Statesman Installs New Typesetting Equipment

You will notice the Statesman has a new, cleaner look this week.

It is the result of a product of the latest technology available to the print media which has been installed in our office.

The Statesman has said "Goodbye" to "hot" metal typesetting and made the transition to so-called "cold" type. In other words we have changed over from the former method of using lead to set type to a modern photography process.

A new Compugraphic I typesetting machine has been installed and is in its first week of operation. This computerized phototypesetting machine was purchased with the idea of doing away with the old linotype method, speeding up the operation of setting type, and at the same time improving on the appearance of the paper.

Along with the Compugraphic I, a Compukwik Processor was also installed, which processes the film strips.

The news matter is now set in a more readable 9 point type on a 10 point body, while previously it had been set in 8 point type on a 10 point slug. The Compugraphic I also sets type for headings and ads in sizes 7 point, 12 point, 14 point, 18

point and 24 point sizes.

In this issue most of the news matter and headlines are set on the new machine. Within a week or two, after our operator becomes more familiar with the phototypesetter, the transition will be complete.

Jean Smith, 2 Others Killed In Accident

Three women died in a collision Sunday evening at County A and M, south of Fillmore.

Victims of the accident were Jean Smith, 30, 1800 Barton Ave., West Bend, formerly of Kewaskum, Mary L. Miller, 41, and Helen Miller, 68, both of 11531 N. Wilson Ave. 64W, Mequon.

The accident occurred when cars driven by Thomas Breckenridge, 36, 233 S. 8th Ave., West Bend, and Mary Miller collided. Authorities said the Millers were southbound on County M, and Breckenridge apparently ran the stop sign on County A, hitting the Miller car broadside.

Breckenridge was reported to be in satisfactory condition Monday morning at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. The sheriff's Department report said he appeared to have suffered broken ribs and loosened teeth.

Coroner Robert Boltz said all three women were dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, where they were taken by Newburg's rescue squad and Schmidt ambulance. The Millers both sustained internal injuries and Jean Smith, who was a passenger in the Breckenridge car, had a broken neck.

Breckenridge is said to have told authorities he didn't see either the stop sign or the other car approaching the intersection.

Jean A. Smith, nee Konicek, was born Nov. 26, 1947, in Prairie du Chien, Wis. and graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1965. She was the owner and operator of the Long Branch Tavern in West Bend for eight years.

Survivors include her mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Ebersold of Kewaskum; her father, Clarence Konicek of Prairie du Chien; one sister, Mrs. Manwell (Judy) Dahman of Kewaskum, and other relatives and friends.

Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, was from 12 noon until 4 p.m. on Wednesday, at which time services were held at the funeral home. Rev. Collette Stellmacher of the Methodist Church, Campbelsport, officiated. Burial followed in the Lutheran Memorial Park, Kewaskum.

MEMORIAL DAY COOKOUT
Memorial Day is the day for the first picnic of the year, or at least cook out. It is so great to get the family and friends together for some out-of-door cooking.
This year the Crowley's "cook out" for Memorial Day includes beef kabobs. I will use onion steaks for the beef kabobs.
Beef is the most popular meat in this country. Everyone enjoys a steak. From the time of the early settlers and still to day, a steak is considered the champagne of meats.
Beef is high in protein. The harder the beef, the more protein. Most beef has some marbling of fat in the red tissues. This marbling adds to the tenderness as well as the flavor in preparing kabobs or steaks. The outside covering of fat can be removed.
Beef is also a good source of iron. Iron is needed in the diet for the red blood cells. The iron part of the red blood cells makes it possible for oxygen to be carried to all the cells of the body. Without oxygen, the cells would die. One of our Memorial Day beef kabobs will supply one third of all the iron needed in a day for an adult. The recipe I use is very simple.
Beef Kabobs
2 lbs. boneless sirloin of beef
1 lb. French salad dressing
Cut beef into 1 1/2 inch cubes. Place in bowl and cover with French dressing. Mix well. Cover and refrigerate for 8 to 24 hours. Alternate on skewer with:
16 green peppers (1 1/2") 16 mushroom cubes 16 mushrooms
Cook over slow burning charcoal log for 20-25 minutes. Turn and baste with marinade from the meat bowl during the cooking time. When done, top with cheese, tomato, sauce & ketchup.

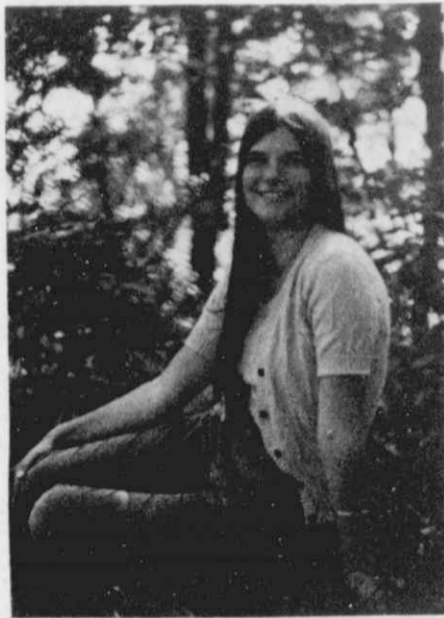
Winners of Junior Woman's Club Scholarships

Roger Neumann was selected as the Outstanding Young Farmer at the recent FFA Banquet. Neumann is an area dairy farmer, who produces quality milk on his 216 acre farm. Neumann milks an average of 48 to 50 cows and has the capability of milking 60 cows in his barn. Neumann practices extensive farm planning and has very good soil conservation techniques. He has his soil tested regularly thru a soil consulting service to keep balance. Neumann's is one of the first farms in the area to have an operating Deval DV300. This "milker with a brain" is a vacuum with an automatic takeoff. Neumann is particularly proud of the quality of his milk. His milk has a bacteria count of under 5,000, and a coli count of under 2, while pasteurized milk to meet federal standards has a bacteria count of under 20,000, and a coli count of under 10. Because of the high quality of his milk, Neumann has been working to establish a law allowing him to sell raw milk directly to the consumer.

Roger and his wife Ann have two daughters and live at Route 2, Kewaskum. Members of this year's selection committee were Roy Esser, Assistant Principal at Kewaskum High School; Gordon Darmody, Kewaskum High School Ag Teacher, and Wayland Tessar, President of Valley Bank.

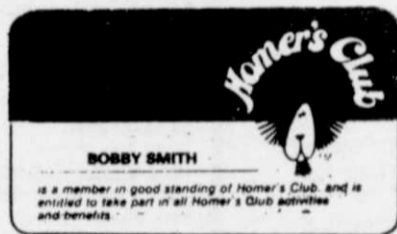
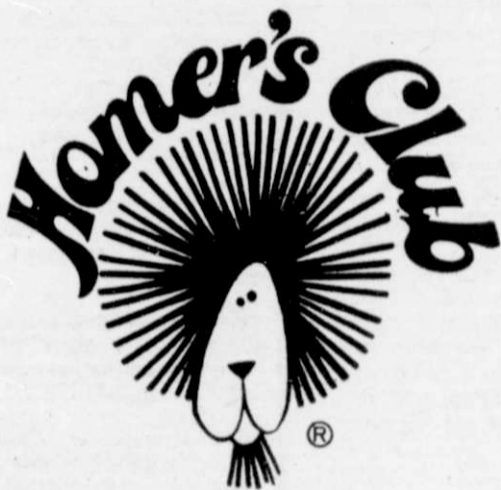

School Board Delays Voting on Additional Administrative Staff

Due to the absence of Charles Ogi and Byron Gessner, the Kewaskum Board of Education at their meeting last week, decided to delay voting on the issue of additional administrative staff until their next meeting June 5.

Existing administrative staff received approval on a 6.1-6.2 per cent wage increase for next year. Salaries for the 1978-79 school year will range from the half-time principal's salary (Farmington) of \$10,727 to the superintendent's salary of \$27,000. A two-year salary schedule was approved for the school psychologist position, with \$15,376 being the 1979-80 figure.

Summer programs in music, kindergarten screening and, if enough enroll, classroom drivers' education received funding for another season.

A device expected to guarantee more security at the high school, middle school and elementary school will be installed on the doors of those three buildings. According to Floyd Brenholt, the new security arrangement will not affect escape measures should anyone be accidentally locked inside the structures.

Protective screens for the elementary school have also been approved for four windows due to their tendency to "bow out." That additional safety factor will probably cost an excess of \$400.

Lynn Walters, English teacher and assistant coach for the girl's basketball team at the high school, was granted a release from her newly approved contract for teaching next year. A change in her husband's em-

ployment was given as the reason.

The board decided to move the library to the 700 area of the high school. Costs will be kept at a minimum by having staff and students in related fields do the carpentry work.

Brenholt said that he will soon be making appointments within the staff for writing the new curriculum as a result of the studies being completed. Each teacher will receive three-fourths their regular salary for the job.

Carol Asch, a graduate of Kewaskum High School, will be presenting a Senior Recital on May 28, at 2:00 p.m. in the UWWC Auditorium, West Bend. Also playing in the recital will be Anne Strancke and Kumiko Onuma.

The program will include works for piano, strings and voice by Bach, Marais, Brahms, Rachmaninoff and Copland. An art exhibit will be on display by Renee Slegler. Following the recital there will be a reception.

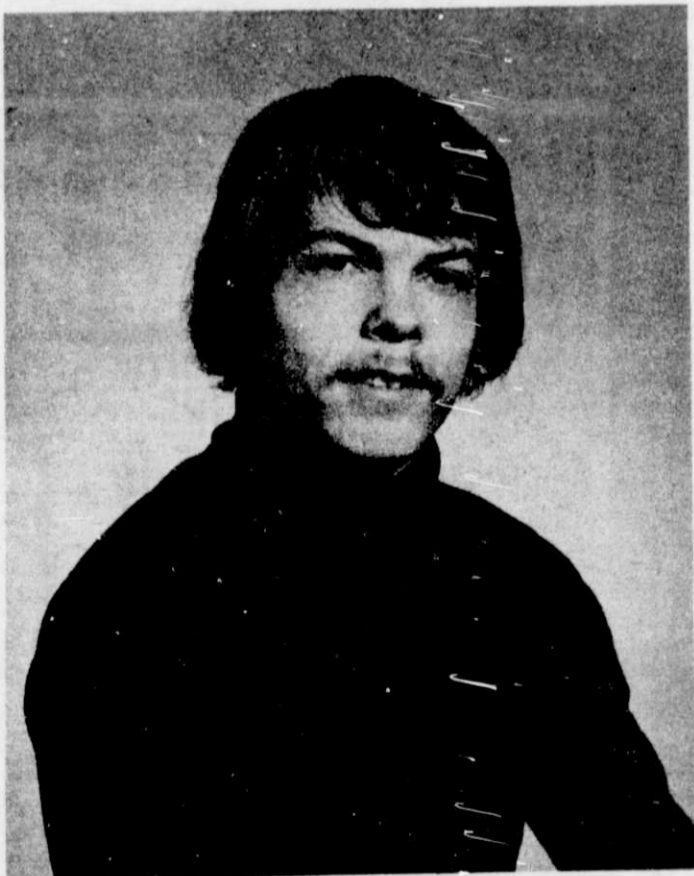
They also have 14 granddaughters, 13 grandsons, two great-granddaughters and two great-grandsons.

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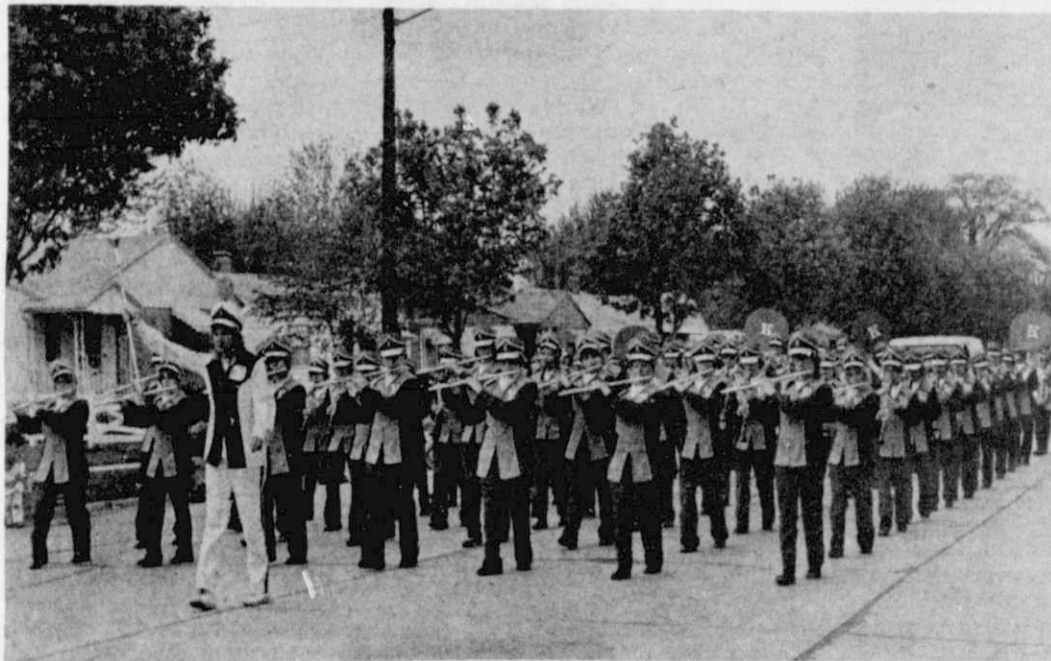

Berg Finds Post As Dane County Board Supervisor Fascinating

After one month as Madison's University area Dane County Board supervisor, Paul Berg feels he's had a "charmed month."

"I'm finding it fascinating," Berg said. "There's no other place in Wisconsin with this kind of County Board. Board members are intelligent, young for the most part, and they all have personalities," he said. "And I got the best committee appointments of any freshman on the board."

Berg, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elwood Berg, Route 2, Kewas-

kum, defeated a one-term incumbent for the board position in the recent Dane County elections. A University of Wisconsin-Madison law student, Berg graduated from Northwestern Prep High School, Watertown, in 1970.

From there he worked one year, spent two years at Washington County and graduated from UW-Madison in 1976 with great distinction, receiving a bachelor's degree in history and political science.

Berg was active in theater and music in high school and maintained his interest while at UW-Washington County, playing the lead in several productions. It was also there that he began his political career. He served as the student government president, founded the school's literary magazine, and was a member of "just about every campus committee." He extended his involvement outside of the campus by serving two years as treasurer of the Washington County Democratic party and on the board of directors for the County Drug Information Center.

Berg continued his political involvement at UW-Madison. He is currently a member of the Law School Ad Hoc Committee

on grading, a university tutor, a member of the University Health Committee and has served on numerous other committees. He was elected this fall to the Student Bar Council and is the first male member of the Women's Law Students Association.

Despite his political experience, he is still settling into his new County Board post. "For the first five months I'll probably keep my mouth shut and try to get my bearings. I'm still finding out where the mines are buried," he explained.

Past activities at UW-Madison include being a staff member at the Drug Information Center, head of the history honors society and an organizer of the Wisconsin Public Interest Research Group. He was also selected for the Wisconsin Universities United Nations Summer Seminar.

Interested in Madison politics for the past two years, Berg has worked on several city campaigns. In 1976-77 he served as inner-city coordinator for county executive candidate Rod Matthews. And he was also the inner-city coordinator for Moria Krueger in her successful race for county judge last August. Following her victory, Krueger

asked him to be her Campaign Coordinator in her race for reelection this spring before it became apparent she would have no opposition.

After attending several Dane County Board meetings, Berg decided to oppose the one-term incumbent in October, stressing issues, parking and housing issues. He led an organized and active campaign and of his victory the second youngest board member says, "It was small, but exciting."

Although Berg enjoys Madison, he hopes to serve as board supervisor for only two years. After graduating from law school, he plans to pursue a doctorate in international relations at Columbia University in New York.

Although his new position is theoretically a part-time job, Berg feels that "for any reasonably competent county supervisor, it's a full-time job. And I've already found that it is."
