Discussion was held on the water problem on Edgewood. The culverts were all open but the water can't run out fast enough. At this time the water is stable and there is no place to pump this water. The culvert is 48 inches and the ditch lies flat with no incline to allow for proper drainage of water. If the water would get too high it would run to Brooklane and drain there.

The board discussed a placement for sludge during the winter months. One was to thicken the sludge and stockpile it. The other method is to dig a lagoon for storage. This elimination of sludge is one of the most expensive parts of disposal. Nothing was decided.



A closed session will be held following the regular meeting to discuss administrative salaries and a personnel question.



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Speak Up on Welfare Reform Welfare Reform, Who Needs It?

Two concerned citizens from my hometown of Fond du Lac are looking for an answer to that question from all of us. Robert Haase and Steve Wright are circulating a petition which will be sent to the members of the state legislature and the U.S. Congress.

The petition calls for reform of the welfare system in four specific areas:

1) a work requirement for all welfare applicants and recipients who are physically able with a provision eliminating aid to those who refuse to participate;

2) stricter penalties for fraud and abuse of welfare programs;

3) greater parental responsiblity by enforcing child support laws and discouraging conception of additional illegitimate children for increased aid; and

4) increased local control over welfare programs and consolidation of administration for greater efficiency.

WELFARE REFORM WOULD BENEFIT ALL

The answer to the question who needs welfare reform? is everyone, taxpayers and welfare recipients alike. With approximately 12% of the entire

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GENERAL REPAIRS

state budget going to welfare programs, every taxpayer should be concerned about this bite out of our weekly paychecks.

The goals of welfare programs are to help people through times of need and to assist them in getting back into the workforce. It seems these goals are not being adequately reached. This should be a matter of grave concern to all welfare recipients, whose chances for a dignified life are not being furthered by the present system.

LEGISLATIVE PROPOSALS

The welfare program in Wisconsin has swelled to inordinate proportions over the last decade. In 1965 the total number of recipients was approximately 82,000; by 1978 that had jumped to 450,000. This has been due to several factors. Grant sizes have increased; eligibility requirements have become vague; and our work ethic and sense of family responsibility have deteriorated.

The problem can be solved in part by state legislation; federal

rules and regulation dictate much of the structure of Wisconsin's welfare system. Since 1974, I have submitted to the state legislature proposals to improve the quality and curb the quantity of welfare programs.

This session I plan to introduce legislation which answers several points of the Haase/Wright petition. Among others, the proposals include:

1) Allowing county welfare departments to consolidate for greater administrative efficiency:

2) Requiring adult children to contribute to the maintenance of parents receiving public assistance;

3) Requiring applicants for aid to swear under oath that all statements on the application are true, with a 3-year jail term or \$1,000 fine for swearing falsely.

These proposals have a better chance to become law if you and your neighbors will take the time to sign the petition Robert Haase and Steve Wright are circulating. My colleagues in the legislature must listen to the collective voice of the people.



The first major fight in Congress this session will be over the issue of taxpayer financing of Congressional elections. The House Democratic leadership has given this legislation its top priority and media editorials are now responding to that stance. As a result of this activity this issue has prompted more mail to my office recently than any other issue.

Taxpayer financing of Congressional elections is just that — using federal tax dollars to pay for Congressional campaigns. By accepting these funds, a candidate would subject his campaign to limitations on the total amount it may spend. Supporters claim such a system is needed to remove "special interest" group influence from elections. But I strongly believe there are more compelling reasons to oppose taxpayer financing of elections.

First, I believe it is morally wrong to use someone's tax dollars to support candidates he may actually not support. Limiting spending also limits the freedom of the candidate to communicate with his potential constituents. Thus, it runs counter to our democratic system of choosing our elected representatives in an atmosphere of complete freedom.

Such a system would certainly cost the taxpayers a great deal of money — up to \$100million — for the candidates and for the costly bureaucracy needed to administer it, which will no doubt create more paperwork. A case in point of the problem is the existing program of taxpayer financing of Presidential campaigns, which cost us \$74 million in

Taxpayer financing of elections would also give a built-in advantage to incumbents, who have many "perks" available to them — mailings, staff, printing, etc. If a challenger is limited to the same amount of spending the incumbent is, he has no way of offsetting those incumbent advantages, which are not included in the limits.

I do not believe that this plan would accomplish the goal of removing "special interest" group influence, either. Not allowed to contribute money to a candidate, they would merely give volunteer assistance and indirect help. Thus, their influence could continue or even increase. The worst of it, however, is that such help may escape full public disclosure along with the accountability of the candidate for receiving it.

Taxpayer financing of Congressional elections has many strikes against it, and a recent poll showed that two-thirds of the American public opposes it. The best way to eliminate "special interest" group influence is to keep strong public scrutiny of the activities of such groups. Unfortunately, too many Congressmen have a "public be-damned" attitude about this issue. I urge everyone opposing this plan to let me know, so I can show those colleagues the depth of public opposition to this bad idea whose time, hopefully, will never come.

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




