## Postmaster Harry E. Koch Retires

On Friday, June 30, Postmaster Harry E. Koch will retire from the Kewaskum Post Office. He was appointed postmaster on December 31, 1956. He took over from Frank Heppe

on this date and has served the U.S. Government for a combined service of 30½ years.

Under his postmastership the office has been in three different locations. The first was at

222 Main St. (Heppe building) and then moved to 355 Main St. (Koch building). A new post office was constructed and dedicated in 1967 on the Koch property at 347 Main St. This building was built and leased to the postal service by Stürm Building Corp., Manawa, Wis.

Postmaster Koch was instrumental in the design of the building. The field stone on the building is a native stone acquired two miles from the village, which was split by hand and installed. This is symbolic of the Kettle Moraine area.

Postmaster Koch is a member of the Washington-Ozaukee Postmaster Association and has held the offices of president and secretary-treasurer. He is a member of the National Association of Postmasters of the United States and the National League of Postmasters.

Announcement will be made in next week's paper who the officer in charge will be until a postmaster is appointed by the Regional Postmaster General.

Postmaster Koch and his wife Jan are the parents of two daughters, Wendy (Mrs. Edward Dorn), West Bend, and Melissa at home. They also have one granddaughter, Patricia.

Postmaster Koch thanks his patrons for their understanding thru the many changes in the postal service.

The firemen invite all residents of Kewaskum and the surrounding communities to add a little "spark" to their holiday celebration by attending this year's fireworks spectacular. Come early and enjoy the whole evening.

## \$3½ Million Budget Approved to Present to Annual School Meeting

Budget adoption for the coming 1978-79 school year was approved to be sent to the annual meeting after the School Board met Monday night. Absent were members Gerald Secor and Jean Goeden.

The board reviewed various items such as the Industrial Arts Department which showed a significant increase compared to last year's cost. Members also looked into the athletic program and the lunch service. Several changes were noted on the budget in which the total proposal will be \$3,437,108 instead of the \$3,467,108 submitted at an earlier meeting. The remaining items will be discussed at the annual meeting.

The members then discussed the rules on transportation. Several additions were made to the list but the rules basically remained the same. Two added improvements to the rules were: (1) Drivers shall stay on their designated route. (2) Drivers shall not drive to individual private driveways, just to their designated pick-up areas.

Discussion on walking distances to a designated pick-up point remained at 1/8 mile for kindergarten students, ¼ mile for grades 1-6, and ½ mile for grades 7-12.

A new complaint about the guidance performance at the high school showed that this particular student was eligible for a \$2,000 scholarship which

### Annual Firemen, Rescue Squad Picnic July 8-9

On Saturday night there will be live music in the beer garden by the best in country rock, featuring Ida Red from 7:30 to 11:30 p.m. All of the rides, games, refreshment and food stands will be in operation.

A highlight of the picnic will be another excellent parade at 12 noon sharp which will start off the festivities on Sunday. The parade will feature 10 bands, drum and bugle corps and drill teams, including St. Josaphat Basilicans Baton and Drum Corps of Milwaukee, Continental Youth Band of Milwaukee, Mariners of Port Washington Drill Team, Village Greens Drill Team, Greendale, Janesville Fife and Drum Corps, Hartford City Band, Old Mapleton Circus Band of Oconomowoc, All-American Holiday Baton

The parade will form on the high school campus and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. Theme for this year's parade will be "Wisconsin's Changing Seasons." Businessmen, industries and organizations are urged to enter a float. Prizes will be awarded for the best floats and kiddies' specialties (groups).

CHICKEN FOR THE 4th  
For as far back as I can remember, I have had fried chicken on the 4th of July. When I was a little girl on the farm, I remember my mother planning for newly hatched chickens so they would be large enough for fryers on the 4th of July.

One of the big advantages of serving fried chicken for the 4th of July is that it can be served hot or cold. There are packages of pre-fried chicken available at the supermarket that only require reheating.

Fried chicken doesn't need to be the same every time. There are many different batters and breading mixes to use. Barbequed chicken can also have different flavored sauces for a new taste sensation.

On July 4th, 1978, the Crowley's will use this recipe for fried chicken:

2 1/2 to 3 pound fryer cut into pieces 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 cup flour 2 tablespoons water  
1 teaspoon salt 1 egg  
2 teaspoons poultry seasoning 1 1/2 cups vegetable oil or butter

Combine flour and seasoning. Place in paper or plastic bag. Combine egg and water. Beat slightly. Dip chicken pieces into egg mixture, then dip into flour mixture in the bag. Shake to coat chicken. Heat fat in frying pan. Place chicken in skillet and cook over medium heat. Brown on both sides. Reduce heat, cover and continue cooking for 20-30 minutes. For crisper coating, remove chicken for the last 10 minutes of cooking.

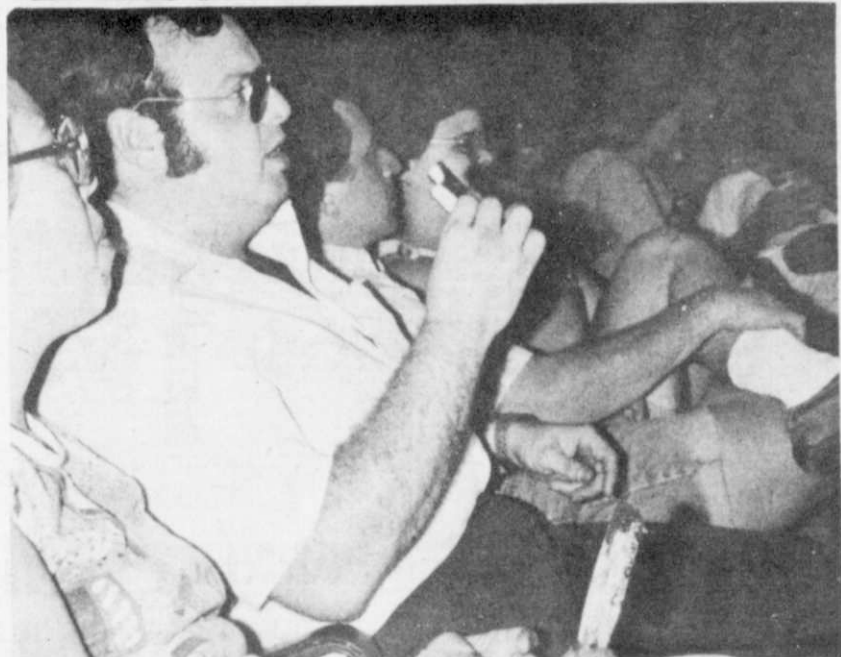

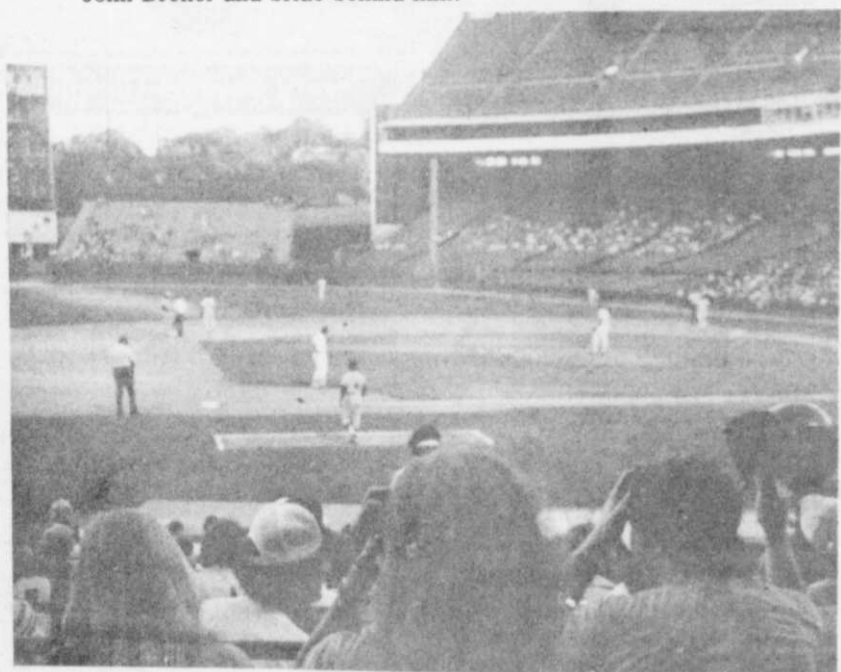

**County Farmers  
To Set Aside 5147  
Cropland Acres**

Washington County farmers participating in 1978 farm programs intend to set-aside 5,147 acres of cropland, according to Ira A. Oelhafen, an official of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Results of the final sign-up report showed that the intended set-aside for wheat is 159 acres, for corn 4,977 acres and for barley 11 acres.

Producers could not exceed their 1977 plantings of the corn and wheat to be eligible for the diversion payment. Also those in the so-called "additional" set aside are required to retire an extra 10% of land in addition to the minimum 10% requirement.

The diversion payment for corn is \$.20 per bushel times the farm's established yield times the actual corn acreage planted for harvest. For barley the payment is \$.12 per bushel, applying the applicable yield and planted acreage. "Producers received half of these payments when they signed up," Oelhafen said.

Regular benefits include protection under the disaster provisions which guarantee a 60% crop, eligibility for the

price support (loan) program, and the "target price" guarantee. In event markets drop below the target, a deficiency payment on that commodity

would be authorized to all producers regardless if they were enrolled in the minimum program only or the additional diversion option.
