69 Riders Participate in Local Bike-a-Thon



On Saturday, May 6, the March of Dimes held its annual bike-a-thon in the Kewaskum - Campbellsport area. The event this year was entitled as the "March of Dimes Ride - Stride '78."

The bike route was a 63 mile jaunt beginning at the Kewaskum and Campbellsport parks and was a fine success. There were 69 parti-

cipants in Kewaskum and 51 in Campbellsport.

Plans Discussed for Make-up of United Way Fund Drive in Area

Lem Rosenheimer and James D. Reigle, co-chairmen of Kewaskum Area's United Way Fund drive, reported to the Board of Directors at a meeting held on Monday, May 8. "Kewaskum Area" includes all the area included in Kewaskum's school district.

The co-chairmen discussed their plans for the make-up of the Fund Drive, with areas to be covered designated by divisions: industrial, financial, professional, retail, taverns and restaurants, transportation, public employees, special gifts (organizations, and residential, including rural.

Most employees and businessmen will be canvassed at their place of employment or business with all other members of the community solicited in their homes when the Fund Drive gets underway in mid-September. A chairman for each division is being chosen from within the division itself.

The Fund Drive plan was approved by the Board of Directors.

wish to be included, and stated that other groups should notify him at the Valley Bank if they would like applications for inclusion.

Regular Meeting Of School Board

The regular meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education will be held Monday, May 15, 1978, at 8 p. m. in the administrative offices.

Agenda items will again include questions on staffing for next year, as well as consideration of small remodeling projects. Staffing for the kindergarten screening and approval for the summer music and driver education programs will also be considered, as will payroll and vouchers payable.

Purchasing approval for protective screens at Kewaskum Elementary and security devices for the aluminum doors in the schools in the village will be voted on, and the board will also discuss whether members wish to meet on May 29, which is Memorial Day. Administrative contracts for next year and the contract for the school psychologist will be on the agenda. Contracts for any new teachers recommended for hiring will also be considered. Miscellaneous items which come up will also be acted upon.

A closed session will be held following the regular meeting to discuss teacher negotiations and other wages and salaries.

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The danger zones for food temperatures is from 60° to 140°. If food is held warm for two hours, it can be dangerous for this is ideal bacteria growth. Baking, boiling, roasting and broiling destroys most bacteria. Food should be cooked to an internal temperature of at least 140°. Cooked food should be served immediately. Leftover food should be refrigerated immediately.

Bacteria growth is retarded if the temperature is low. All puddings, cream dishes, and mayonnaise base salads should be kept cold until serving time.

As soon as you return home from a shopping trip, store your meat, eggs, cheese, milk, fish and poultry in the refrigerator.

Fruits and vegetables are not ordinarily a good environment for bacteria growth. However, it is best to store these in the refrigerator, too, and wash before serving.

These hazardous materials travel through our communities both by railroad and trucks on our highways every day.

The solvents that were burned were donated by Freeman Chemical of Saukville, which also sent five employees to participate along with firemen from Boltonville and 12 Kewaskum firemen.

Firemen fought the 30'x30' pit fires with both water and liquid foam at the village landfill site.

On Saturday, May 13, four Kewaskum firemen will be attending another hazardous material school at the Moraine Park Technical Institute from 8:00 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.

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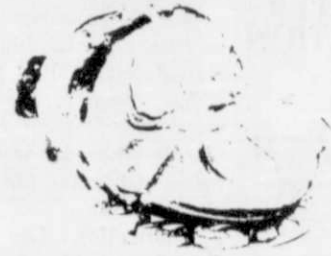

Linda, a chemistry and biology major, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Secor, Route 1, Kewaskum.

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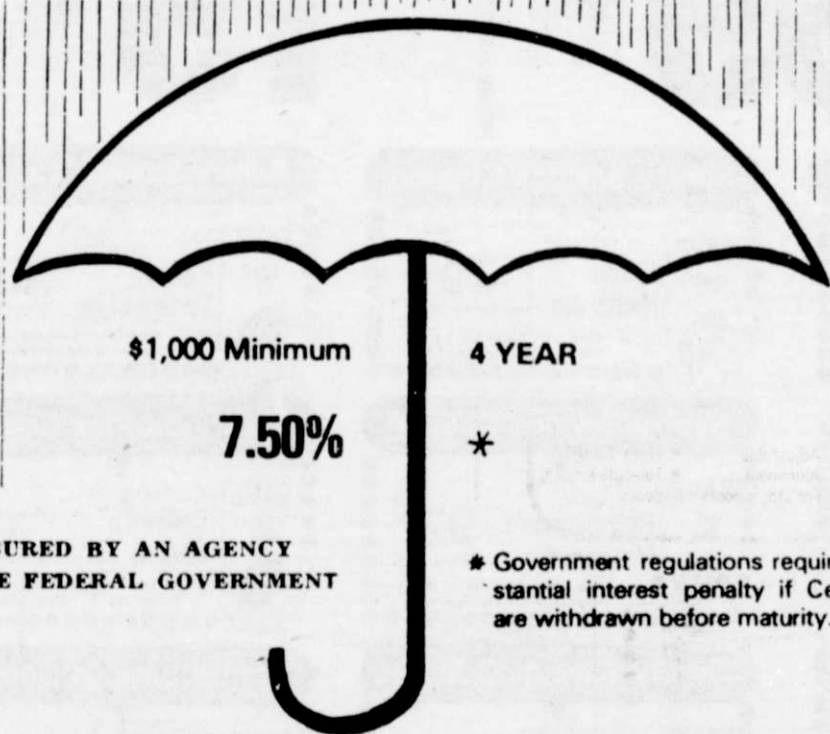

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Bicycle Safety Week in Wisconsin May 7-13

"Bicycle Safety Week in Wisconsin" has been proclaimed for May 7-13, 1978, by Acting Governor Martin J. Schreiber.

The state's chief executive says bikes are outselling autos and the bicycle "has become an important mode of transportation through such activities as recreation, physical fitness, commuting and touring."

By law the cyclist has a right to use public roadways, and by common understanding the motorist expects bikers to share the road with him in a lawful and predictable manner, according to Don Gehrman, state highway safety coordinator.

Gehrman points out that 28 bikers were killed in our state last year, 20 of them on rural roads. In 1976 the toll was 27, again 20 on rural roads.

Last year 1,690 bikers were injured, with the majority of mishaps occurring on city streets. Last year's fatal crash victims included 20 males and seven females. Those injured included 1,174 males and 516 females. Hardest hit age group was 10 to 14 years, with 12 killed and 569 injured in this category.

Gehrman praised police officials, educators, and others who have stressed bike safety for years in bike safety roadshows, safety poster displays, movie showings and other activities.

Sheriff Warns County Citizens On Home Repairs

Sheriff Clarence A. Schwartz has issued an alert to Washington County citizens against dealing with itinerant home repair crews. At this time of the year, he said, when people are thinking about improvements and repairs to homes, barns and other buildings, they would be wise to heed the time-honored warning, "Don't deal with strangers at the door."

In a news release, Schwartz cited information from the Consumer Protection Division that most consumer complaints about high prices and shoddy or unfinished home repair work result from dealings with itinerant repair crews.

A recent example, he said, was a case involving contractors who last year installed lightning rods on two rural homes at a total cost of \$350. Two men reappeared later to inspect the job at one of the homes. They claimed that lightning had struck one of the rods and it had to be replaced. They charged \$450 cash for the work, stating

that the company would refund the money within three days. They disappeared and no refund has been made.

In other past instances, Schwartz said, con men have misquoted prices to paint roofs and when the owner refused to pay an exorbitant price, they threatened to burn the building down; and itinerant crews have attracted driveways at attractive prices, but used sealer diluted with gasoline, "turn-

ing the driveway into a gooey mess."

Schwartz said, "In all of these instances, the itinerant crews had moved on to greener pastures by the time homeowners had discovered that they had been duped.

"The best advice is deal only with reputable, well-established firms located in your area, and more importantly, 'Don't deal with strangers at the door.'"

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MARTIN J. SCHREIBER, Acting Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim the week of May 7 - 13, 1978, as

BICYCLE SAFETY WEEK IN WISCONSIN

and urge governmental agencies, civic/service organizations and concerned citizens to make a concerted effort to make bicycling a safer activity in Wisconsin through programs aimed at both young and adult bicyclists and motor vehicle operators so that an improved sharing of the roadway can be achieved.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Wisconsin to be affixed. Done at the Capitol in the City of Madison this fifteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventy-eight.

Kewaskum Post Office to Be Part Of Area Mail Processing Program

The Kewaskum Post Office will become part of the Area Mail Processing Program of the U. S. Postal Service on May 20, it was announced this week by Postmaster Harry Koch.

"This modern mail-processing program, which began on a national basis in 1970, is intended to gain maximum efficiency through the use of the mechanized 'AMP' facility at Milwaukee," Postmaster Koch said.

"The Milwaukee, Wisconsin Postal Facility," said Koch "will now handle processing functions for a total of 49 area post offices, including our office."

The "AMP" is a plan whereby mail originating at post offices within a given area is consolidated for processing at a major nearby facility, including complete preparation of mail for outgoing dispatch.

This centralized processing of mail for a wide area is more efficient, and helps to maintain the quality of service, he said.

However, provisions are made for continuance of the local postmark in all area

offices, Koch emphasized.

All mail deposited in a receptacle at the post office which is designated for the deposit of mail for LOCAL POSTMARK ONLY, will be cancelled with the postmark of the local post office, he explained.

All mail deposited into street letter boxes not designated for local delivery, or into the "out-of-town" letter drops at the participating post offices will be sent to the Milwaukee Area Mail Processing Center for processing. This mail will bear the Mail Processing Center postmark, which is Milwaukee WI 532, along with a date and time designation.

Local postmarks do not change.

Postmaster Koch urged, however, that customers no longer use the word "city" on mail addressed for local delivery, but spell out the name of the city and use the correct ZIP Code.

He emphasized that because of the high degree of mechanization at the Milwaukee facility, the use of ZIP Code on all mail becomes extremely important.

"This program has been successful all over the country for seven years," Koch added.

"In some cases, there has been a misconception that the local postmark is 'lost' in the process, but I want to make it clear that this is not true, as evidenced by the provisions we are making for local postmarking where desired."

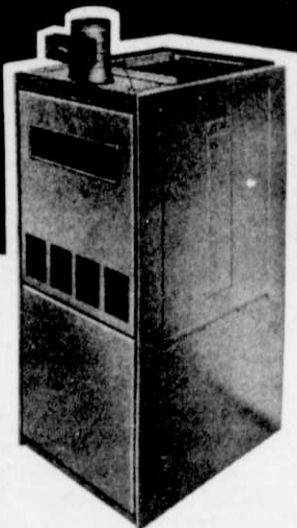


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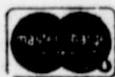
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Middle School 7th and 8th Grade Girls Teams Both Undefeated in Spring Basketball
