

Another Blizzard Saturday, More Snow This Week, Bitter Cold Paralyze Area

Up to now this winter will go down as the most severe in history.

The snows started shortly after Thanksgiving and have been very frequent ever since. The worst was a blizzard on New Year's Eve which left 14-20 inches more of snow cover over that already on the ground (it will be a long time until we see the ground again with spring a long ways off).

Following the New Year's Eve blast, another blizzard hit last Saturday which added 14 inches more snow. As if this wasn't enough, three more inches of snow fell Monday night and two more Tuesday night and early Wednesday. Our season's total this far is over 60 inches, well over the average of 43.3 inches for the entire winter. And this is with the rest of January, all of February and March still ahead of us.

When it isn't snowing, it's bitter cold. The temperatures dropped to 17-20 degrees below zero Monday and Tuesday mornings. As a result of the persistent cold, there have been only a few days since New Year's Day that the thermometer got above the zero mark. The temperature warmed up to

two degrees below zero Monday for the latest snow.

The snow and cold paralyzed the area, keeping traffic almost at a standstill. Vehicles that were on the road slipped and skidded, got stuck in the snow, and were involved in numerous minor accidents. Cars wouldn't start from the cold. Most events were cancelled. Winds of 25-30 miles per hour Sunday piled the snow into mountains. Kewaskum schools were closed on Monday and again on Wednesday when there was much drifting. Some rural roads still weren't plowed out Wednesday and on others there was just one lane of traffic.

County and village crews worked night and day clearing the highways and streets and hauling away the snow. There is just no place left to go with the white stuff.

Milwaukee and Chicago got even more snow, were in much worse shape and were declared disaster areas.

The weather, like a broken record, is getting awfully monotonous. The only cheerful news at this writing is that it will be warmer Thursday.

Sensenbrenner Announces \$1.9 Million In Aids to District Municipalities

man Jim Sensenbrenner (R-Ninth District) Friday announced the distribution of \$1.9 million in federal revenue sharing payments this week to local that year to provide funds badly governments in the Ninth Dis-


"These funds help keep property taxes down by picking up part of the costs of local services," Sensenbrenner observed. "I am happy to report that with these latest payments, local governments in the Ninth District have received \$43.4 million under this program, which has meant a direct savings to the property taxpayer," he continued.

The latest payments are part distribution of FRS monies. municipalities follow:

WASHINGTON - Congress- Over \$43.7 billion has been paid to local governments in the U.S. since the program began in 1972. The Federal Revenue Sharing program was created needed by local governments with no strings attached, so they would have complete flexibility in using them to meet local needs.

> Sensenbrenner noted that the FRS program is scheduled to expire on September 30, 1980. "This program has provided significant property tax relief, so I will support its continuance beyond 1980," Sensenbrenner pledged.



Brewers' Top Pitcher, Mike Caldwell, to Appear at Sports Night Here

The players appearing will be the Brewers' two winningest pitchers, aces Mike Caldwell and Lary Sorensen.

A short baseball film will be shown and a booklet, "What's Brewing?" will be passed out and autographed by the players.

Plan now to attend both the Player Night on January 29 and Kewaskum Night at County Stadium on May 31, also sponsored by the Chamber, when the Brewers will play the World Champion New York Yankees.

If not for the sensational season that Ron Guidry of the New York Yankees had, Mike

PITCHER

Caldwell would have been the top pitcher in the American League in 1978. He had a 22-9 record, the second highest victory total in the league, and he finished third in the league in innings pitched (293.1) and ERA (2.36). He tied for second in the league with 6 shutouts, one of four team records he set in 1978. He broke Brewer season records with 22 wins and 23 complete games, the latter the top total in the American League this year. And he set recorus for the lowest ERA (2.36) and the most wins in a row (7) to firmly etch his name in the Brewer record books.

Twice named the American League Player of the Week, three times named Brewer Player of the Month and once runnerup for the American League Player of the Month, Caldwell was one of the key players in the Brewers success formula in 1978. An arm injury to Moose Haas moved Mike into the starting rotation on April 22.

MILWAUKEE BREWERS

He won 11 of 13 decisions from May 24 through August 2 and he became the first pitcher since 1964 to shutout the New York Yankees three times in one season.

Acquired from the Cincinnati Reds on June 15, 1977 for two minor league players, the Brewers were Caldwell's fifth team in the majors, following stints with San Diego, San Francisco, St. Louis and the Reds. His previous best season was a 14-5 record and a 2.95 ERA while with the Giants in 1974. He had surgery to remove a traction bone spur from his left elbow in October of '74.
