Peterson, Joiner Granted Amateur Radio Licenses

The Federal Communications Commission at Chicago granted new Amateur Radio standing on May 26 to L. N. Peterson, Chairman of the Board of Regal Ware, Inc., who received the Technician Class License, and to Rev. D. R. Joiner, pastor of Peace Church, who received the Amateur Extra license which is the highest class license available.

Both of these Kewaskum men were granted these licenses after a thorough written examination and proficiency in sending and receiving the Morse Code.

In the State of Wisconsin there are now 6,053 amateur radio operators. The fundamental purpose for anateur radio is: the recognition and enhancement of the value of the amateur service to the public as a voluntary noncommercial communication service, particularly with respect to providing emergency communications; to promote interest in amateur radio communication and experimentation; for the relaying of messages by radio and for the merchants. Fire Numbers No Longer Exist in Washington Co.

The Washington County Fire Chiefs have expressed concern over confusion which still exists among some residents over fire numbers and house numbers and addresses.

Many years ago, rural properties were assigned fire numbers to provide quick and practical identification for emergency services. With the increase in population in rural areas, a more practical system was deemed necessary. The various governmental bodies in Washington County decided to establish a uniform address numbering system. This system was supported and encouraged by the fire departments, sheriff's department, police departments, post office, and other organizations. This system has worked out very well, and in order to avoid any delay in responding to an emergency call, the fire chiefs urge all residents to be aware that fire numbers no longer exist, and if an emergency develops, that they use their regular street, highway, or road address and any identifying geographical information when calling for help.







# Savings & Loan **Announces New Interest Rate**

Savers at West Bend Savings and Loan Association will be able to earn a compounded interest rate of 8.45 per cent on long term deposits, starting June 1, Association President, Richard A. Larson announced.

To earn the full rate, savings must be left on deposit for a term of eight years, and interest left to accumulate on an annual basis.

The new certificates are being sold in denominations of \$5,000 or more. The certificates are federally insured up to \$40,000.

Larson said the new savings account interest rate was authorized by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board on May 11.


The eight to ten year certificates will carry an eight per cent stated interest rate, but with daily compounding the effective annual yield is 8.45 per cent, if interest is left in the account.

'Until now, the highest compounded interest rate savers' could earn under Federal regulations was 8.17 per cent on six-year certificates," said Larson. "But, with the new authority just granted, we will be able to help our long term savers accumulate an even better return."

Larson added that the longer term certificates will also be helpful to home buyers because they will enable the association to stretch the terms of some savings capital, matching more closely the long terms of most mortgage loans.

He said certificate holders may withdraw earnings without penalty at any time. Deposits can also be withdrawn before maturity, but subject to an interest penalty required by federal regulations. The withdrawn deposits would earn interest at 51/4 per cent, less 90 days interest.

A second new type of savings certificate, also federally insured to \$40,000 is being offered in denominations of






