Bomb Squad Removes Picric Acid at KHS

volatile picric acid was picked up Monday morning at Kewaskum High School by the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department bomb squad. Police Chief Donald Hlavaty said the community had to wait about a week for the pickup.

The Kewaskum pickup was reportedly the only one made in Washington County. From here the squad went to Random Lake to pick up an undetermined amount of the chemical.

The bomb squad was attempting to consolidate the trips to outlying areas. No information was available on where and when the material would be exploded.

The Sheriff's Department is asking anyone in Washington ment might explode the acid.

Two and one-half ounces of County that might have the chemical picric acid in their home or place of business to check on the condition of the chemical. If the chemical has crystalized, it is very dangerous and unstable and could explode upon the slightest movement or change in temperature. Under NO circumstances should unauthorized personnel handle picric acid in that condition.

If you have picric acid in your inventory and it is in an unstable condition, call the Washington County Sheriff's Department, which will arrange for a bomb disposal squad to dispose of the material. If the picric acid is in a container that you cannot see into, DO NOT open the container as the move-

Village Board Opens Bids For Monitoring System

At Monday night's Village Board meeting there was an opening of bids for a monitoring system for the sewage lift stations, water pump stations and the park bathhouse.

The three bids came from Lane Northwest, Bevco Engineering and L. W. Allen. The board will review these bids to see if the bids meet the specifications. A report will be given at the next meeting.

Don Woller of Foth and Van Dyke was present to discuss the sludge thickening devices. At the present there is a significant volume of sludge for disposal. The sludge disposal contains a great amount of water and decreasing the water content

would decrease the fifteen loads to two loads of sludge for disposal. The winter conditions had made it difficult to dispose of the sludge and stay within the 5.5-9.0 Ph allowance in the sewage plant. The solidifying equipment would be a good investment.

The board discussed the problem of increased vandalism in the community. Members voted to appropriate \$2,500 to the police funds for more auxiliary and part-time policemen and \$2,500 for snow removal. Both amounts were taken out of the excess funding.

National Register of Historic Places The State Historical Society

in Madison at a regular quarterly meeting last month granted unanimous approval to a nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for a set of buildings located in the Town of Farmington, Washington County.

The only buildings from Washington County considered at the April 27 meeting of the Historic Preservation Review Board, the former convent of the Sisters of St. Agnes (1869), Public School No. 8 (1869), St. John of God Catholic Church (1891), and the cemetery located on the church grounds (circa 1853) were placed in nomination by a representative from St. John of God Congregation primarily on the architectural and historical merits of the buildings. After careful consideration by the Historical Properties and Architectural Properties Committees of the State Historical Society, recognition was given by unanimous approval.

Katherine E. Hundt, in her analysis of the fieldstone architecture of the former convent and public school buildings, emphasized the small number of such structures in Wisconsin and said that the use of fieldstone seemed to be limited to a few townships in and around Washington County. A member of the Architectural Properties Committee, Ms. Hundt noted that they were good examples of the Irish settlers' self-expression through their emphasis of 'the colored appearance of the stones." Early German builders by contrast used mortar to cover most of the rock face. Indigenous materials were also used in the locally-manufactured bricks comprising the 1891

Although, according to Gordon Parks of the Historical

Properties Committee, the "ethnic history element" strong enough to solidify any historical claim, there were other merits which gained the complex its recognition. The staffing of Public School No. 8 with state-certified, teaching nuns was a unique example of 'cooperation between Church and State" in lieu of the restrictions normally calling for their separation, according to David Donath, historian for the Historical Society.

Mary Lou McKee, who nominated the buildings on behalf of Friends of St. John of God, Inc., an historic-preservation group based in Farmington, said she and her co-workers were "well pleased with the recognition given the buildings at St. John's by the State Historical Society. She said one immediate goal of those who sought the nomination is the installation of an historical marker on the site to commemorate the significance of the task undertaken by the Irish founders of the parish.

time and material contract to Bunkelman Builders to provide a roof over the dressing area of the bathhouse at a cost not to exceed \$4,500.



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


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

Sensenbrenner Cautions Lawyers On Their Image

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner (R-Shorewood) warned area lawyers that unless members of the legal profession police themselves better, they can expect legislation restricting their professional activities to a much greater extent to be passed by Congress and the state legislatures. Sensenbrenner made his remarks to a meeting of the Washington County Bar Association at the Fox and Hounds Restaurant near Hubertus on the occasion of the May 1 celebration of "Law Day U.S.A."

"People are growing more and more cynical of lawyers because of the unprofessional antics of a few and the publiclyperceived arrogance of many lawyers. On top of that, even the Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court has said there are too many incompetent lawyers now in practice. This image is destructive of lawyers' ability to do a good job of representing their clients and to contribute to a sound system of justice in this country," Sensenbrenner told the lawyers.

Sensenbrenner said part of the answer may lie in the legal profession doing a better job of policing itself to remove the incompetent and the dishonest.

'Unless we do that the only alternative will be the potentially problem-ridden one of more government interference and regulation. The more skeptical people become about lawyers, the more pressure they will put on elected representatives to 'crack down' on them. I think the past record of government overregulation of various professions is fair warning about what can and will happen to the legal profession unless it shows more responsibility to policing itself," Sensenbrenner concluded.







End to Revenue Sharing May Mean State and School Tax Hikes

Recent action by a House committee in recommending an end to federal revenue sharing funds to state governments may have disastrous consequences for Wisconsin taxpayers. Nearly as bad is the fact that ending the program will not accomplish what its opponents have claimed.

After the revenue sharing program was enacted in 1972, the Wisconsin Legislature decided that our state's share -\$53 million per year - should be earmarked for local school districts. As a result, school taxes are not as high in Wisconsin as they would be had revenue sharing not been enac-

Governor Lee Dreyfus' State Budget, now under consideration by the Legislature, assumes that state revenue sn. -ing will continue. If Congists ends it, however, the Governor

and the Legislature will have to decide how to make up for this loss of income. Three unpleasant alternatives exist: 1) cutting state and local programs; 2) raising state taxes; or 3) reducing school aids, thereby raising local school property taxes. It is unfair to end these funds now, as states like Wisconsin have already set their tax levels for the next year.

Opponents of state revenue sharing claim ending it will save us \$2.3 billion, but in fact this move does not reduce our \$532 billion federal budget or its \$28 billion deficit. Instead this \$2.3 billion will be used for those "Washington knows best" programs (many of which don't work) while our state and local programs and taxpayers suffer. I will work for reversing this illtimed and ill-conceived committee action to prevent local tax increases

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


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

County Board members from Washington and Waukesha counties me, jointly to discuss the engineers approach to the 10 month solid waste management program. Disposing of these daily tons of trash in the most economical and ecologically acceptable way is the objective of the Solid Waste Management Planning Program.

Alternatives for solid waste management will be evaluated including a study of possible landfill sites and investigation of the potential for recycling. The \$95,000 study is 50 percent state-funded and is scheduled for completion by February.

TAC personnel, acting as a liaison between the counties and the consulting firm, held several meetings during April as the project got underway. included in the initial discussions was the formation of a Public Involvement Program to keep local residents informed of planning activities. Residents will be informed through news releases, newsletters, and informational meetings.

The first of a series of in-

formational meetings is planned for late June. The counties solid waste disposal problems will be discussed. Comments from county residents are desired. Additional meetings will be required to receive input from the people of Washington and Waukesha counties to develop and evaluate solutions to the problem and help the County Board implement a solution to the problem.

Smelt fishing in the southeastern counties has tapered off because of the cooler temperatures and the run is very likely about over. Walleyes are hitting on the Fox River in Kenosha County, and panfish fishing is good on most inland waters in the district.

In the southern and southwestern counties, there is good crappie action on the Rock River in Rock County. White bass are running in the Crawfish River. Lake Monona and the Yahara River are yielding crappies in the Madison area. There should be good muskie and bass action at Yellowstone. Walleyes and smallmouth bass are biting in the Wisconsin River in Iowa County.

For those of you who are planning on combining fishing and camping, a reminder that camping facilities are now open at all state parks and forests except for Rocky Arbor and Roche-A-Cri state parks.

Some rainbow trout are being taken in the Sheboygan River and tributaries in Sheboygan County and the Root River in Racine County. Rainbows and browns are also being taken at warm water discharges on the Lake Michigan Shoreline. Spawn sacks are the best bait.

Crappie fishing continues generally good on inland waters throughout the District with some good catches being made on Gilbert Lake in Washington County, Pewaukee Lake in Waukesha County and the channels of Lakes Elizabeth and Marie in Kenosha County.
