FFA SAFETY TIPS

Farmers are now in the midst of their harvesting season. It is of the utmost importance to use stern safety measures at this time to prevent accidents.

People seldom realize the importance of safety until it is too late. Some lose lives, others have permanent injuries, or, in some lucky cases, they are just laid up for awhile

Doing things the safe way is not always the quickest when thought out, but when the actual work begins, the safe way is ALWAYS the best way. A few general rules follow. If

you use these basic rules, generally you are headed in the safe direction.

Use COMMON SENSE.

2 . Read operator's manual before operating any machine.

3. Keep all shields in place.

4. Always disengage the power source, and shut the engine off before making any adjustment, or lubricating any machine.

5. Always operate machinery at proper operating speeds.

6. Keep your hands and feet clear of machine at all times. 7. Never crawl or walk on a

machine. 8. Take time to read ALL

stickers and labels.

9. If you do not understand the operation of a machine, refer to the operator's manual.

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10. If the operator's manual does not contain necessary information to operate a machine, check with authorized personnel ONLY

11. Never allow extra riders on a tractor or any piece of equipment.

If these 11 basic steps are followed, farm accidents could be greatly reduced. These are not all of the rules by any means, but they will be a great help
