Dan Schmidt Resigns From Village Board

In a special Kewaskum Village Board meeting on Thursday evening, July 5, the board accepted the resignation of Trustee Daniel S. Schmidt. The board also approved the sale of the old coil filter at the sewage treatment plant to a "hot prospect.'

After the Monday, July 2, board meeting, Dan Schmidt informed Village President Bob Danielsen that his resignation was effective immediately. Although Schmidt resigned "With a great deal of regret," he stated in a letter that "My resignation is due to my community interest and in trying to serve the community in a more useful manner.'

Danielsen then told the board at the special meeting that "I'm sure we all feel disappointed about his resignation and evidently he feels he's doing what he wishes to do." Danielsen also said that a replacement would be appointed and subject to the board's approval at another special meeting on Tuesday, July 10. One other applicant was interested in the trusteeship when Schmidt was appointed on May 2, 1979, and is now a prime candidate. Whoever is appointed would serve until the April 1980 election. This would fill the post originally vacated by Danielsen when he became Village President.

Schmidt has been on the Village Board for nearly seven years and was presently Park Committee Chairman and responsible for much of the development of the new park and swimming pond. He had served on all committees at one time or another, acting as Chairman of the Finance Committee for two years. The Library Board and the Village Plan Commission also benefited from his services for about two years each.

The coil filter sludge conditioner which has been at the sewage treatment plant since 1954 may be sold to an unnamed party who is very interested in it. The board recently heard specifications on a new sludge conditioner which acts to press out excess water instead of vacuuming it up like the old one. The machine was maintained well, has a control panel and several starters to go with it, and is ready to go. The possible purchaser would pay for the moving which would not be too difficult with a crane and a truck. The board gave Supt. of Wastewater Treatment Peter Albers authorization to negotiate a price above a certain minimum, as the opportunity to sell it may not arise again.

It is hard to say goodbye to AFS students that have lived in our community for a year and it wasn't easy for Jorge Cazal and Edgardo Carranza to leave their families who shared their lives and cultural backgrounds.

Mrs. L. N. Peterson, Ke-waskum AFS student/family laison, tells the students when they return to their country to give their parents a chance and not to talk about their year too much at first. Their parents, after all, are primarily glad to have their children back. They are not going to be excited to hear. "My American mother did this or let me do that." In some countries, of course, difficulties in adjustment are economic. You cannot expose these students to two-car garages and dishwashers and not have their ideas about what is a necessity change. Mrs. Peterson pointed out that the lack of these luxuries does not mean that their countries are unimportant. When readjustment is achieved it tends to be complete.

These students see that we're human, we're real, not like the movie images they've seen of rich Americans. They see the good and bad after living here for the year and have a greater understanding why sometimes there can be a bad.

After about two or three months most students have readjusted to the pattern of life in their own countries. That is about the same length of time it takes them to get used to the United States.

The accident occurred on N. Wauwatosa Road, about two blocks north of W. Donges Bay Road at 4:40 p.m. Saturday.

Authorities said the girl was a passenger in the back seat of a car driven by Minerva Reifschlanger, 75, a resident of Tudor Oaks North Retirement Community, 9301 N. 76th St.

Mrs. Reifschlanger was driving the girl and her grandmother, Ruth Grasse, 68, who also lived at Tudor Oaks, to a Saturday afternoon church service, according the the girl's father.

The Reifschlanger auto was northbound on Wauwatosa Rd., police said. As another northbound car passed her auto, Mrs. Reifschlanger lost control of her car, which veered onto the shoulder of the road, then crossed the center line and collided head on with a southbound car driven by Mrs. Miler's husband, Richard, 55.

Spoeth Named Trustee

In a special meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board on Tuesday night, July 10, Carl R. Spoeth of 1189 Riverview Drive was appointed to fill the board post vacated by Dan Schmidt.

In his recommendation of Spoeth, President Danielsen noted that only two people had indicated interest in the trusteeship. Spoeth was chosen, since he was the only one who had written a letter of application, and he resides on the east giving more equalized representation throughout the village. Danielsen further recommended him, saying "He's interested and I think he'd do a very good job." Spoeth would replace Schmidt as Chairman of the Park Committee. He will also be on the Protection and Public Safety Committee and the Finance Committee. Paul Blumer would take over for Schmidt on the Public Works Committee.

Spoeth, age 34, is presently employed as a Product Engineer at the West Bend Company and was a former owner of the "Village Store." He commented that he believes government starts out with people, and since Kewaskum was an "outstanding place to live," he wished to work for the community to keep it the way it is. Spoeth is an active member of the Kewaskum Lions Club and also belongs to the National Management Association at the West Bend Company. Prior to moving to Kewaskum, he was an officer in the U.S. Navy, stationed at Barber's Point,

Bassma I. Marji from Amman, VFW Convention Jordan, will be living with the Marvin Kleinke family at 1532 Stark Street, Kewaskum. Bassma is 17 and has four brothers. Her father, Izzat Marji, is office manager for an American company "Near East Foundation Company." Her mother, Nahil, teaches at De La Salle College in Amman. Bassma has had eleven years of English and twelve years of French. Her native language is Arabic. She is interested in arts (painting), basketball, music, reading and gardening.

Amman, the capital of Jordan, has a population of almost 1,200,000. It is an Arab kingdom in the Middle East area of southwest Asia. Jordan is a little larger than Indiana, but has less then one-third as many people as that state.

Education is free in Jordan. The law requires all children to attend elementary school. Jordan has some high schools and several schools are operated by Protestant, Roman Catholic and Greek Orthodox groups.

Textbooks are distributed to students free of charge, except in private schools. Higher secondary education is provided by secondary general schools or secondary vocational schools. The latter include agricultural, commercial and industrial schools. Students of both types of secondary schools sit for the Public Secondary Education examination - those who pass are entitled to pursue their education in institutes of higher learning, both in Jordan and abroad.

Mirjam Sibbel from Zaandam, in the Netherlands, will be living with the James Dieringer family in Fillmore. Mirjam is 18 and has two brothers and two sisters. Her father "Jan" is director for a large company. Her mother "Wil" is an employee of the company her father works for. Mirjam has had six years of English, six years of Dutch, six years of French and five years of German. She likes team sports, popular music and reading.

Zaandam is a modern city a few miles north of Amsterdam. They have several industries.

Netherlands requires all children between their sixth and fourteenth birthdays to attend school. The government supervises and gives aid to both public and private schools. Children who finish elementary school may continue in industrial schools, or in several types of high schools. Their courses are similar to those given in high schools and colleges in the United States. A high school graduate in the Netherlands may continue his education in a University. Dutch universities are graduate schools only.

When the girls arrive the latter part of August, let us all give them a warm welcome to their new community for the 1979-80 school year.

Danielsen again stated that this position would more than pay for itself through the possible grants received and increased effici-

In other action, the board authorized the signing of a contract for the sale of the coil filter at the sewage treatment plant. Mrs. Mark Kral was present to find out what was to be done about the disturbances by high schoolers in the alley behind the Lutheran Church.

Danielsen assured her that a meeting would occur in late July between Supt. of Schools Floyd Brenholt, High School Principal Clark Pearson, Police Chief Don Hlavaty, and himself to find a solution to the problem instead of merely transferring it to adjacent streets. In addition to posting "No Loitering" signs in the alley, the tentative possibility of keeping students on campus at noon may be discussed.

The board authorized Ken Leitheiser to install an astro-turf type carpet on the raft at the pond. The cost would be \$52.00 at \$3.99 a yard with free installation by Saturday, July 14. The board also agreed to buy 138 baskets for clothes checking from the school at their asking price of \$3.00 each after bargaining in good faith.

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


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Regal President Responds To Problem at Sewage Plant

The highlight of the Village of Kewaskum Board meeting of July 2 was a response by the President of Regal Ware to the problem created by an excess of lead discharged to the sewage treatment plant. The board also heard the specifications for a sewage sludge conditioning device and made the final decision on sewer and water charges for Werner Drive. Three part-time police officers were also hired. A complaint about rowdyism at the softball diamonds was also heard.

James Reigle, President of Regal Ware, Inc. began the meeting with a clarification of the relationship between the village and the local industry. He stated that he was embarassed to have to appear before the board, since there was a 34 year history of cooperation with, and contribution to the welfare of, the community, and now "...apparently we, Regal Ware are contributing to your problems, and this is not our way of doing business."

Reigle was referring to an inexplicable increase in the amount of lead, up to 166 parts per million, that had been monitored at the sewage treatment plant. Village standards say that no more than .1 part per million is acceptable. The matter had come up at the June 18 village board meeting and was followed by a front page article in the West Bend News which was obviously not received well by the aluminum ware company. Reigle claimed that the article made it seem as if the village and Regal Ware were at odds. He felt that this was definitely not the case and added. "I doubt very much that that article expressed the feelings of the members of the board." He further stated that he had"...no intentions whatsoever of allowing any third party to come between us.' Reigle pointed out that the village had been kind to the company and allowed for their expansion. He also mentioned how the company's employees have been on the school board and village board and been involved in church related activities

Reigle mentioned that the company had been using porcelain which does contain lead and other hard metals since 1967. For 12 years this had worked out well with no extreme excess of lead discharge. Reigle was at a loss to explain, the reason for the problem, saying, "All of a sudden, something has happened and frankly, we don't know exactly what it is." The amount of lead had

increased only slightly from 2.98 parts per million in 1975 to 3.56 parts per million in 1977 and then dropped to .49 parts per million in 1978 and recently

The village and the company have mutually been trying to locate the source of the problem. Reigle vowed that they would not quit until the situation was resolved. He noted that one possibility was that a settling tank may not have been properly maintained. Portions of it were being rebuilt and would be checked out by Swanson Environmental Inc. of Sheboygan. Reigle also mentioned that some processes may have a cumulative effect whereby lead may build up if apparatus is not maintained properly and then begin washing through, but this was a little difficult for him to accept as an explanation. He further suggested that the village was free to contact him directly in regard to any problems that may arise.

A report was mentioned by Reigle that claimed village sewage treatment standards were rather tight. Standards were compared between the Village of Kewaskum and the City of Manitowoc. Kewaskum allows .1 ppm of lead, Manitowoc allows 5 ppm; Kewaskum accepts only .05 ppm of cadmium while Manitowoc allows 5 ppm; Kewaskum permits only .1 ppm of chromium and Manitowoc accepts 25 ppm.

After Reigle spoke, Village of Kewaskum President Bob Danielsen spoke for the board and the village that the remarks would be received well and Kewaskum "...appreciates your being located in our community and the fine works you do for

Don Woller of Foth and Van Dyke of Green Bay, the village's consulting engineers, gave the board a copy of the specifications for a sewage sludge conditioning device to be installed at the sewage treatment plant. The device which has to be somewhat customized to meet space requirements and the village's needs, will act to thicken sludge by adding a polymer that draws off excess water. This method would save the village the cost of hauling more liquid sludge more often onto lands which may or may not be accessible.

Bids will be taken on the installation of this equipment. A bidding firm must look at the sketches and visit the site. If a bid is accepted by the board, Foth and Van Dyke must further see that the equipment will meet the specifications. Prior to any payment, the equipment must be rigidly tested, and if it

doesn't meet the standards it would be modified or removed at no extra cost to the village. With this arrangement, the board approved a motion to advertise for bids which would be opened on August 20.

Elton Liepert was present as one of the property owners on Werner Drive. He wanted to know what the village had decided as to corrected charges for sewer and water installation on that street. The bills had been revised so that on a corner lot, sewer was charged according to the full number of frontage feet instead of 1/2 the number of frontage feet on each side. Liepert would be paying about \$1400 more this way and did find it hard to accept. Board member Don Mlodzik and Commissioner Martin reaffirmed the village's position that frontage was the only way and the most equitable way to bill. A 27 foot portion owned by Wilmer Ramthun was not to be billed for sewer and water, because it would not benefit the property in any manner. Martin pointed out that this was statutory procedure

The costs for sewer and water extension on Werner Drive are \$15,166.77 for water at a rate of \$16.37 per foot, and \$15,631.30 for sewer at a rate of \$15.05 per foot. At these rates, Ken Erickson who had previously confronted the board about his large bill, would be paying \$3,373.22 for water and \$3,100.30 for sewer with his 206 frontage feet. Liepert, the owner of three lots, would be paying a total of \$12,025.78. These corrected bills are payable within one year with no interest or within four years or an installment plan with 8% interest. The board moved to send out

times with some success, but the basic problem remains the same. More patrolling by the police and an ordinance limiting such activities were suggested by Mrs. Schaefer. Police Chief Hlavaty noted that this was the first such complaint in 12 years and agreed to respond if the police were notified immediate-President Danielsen had additional comments that next year the problem would be totally eliminated, since softball will be played in the new park. He stated that ordinances against such disturbances were already in existence and assured Mrs. Schaefer that if she called immediately, direct action could be taken.

As part of his routine report to the board, Chief Hlavaty announced that three parttime officers had been hired by the Police Commission. Two additional officers had been suggested, but three were chosen since the cost would not be any more and the personnel would be available as needed. Jim Jansen of West Bend, Howard Schneider of West Bend, and Steve Hafeman of rural Kewaskum are the new officers. Mlodzik wished to know if the board could know more about them, but Danielsen denied this, since the hiring was strictly the function of the Police Commission.

A tavern license application of Robert J. Klein was approved. Klein has been leasing Timmer's Bayside Inn and will now be taking over the Wigwam from William Edwards who has sold the business. Edwards will continue to run the business until Krazy Daze with his operator's license. Klein will take over the tavern license as of July 1. There was no objection from the board or the police chief. A bartender's license was also approved for Earl William

Wienke of Route 2, Slinger. The board also approved the

dedication of a 410 foot long and 66 foot wide street to the north of the proposed south side shopping center. The developers would have to provide curb, gutter, sidewalking, and other street improvements with no direct involvement of the village.



In miscellaneous actions, Raynor Herriges, as Chairman of the Protection and Public Safety Committee, commented on the need to look at the problem of young children playing in the street near the entrance to the new park. Supt. of Public Works, Augie Bilgo, announced that the stop signs had arrived and would be installed along Clinton and Brooklane when the piping also arrives. Dan Schmidt, Chairman of the Park Committee, noted that a new pier for the pond may be constructed by Howard Zemlicka and that there are monies from the Modern Woodmen for purchasing a large clock for the beach. Danielsen received a letter from Phil Majerus Construction and Land Fill stating that rates for dumping rubbish at his Town of Byron site would be raised from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per cubic yard. At present, the board couldn't realize many alternatives to this. Danielsen also announced that only two applications for the position of Village Administrator had been received. On Tuesday, July 11, a closed session will determine if the applicants warrant the creation of the position.

It was a tight race, but Dan Schmidt beat out Raynor Herriges for the opportunity to move to adjourn at around 10:15. Personally, the 5-minute meetings are more to my taste.

The committee in charge wishes to thank everyone who helped make the affair an outstanding success.






Congress Cleans Up Its Act

A few days ago I was very proud to take part in an historic action in the House Committee on Standards of Official Conduct, on which I serve, when it recommended that Representative Charles C. Diggs, Jr. (D-Michigan) be censured by his colleagues and fined \$40,000 for misconduct in office. The implications of that action are far-reaching, and should prove to a cynical American public that Congress now means business when it disciplines wrongdoers among its ranks.

The Committee, otherwise known as the Ethics Committee, heard Mr. Diggs plead guilty to several charges of misusing tax dollars for his own personal gain. Earlier his attorneys had asked for dismissal of the charges filed against him by the Ethics Committee, but the Committee rejected that and persisted in its scrutiny of Mr. Diggs' financial affairs during the 1975-77 period. In the end, Mr. Diggs chose to plead guilty and face the music.

Until now, Congress has been very reluctant to punish any of its members for unethical conduct in office if he or she was re-elected after public disclosure of his or her misconduct. The feeling was that re-election

by constituents having the full knowledge of such acts meant forgiveness.

In my opinion, that attitude was wrong. The Ethics Committee's action marks the official end of that practice.

If the full House accepts the Committee's recommendation, it will be only the second time this century that a Member of House has been censured by his colleagues, and the first time ever that a Member has been ordered to pay restitution. While I personally believe those convicted of felonies, as Mr. Diggs has, should be expelled from office, I am satisfied that the unprecedented action of the Ethics Committee demonstrates that Congress intends to fully punish its members who abuse the public trust.




