



## Virginia Fellenz **Graduates From** Pharmacy School

The University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Pharmacy graduated 176 pharmacy students in commencement ceremonies on Sunday afternoon, May 27, at Camp Randall Stadium on the UW campus.

The degrees included 172 Bachelor of Science in pharm-acy, one Master of Science in pharmacy and three Doctor of Philosopy.

The undergraduate pharmacy curriculum consists of two years of pre-pharmacy college course work followed by three years of professional pharmacy education. Students must apply and be accepted into the pharmacy program. The master's degree program takes two to three years to complete. The doctorate program runs four to six years with a required dissertation.

The UW School of Pharmacy was established in 1883 with a student body numbering 28. Currently, over 500 bachelor of science students are enrolled in the School of Pharmacy. Over 75 students are enrolled in the M.S. and Ph.D. programs.







#### The Panama Canal - in the News Again

One of the thorniest issues of the last session of Congress was the Senate's ratification of the treaties negotiated by the U.S. with Panama. Those provided for the phased withdrawal of American personnel in and authority over the Panama Canal, a vital world trade link between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

Soon the House of Representatives will debate the legislation needed to fully implement those treaties. However, it appears that even though the treaties themselves cannot be rescinded now that they have been ratified, the implementing measure may face an uphill fight with an uncertain outcome. The first test on the bill was the vote to schedule it for debate, which barely passed on a 200-198 vote.

The basic controversy focus s on the issue of compensation by the U.S. to Panama from now until 1999, when Panama takes complete control of the canal. The measure we will consider provides an estimated \$50-75 million per year to Panama, from tolls collected from ships using the canal. It also commits the U.S. to spend an estimated \$4 billion in the next twenty years to compensate for lost property and other transitional costs.

Frankly, I believe giving the Panama Canal away was a serious mistake for U.S. foreign policy and national defense in the future. Those treaties cannot be undone, but I don't believe we should compound the error by committing the U.S. to shelling out \$4 billion in taxpayer dollars on top of it. Nor

is there any sense in handing over \$50 million or more a year in canal revenues just to perpetuate the military dictatorship in Panama. I think the pending treaty-implementing legislation should be killed, and a new approach that doesn't punish the American taxpayer should be sought instead.







An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a ballot, but the official shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At the special primary, the elector shall select the party ballot of his or her choice, and make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidate's name for whom the elector intends to vote or insert or write in the name of the elector's choice for a party candidate, if any. The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by 2 ballot clerks or is defective in any other way the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his or her name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist in marking the ballot. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.
