Dr. Edwards officially retired January 1, 1977, having served the community for 45 years. During his career, his wife Alma, assisted him in his office as a graduate nurse.

They have six children, Annabelle, Dick and Bill, all of Kewaskum; Dolly of Route 2, Campbellsport; Gwen of Kenosha; Pat of Brookfield, and their families. They also have 28 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

20 Fire, 144 Rescue Calls by Firemen in 1978

The Kewaskum Fire Department annual report for the year 1978 as submitted by Chief August F. Bilgo is as follows:

Total number of fires responded to by the department was 20 fires in 1978 compared to 15 in 1977. Location and types of fires were:

Village of Kewaskum — One chimney fire.

Town of Kewaskum — Nine fires; types: Four chimney, two house trailers, one truck, one grass, one electric motor-house.

Town of Auburn — Seven fires; types: Three chimney, one grass, two house fires, one car-truck accident.

Mutual aid calls — Three fires; Town of Wayne — Two house fires; Campbellsport — Assist at a barn fire.

In 1978 the Kewaskum Fire Department Rescue Squad responded to 144 calls and transported 173 persons. A total of 3,077 miles were logged.

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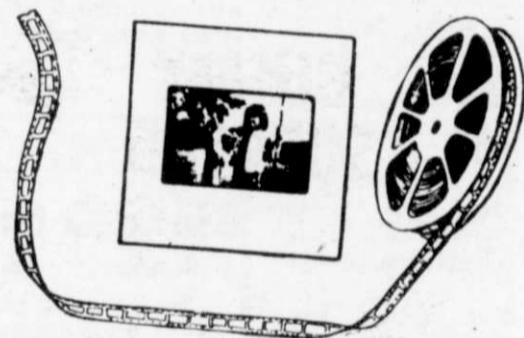

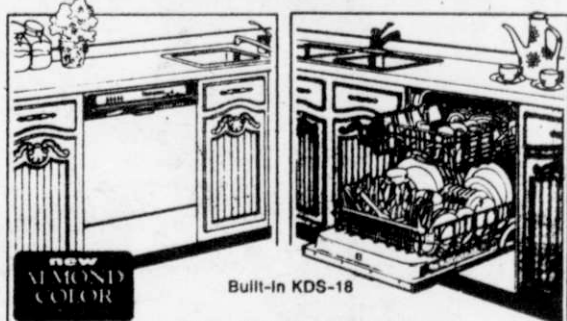
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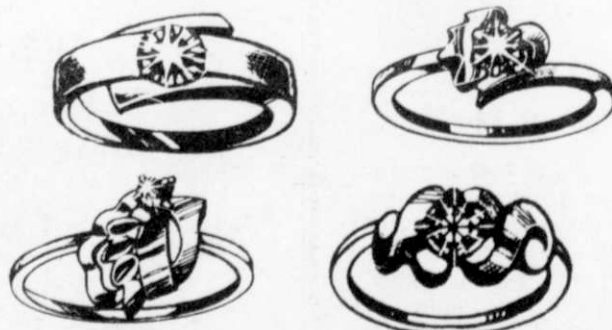
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TOP KEWASKUM NEWS STORIES OF 1978

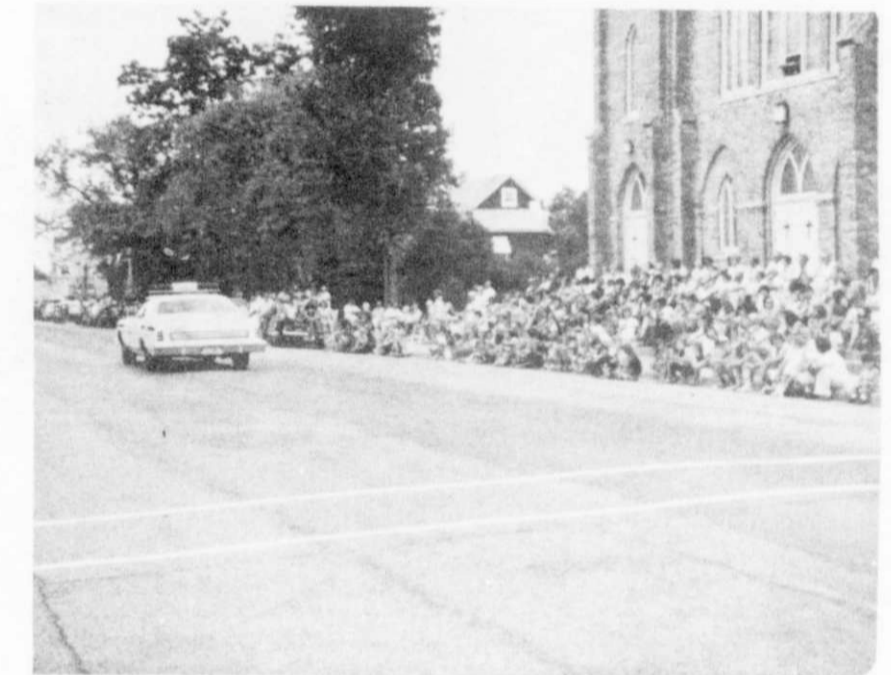

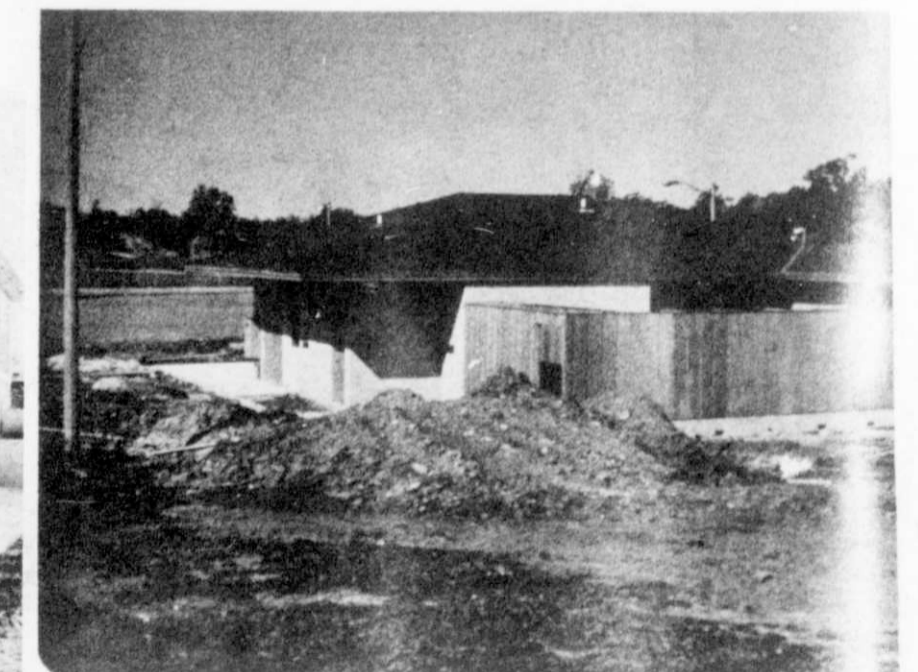

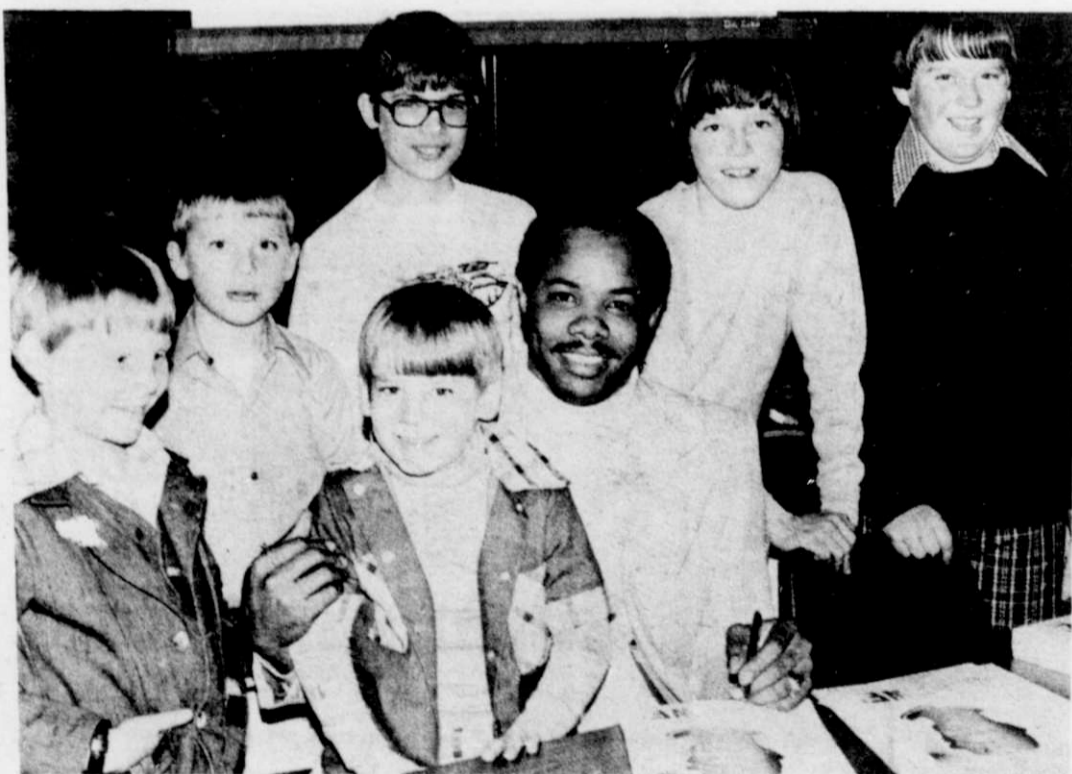

Hephner Appointed To Head Committee On Debt Management

State Representative Gervase Hephner (D-Chilton) announced this week that he has been appointed Chairman of the Assembly Committee on Debt Management. The Committee has the responsibility to review all bills that would increase or decrease the amount of money borrowed by the state of Wisconsin.

Representative Hephner brings considerable experience and expertise in money matters to this position. Hephner has been on the board of directors of a local bank and has served for a number of years on the State Revenue Committee of Wisconsin.

The Committee on Debt

Management was created in the 1977 session of the legislature to better manage the debts of the state.

Chapter 317, Laws of 1977, created the Joint Committee on Debt Management comprised of six legislators (three from each house) and three members appointed by the Governor. It is a legislative committee designed to advise the Legislature on matters regarding the state's debt policies.

The Committee has the specific statutory authority to determine desirable amounts and forms of debt and revenue obligations, to review all legislative proposals which affect any existing statutes relating to the issuing of debt, review the operations of independent authorities, make investigations and prepare long-term financial plans relating to state debt. Also, the Committee is required to prepare a report on all bills related to state debt or revenue obligations that describes the effect of such bill on the state's finances and the desirability of the proposal as a matter of public policy.

An afternoon seminar will begin at 1:00 p.m. in the Washington County Courthouse Auditorium, 432 E. Washington St., West Bend. For those persons unable to attend the day session, a repeat seminar is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. The seminar will be approximately 3 1/2 hours in length.

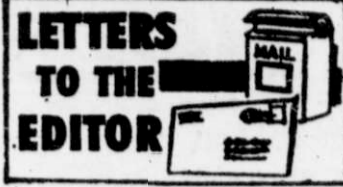

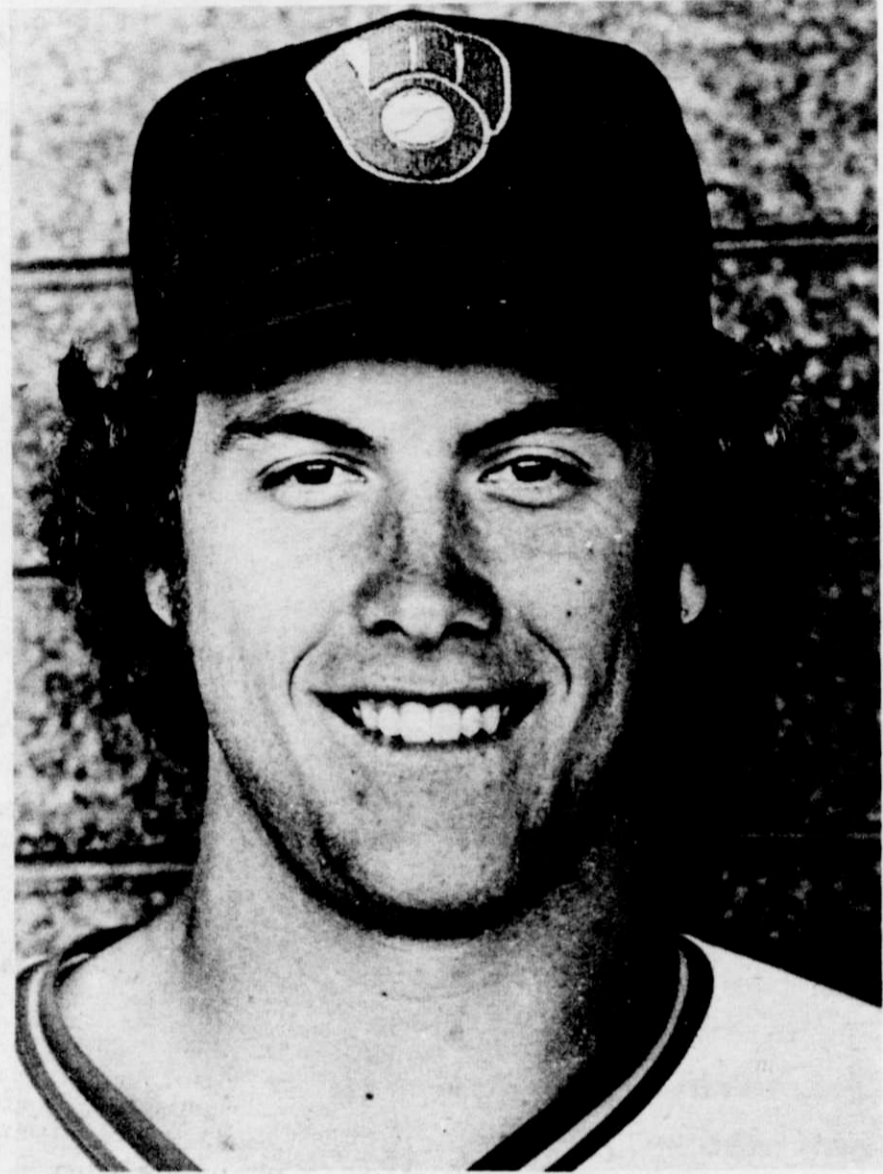
