Alert Sounded Here As Tornado Causes Damage in Nearby Area

Tornado warnings were issued for Dodge County, southern Fond du Lac county and northern Washington county (including Kewaskum) Saturday evening.

The tornado was first reported to have touched down and caused serious damage in the Village of Burnett, made its way across Horicon marsh and then hit and caused much damage in the Village of Theresa in Dodge county. Coming closer it then struck the Town of Wayne in Washington county, again creating severe damage, as it headed in our direction. The tornado alert siren was sounded in Kewaskum as the storm approached about 8:30 p.m. and residents took cover. It became extremely dark and overcast with high winds and about two inches of rain fell. However, Kewaskum escaped the brunt of the storm and no extensive damage was reported.

Shortly after the tornado alert here, the fire siren sounded and many residents believed it was an all clear signal. But it was a fire call to the Town of Auburn where lightning knocked out a transformer.

The tornado first touched down about three miles west of Burnett at 7:35 p.m. destroying a barn. Other farms also had extensive damage.

In the Village of Burnett two trailers were destroyed. Other barns were demolished in the Town of Williamstown, located between Mayville and Kekos-

The twister then made its way down Highway 28 and into

The Village of Theresa was one of the hardest hit areas in Dodge county. Twelve homes had extensive damage with roofs blown off and trees falling on buildings. Garages and sheds were destroyed. The twister picked up a van and tossed it over the top of a car, and a boat was lifted into a nearby tree.

Theresa Police Officer Michael Mansfield said he felt the tornado lift up his squad car with the wheels spinning while driving through town to warn residents. He escaped injury.

The Town of Wayne also reported barns destroyed along with other buildings and numerous downed trees. At the Dennis Terlinden farm the whole top of the barn was taken off. A shed at the Jerry Darmody farm in Wayne which was put up last year and cost \$5,200 was completely gone. At the Kermit Coulter farm on County H, a lean-to shed and the roof of his hog house were heavily

damaged. Trees were uprooted on the Edgar Miske farm.

Village Board Accepts Bid For Blacktopping Streets

Two blacktopping bid proposals were put before the Village Board at Monday night's meeting. Ram Construction proposed their bid which would total \$49,704 and Payne and Dolan, Inc. put in their bid totaling \$56,375. Both bids included the removal of the old asphalt.

The locations of the roadwork are: 290 ft. of Brooklane Dr. and the entire Edgewood Road, Stark St. and Moraine Court, Reigle Dr. and Third St., Knights Avenue, Second Street, and Lin-De Lane. Streets in which old asphalt must be removed are: Reigle Dr., Third St. and Railroad Street.

It was stated that work must

be completed by August 15,

The Board, in the absence of Danielsen and Herriges, recessed to go over the two bids. After the meeting resumed it was recommended that the Ram Construction bid be accepted. With a motion by Donald Mlodzik and a second by Mark Kral, the members voted in favor of the Ram bid of \$49,704.

Approximately \$3,000 worth of tools were taken from the industrial arts department and about an equal amount of damage was done to the building when the Kewaskum High School building was broken into sometime during the night on Monday of last week.

According to Police Chief Donald Hlavaty, the old back doors to the school had been pried open to gain entrance to the building. The door was then reset by the burglars, making it difficult for the officer on night duty to notice that anyone had illegally entered the school.

Hlavaty reported another door was found open at 5:20 a.m. but he didn't feel it has anything to do with the burglary. Inside the building they ruined several doors, including two steel doors, in attempting to get to the tool area.

Hlavaty said the tools taken are mainly used in factories and service stations.

School Superintendent Floyd Brenholt said all of the tools are covered by insurance.

A request for sewer and water extension on Werner Dr. proposed a problem. Before construction proceedings began, owners in this area were promised water and sewer appropriations. During construction they were notified they were not to receive the facilities. Approval for the extension of the service went through but the decision for who hires the contractor will have to be discussed with those involved.

The Board was confronted with three assessment complaints in which payment of taxes were made under protest. Explanations showed the two parties who went before the Board of Review did not agree with its decision.

Daniel Schmidt motioned to turn the matter over to the Board of Review which in turn would go over the matter with the assessor. The members honored the motion.

The Village of Kewaskum should be receiving a total of \$13,987 for the Sewage Plant Grant project.

Confusion with sirens during last weekend's storm presented a problem involving the distinction between a fire alarm and the "all clear" signal. No action was taken, but the matter is to be discussed with the fire chief.

Schmidt reported that progress on the new park is going well but that there is a need for electricity as soon as possible.

The final evaluation before adjournment was the traffic condition at Regal Ware when employees leave work. A recent report showed that traffic on Second Street moves smoothly although occasional back-ups on the east side of the railroad tracks do occur but in 5-10 minutes the traffic conditions do take care of themselves.

Hephner Will Seek Reelection

This session, he succeeded in getting final authorization and funding for a UW veterinary college, and chaired a special committee which investigated and proposed measures to restrict the purchase of farmland with pension and profit-sharing



Hephner also authored a law this session permitting school boards to provide transportation to public and private students for school extracurricular activities, and helped to eliminate the placement of male offenders in the Wisconsin Home for Women in Taycheedah.

Examples cited by Hephner include the proposed elimination of the personal property tax on livestock and business inventories, changes in the farmland preservation program which increase benefits to farmers, a new snowmobile trail program, inheritance tax reform, and eminent domain protections for landowners

Ecumenical Service at Faith Haven

The annual outdoor Ecumenical worship service will be held at 10:30 a.m. on June 25, at Faith Haven. This year marks fifteen years since the 59 acre site was dedicated to Christians of all faiths in honor of the 110th anniversary of St. John's United Church of Christ of Kohlsville.

The farm was purchased from a local farmer by Reverend Riesch, then pastor of the

An old gravel pit that had been used as a dump was cleaned up and three wooden crosses were erected to depict the crucifixion. Another spot on the nature trail depicts Christ's birth. The stable was built by a

resident of Cedar Lake Home and transported to the area. A baptism has been held and the Lay School members have come at Christmas for a worship service.

A mirror pond was dug and can be likened to the Sea of Galilee. One cannot help but "Lift up mine eyes unto the hills," as one meditates while looking the full distance to Kewaskum. "What you sow, that shall you reap," comes to mind as one looks across fields of hay, corn and grain.

Scripture passages appropriately mark the trail and lend meaning to the worship-or's reflections.

The grounds are maintained

by the Lay School which began in June of 1962 with twelve members and continues with weekly meetings in which Theology, and Sermon Structure are taught.

Worship services are held on the hillside and center around a field stone pulpit and communion table, topped by a stainless steel spire. People are welcome to come early and walk the trails to meditate before the worship service.
