TURKEY SHOOT SUNDAY

The Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum has announced that its 26th Annual Turkey Shoot will be held on Sunday, September 10, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, six miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine Drive. Thousands of people joined us last year with over 600 marksmen winning fine frozen turkeys.

For a fee of \$2.00 for four shots (four shots for \$1.50 on advance sale tickets, which may be ordered from Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum, Box 68, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040), the marksman attempts to win a frozen turkey. There are special lines for ladies and children.

Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

Trout Fishing Contests are another attraction. The angler keeps the fish he catches. In addition, there is a grand prize for the person catching the largest fish.

Trap shooting contests are conducted throughout the day. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns and ammunition. There is also an archery target range, as well as other marksmanship contests. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, brats, hamburgers and both hot and cold beverages will be available.

Bids Opened for Phase 3 on Development of New Park

The opening of bids for Phase 3 on the development of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park project was the highlight of the agenda at Tuesday evening's Village Board meeting.

Payne and Dolan submitted a bid of \$39,367 for Contract I which is for bituminous pavement of the parking lot, road and walk. Six bids were submitted for Contract II of fencing for the tennis court and softball diamond which range from \$17,000 to \$24,000. One bid from Page Electric was submitted for the lighting at \$12,670.

Approval was given for the Gilsabind sealing of Memorial Drive, Pleasantwood, Lazy Lane and Werner Drive. The contract of \$9,322 will include black-topping and filling of cracks in the pavement, also for the removal of weeds in the cracks. The cracks should be filled twice - once now at time of construction and again before winter.

The new shelter house in the old village park will have the addition of a 10 ft. 6 in. opening on the south side to enable trucks to unload. On the east side one post was eliminated to provide for a future door. Included also will be two vented louvers. The total cost will remain under \$12,000.

The certified survey map for the division of a lot on River-view owned by Gilbert and Lorraine Korth met all zoning requirements and was approved as recommended by the Plan Commission.

Two police officers will be sent to the Retraining Conference on Juvenile Justice at Neenah on October 4, 5 and 6, due to the revision of the juvenile code.

The Board granted permission for the installation of an

underground cable on River-view Drive south of Main by the General Telephone Company. They also decided to pursue the situation of installing a natural gas lateral to the new fire station.

A request from Dr. Edwards to convert the office rooms into a small apartment was approved along with a building request from Exodus House, if approved by the building inspector.

An ordinance has not been completed on the restriction of loaning of village and park equipment by the general public.

In a recent article it was stated that Howard Zemlicka would be razing the old Geidel house on Fond du Lac Avenue. It was in error. At the present time no one has been found.

Primary Election Tuesday

Tuesday, September 12, is Primary Election Day.

State, congressional, legislative and county officials will be nominated for the general election in November.

Candidates have been working hard in recent weeks, especially those for state and congressional offices, and a good turnout is foreseen at the polls.

Polls at the municipal building for the Village of Kewaskum, the Labor Center for the Town of Kewaskum, Strobel's Hall for the Town of Wayne, and Fillmore Turner Hall for the Town of Farmington will open at 9 a.m. and close at 8 p.m.

Kewaskum teachers and the Kewaskum Board of Education paid tribute to a 25-year veteran of the teaching profession last week. Honored for his years of service was Earl (Buzz) Buswell, a social science teacher, audio visual aids coordinator, and drivers education instructor.

Reverend Hoenecke, pastor and friend of the recipient, acted as master of ceremonies for the program. Reverend Hoenecke reviewed some of the highlights of Mr. Buswell's teaching career, while interjecting amusing incidents that occurred during the past quarter century. Mr. Buswell was given an engraved plaque by the Board of Education in commemoration of his service to the district.

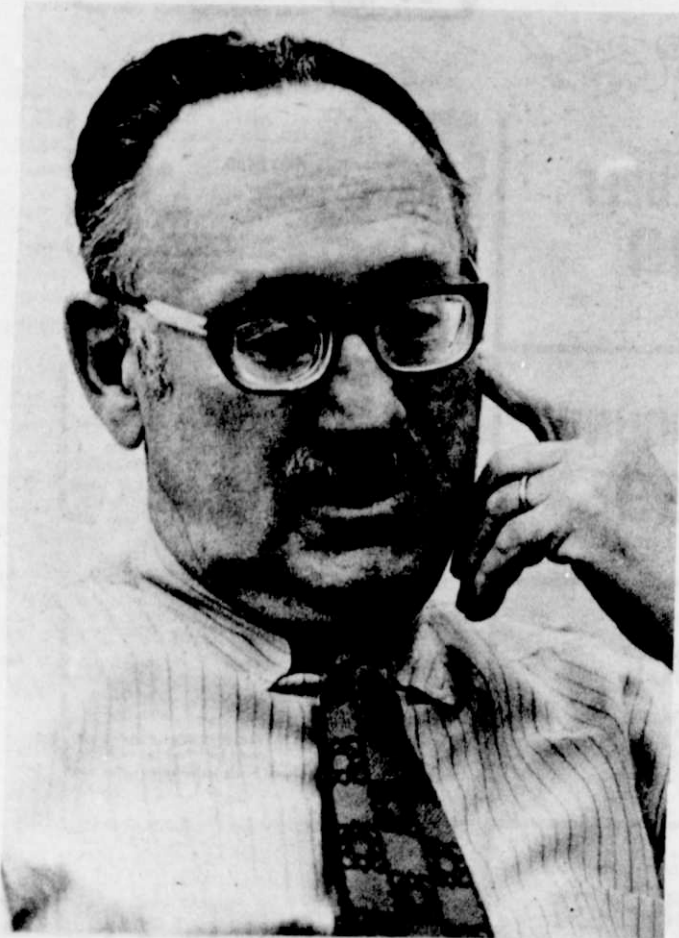

Statesman to Carry Series of 15 Articles on Wisconsin's Folklore



Dr. Walker Wyman, Centennial Professor of History at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, is the author of a series on "Wisconsin Folklore" to begin in the Statesman on September 15.

Wisconsin's rich and varied folklore will be the subject of a series of 15 articles carried in the Statesman starting September 15. The series is being written by Dr. Walker Wyman, Centennial Distinguished Professor of History at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls.

Topics for the various articles, which will run once weekly through the week of December 17, include Wisconsin Heroes and Legends; Nationality Folk-

lore (focusing on Wisconsin's predominate ethnic groups); Occupational Folklore; Animal, Bird and Fish Lore; Mythical Creatures of Wisconsin; Folk Medicine; Witching for Water, Oil and Precious Minerals; Death, Burial and Tombstone Lore, and others.

Dr. Wyman retired in June after 42 years on the history staff at River Falls. He served as president of Wisconsin State University-Whitewater from

1962-67. Dr. Wyman has written 11 books on the subjects of folklore and frontier history and offered his folklore course through the facilities of the State Educational Radio Network in 1970.

The weekly articles are self contained and meant to be read for pleasure. They do, however, serve as the nucleus of a course which may be taken either from undergraduate or graduate credit through University of Wisconsin Extension. Readers who decide to participate for credit will receive additional materials by mail.

Dr. Wyman will also visit this area during the course of the series to meet with students and interested readers. The schedule for his visit will be announced later.

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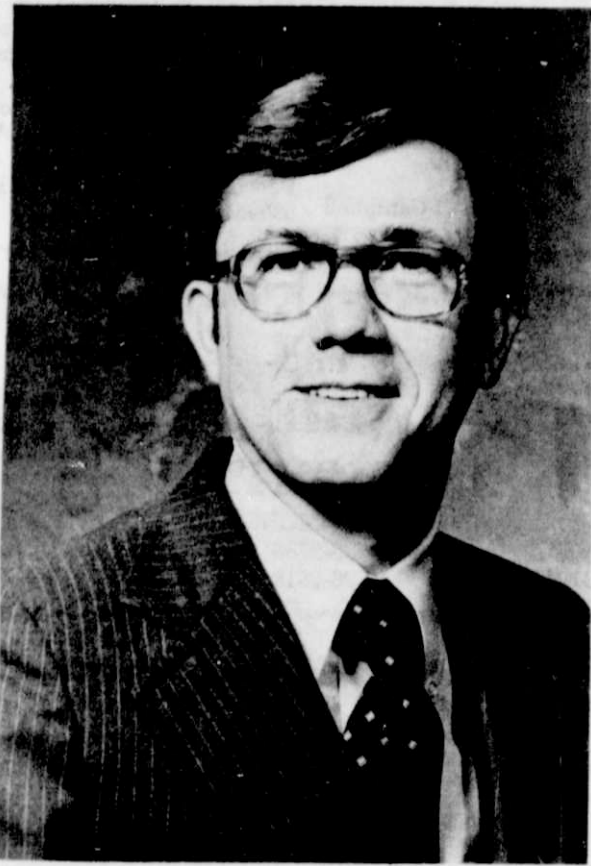
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Seefeldt, Kewaskum Native, Candidate for Secretary of State, to Attend GOP Brat Fry

FFA Tractor Safety Tips

We are now in the peak season for tractor accidents, and all tractor operators are the victims being sought.

The planting and harvesting season are peak months for tractor accidents. This is mainly due to the fact that most tractors are operated and more operator time is put in. Putting more time in may contribute to carelessness, and therefore the results show.

Leading the list, by far, is tractor upsets. Tractor upsets are mainly of two types, backward overturns and side upsets. Tractors equipped with Roll-Over Protective Structures (ROPS) will generally be limited to an upset to 90°, however, injuries still are just as possible or, even more severe than without ROPS, if seatbelts are not worn. Seatbelts in overturns without ROPS really serve to use, because you are held in the tractor's seat and crushed by the tractor. Tractor upsets can generally be avoided by being

alert and using common sense.

Next to tractor upsets are due to extra passengers on tractors and tied with this are people being crushed between a tractor and another object. Following these are people being run over by tractors. The last two are fell-off and thrown-from a tractor.

Fenders are provided to cover the tires, not to provide a seat for extra riders. Tractors are designed for only one person to be on, and that person is the operator.

When operating any tractor, or any farm equipment for that matter, full attention is required by the operator. Reaction time is reduced when the operator is drugged, fatigued, ill or intoxicated. When you are not fit to operate a tractor, you are first putting the life of you in danger, and secondly, putting the life of anyone in the immediate vicinity at a risk. To prevent fatigue when putting in a long day, take short breaks to revive and refresh yourself.

A very serious culprit of tractors is the PTO (Power Take Off). Speeds up to 1000 rpm's are achieved with un-suppressed power. PTO's

should be guarded at all times. Never assume that a guard that is rotating on a PTO shaft will stop when you grab hold of it, technically it should but never put yourself at that risk.

Accidents don't just happen, they are caused.

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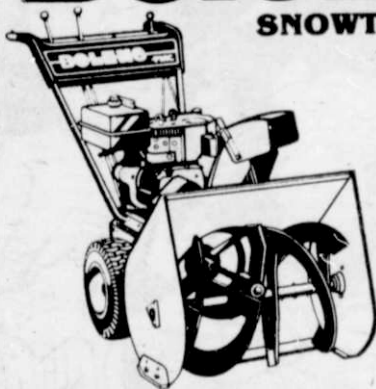
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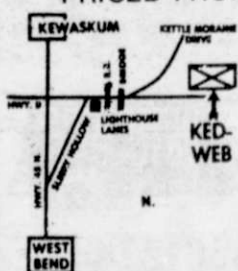

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




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September 'Law of the Month' to Stress Stopping for School Buses

With the beginning of the 1978-79 school year, the Wisconsin State Patrol will again stress the requirement that drivers stop for school buses with red flashing lights as the "Law of the Month" for September.

Last year some 253 drivers received citations for failing to observe the law, while another 900 received special attention and warning letters from the Office of Transportation Safety after school bus drivers reported them for passing without stopping.

Captain Jack W. Jorgensen, Commanding District 2, of the Wisconsin State Patrol, said Wisconsin law requires drivers to stop when meeting or overtaking a bus that has stopped and has its red warning lights flashing, indicating the passengers are being loaded or unloaded. Drivers must stop at least 20 feet from the bus and remain stopped until the bus driver has turned off the flashing lights or the bus has resumed motion. The only exception is that drivers need not stop if they are on the opposite roadway of a divided highway.

He said drivers should also be particularly careful to observe the 15 mile per hour speed zones in the vicinity of schools and school crosswalks. The slower speeds are in effect when children are present or going to and from school.

Norbert K. Anderson, Administrator of the Division of Motor Vehicles, reminded dri-

vers that failure to stop for a school bus is a violation which carries four demerit points for a driver with a regular license, and eight demerit points if the driver has a probationary license and a previous traffic conviction. Forfeitures may range from \$20 to \$200, he noted.

Local law enforcement agencies are invited to participate in the "Law of the Month" campaign, which stresses timely topics of motor vehicle laws each month.

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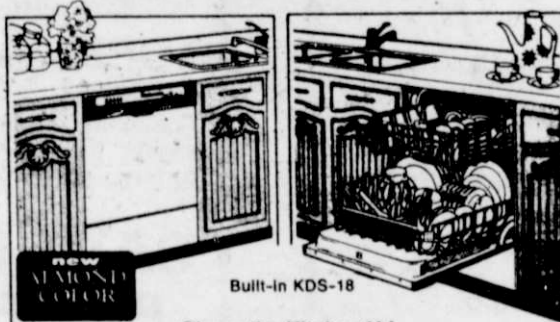

In the first half the Cougars rushed for 140 yards while the Indians were held to six. Kewaskum's biggest gain was a fine 24 yard effort by tailback Paul Bremser but everything went wrong for them offensively. Quarterback Joe Herriges was thrown several times for losses. Bremser's run was good for the only first down in the half.

In the second half some defensive changes were made and two of last year's standouts were inserted into the lineup, namely John Bemis and Mike Pettit. This greatly improved the Indians' play and cut down the Cougars' running.

Kewaskum had one good opportunity to score when Bemis recovered a fumble on the Cougar 29 yard line. The Indians got one first down but then the drive stalled and they wound up on the 22.

In the last quarter the big Cougar backs took turns running and drove 78 yards for the final score. This time it was 190 lb. Keith Rowe going in from the 2 yard line.

Leading rusher was Scott Rowe with 87 yards in 14 carries, including a 15 yarder. Brother Keith rushed for 67 and Narges for 64.

before opening the Scenic season at home September 15 against Germantown.
