## New Park Dedicated Saturday

Built at a cost of about \$483,000, the park includes a 1.4 acre swimming pond, bathhouse with showers or restrooms, tennis courts, two baseball diamonds, basketball and volleyball courts, playground equipment, wildlife trail and parking for 200 cars.

A crowd of around 150-200 adults and children gathered around picnic tables for the dedication ceremony of the new Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park on Saturday morning, June 16. For the official opening, a green ribbon across the walkway leading to the new bath house was simultaneously snipped by two shears held by past and present Village Presidents, Charles Miller and Bob Danielsen. Several speakers greatly praised the efforts of various individuals and organizations throughout the entire community.

In the Invocation, Reverend Darrell Joiner spoke of the new opportunity to exercise our bodies and enjoy nature. Dan-

nielsen hoped the park would have many years of use and pointed out that the Kiwanis Club had gotten the ball rolling and that the rest of the community contributed greatly.

Park Committee Chairman, Dan Schmidt, gave a brief history of the park from its inception in 1973 through the DNR recommendations to its present state with a swimming pond and numerous athletic facilities. It was announced that the park would cost a grand total of \$483,000. Schmidt also thanked the village employees and the various construction firms involved for their efforts.

Charles Miller was pleased to see the park completed and praised the hard work of the Department of Public Works. Miller added that the park is "here for people to enjoy" and hoped "everyone will take advantage of the facilities that are

here to their fullest."

The crowd was then asked to turn to the north where a flag was raised by the Legionnaires on a pole donated by the Edwin Fickler family in memory of their two sons. It was a stirring scene as the red, white, and blue ascended against the green foliage, hazy blue atmosphere, and the brown, gray, blue, and white roofs of Kewaskum. Deb Schlice's trumpet rendition of the "Star Spangled Banner" cut through the heavy June air. The program concluded with the ribbon cutting.

On the lighter side, Charles Miller was presented with a "trophy" declaring that "no job is finished until the paper work is done." The special events to initiate the basketball court and the tennis and volleyball courts then got underway. This 3-ring circus was rather hard to follow and a blow by blow account will not be forthcoming however, here are a few observations.

In reference to the free-throw contest between the Lions and the Kiwanis, Howard Zemlicka's underhanded shots yielded no baskets. The orange sphere was mysteriously attracted to a point just behind the rim before plummeting to the surfaced court below. Karl Fee may call a few shots at the bank, but here he failed to make a single "deposit." A huddle and a cheer at one point did seem to pay off for the Kiwanis. The final score was Kiwanis 6 and Lions 4 (out of 20 shots!).

The tennis match between the Junior Woman's Club and the Jaycees turned into a mismatch. Any male chauvinists

## Son-in-Law of Local Couple Found Slain

The bound body of a mailman was discovered June 7 on the floor of his home in the North Park neighborhood of San Diego California, where he lived and delivered mail for several years.

Homicide investigators said police found Robert Okrasa, 45, about 8:40 a.m. in the living room of 1990 Boundary Street after a supervisor became concerned at his failure to show up for work. Okrasa's wife is the former Shirley Keller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Keller, Sr. of 323 Second Street, Kewaskum.

Police said Okrasa's hands and feet were tied and he had a severe wound on the back of his head.

Homicide Lt. John Gregory said there were no immediate signs that the house had been ransacked, but a rear window had been smashed. He said Okrasa had apparently been dead about 10 hours.

Neighbors told police that Okrasa's wife, Shirley, was vacationing in Boston, and his two

children were also away from home. His daughter Pamela (Penney) was believed to be working in Chula Vista and his son, Steven, is in the Army and is stationed in Alabama.

Police said the family's little dog was found in the house unharmed. A next-door neighbor said Okrasa's white van was missing.

Gregory said Okrasa, a retired Marine and a Boy Scout leader, was known to have been punctual at his job. So when he didn't show up for work a supervisor from his office came to the house to check on him. He found a window in the rear family room broken. He looked inside and then called police, who went inside and found the body. Another neighbor described Okrasa as a "pretty stout fellow, in pretty good condition."

"The police tell us he was bound and that someone probably broke into the house," the neighbor said. "I think there

## Delay Pond Opening to June 30; Apollo's Lyre Gets License

A spirit of mutual cooperation was evident at Monday night's Kewaskum Village Board meeting, as a group of citizens and the owner of "Apollo's Lyre" each made some concessions to ensure neighborhood tranquility and the right to do business. The board also adopted a recreational vehicle ordinance for the village and rules for the new and old parks. It was also announced that the new pond would not be open most likely until June 30.

A group of east side residents presented a formal statement in regard to "problems created by the management and patrons of Apollo's Lyre Tavern, 1310 Riverview Drive." The written statement cited: 1) excessive and intolerable music levels that interfered with sleep and day to day functions as conversation; 2) actions of patrons, specifically verbal and physical fighting and the use of foul and obscene language; 3) damage to private property through littering and urinating, etc.; 4) parking problems created by cars in the driveways and on the sidewalks; 5) additional noise from cars, trucks and motorcycles, mostly after late dances.

The group wanted "Apollo's Lyre" to ensure the following: 1) keeping doors and windows closed to contain noise; 2) controlling music and noise at 50 decibels or below; 3) ceasing dances at midnight on any day of the week; 4) not allowing patrons to congregate on the porch of the tavern, sidewalks, or adjacent private properties; 5) dispersing patrons in a speedier fashion at closing time.

There were also numerous verbal comments from the group. Hattie Weddig complained of foul language by one patron - "...we heard their whole history of their life in all 4-letter words." Carl Spoeth questioned the zoning aspect of

such a business, saying, "I just feel that its not the place for that type of business." Mrs. Byron Eichstedt added how the tavern's disturbances interfere with working people who must get up at early hours and find adequate sleep unlikely due to noise.

Ralph Scott, the owner, was present and claimed that they were trying to run a respectable place and endorsed a nonviolent policy. He said that bouncers were no longer present and that they were not needed. Police Chief remarked about Scott, "he's been in business for less than three weeks and we've found him more than cooperative with us." Scott repeatedly mentioned his willingness to cooperate - "...we're willing to cooperate and try to do anything to keep everybody happy. We'll cooperate with the people in any way we can."

The outcome of the discussion was that "Apollo's Lyre" would contain its noise by shutting doors and windows and would lower the noise by using a decibel meter. It was further agreed that dances would end at midnight on Sundays and Scott would hire an additional officer to assist with crowd dispersal at a total cost of \$44. Apollo's Lyre's tavern license that had been tabled was then approved pending payment of fees while keeping in mind the spirit of cooperation.

A recreational vehicle ordinance was passed that would make it unlawful to drive or operate such vehicles as minibikes on private or public properties or roads without written permission of abutting property owners and the owners of 75% of the land within 200 feet of the land driven upon.

There was some discussion as to whether snowmobiles were included in the ordinance or should be likewise regulated. The village already has a snowmobile ordinance that prohibits operation on private lands but provides for access (mostly through the old park) to snowmobile trails. The board in general objected to allowing youngsters to "tear around" and making excessive noise on

snowmobiles. Adult drivers, usually in a snowmobile club, presented no problem. It was agreed that the present ordinance would be examined by the village attorney, local snowmobile clubs, and the village board before another ordinance was introduced.

The new park rules and regulations were adopted. The proposed rules were published last week and are essentially the same. An additional set of rules for old and new park reservations was presented. Major items are: appropriate drivers must be used to unload picnic supplies, and for building usage, the Commissioner or Superintendent of Public Works must be contacted; any damage costs or additional clean-up fees will be charged to those causing damage; there are no reservation fees for general usage but a kitchen reservation deposit of \$25.00 is required with a \$10.00 refund if all is properly cleaned after use; future reservations may be refused if rules are not obeyed; and reservations are on a first come, first served basis.

Park Committee Chairman Dan Schmidt was given a round of applause for his contribution to the new park development and the dedication ceremony. Schmidt also announced that the pond opening would be delayed, most likely to June 30, because necessary equipment as buoys, ropes, and posts had not come in. A telephone also needs to be installed. A pay phone was deemed appropriate for the use of patrons. The patches that are required to indicate a season swim pass will go on sale at the Municipal Building, 204 First Street, Kewaskum, on Monday, June 25.

\* Although not mentioned at the board meeting, registration for swim lessons is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, June 30, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the new bath house. Lessons are free only with a season pass. More on this will appear next week.

There was some discussion as to why the sewage treatment plant has taken on a more pungent odor lately. Supt. of Wastewater Treatment Peter Albers explained that a local industry has been depositing 166 parts per million more of lead than is allowed. This kills some of the bacteria needed for effective sewage treatment. Albers said he had approached the industry's chief engineer and couldn't personally do any more about the situation until the industry is required to refrain from depositing the lead containing substance. Tuesday's reading may determine further action.

Superintendent of Public Works Augie Bilgo made a suggestion that property owners notify him or Building Inspector Hank Becker several days before putting in any asphalt or concrete driveways. Bilgo cited several instances where water system "stop boxes" had been covered by driveways. Village President Bob Danielsen remarked that it would be a good idea to inform residents of the requirements for a building permit.

The problem of proper payment for water and sewer on Werner Drive was discussed. Tom Grasse was present to

question the charges and some adjustments made to the bills that were received. Danielsen stated the adjustment was due to a clerical error which confused the costs of water and sewer. He further reaffirmed the practice of paying for improvements on a frontage basis, but stated that as much consideration for an equitable means of assessment would be given property owners.

The board also resolved that Valley Bank of Kewaskum would be the public depository for all monies received by the village. It was further resolved that Danielsen and Village Commissioner Bill Martin be authorized to sign checks drawn upon the Village of Kewaskum. This authorization apparently had been officially granted last in 1948, and it was deemed appropriate to update this provision.

It was announced that a request to block off Main Street from Highway 45 to the railroad for "Krazy Daze" was denied by the state. In response to a letter from the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad consenting to repair the three village crossings some time in 1979, Danielsen reported a one-word letter may be sent, "When?"

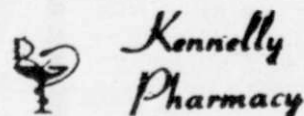

The pond will be open for swimming on Saturday, June 30, and swimming lessons are scheduled to start Monday, July 2.

Rules and regulations for the new pond will be published in next week's paper.

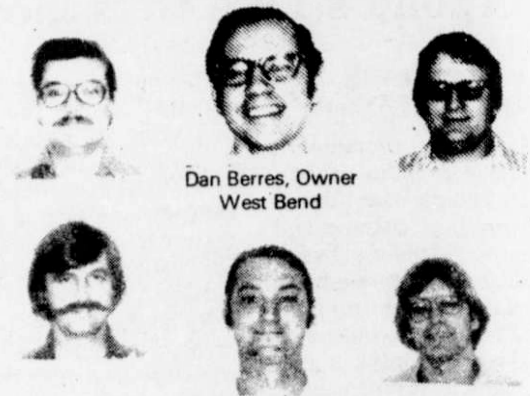
Dr. Rumsey completed the required four academic years professional training to qualify for his degree. Palmer College is the first and world's largest chiropractic college.

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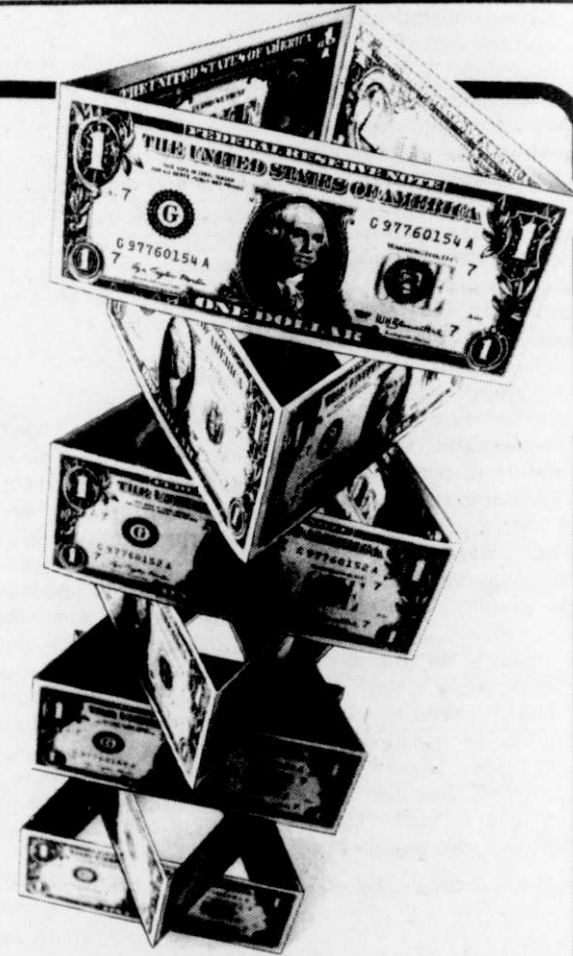

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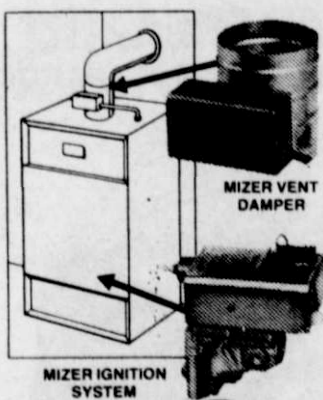

will not be consoled by the fact that the team of Shirley Perkins and Joyce Malichar trounced Gary Panzer and Ted Miller who were only standing in for two other Jaycees. Although the ladies won two out of three games, no details could be gotten except that the guys were good sports. As the girls' trophy said, "no amount of planning will ever replace dumb luck."

Blinding speed and flashes of brilliance characterized the volleyball game between the Village Board Employees and the Kewaskum Fire Department. Raynor Herriges and Bill Martin had their team whipped into a frenzy and the fire department was equally fired up. The average number of volleys in a series was about 2.5, but at one point a tremendous flurry of about 10 volleys did occur, with a dramatic save by Chief Hlavaty even though Dan Schmidt finally let the ball drop in order to put it out of its misery. would have had to be two people to do that to him because of the shape he was in. He and his wife were a pretty nice, quiet couple. We only knew them casually, and that he delivered mail in the neighborhood. They've lived in the neighborhood about 15 years."

"It looks like someone might have broken in sometime after midnight," the neighbor's wife said. "I'd hope it was after midnight because we were sitting here (in a room with a view of Okrasa's house) up until midnight, and we didn't hear a thing except some dog barking and something that sounded like a van door closing."

Several residents said the area has been hit with a rash of burglaries recently and they had formed a neighborhood watch group.

Funeral services for Okrasa were held at 10 a.m. Thursday, June 14, in Merkley-Mitchell Mortuary, with private entombment following. He was given a full military funeral.

A native of Escanaba, Michigan, Okrasa had been with the Postal Department 10 years. He was a retired Marine Corps master sergeant with 21 years of service. He was a scoutmaster for San Diego Boy Scout Troop 18 and was a member of the Disabled Veterans Association.

Surviving are his wife, Shirley; a daughter, Pamela Ann, and a son, Steven T. of San Diego; his parents and a sister.

It was the 53rd slaying reported in San Diego this year.

## Dairyland Seed Expands Research Efforts

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### Three Area Priests in Strife-Torn Nicaragua

Revs. Isidor Herriges of rural Kewaskum, Alfredo Gundrum of Allenton and Bernard Wagner of West Bend are three priests from Washington County who live in the strife-torn country of Nicaragua where Sandinista rebels are staging a new attempt to overthrow the Somoza government. The missionary priests plan to remain in Nicaragua unless they are forced out.

Rev. Herriges, the son of Anton Herriges and the late Mrs. Herriges of St. Michaels, was last heard from about two weeks ago by family members. Herriges lives in Bluefields, Nicaragua, and works at Puerto Cabezas, a village that is about as far away from the embattled capital city of Managua, as Kewaskum is from La Crosse, a distance of about 250-300 miles. The priest builds schools, churches and homes and sculpts statues.

Herriges hopes to come home for about a three month vacation at the end of this summer, according to relatives. He has lived in the country for fifteen years and is always anxious to return.

After a vacation two years ago, Rev. Herriges expressed concern that he would not get back in but the situation wasn't as bad then as it is now.

Rev. Gundrum, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Gundrum of Allenton, lives near the Honduras border in the village of

Jalapa. His duties include visiting the ill and elderly in rural areas, teaching skills to farmers, working with the youth as well as doing his church duties. Gundrum was last home in January and couldn't wait until he got back.

Rev. Wagner has also lived in Nicaragua about 15 years and lives in El Jicaro, a village about twenty minutes from the Honduras border.



**Congressmen's Pay High Enough**

Last week the House of Representatives wisely killed a measure that would have given Members of Congress a pay raise of \$3,162 a year, on a 232-186 vote. That 5.5% hike would have raised their salary to \$60,662 a year.

I strongly opposed that pay increase because it would have been grossly inflationary. At a time when the American people are forced to tighten their belts because of the inflation Congress itself too often promotes, it would have been an outrage for the Members of the House to vote themselves such an unjustified raise. It deserved a quick death, and it got it.

The current \$57,500 annual salary for Congressmen is quite enough. I believe it should be frozen at that level, along with the salaries of all high-ranking federal government officials.

The proposed raise would have taken nearly \$1.7 million more each year out of the pockets of the taxpayers. The mood of the country clearly demands that Congress fight inflation by reducing government spending and enacting a balanced federal budget. By voting to line their own pockets at taxpayer expense, 186 Congressmen last week took a "public-be-damned" attitude. No wonder Congress is so unpopular.

The only way Congress will ever learn how to manage the

people's tax dollars more wisely and responsibly is for the Members themselves to be forced to make do with what they have, just like the working man and woman has to.

Indeed, I think the \$57,500 salary is very adequate. I am hopeful that the next version of this legislative appropriations bill freezes it at that level indefinitely. Congress should set a good example for itself and the public on living within its means.

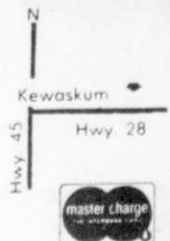

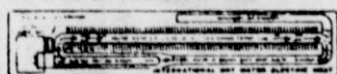
