School Board Accepts Gasoline Bid

Monday night's meeting had the School Board looking at the bids for gasoline again. The question was whether the motion had been to accept the Strobel bid, or a motion which indicated the low bid. This motion resulted from a change made at the September 19 meeting at which time the Shefond bid was rescinded because of a misunderstanding on what the bid included.

A motion was then made to rescind the motion of September 19 to accept the low bid and to accept the bid of Strobel Oil Co. gasoline for 1978-79. The vote went with five members in favor and Gessner and Theusch voting "no."

The board also discussed the question of cheerleaders participation in a sport during the same season. No action was taken on the matter.

The board approved having all complaints of violations of training rules in the athletic code be submitted in writing, signed, time and place of violation being reported. Also approved was the fall auditing of student enrollment.

The first reading of Policy 5113.2 - Attendance - Full-time Students was defined as follows: 1. High school students must be scheduled for at least three and one-half units per year. College credits being taken and school supervised work experience programs may be used toward fulfillment of the minimum program. 2. Middle School students must be scheduled for at least 4-1/2 units per year. 3. Elementary schools must be scheduled for the full day program, kindergarten students for 1/2 day. 4. EEN students may have less than a minimum program if M-Team prescribed.

The CETA project application for the continuation of a custodial and library aide position was approved by the board.

The long term disability program was discussed but no action was taken. A letter is requested from companies making proposals indicating coverage and will be retroactive to October 1, 1978. The board will review this issue at the October 16 meeting.

Policy # 3326.1 on check signatures was read and approved by the board. It indicates who is authorized to sign specific checks.

Parents planning to move to the district have asked to have their children enroll in Kewaskum schools now. The board accepted the requests based on tuition requirements as stated in the Wisconsin Statute, understanding that tuition will be charged if residence is not established as required by the statute.





MYTHICAL CREATURES OF WISCONSIN

Among the best known mythical animals in Wisconsin were those reported by the lumberjacks, miners, and their romantic followers. Bed-cats were descendants of the original bedbugs that once infested the miners' cabins in Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota. When the mines were deserted, they attached themselves to bob-cats, grew fur to stay alive in the wintertime, and learned to run the woods with their hosts. Trappers occasionally caught them, noticed that they looked like bob-cats except they had more legs. There was a lively market for their pelts in Superior and Hurley where women, intrigued by both the name of Bed-cat and the warmth of the fur, used the pelts to trim their nightgowns.

The most famous mythical creature in Wisconsin is the Hodag, a prehistoric creature resembling a dinosaur with the body of an ox and the tail of an alligator. Along its back were sharply pointed spines. Gene Shepard of Rhinelander cap-

tured one at the turn of the century, using white bulldogs as bait, and exhibited it at county fairs. The Milwaukee Journal reported on this amazing news event and it is said that the Smithsonian Institution was interested in this creature.

Unfortunately, a fire destroyed the creature so the scientific world was not able to prove the Hodag's authenticity. Hodags were reported in Minnesota logging camps in the same period, but these may have been a sub-species. A replica of the Hodag may be purchased in Rhinelander today (made in Japan!) and a statute to this noble creature stands in front of the Rhinelander Museum. One question remains: If the Hodag was a hoax, then why are there not more white bulldogs in northern Wisconsin today?

In a number of bars in northern Wisconsin hangs the Jackalope, a cross between the antelope and the jackrabbit, and many a fight has occurred over the issue of its authenticity. This creature was first reported in 1829 in Wyoming, but it has moved eastward as well as westward over the years. A statute stands in its memory in Douglas, Wyoming. Mounted Jackalopes are available in both Tioga, Pennsylvania, and Hong Kong. The Douglas Chamber of Commerce issues a non-resident hunting license for Jackalope hunting which authorizes shooting between midnight and 2 a.m. on June 31. The taking of two-tailed Jackalopes is prohibited. Jackalope milk is also sold, claiming to be richer "in Vitamin P than beer or water-

melon," and is to be kept away from office girls and waitresses.

The Splinter cat that once frequented the pineries looked like a porcupine "with its spines running the wrong way." Its head was shaped like a maul; it had the hind legs of a jackrabbit that enabled it to jump over logs and streams, and a body the size of a six-week old calf. But it had one great weakness--it had a sweet tooth that caused it to seek honey wherever it could be found.

If the bees had hidden their honey inside a tree--out of reach of the Splinter Cat--it went raving mad, climbed into a nearby tree and then sprang against the bee tree with all its might. Its head was a battering ram that often shattered the tree into a million pieces. Then the animal ate its fill. Since it roamed only during thunderstorms, lumberjacks often said as they listened to the thunder. "The Splinter Cats are sure out

appear? It is believed that the honey bees migrated out of the pineries into the hardwood forests, and that the Splinter Cats simply dashed their brains out against these large trees. Is that why there are so many fallen and shattered trees in the Wisconsin forests today?

Among the Chippewa Indians there is a legend about a giant cannibal, the Windigo, that once roamed the forest sending out thunderbolts from its twisted jaws and hungering for human flesh. It is believed that some Indians who had to eat human flesh to survive the long winters also became Windigoes. Mothers quieted their Children by saying, "Hush, or the Windigo will get you." Trappers and fishermen in the Great Lakes still say, when they see strange tracks in remote areas, "the Windigo has been

been reported ever since lonely men first went out to sea. They have the bust and facial features of beautiful women and the lower body of a fish, and usually inhabit rocky islands where they lure men into the great unknown. Columbus saw one in the West Indies. Henry

Hudson's sailors saw one on the river that bears his name. Captain John Smith saw one gracefully swimming along in the Caribbean Sea.

The only mermaid in the Great Lakes region was reported by a French fur trader in 1812. While in camp on the north shore of Lake Superior, he saw a strange sight--a merman. It had the body of a child seven or eight years of age, with a handsome face, brown skin, and wooly hair that he associated







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who was in the party. She called the creature, "God of the Water and Lakes.'

Sasquatch and Other **Apelike Creatures**

Throughout history there have been reports of ape-like creatures that seemed to be a missing link in the evolution of man or apes. The most convincing evidence that has been found are the numerous footprints scattered all the way from British Columbia to Northern California. Wisconsin has also had its own ape-man. Deer hunters near Fremont reported such a sighting in 1969. Residents of the Weyerhauser area in northern Wisconsin hear from time to time the "whistling screams" of a nocturnal creature whom they affectionately call "The Screecher."

Summary

These examples of American mythical creatures are quite different from many of the dragons and werewolf types that frequented Europe. Most of the American creatures are lovable; a few are ferocious but never hurt anybody. Most of them have been born of the need to explain something, and in so doing, make a tall tale of it.

The Sasquatch is in a different category than the Hodag and the Goofus Bird, for its identity is believed by many people who constantly seek evidence of its existence, while, the Hodag will always be a good tall tale about the "lumber-

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



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

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


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


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KEWASKUM'S AFS STUDENTS

Jorge is from Asuncion, the capital of Paraguay. Asuncion has about 500,000 people and he says the buildings are not as large as Milwaukee's. Temperatures range from 35 degrees F to 100 degrees F. They get very little snow. Paraguay shares borders with Brazil, Argentine and Boliva.

Jorge is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pedro Cazal and has one brother, Francisco. His father works in a soap factory and his mother is a housewife.

In Paraguay, Jorge attends the Colegion Nacional de la Capital, an all boys school with 3,600 students. School starts in March and runs until November which is their winter. The school day starts at 7:00 a.m. said the difference in schools was a big surprise. Here the students go from classroom to classroom but in his country the teachers change rooms.

The majority of the people are mestizo. The government is Democratic with their President being General Alfredo Stroesner. They must be 18 to vote and to acquire a driver's license. The official language is Spanish and people also speak English and Guarani, an Indian language. The money unit is Guarani; (126 guarani = \$1.00).

Asuncion manufactures shoes textiles, and has a Coca-Cola plant. In rural areas they raise cows, horses, pigs, and grow watermelon, oranges, mandarins and bananas.

Paraguay has professional basketball, soccer and volleyball teams. Jorge enjoys basketball and volleyball the most.

For recreational pleasure he likes fishing a large fish called the Surubi. He likes to read best sellers and go to movies, which include many American films. He collects stamps and likes to listen to music. His favorite American groups are Kansas and Boston, also a famous Paraguayan group called "Aftermad's" which have appeared in concerts and TV in the United States

Two favorite dances in their country are the Paraguay Polka, which is similar to our polka, and the Guarania, a slow dance. Discotheques are popular with the young people. He likes playing his guitar and Paraguayan harp.

Hamburgers and pizza are his favorite American foods. His native food favorites are chipaguazu (corn pudding) and sopa paraguaya.

On his return to Paraguay, he will attend college to study civil engineering.

AFS student, Edgardo Carranzo from El Salvador, is staying with his American family, Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Dettmann of Bolton Drive, Kewaskum. Edgardo is attending Kewaskum High School with host brother John, a senior, and Julie, a freshman.

El Salvador, Central America, borders with Honduras, Guatemala, and the Pacific Ocean temperature ranges from 77 degrees F to 90 degrees F. It has many lakes and mountains but due to the temperature Edgardo has never seen snow. The population of El Salvador is larger than Milwaukee.

Edgardo's home town is San Vincente where he lives with his mother, Juana, and sisters Elsa and Griselda. His mother owns a store in which she sells food. vegetables, clothes and medi-

Edgardo attends a Technical Institute in San Salvador (the capital) at which time he lives with his aunt and uncle. Schools consist of six years of elementary education and three years of high school. After Edgardo returns to El Salvador, he will attend a college to study electrical engineering. Their winter from February to October is also their school year. The day starts at 7:00 a.m. and ends at 3:00 p.m. He said the school's are similar except that in his country there aren't any study halls.

President Romero leads the Democratic government of El Salvador. The monetary unit of the country is a colon; (2.50 colons = \$1.00). The majority of the people are mestizo. The United States and Japan have built industries in El Salvador. Textiles, shoes and Coca-Cola are manufactured.

The rural areas raise cows. cucumbers, watermelon, pumpkin, fruit trees, balsum, coconut and medicinal trees. Pine trees are grown only in large cities in the wealthy areas. He said can start driving at any age, but there isn't much need for a car.

El Salvador has basketball and futbol (soccer) as the countries professional sports. Edgardo enjoys soccer, swimming, baseball, track and running.

In his spare time he likes to collect stamps, read science fiction, fish, hunt, camp and enjoys music. The Country's famous musical group is Hermanos Flores. (Flower Brothers). He speaks Spanish, English and Japanese.

He said that every house in San Salvador has cats and dogs but his favorite is the horse.

Edgardo would like to go to Japan and study electrical engineering. He also wishes to return to the United States some day.

The way the schedule was set up, Kewaskum had to face probably the two best teams in the conference in their first two games and after losing to Germantown the week before, the Indians were defeated again by Grafton here Friday night, 26-14.

A two-yard loss, penalty and incomplete pass left Kewaskum with fourth down and 12. On a flea-flicker play Herriges handed off to Paul Bremser, who in turn handed off to Schultz, who found Scott Brendemihl in the end zone for the TD. A catch by Schultz was good for the two point conversion, 8-0.

Kewaskum's defense held Grafton for two downs and then the offense got going again. Fullback Mike Pettit went off tackle, broke two or three tackles, and got into the clear on a 60-yard run for the second score, 14-0.

Grafton finally got their wishbone started for their first touchdown in the second quarter on a 60-yard drive with fullback John Brewster going in for the score. The defense held the Indians and later in the same quarter the Blackhawks got their second touchdown, again on a Brewster run. Both kicks for extra points failed and it was 14-12 Kewaskum at half-

The Indians lost a key player at halftime. Guard and linebacker John Bemis was suffering from double vision and attendants of the local rescue squad suggested he discontinue playing for the night. Bemis, who had an outstanding first half, was sorely missed as Grafton's two platooning began to wear the Indians down.

In the third quarter Grafton began a long 84-yard, 17-play scoring drive which consumed much time and on the second play of the last quarter, quarterback Greg Merchen scored from the four-yard line. Then he hit Paul Schlect for the twopoint conversion to give the Hawks the lead for the first

Kewaskum went to a shotgun offense the rest of the way but it backfired. One of the snaps went over quarterback Herriges' head and Jeff Kotes recovered for Grafton on the Indians' 22. Following a 15-yard penalty, three plays later John Lieven got free for a 26-yard score around end.
