Outstanding Runners Take Part

Record 220 Entries Compete In 'Kettle 20' Race Here

Lions Serve 1600 Chicken Dinners

A record 220 runners, compared to 165 last year, entered the "Kettle 20" foot race held in conjunction with the Kewaskum Lions Club annual chicken bar-b-que and Kewaskum Historical Society's Early Farm Days in the village park Sunday. The mass of "Kettle 20" runners starting out is shown in the photo.

The foot race, which started at 10:15 a.m. through the Kettle Moraine area, was followed by bicycle races at 12:30 p.m. There were 12 entrants in the bike event.

The Lions Club served around 1600 chicken dinners in the large tent, starting at 11 a.m. until all were served and had to shop around for additional chicken. Carryouts were also available. Beer, soda, popcorn, ice cream and sandwiches were sold and bingo and other games played.

The Historical Society's fourth annual Early Farm Days exhibit attracted crowds of interested spectators throughout the day. Items on display included gas and steam engines, steam traction, oil pull, oil tractors, old-time farm equipment dating back to 1870, a 1910 saw mill operation and threshing rigs. Miniature models of old machinery were also shown in operation as were demonstrations of a spinning wheel and hand loom.

Entertainment was provided by the Senior Citizens Square Dancers and Kitchen Band as well as Concertina Eddie in the afternoon.

The "Kettle 20" 12-mile foot race was entered by many outstanding runners from all over Wisconsin and other states, including one who qualified for

the Olympics, a U.S. and world class runner, professional, college, high school and club affiliated runners.

A former UW competitor and world class runner was Cindy Bremser, 25, of Madison, whose father, Frank, is a Kewaskum native. She set a new record for women in 1:18.43 in the ages 18-29 women's open. Other members of her family also ran. Cindy had a successful career for the University of Wisconsin and also later ran for the United States in a number of events. She was an alternate for the 1976 Olympics and has been to Russia twice with the U.S. team. This summer she placed second in U.S. regional track competition in Colorado Springs, Colo. and also qualified for the U.S.-Russia meet and placed fourth in the 3,000 meter run. She has one 1,500 meter race in Japan to go before wrapping up the season. She has her sights on the 1980 Olympic Games and runs from 5 to 15 miles a day.

Another noted runner here was Lucian Rosa of Kenosha, who won the men's open, ages 18-29, with a time of 1:5.15. All set for the 1976 Olympics in Montreal, he qualified and was ready for the marathon when his country Sri Lanka pulled out of the games because of a political protest. He had not raced since, until some months ago, following his disappointment. Coach of the cross country team at UW-Parkside, he is building himself up again toward running in a 15 mile road coming up in West Virginia.

A special School Board meeting was held on Monday evening to fill several remaining teaching positions for the coming school year.

Contracts were approved for Debra Weliskopf as kindergarten teacher, Jane Binder and Ellen Steenrod, elementary teachers, and Milton Dickinsen as elementary guidance counselor.

Dennis Reha was approved for the teaching principal position at Wayne Elementary School after the resignation of Tim Leader from his duties as principal at Wayne was accepted.

The policy pertaining to this year's school hours will be as follows: 1) Kindergarten session: 9:05 to 11:40 or 1:05 to 3:40. 2) Grades 1-6: 9:05 to 3:40. 3) Grades 7-12: 7:45 to 2:45. 4) The special education programs will be scheduled to

coincide with normal school hours unless special bussing necessitates a different schedule.

The Kewaskum School District acknowledged its responsibilities by approving to supply school lunches free or at reduced prices according to the family size and income level. A complete list of qualifications can be obtained from the school.

Two families' request to have their children attend the Kewaskum Elementary School, but who reside in what is considered Farmington School area, was refused.

A diploma was granted to a former student after obtaining needed credits at the Moraine Park Technical Institute.

Approval was given to Beth Thurk and Lois Weiland for unpaid child care leaves.

The board then adjourned to a closed session for discussion of teacher negotiations.

Bid for Shelter in Old Park Approved by Village Board

The opening of bids for sewer and water installation on Werner Drive was set for the mid-monthly meeting of September 18 by the Village Board at Monday night's meeting.

Various water pipes and water services will be presented for bidding on that date. Foth and Van Dyke have submitted their plans and specifications for the extension of sewer and water lines.

Approximately three months ago a hearing was held on the Zoning Ordinance for the Village of Kewaskum. The understanding was that the board couldn't adopt the ordinance until it was written out. The ordinance, after recommendation by the Village Plan Commission, was adopted by the Village Board members.

The purpose of the "ordinance" is to enhance the general welfare of the village.

Several bids for the shelter in the old park were presented to the board. The board approved the bid from Jack Walters for \$11,714. The shelter will be 42 x 120 x 10 ft. 6 in. and will include gutters and downspouts.

The board also approved \$6,000 toward the cost with the Fire Department and local service groups sharing the remaining costs. Construction possibilities will be for October or November.

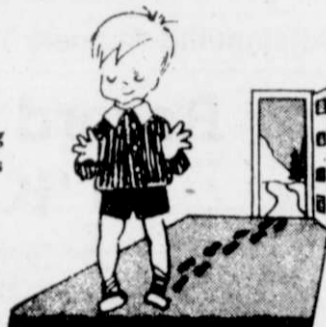

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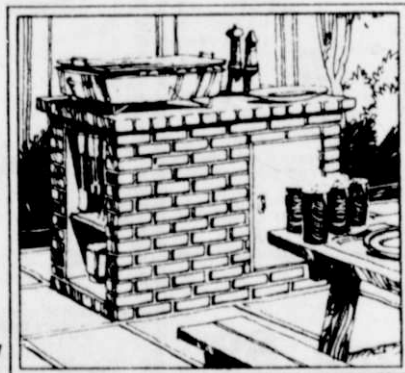

Regular Monthly Meeting
August 7, 1978
8:00 P.M.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

2. Fencing for two ball diamonds and tennis courts.
3. Lighting for tennis courts, horseshoe courts and sign.

Motion was made by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Danielsen that the bid opening date for the above mentioned improvements be Sept. 5, 1978, at 8:00 P.M. Voice vote was unanimous.

Upon the recommendation of Supt. Bilgo, it was decided that the parking lot and the service drive at the new park shall be paved with a binder course only for the present time. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Voice vote

Change order number 2 in the amount of \$250.00 to Packerland Fence Co. for an additional 16 foot double drive gate at the new park area was approved. Motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Voice vote was unanimous.

As recommended by the Plan Commission, the preliminary plat of the Hon-E-Kor Estates Subdivision, being a part of Lot 8, Block 37, of the Assessor's Plat was approved. Motion by Trustee Danielsen, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

Roger Turchany was granted a real estate tax refund in the amount of \$165.62 because of an error in his 1977 real estate assessment. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Voice vote was unanimous.

Chief of Police Hlavaty was authorized to attend the Wisconsin Chiefs of Police Conference at Fond du Lac on August 14, 15 and 16. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Voice vote was unanimous.

Supt. Bilgo was authorized to purchase 350 feet of metal culvert pipe, the diameter and gauge to be as specified by the consulting engineer. Motion by Trustee Danielsen, seconded by Trustee D. Nigh. Voice vote was

The village's consulting engineers, Foth and Van Dyke, were authorized to prepare plans and specifications for the extension of sewer and water lines eastward on Werner Drive. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

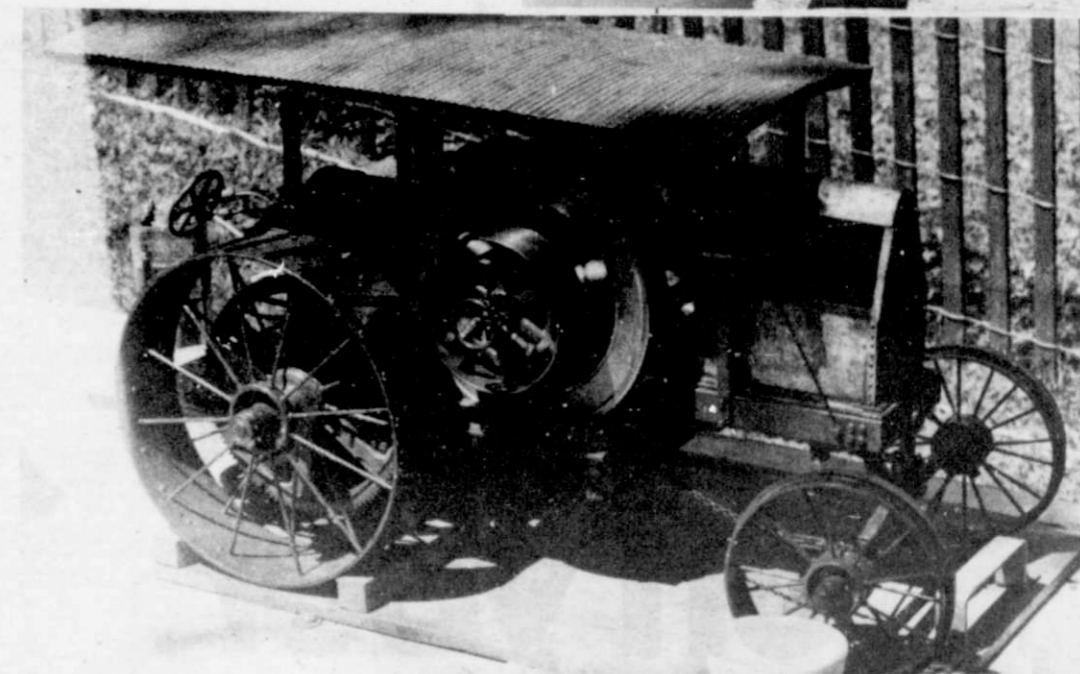

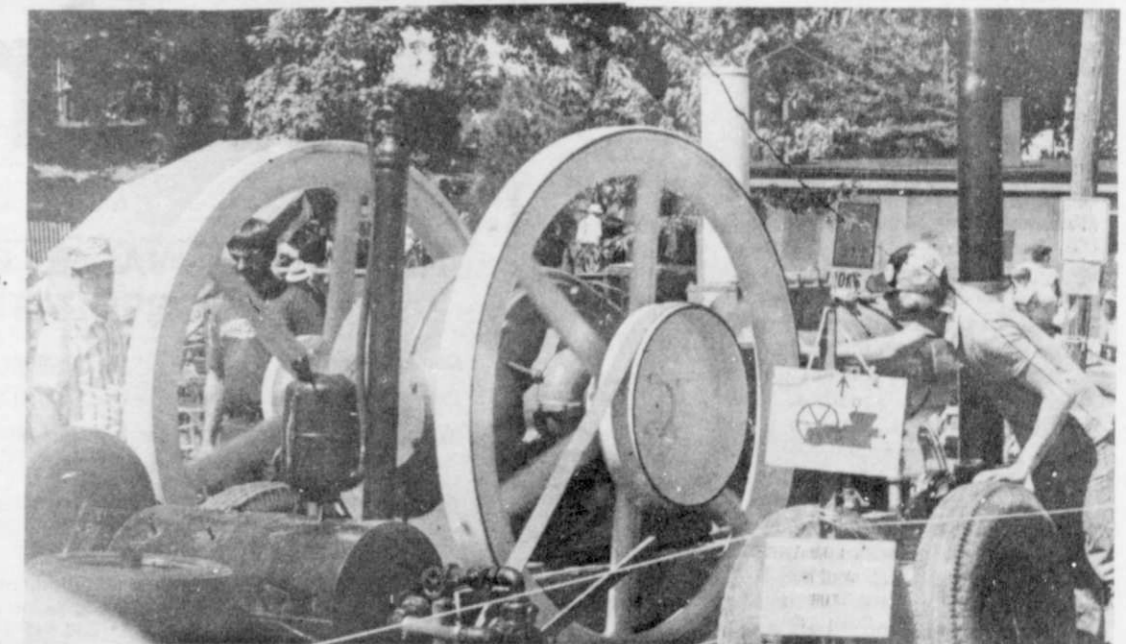

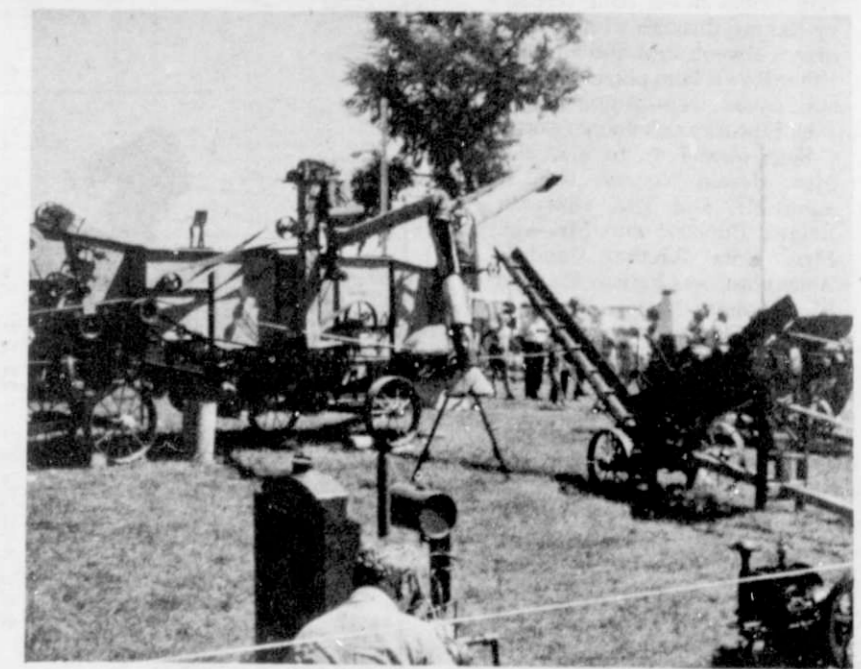

The Bruhn and Backhaus service station and lunch room just outside of the north village limits, was broken into again sometime early Tuesday morning. It is believed that the would-be burglars were youths because the only thing molested was a shuffle alley machine which was forced open.

The Northern division Land O' Lakes all-stars clashed with the Eastern division stars last Wednesday night at Lannon in the final game of the Lakes all-star series with the East winning 8-2. The Northern stars were able to get but one measly hit up until the ninth inning and so Killy Honeck of Kewaskum, who was on the squad as a coach not a player, went in to pinch hit. Killy slapped out a clean single and drove the North's second run across the plate. Honeck was "persuaded" to pinch bat with two outs in the ninth and the score 8-1, with runners on first and second. He shoved the "persuasion" right down their throats by coming through with a solid drive between first and second. Other Kewaskum players on the star squad were Augie Bilgo, Dick Edwards and John Tessar.

50 Years Ago

August 25, 1928

Work on the installation of city waterworks plant in Kewaskum was started on Tuesday afternoon. The first test hole to

be dug was in the L.D. Guth land, located east of the stockyards. The hole was abandoned for reason that they struck solid rock. They are now drilling a test hole in the Roman Backhaus land located on the south side of the village limits.

A severe wind, rain and electrical storm passed through this section of the state last Monday night. It is reported that losses to farmers and various companies will total about \$100,000 or more. The path of the storm followed the northern end of Washington County and in some places had the appearance of a cyclone, leveling trees in one farmers place and jumping several miles before striking again. At Beechwood, the large barn on the Louis Reed farm, together with the foundation were completely demolished, and three horses were buried beneath the wreckage. On the

William Doms farm, located about a mile west of Kewaskum, nearly all of the trees in the woods were uprooted. While in the village, trees on the premises of Mrs. Aioert Glander, S.N. Casper, Holy Trinity school grounds, August Schlaefer and Adolph Rosenheimer, Sr., were uprooted.

In spite of the fact that Robert Yoost, county bridge builder, and his crew, had considerable trouble in excavating for the abutments of the new bridge on account of the heavy flow of water, caused by underground springs, the work is getting along remarkably well. The abutment on the west side was finished this week and work of pouring concrete for the center pier was done on Wednesday.

Work has begun on the grounds of St. Joseph's hospital, to end six or seven months hence, with the completion of

an entirely new \$175,000 structure.

A quiet wedding was solemnized at Holy Trinity church Tuesday morning when Mrs. Mayme Roden, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Stellpflug, and Albert G. Hron, both of this village, were united in bonds of matrimony.

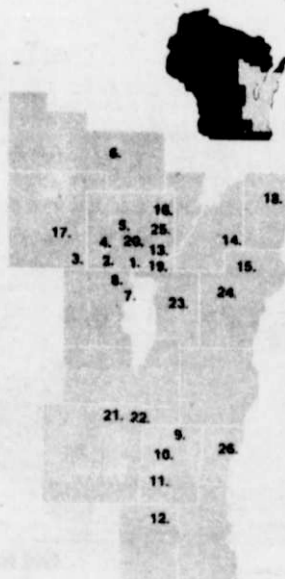

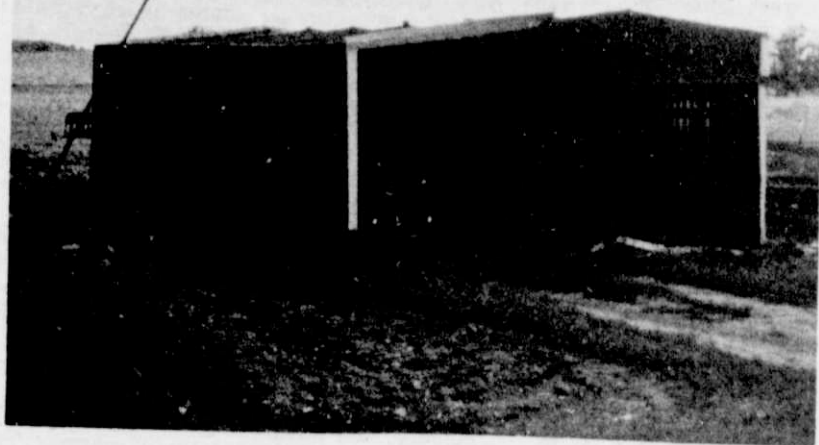

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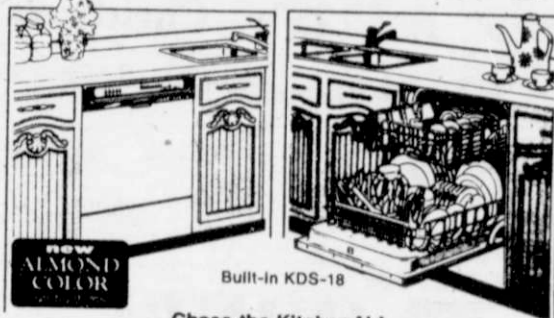
