Postmaster Harry E. Koch Retires

On Friday, June 30, Postmaster Harry E. Koch will retire from the Kewaskum Post Office. He was appointed postmaster on December 31, 1956. He took over from Frank Heppe

on this date and has served the U.S. Government for a combined service of 301/2 years.

Under his postmastership the office has been in three different locations. The first was at

222 Main St. (Heppe building) and then moved to 355 Main St. (Koch building). A new post office was constructed and dedicated in 1967 on the Koch property at 347 Main St. This building was built and leased to the postal service by Stürm Building Corp., Manawa, Wis.

Postmaster Koch was instrumental in the design of the building. The field stone on the building is a native stone acquired two miles from the village, which was split by hand and installed. This is symbolic of the Kettle Moraine area.

Postmaster Koch is a member of the Washington-Ozaukee Postmaster Association and has held the offices of president and secretary-treasurer. He is a member of the National Association of Postmasters of the United States and the National League of Postmasters.

Announcement will be made in next week's paper who the officer in charge will be until a postmaster is appointed by the Regional Postmaster General.

Postmaster Koch and his wife Jan are the parents of two daughters, Wendy (Mrs. Edward Dorn), West Bend, and Melissa at home. They also have one granddaughter, Patri-

\$31/2 Million Budget Approved to Present to Annual School Meeting

Budget adoption for the coming 1978-79 school year was approved to be sent to the annual meeting after the School Board met Monday night. Absent were members Gerald Secor and Jean Goeden.

The board reviewed various items such as the Industrial Arts Department which showed a significant increase compared to last year's cost. Members also looked into the athletic program and the lunch service. Several changes were noted on the budget in which the total proposal will be \$3,437,108 instead of the \$3,467,108 submitted at an earlier meeting. The remaining items will be discussed at the annual meet-

County Farmers To Set Aside 5147 **Cropland Acres**

Washington County farmers participating in 1978 farm programs intend to set-aside 5,147 acres of cropland, according to Ira A. Oelhafen, an official of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Results of the final signup report showed that the intended set-aside for wheat is 159 acres, for corn 4,977 acres and for barley 11 acres.

Producers could not exceed their 1977 plantings of the corn and wheat to be eligible for the diversion payment. Also those in the so-called "additional" set aside are required to retire an extra 10% of land in addition to the minimum 10% requirement.

The diversion payment for corn is \$.20 per bushel times the farm's established yield times the actual corn acreage planted for harvest. For barley the payment is \$.12 per bushel, applying the applicable yield and planted acreage. "Producers received half of these payments when they signed up," Oelhafen said.
