New Officers Elected by Red **Cross Chapter**


At a recent meeting of the Board of Directors of the West Bend Chapter of the Red Cross new officers were elected to serve for 1978-1979 terms.

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

New Logo Identifies Wisconsin Cheese

100 % WISCONSIN CHEESE made in

"Wisconsin cheese may now be labeled with a special logo identifying it as '100% Wisconsin Cheese Made in Wisconsin,' reports Al Breseman, dairy marketing specialist with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

According to Breseman, the new logo is designed to show consumers that the product is 100 percent Wisconsin cheese and that it is Wisconsin's best quality. The design is an outline of the state with the words "100% WISCONSIN CHEESE made in WISCONSIN" and the official registration number of the cheese plant.

To use the new logotype, cheese plants must register with the marketing division of the DATCP. Permits are issued without the payment of any fee and are valid for two years. Producers must meet specific grading requirements and produce the cheese under strict sanitary and quality standards.

To date, ten Wisconsin cheese companies have registered to use the new logotype.

Breseman reports that the new logo is permitted under Chapter Ag 88 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code.

He says, "When you see this design on cheese you are assured that it is top quality Wisconsin cheese.

Washington Report

By Congressman William A.

Congress began work last week on reauthorization of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act. CETA, as it is commonly called, has become one of the government's largest and most controversial programs. The debate in the House reflected the concern and confusion which many Americans have about what CETA is supposed to do and what it has be-

The original purpose of CETA was to bring some direction to government sponsored employment and training programs for the disadvantaged. Having been in on its creation when I was a member of the Education and Labor Committee, in 1973. it is distressing to me to see what has happened to CETA in a short five years.

The new bill is designed to put CETA back on track. It contains many good and necessary changes. Let me briefly explain what CETA was designed to accomplish, what happened to it, and how the new bill will help redirect CETA to its original purpose.

Before CETA, the federal government itself ran employment programs for unskilled and economically disadvantaged Americans. The Secretary of Labor contracted directly with individuals and organizations all over the country for almost 10,000 separate programs. In most cases there was very little coordination between these programs in a state, county or local community.

After 10 years, it became clear that nationally run programs simply weren't able to adequately serve the very different needs of individuals and job markets in the many areas of the country.

Through the CETA system, states and local governments were to be given the opportunity to determine the needs of the unemployed in their area, to analyze the job market, and to plan and sponsor programs to meet these special local needs.

In short they were to become the "prime sponsors" for employment and training programs in their areas. Cities, counties and consortia (groups of cities and counties with populations of over 100,000) can run their own programs. Governors serve the balance of a state not covered by local prime

In the 6th District, Winnebago and Fond du Lac Counties joined together to form the Winne-Fond Consortium Prime Sponsor. Our other 6th District counties are served by the Wisconsin Balance-of-State program. The Governor has divided the state into 6 planning areas - Juneau and Adams Counties are in the North Central District. Marquette, Green Lake, Calumet and Waushara are in the Lake Winnebago District. Manitowoc and Sheboygan are in the Lake Michigan District.

Local and state elected officials are responsible for CETA programs in the areas they serve. They have a staff and an Advisory Council, composed of citizens and representatives of concerned organizations, to advise them and actually carry out the program.

CETA was primarily designed to serve people who are structurally unemployed - the jobless who have inadequate or obsolete skills, a long history of unemployment, or some physical or emotional handicap. Even when the economy is healthy and jobs are plentiful, individuals who are structurally unemployed have problems find-

ing jobs. To help these individuals, CETA sponsors counseling; classroom, vocational and on-the-job training; work experience and other related programs.

Just as the program was getting off the ground, the oil embargo and other problems hit our economy. Unemployment began to rise. CETA was faced with training hard-to-employ people for jobs at a time when people with skills were being laid off.

Concerned with rising unemployment and the deepening recession, in 1974-75, Congress set up a special revenue sharing program, a short term public works program and the public service jobs program. As the system already in place, CETA was chosen as a vehicle for implementing the countercyclical public service employment program.

CETA had always had a small public service jobs program which was supposed to serve the structurally unemployed. Now it was running two public service jobs programs to serve two very different kinds of individuals - one unskilled and disadvantaged, the second skilled and only temporarily disadvantaged. Congress stipulated that these were not to be make-work jobs, but useful jobs, and prime sponsors were prohibited from substituting CETA workers for regular workers. Soon after the first countercyclical public service jobs were underway, Congress tried to tighten up the program by requiring that some of the jobs be in special projects and targeted to the economically disadvantaged.

At this point CETA was becoming more and more complex prime sponsors became confused, and the people the programs were supposed to help became confused. In 1977 President Carter proposed yet another expansion of public service employment, and in a little

of public service jobs went from 300,000 to almost 750,000. At the same time, a major new program to combat youth unemployment and another to deal with veterans unemployment were initiated through the CETA system. Given these circumstances it's not surprising we've had problems in CETA.

There has been some outright fraud and abuse in CETA. There is no denying this. And in many cases the program simply has sunk of its own weight, strangled by law upon law and regulation upon regulation.

Much needed changes will be made in CETA as a result of House action.

First, we have clearly separated the structural job program (which provides training, work experience and supportive services for the low income unemployed) from the countercyclical jobs program (which is targeted to individuals who are unemployed because of economic conditions.

Second, we have tightened the eligibility requirements for both programs. Both have an income requirement and a longer unemployment requirement. Our 6th district programs have had many of these restrictions all along, but they were not required by federal law.

Third, there are strict new criminal and civil sanctions against prime sponsors and subcontractors for misuse of program funds and a requirement that the funds be repaid if an abuse is found.

Fourth, a new Office of Audit. Investigation and Compliance and an Office of Management Assistance are created to provide federal oversight and assistance to prime sponsors.

There is an important new private-sector initiative section to help prime sponsors improve their links with private business now that the economy has improved. There is an 18-month limit on the time an indiviual can hold a public service job.

ing people for non-subsidized jobs and to helping those most in need.

CETA must be made to work because the problems of unemployment and underemployment cannot be met at the federal level. It is only at the local level that an understanding of these problems exists. Here there is a knowledge of the job opportunities available in the local labor market and here is the ability to join local resources with federal money to deal effectively with unemployment. In any human endeavor there will always be those who abuse the spirit of the law and the law itself. Our task in Congress is to establish an employment and training system with a clear purpose, adequate guidelines and mechanisms for preventing abuse or correcting and punishing it, when it occurs. The new CETA bill will not be problem free, but it is a step in the right direction.

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McKenna Proposes End to School Property Taxes for the Elderly



In a visit to Kewaskum Monday, including a stop at the Statesman office, State Senator Dale McKenna, Democratic candidate for Lt. Governor, discussed his program for property tax relief for elderly Wisconsin taxpayers.

Under the McKenna Plan, senior citizens who qualify for the Homestead Tax Credit Program would get a refund on the property taxes they pay for

school purposes.

"In Kewaskum, the property taxes are about \$989 on a \$40,000 home," McKenna said, "and \$575 of that money is used for public and vocational schools...that means under the McKenna Plan senior citizens in Kewaskum would pay \$414 in property taxes."

"It was 'senior power' that pushed Proposition 13 in California," McKenna said, noting that the co-authors were 75 and 65 years of age. "Our senior citizens on fixed incomes are being gouged the worst because they can't compete with wage earners," McKenna said. "Any increase in fixed incomes is more than offset by skyrocket-


ing health costs."

McKenna noted that the size of Wisconsin's elderly population was growing while school enrollments were decreasing. Those factors mean elderly taxpayers must have their taxes cut. "Otherwise," McKenna said, "the loss of one's home will be a normal part of old age."

"We're all going to get old," McKenna said, "and anybody over 40 is looking down the road to retirement. Many of those people fear their tax bills will be just as high as the mortgages they're paying off right now," he said, "and a lot of them are afraid they won't be able to retire when they want to."

"Every budget cycle requires that we set priorities as to what is important for our people. In 1978, we must make a judgement that keeping our elderly taxpayers in their homes deserves a high priority," Mc-Kenna concluded.

Reducing Heart Attack Risks

Are you encouraging the chances of a heart attack? Medical research has shown that the daily living habits of millions of Americans are endangering their hearts and promoting the opportunity of having heart health problems. For every risk factor, however, there is a practical step that may be taken to counteract it.

Since statistics show that the earlier preventive measures are undertaken, the greater the chance of escaping heart problems later in life, it is a good idea to begin a year-round risk reducing program for the entire family. Following are some of the simple precautions that may be taken to help insure a healthier life:

Avoid Extra Pounds. Retaining a good weight for each individual is obviously a personal matter. However, a good scale judge is by maintaining one's normal weight at age 25. There is no quick or easy formula to lose weight. Crash diets and reducing fads should be avoided. It is also important

to develop regular eating patterns in order to keep weight at a normal level.

Select Food Carefully. The key to any weight reduction or health program is the establishment of good eating habits. The entire body benefits from the four basic food groups: milk and milk products; fruits and vegetables; meat, fish and eggs; breads and cereals.

For most people, saturated fats in the diet should be replaced with polyunsaturated fats. High cholesterol foods should also be avoided as much as possible. It is good to cook with liquid vegetable oils and polyunsaturated shortenings. Eating more fish and poultry than meat is advisable and when cooking meat, use leaner cuts and trim off all excess fat from the meat. Drinking skim milk and fat-free milk products as well as eating no more than three egg yolks per week is also suggested in an attempt to reduce the risk of heart attacks.

Exercise Regularly. Many people are not aware that the heart muscle is benefited by exercise in much the same way as all other muscles. A regular, moderate exercise program tones the muscles, stimulates circulation and helps burn calories. Exercising irregularly can be harmful, therefore, it is important to stay in condition with daily

physical exercise.

No Smoking. The nicotine in tobacco smoke stimulates that part of the nervous system which controls and regulates the heart. Those who smoke regularly have twice the risk of heart attacks, as compared to nonsmokers. Heart attacks occur earlier in life and are often more serious for those who smoke regularly.

Control High Blood Pressure. Hypertension often produces no noticeable symptoms. It is therefore necessary to have physical check-ups to determine the condition, cause and treatment measures for high blood pressure.

It is also helpful to learn to control many of the daily situations that stimulate tension and nervousness. When a person becomes nervous or tense, the human system involuntarily contracts the body's small arteries. The heart must then increase the pressure of each beat to move blood through them.

After reviewing these simple precautions, one is able to see how closely related they all are to each other. No single factor will prevent heart disease.
