Two Children Killed in Area Fire

Two children died in an early morning fire Sunday at their home near Campbellsport. Their parents and a sister were also burned, one seriously, in the blaze.

Donna Ann Erickson, 13, and her brother, Lee, 8, were found in a bedroom of the one-story home, built less than a year ago, located at the corner of Maple Drive and Fond du Lac County Trunk Y, about a mile southeast of Campbellsport (about five miles north of Kewaskum).

About 30 members of the Campbellsport Fire Department responded to the call about 1:35

The girl was dead at the scene while the boy died enroute to St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac.

The father, Marlyn Erickson, 37, was taken to St. Mary's Burn Center in Milwaukee, in serious condition with second and third degree burns to 48 per cent of his body. Delores Erickson, 39, the mother, suffered first and second degree burns and was taken to St. Agnes Hospital. Colleen Erickson, 10, was treated at St. Agnes Hospital and was released Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Erickson, her husband and daughter, Colleen, escaped through the kitchen and out the attached garage.

Mrs. Erickson ran to the neighbors, the Robert Gellings, and awakened them screaming that her house was on fire. Mrs. Gellings called the Fire Department while her husband ran next door to attempt to rescue the children but the intense heat and heavy smoke stopped him from entering the house.

According to Campbellsport Fire Chief Joseph Thelen, the blaze was brought under control in about 15 minutes. The outside walls are still standing but the interior was destroyed.

Neighbors said the family had been cooking outdoors Saturday evening using a charcoal grill that was found in the garage. Mrs. Erickson said she had doused the coals with water after they were finished cooking. Exact cause of the fire has not been determined.

The family formerly resided in Wayne, Washington County. Erickson works for the West Bend Co. at West Bend and his wife is employed at Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum.

Funeral services for Donna A. Erickson and Leland L. "Lee"

Erickson will be Friday at 1:30 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church, West Bend. Rev. Victor Hackbarth and Rev. Timothy K. Prasad, pastor of Salem United Church of Christ, Wayne, will co-officiate. Burial will be in Washington County Memorial

Visitation at the Schmidt Funeral Home, West Bend, will be from 4 p.m. Thursday until 10:30 a.m. on Friday and at the church from noon on Friday until the time of services.

Donna was born in El Paso, Texas, on April 26, 1965. Shortly after her birth the family moved to West Bend. In 1966 the family moved to the Town of Wayne and since July of 1977 they have lived in their present home.

She was an eighth grade student at Campbellsport Elementary School.

Lee was born in West Bend on Nov. 23, 1969, and lived in the Town of Wayne until moving to their present home.

He was a second grade student at Campbellsport Elementary School.

Survivors include their parents, Delores (Menke) and Marlyn Erickson; one sister, Colleen, at home; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Erickson of Shawano, and other relatives and friends.

Regal Ware Traffic Congestion Problems Discussed by Board

Problems of traffic congestion at the Regal Ware plant highlighted discussion at Monday's Village Board meeting.

Board members reviewed the problem which seems to peak when first shift workers leave in the afternoon.

The board suggested utilizing a traffic director similar to what is done at West Bend Co. when peak traffic there causes problems on Hwy. 33.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty opposed using a traffic director because he felt traffic subsides in 5-10 minutes.

Thus, because of the time factor it wouldn't be worth having a man direct traffic.

Hlavaty reviewed changes that had been tried in the area eliminating parking on Second Street and creating a double lane of traffic flow from the east. While this solution eleviated some of the traffic backup, problems still exist.

After further discussion the board decided to review the matter at a future meeting.

A problem of parking semitrailers drew some concern. Board members have received some complaints from village residents.

A remedy to the problem will

be worked ont at a future date.

In another action, Trustee Robert Danielsen expressed his disappointment on the cancellation of a meeting with subdividers on a new west side development.

Village President Miller pointed out that the subdividers failed to attend the meeting which led to its cancellation.

The Village Board and contractors building the new bathhouse will meet next Wednesday to review any unfinished work.

Proposed dedication date for the new building is set for September.

The board held over for a future meeting a request from Police Chief Hlavaty that parttime clerical help be provided for his department. The chief stated that the problem of paperwork has been piling up. At the present time he has insufficient manpower to do the job adequately.

The problem of minibikes in the park was also discussed and the board agreed to install "No Motorbikes Allowed" signs as soon as they are made available.

The board also paid recognition to the Kewaskum FFA Chapter for its construction of

Jennifer Nolting to Complete Master's Degree in England

Jennifer Nolting, a fourth level teacher in the Greendale Public Schools, will be spending six weeks this June and July working a counterpart in a school in England.

This experience is part of a graduate course being offered by the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater which combines the theoretical and practical aspects of teaching. With the course, Jennifer will complete her requirements for a Master Degree in Education.

Before leaving for overseas on June 13, Jennifer will have completed 15 hours of course work on world educational systems. While in the overseas schools, the American teachers stay with their counterparts for the entire day helping out in any way they can. Jennifer will be stationed in the Meadowdale School in Bedlington, Northumberland, England.

No more than two American teachers have been placed in any overseas school in the program to help insure the maximum amount of cultural submersion for the American teacher. The course is seen as a broadening experience that may help participants to more clearly identify universal problems in education and to get a better perspective on their own teaching.

Jennifer Nolting is the younger daughter of Dr. F. E. Nolting of Kewaskum. She graduated from the Kewaskum Schools in 1966 and from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1970

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
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Explain Purpose Of Saddle Club



Kewaskum's Young Track Girls 4th in State; Freshman Barb Wilson, Mile Relay Team State Champs

Kewaskum's exceptionally young track girls did themselves proud in the WIAA girls' state meet at Madison over the weekend, placing fourth out of 42 finalist teams in Class B and missing second place by just two points.

Kewaskum had two state champions. Freshman Barb Wilson placed first in the mile Friday with a time of 5:22.8, a new KHS school record. The KHS mile relay team also took a first on Saturday with a time of 4:08.5. Members of the team include two freshmen and two sophomores, namely Laurie Wilson, soph; Barb Wilson, frosh; Diane Bremser, soph, and Julann Zemlicka, frosh. Katie Lightner, another freshman, also went to state. She competes in the 100 yard dash and 880 relay unit.

Friday afternoon Barb Wilson in her tour of the four laps in the time of 5:22.8 in her winning mile finished almost two seconds ahead of Mo Garrity of Prairie du Chien.

Kewaskum's second first place in the mile relay Saturday took some doing. On Friday the Indians did not have too good a time and placed fifth best among the eight qualifiers but it was a different story on Saturday when they hit the tape in first place.

Barb Wilson's second leg of the event was the "key." She took the baton from her sister Laurie and moved to the inside lane for good position. With the Chilton runner ahead by about five yards, Barb passed her and continued to increase the lead for the rest of the race. Therefore Diane Bremser had a good eight yard cushion when it was her turn to carry the baton and she held the lead for the entire lap, then left it up to Zemlicka as Prairie du Chien had moved up to second and had their ace runner Mary Mulrooney anchoring. Mulrooney gained on Zemlicka but she did not let her opponent overtake her.

The 880 relay team had bad luck. Running in about fourth place going into the last runners, Jenny Schaub could not reach Zemlicka for the exchange. She made a lunge for her and fell sprawling to the track. Zemlicka had to come back to Schaub for the baton and the Indians thus finished eighth. A fifth place finish would have put Kewaskum in second in the team standings and earned them a large trophy.

Other Kewaskum places were a third by Barb Wilson in the 880, again in record time, and a sixth by Robin Acker in the two mile as she tied her best effort.
