oct. 19, 1888, to Engelbert and Anna Ganns Heppe in Hartford. He married Nora Backus on April 13, 1914.

He is survived by his wife: one daughter, Ruth (Norman) Held of Kewaskum; two granddaughters, Nancy (Jack) Harwood of Ft. Myers, Florida, and Colleen (Tony) Messana of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan; four greatgrandchildren, Douglas and Andrew Harwood, Linda Dodie and Christopher Anthony Messana, and other relatives and friends.

A brother and sister preceded him in death.

Mr. Heppe came to Kewaskum in 1912, employed first as a bookkeeper at H. J. Lay Lumber Company . He then owned and operated Heppe's Delicatessen. After selling his business, he worked as a clerk and buyer in the grocery department at the L. Rosenheimer Store.

In May, 1934, he was appointed postmaster of the Village of Kewaskum, a position he held until his retirement on December 31, 1956.

He was a member of the Kewaskum Village Board for many years. Clerk of Court of Washington County and president of the Washington County Postmasters' Association. He also served on the Election Board of the Village of Kewaskum. He was a life-

One hundred Span sh speak. ing students from six Wisconsin schools attended a funfilled cultural weekend at Lake Geneva, April 21-23. Activities for the weekend included cultural sessions, skits, dancing and singing.

Upon arriving at the camp, each student was given a passport, and then was processed through customs. Students were required to keep the passport in their posses. sion during the entire weekend. Periodical checks were made and passports were then stamped.

Kewaskum High School's contingent was required to prepare the dinner meal on Saturday night. Included on the menu were enchiladas, guacamole, tostaditas, frijoles, quesadillas and burritos.







Entertainment, speakers and the presentation of scholarships to three county boys or girls who plan to continue their education in home economics, nursing or teaching highlighted the Homemaker Night banquet held Tuesday at the Knights of Columbus Hall.

The banquet is being held in honor of National Extension Homemaker Week. Members of the 36 extension homemaker units in the county will attend the banquet.

Extension Homemakers offers women the opportunity to have fun, while participating in educational programs offered through the University of Wisconsin — Extension office. said Gloria Krueger, of the organization.

The local clubs are a division of the county organization which belongs to a district unit, a part of the state council, and the state councils form the National Council which is connected with the Country Women's Council Women of the representing seven million women on six continents.

Each local club belongs to a center. Fond du Lac County has six centers: Brandon-Waupun, Bryon-Campbellsport, Fond du Lac I, Fond du Lac II, Fond du Northeast and Ripon-Rosendale.

Local homemakers groups usually meet in the homes of members once a month. Most of the units are small with ten to 20 members. Each meeting consists of a business meeting and a monthly project. Examples of projects include talks on chemical and food additives, the judicial system, tension and stress and Africa.

Fond du Lac County Homemakers hold a bi-annual holiday fair. This is an event that gives members the chance to display and sell crafts and handmade articles. The fair alternates with a craft workshop which includes instruction in new craft methods

Homemakers take part in College Week for Women in Madison each summer Membership teas and fashion shows are held and a display promoting the organization is prepared for the Fond du Lac County Fair each year.

Expand Feed Grain Program to Include

Advance Payments

New legislation just released offers farmer an opportunity to divert an additional 10% of feed grains according to Ira A. Oelhafen, Chairman of the Washington County ASC Committee.

A definite 20 cents per bushel payment for all corn acreage and 12 cents per bushel for barley will be earned. This amount is computed by multiplying planted acreage times the payment rate times the ASC farm yield.

Advance payments at sign up time will be offered on one-half of the expected payment. This additional 10% set aside from production is in addition to the required minimum 10%, or making a total 20% set aside of the planted acreage.

Farmers who have decided what they intend to plant are urged to sign up soon.

Woodburning Household Needs Storage for 12 Cords

By DAN A. WILSON, Resource Agent

Firewood must dry for nine to 12 months after it is cut to produce the greatest amount of heat. But where do you dry it?

Farmers find that unused corn cribs are good firewood storage containers. So are barns and old machine sheds, as long as they are ventilated and have sturdy floors

Basements aren't especially suited to firewood storage because they can be quite humid and the air may become stagnant.

If you don't have a place to store your wood, you may want to build a simple shed. An open-walled structure with a gabled roof supported by rough lumber of telephone pole sections and a gravel floor (to keep the wood off wet ground) will do.

The ideal shed can hold enough firewood for two burning seasons - half of it dry wood ready to burn and the other half green wood drying for the next season. Since the average woodburning homeowner uses six cords a year, the average s. ed should hold 12 cords.

A shed 16 feet square and eight feet high, or of different dimensions but the same volume, is suitable for storage of 12 cords of wood.

A schematic drawing of a basic firewood shelter is included in UWEX publication G2373, "Locating, Cutting and Gathering Wood." The publication is available for 15¢ at the Washington County UW-Extension Office, Courthouse Annex II, 515 E. Washington St., Box 537, West Bend, WI 53095.
