Malt Beverage License Denied to Store; Korth Rezoning Approved

A Class "A" Fermented Malt Beverage License was refused for the L. Rosenheimer grocery store at Monday's Village Board meeting. With all members present the vote went 7-0 against the license.

The opposition for the license came from local tavern and liquor store owners. These people feel that there are enough places at the present time selling liquor and beer.

Len Rosenheimer explained the store would be open for the selling of this beverage from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. because of state law. The license would include the selling of six packs which customers have asked for in the past.

Members felt there wasn't any need for another place selling liquor. Based on the number of taverns and stores in the village, and because of possible access to minors, the board voted and denied the application.

The petition, submitted by Gilbert and Lorraine Korth, for rezoning of 5.26 acres was approved.

An incorrect 1977 assessment to Harvey Jandre was then called to the attention of the board. Jandre had a detached garage which he removed before the May 1, 1977 assessment. He then constructed another garage after the 1977 assessment date. Jandre paid

his 1977 taxes under protest and at this meeting the board approved to reimburse him.

Ptaschinski Construction had asked a 25 cent increase for the park curbing contract. The board approved the additional increase for the new park.

Further information on the garbage pick-up matter was discussed. Comparisons were made to the West Bend area. This included a once a month pick-up for bulky material. Materials not in the garbage can are not picked up. The board decided some regulations should be made.

Foth and Van Dyke proposed alternates for the placing of a 350 foot drainage ditch at Knights Avenue.

The first alternate for the drainage ditch of \$1,000 would only be a temporary relief. The second alternate of \$26,000 would be a more lasting condition but in future years improvements will again have to be made. The third alternate of \$105,000 will alleviate as well as eliminate the total problem. The board approved sending letters to several companies for bids and for an August delivery date.

The last issue for the evening was a written complaint of a commercial business in a residential area. This business was reported to produce loud noises. The board turned the matter over to the Zoning Administrator. A report will be given on the situation at the next meeting.

"Solid Shield '78" was under overall command of Admiral Isaac C. Kidd, Jr., USN, the commander-in-chief, Atlantic.

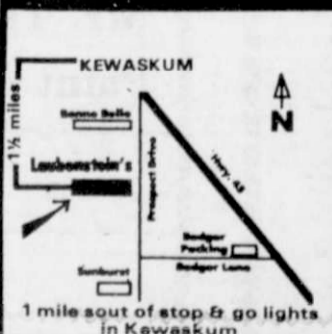

County Farmers Asked to Certify Crop Acreages

All Washington County farmers are asked to certify their 1978 planted acreage, set aside, diversion and other program acreages with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, Ira A. Oelhafen, Chairman of the county ASC committee, said. "Certification is the procedure by which farmers report

their 1978 program acreages as accurately as possible to insure their eligibility for receiving the benefits of price support and disaster, deficiency and diversion payments," he said.

Oelhafen added that growers not participating in the set-aside programs should report their acreages to insure the opportunity to fully participate in future programs.

After certification the ASCS county office will select farms at random for a visit and acreage measurement. Farmers uncer-

tain about their field sizes regarding complying with the program are encouraged to request measurement service now.

No Certain Way Known To Eliminate Mosquitoes

There aren't any easy or sure-fire ways to control or eliminate mosquitoes, says Walter Gojmerac, University of Wisconsin-Extension entomologist.

Heavy rainfall over most of the state has left many standing pools of water, prime breeding grounds for the prolific mosquito. Wisconsin residents will probably be battling more mosquitoes this year as a result.

The situation will get worse before it gets better, Gojmerac adds.

That's because every female mosquito can lay about 300 eggs during her month life span. After 10 days in standing water, the mosquito larvae are ready to begin attacking human flesh for a meal.

"Mosquito eggs can lie dormant for years, but the larvae will emerge once the water they're at stands for 10 days. Mosquitoes can also travel from 3 to 15 miles or farther depending on the wind, so it's impossible to eliminate mosquitoes completely from any given area," Gojmerac adds.

Water-logged Wisconsin residents may have to learn to live with mosquitoes protected only by repellants, screens and lots of swatting.

"Some communities do fog for mosquitoes. The insects are a nuisance, but they don't pose a public health problem in the Midwest. Community control efforts aren't much emphasized because of the mosquitoes' relatively short life here.

"Eliminating or treating mosquito breeding areas is one alternative, but obviously whole swamps, wetlands and river bottoms can't be drained just to rid us of mosquitoes. Dumping

standing water in buckets, trash cans and birdbaths may help somewhat if there aren't any other large breeding areas around," Gojmerac adds.

Fogging may be the only practical temporary method of reducing adult mosquito populations. But communities have to balance the costs of the effort with the benefits, since fogging provides only temporary relief at best.

Approved insecticides are safe for wildlife and humans when applied at recommended levels, although their use may irritate some people.

The community that wants to battle mosquitoes with fogging should have a competent person manage the daily operation. A reliable operator can properly adjust machines and mix materials.

Priorities should be set for fogging operations, and the public should also understand the methods involved in fogging, Gojmerac adds.

"Available insect repellants are effective in warding off

mosquitoes if they're properly applied. The amount of protection they offer varies with the individual, temperature or humidity," Gojmerac says.

Don't waste your money on simple or magical mosquito control devices or techniques, Gojmerac advises.

"Light traps are used to sample insect populations and won't control mosquitoes. Sounding devices that supposedly attract and trap mosquitoes simply don't work.

"Birds won't control mosquitoes either. Most birds fly during the daytime -- and most mosquitoes don't.

"Even if each bird consumed 2,000 mosquitoes every day, they would hardly make a dent in the mosquito population. Purple martins do eat mosquitoes, but they also feed on dragon flies, which prey on mosquitoes," Gojmerac says.

"The only way to eliminate the problem completely is to stay indoors, guarded by good screens."

Wheat Target Price Raised

Farmers participating in the 1978 wheat set-aside program will be eligible for program benefits based on a target price of \$3.40 instead of \$3.00 per bushel, according to Ira A. Oelhafen, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committee.
 The Emergency Agricultural Act of 1978, recently signed by the President, authorized a 40-cent increase in the wheat target price. "The higher target price for wheat should encourage more farmers to comply with the set-aside program," Oelhafen said. Certifications are now being accepted for the wheat and feed grain programs.
 Target prices represent a floor price that eligible farmers may receive nationally for their crops planted within the national program acreage. If the national average market price of a particular crop falls below the target price, a deficiency payment is made equal to the difference between the target price and the larger of the national loan rate or the market price.

Cedar Lake Home Offers Respite Care Services

The Cedar Lake Home Campus, West Bend, has been awarded a grant from the Southeastern Wisconsin Area Agency on Aging to begin a pilot respite care program.

The respite care program is designed to provide temporary relief for the family or guardian of an elderly or handicapped person.

It is ideal for families who will be going away for a few days and cannot take their loved one with them. Or it can provide a few days rest for the ones who care for an elderly individual.

The length of stay may be as short as overnight or as long as eleven days and nights.

As a temporary resident, the person would have full use of the facilities of the Home and the Home's total creative program.

The person must have a physical examination and x-ray before being admitted as a participant of the respite care program. Temporary residence includes all meals, activities and residential care without charge to the participant.

There is no cost for the residential care adult respite program for individuals residing in Washington, Ozaukee, Waukesha, Walworth, Racine and Kenosha counties.

If nursing service or added services are needed the resident or family is to assume the cost for additional services required.

Applications for this new service are made through the Cedar Lake Home Campus Resident-Family Service Department.

This is the first federally funded adult respite care service program in a Home for the Aging in our area.

Avoiding Stings

Now that summer has finally arrived in Wisconsin, people will be getting outdoors and enjoying the warm weather. However, with warm weather come insects, and for many people insect stings are disastrous.

An estimated two million people in America suffer life-threatening allergic reactions to insect stings. Stings from hornets, wasps, and bees are responsible for at least 40 deaths a year. People over 30 tend to have a more severe reaction, but some can outgrow their allergies and develop an immunity to insect stings.

There is a vaccine available to individuals who have a history of allergic reactions to insect stings. However, a new, more effective vaccine is expected to be available for general distribution in the next few months.

In addition, a special stinging-insect emergency kit is available through a doctor's prescription for a person who suspects he or she may have an allergic reaction to an insect sting. A good place for this kit is in your family medicine cabinet or in public places such as swimming clubs, fire or police stations, and meeting houses for scout troops and other meetings. This kit contains a preloaded syringe of adrenalin, an antihistamine, and an aerosol inhaler to help with breathing. Be sure you make it a point to learn how to give yourself an adrenalin injection.

It's important that a person be able to recognize the primary symptoms of a bad reaction to an insect sting in order to deliver aid to himself or another person. These symptoms include: general swelling of the body; shortness of breath, wheezing and asthma; hives; a drop in blood pressure; or swelling of the upper airway or larynx. Such reactions can develop within minutes -- and generally, the faster the reaction, the more dangerous the sting.

Death can result from the

body's inability to supply blood to the brain or from asphyxiation due to swelling in the throat, in the larynx, or at the back of the tongue.

If an allergic person is stung and no emergency kit is available, there are several steps to take. First, seek medical help as soon as possible. While waiting

for aid, have the victim lie down. A tourniquet may help slow the absorption of the venom if the sting is on an arm or a leg. If it is a bee sting, you can flick the stinger out of the sting area. (Bees are the only insects that will leave their stingers in place.)

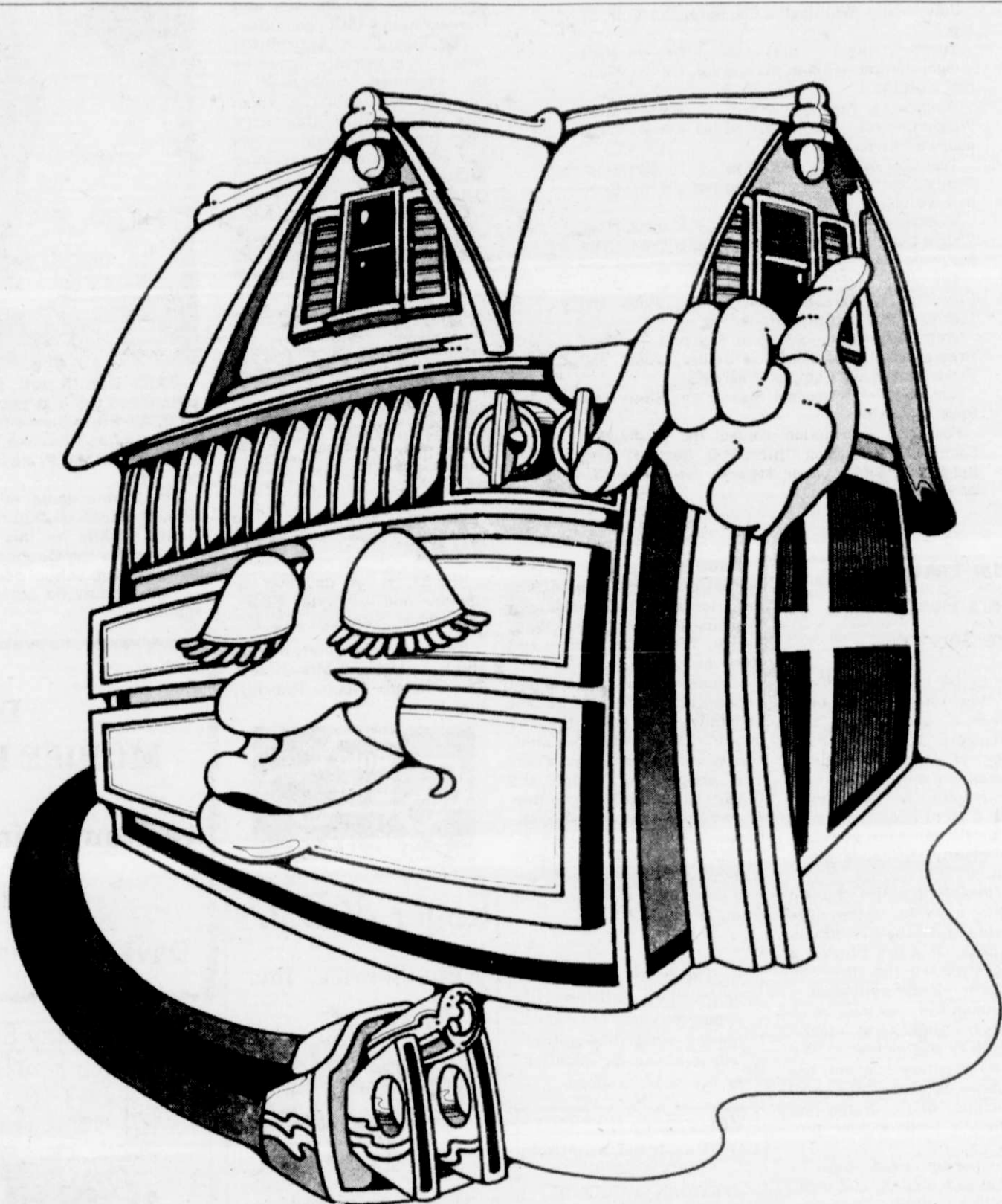
The best way to avoid getting

stung is to use common sense: Don't go barefoot outside. Be careful in the garden, mowing the lawn, cutting vines, and pulling weeds. Cooking and food odors also attract insects. So do perfumes, hair sprays, suntan lotions, and bright colors. And remember, more people get stung around a

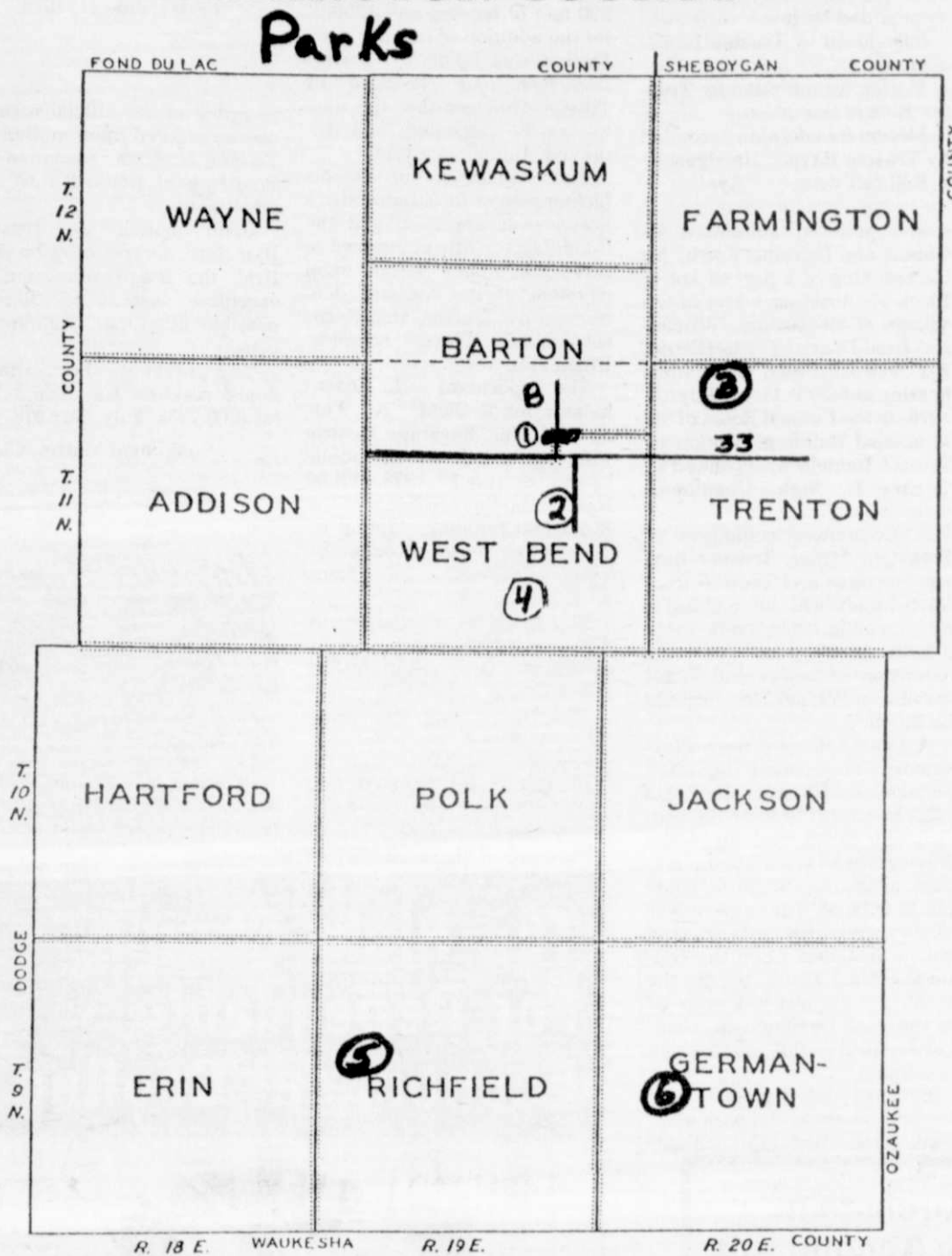

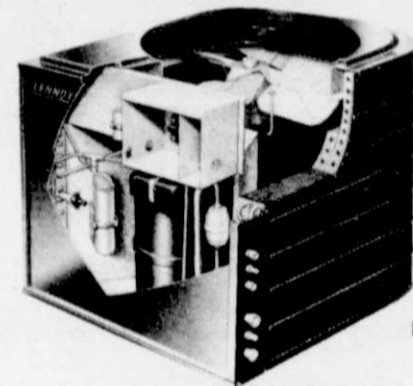

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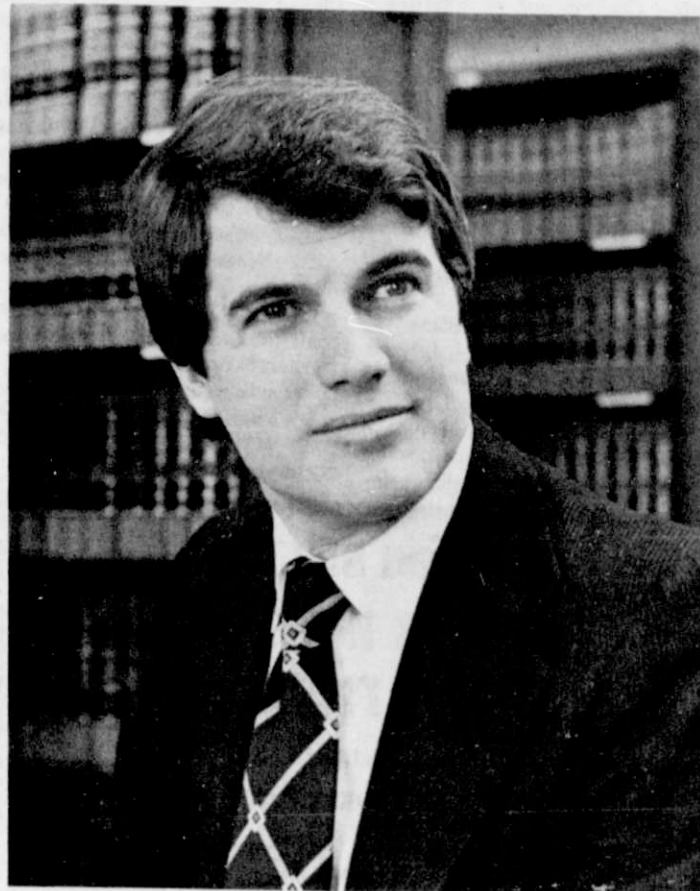
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Flynn Formally Enters Race for Congress



Matthew J. Flynn, a Milwaukee attorney, formally entered the race for Congress in the Ninth Congressional District when he filed his nomination papers with the State Elections Board in Madison Monday, July 10.

Running as a Democrat, Flynn is seeking the seat now held by Republican Robert W. Kasten who is running for governor.

Flynn, 30, is a member of the Milwaukee law firm of Quarles & Brady. He graduated from Yale University in 1969 and served three years in the Navy as a navigator.
