Dan Schmidt Named Village Administrator

After an ordinance was approved creating the position of Village Administrator at the Monday, July 16, Kewaskum Village Board meeting, Daniel S. Schmidt of 1314 Stark Street was selected for the job. Schmidt had recently resigned from his position on the board in order to apply for the position without conflict of interests. Of 10 applicants, three were interviewed prior to Monday night's meeting.

The job of Village Administrator has two basic aspects. The first is to provide assistance to the Village Clerk and Treasurer Bill Martin and his secretary who are bogged down in paper work. The second aspect would be to research state grants-in-aid for future village projects. The administrator may also do some rudimentary field work as using a transit and tape to "map" sanitary and storm

Lively Discussion of Math Survey Held by School Board

In a hot, smoky, and lengthy meeting of the Kewaskum School Board on Monday, July 16, a lively discussion of a math survey and the health and physical education curriculum led to no direct action. The budget was not cut further or amended. The possibility of bidding on insurance was put off and the present insurance arrangement was retained for a year.

The question of whether math at the elementary level should be scheduled at the same time for all students divided the board. Math had its own time slot for the last semester and a survey was taken to see if this should be continued. The teachers responded that pupils have benefited from the grouping according to ability and that their teaching had benefited also. The survey showed that it was generally uncertain if the pupils remarks or the parents remarks revealed that the scheduling was better. The majority of teachers felt that it was not necessary to schedule math at the same time and that the same type of approach would be effective if only the same grade or some grades had math at the same time. A little over half favored the continuance of the grouping concept.

Dennis Reha, Wayne Elementary Principal, was present to say that grouping had been done the first semester as well, where some children went into different classes for math. Kindergarten Teacher Connie Zemlicka noted that grouping had always been done without having the board dictate this policy. Elementary Music Teacher Robert Getter pointed out a major drawback to scheduling math at the same time was that specialists who were in a certain school all day ended up with wasted "dead time" during math and could not be used effectively. Other weaknesses that teachers listed were that it

was too "clock-conscious," materials couldn't be shared, teacher strengths couldn't be utilized, and low groups felt defeated. Positive comments were that there was less prep work, the pace was geared better to ability, and there was less frustration or boredom.

Jean Goeden and Jerry Secor felt that the teachers were saying that the time should not be uniform, while Charles Ogi and Richard Theusch wanted to see the concept continued for another year. Board President John Tessar wondered if one semester was enough time to evaluate this schedule and wanted "another shot" as it is.

Supt. of Schools Floyd Brenholt suggested a compromise whereby 1st, 2nd and 3rd grades might have math at one time and 4th, 5th and 6th at another time. It was agreed that all elementary principals should be present at a July 30 meeting (which was not cancelled) to compare notes further.

In regard to the health and physical education curriculum which was compiled last year, further action will be taken on July 30. The major questions concerned whether the board wished to specify exact times for phy ed or not and the possibility of an adaptive phy ed program. This would involve those children primarily in special education or those who were developmentally delayed. This would ultimately involve individualized programs to develop coordination and balance, etc. It was stated that Director of Special Education Richard Zarling said he was not in a position where he was expected to offer this beyond what was done by the regular phy ed teacher within their classes. Elementary phy ed teacher Mike Miller said that adaptive phy ed would probably involve a 1/2-time teacher who would have 1-4 students for 10-15 minutes. The trainable mentally retarded would require 1/2 hour total time

In the election to fill the seat vacated by the election of Republican Thomas Petri to Congress, Donald Hanaway of De Pere, the Republican candidate, received 7,941 votes and Hephner 7,901.

Certified letters and copies of the petition were sent to clerks in the six counties — Brown, Calumet, Fond du Lac, Outagamie, Sheboygan and Washington — and the recount was to begin at 9 a.m. Thursday.

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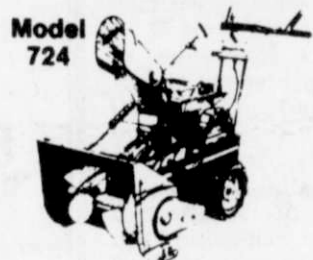
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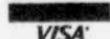

per day. Other elementary students would require 1 hour per day. With 1/2 of the educable mentally retarded class eligible for the class, the total time would be 3 hours per day at the elementary level for some 20-30 students. It was agreed that Zarling should appear on July 30 for more discussion of this.

In regard to the health curriculum, Tessar said he'd come back with some recommendations on the 30th. The biggest question here was on a proposed citizen's advisory committee. When areas that deal with values, particularly sex education were considered, Tessar thought it would be difficult to get a committee to serve. This group would review and screen materials to be used in such classes. Brenholt felt such a committee might be useful if a teacher thought something may be controversial and the committee would provide some backup for the implementation of such programs. With open meeting laws, the reviewing process would have to be public, and Ogi pointed out that with scrutiny from the press, serving on such a committee would be difficult.

The budget was not discussed further, however a fee of \$4.00 per semester was approved for the "Foods" class at the high school.

Employees Insurance of Wausau had written the district to see if Kewaskum was interested in presently its insurance bid on. Presently Gene Bohn of the Kettle Moraine Agency handles the school's insurance needs. Tessar felt that Bohn does a Tessa job and it's well worth the money. Brenholt felt it was good to stick with someone local. It was agreed that Bohn will be retained but may appear to explain bidding on insurance. Brenholt and Business Manager Bob Borch pointed out that if bids were taken, an expert on insurance would be required to evaluate and compare them. Borch presently felt inadequate to do this.

Bids on milk were opened. John Engelhardt and Sons Inc. were awarded the contract with a price of 10.9c per 1/2 pint of white milk and 11.9c per 1/2 pint chocolate milk.

A teacher resignation was accepted from Barbara Deters who was the librarian at the middle school. She wished to devote more time to her family. The board also accepted resignations from Elaine Vetter, a secretary-aid at Beechwood, Malinda Seifert, a cafeteria and library aide at KCHS, and Tom Jalas, who was only recently hired as custodial help at Wayne.

A teaching contract was approved for Perry Koth, who would be teaching Boy's Physical Education, coaching freshman basketball, and advising student government. Koth is a native of the Kewaskum and Beechwood area and attended the UW-La Crosse and UW-Oshkosh. Mrs. Nancy Norris is approved as the Title I teacher at Wayne. She would also take 1 hour per day of Mr. Reha's teaching time to allow him to perform principal duties.

A student from Bogota, Colombia, Adrienne Martenz, was granted permission to attend

KCHS next year. Students from other countries are granted resident status if living within the district and need not pay extra tuition. A total of 4 foreign students will be attending the high school.

In miscellaneous action, the board approved discarding all vouchers beyond 7 years old and to microfilm such retained records from 1972 to the present. The total cost would be \$180. Short-term borrowing in Valley Bank was approved. Last year, borrowing was not necessary, but this year it is, because taxes are coming in late. The implementation committee was disbanded as they did not care to have their meetings open as would be required. 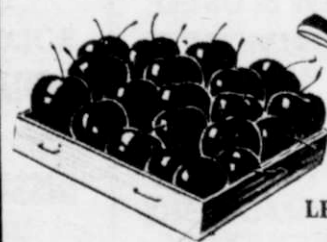

Twenty-five years ago this

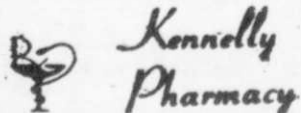

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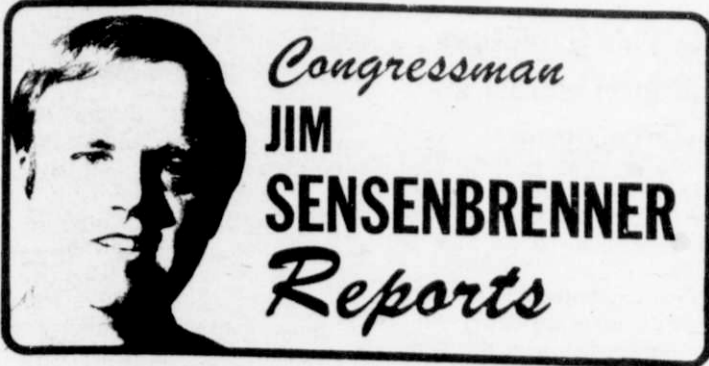

Trade Bill Will Help Ninth District

Last week the House overwhelmingly passed on a 395-7 vote the measure implementing the Multilateral Trade Negotiations (MTN) agreement the U.S. signed with 98 other nations a few months ago. I voted for it, because I believe that overall it will substantially help agriculture and business concerns in the U.S. and Wisconsin's Ninth District by expanding markets for their products overseas.

Four years of intense negotiations went into the agreement, the intent of which was to stimulate world trade by removing as many trade barriers — duties, tariffs, export subsidies, etc. — as possible. Such artificial barriers have hurt many U.S. businesses, such as the steelmakers who suffered when Japan dumped cheaper, Japanese government-subsidized steel into the U.S.

The whole premise of the trade talks was to promote each country's specializing in what it does best — like the Ninth District does in its production of pork, soybeans, beef, electrical equipment, and construction equipment. The idea is for each nation to trade those specialties for those of other nations in a freer, more competitive market.

I believed the MTN implementation measure to be of the utmost importance to U.S. business and agriculture, so before I decided how to vote on it, I sought the input of the Ninth District farmers and businessmen who would be affected one way or another by the measure.

With Wisconsin Farm Bureau President Don Haldeman's help, I met with Ninth District farmers at the Summit Town Hall. I also met with members of the Wisconsin District Export Council, to get their input as well. After reviewing the agreement, they convinced me that while it had some shortcomings, it generally will help the farmers and businessmen in our area. For example, our farmers will be able to sell more beef and soybeans to Japan and Europe, more pork to Canada, and more feedgrains to South America. Our businesses will benefit from more sales of heavy machinery, chemicals, paper, machine tools, and transportation equipment.

The early concern of some dairy farmers that the MTN would increase imports of foreign cheeses into the U.S. turned out to be without substance. The MTN sets a ceiling on foreign cheese imports of

125,000 metric tons per year, up from 93,000 in 1977. U.S. Department of Agriculture figures, however, show that the present annual level is 127,000 metric tons. So, the MTN will actually reduce these cheese imports and keep them from growing in the future. Unfortunately, by allowing the 34,000 ton per year increase since 1977, the Carter Administration has hurt Wisconsin dairy farmers. The MTN will prevent that injury from getting worse.

By expanding foreign markets for American-made products, we will help farmers and businessmen like those in the Ninth District. We will also help reduce the U.S. trade deficits that have added to inflation here in the U.S. and to our weakened dollar abroad. By strengthening our economy in this way, we should also be able to help reduce government spending deficits, too.

The MTN bill I supported last week will help accomplish these objectives by expanding those markets.

Sensenbrenner To Hold Town Hall Meeting

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner (R-Shorewood) Monday announced that he will hold a "town hall" meeting for residents of the West Bend area on Sunday, July 22, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. The forum will be held in the Addison Town Hall, which is located at 127 First Street in Allenton. All residents of West Bend, Kewaskum, Hartford, Slinger, and Allenton are invited to participate.

"This meeting is another part of my effort to respond to the needs and concerns of the Ninth District. It gives everyone a chance to speak out on what's bothering them and to find out how I feel about those same issues. The response to these meetings has been excellent, so

I will continue to hold them as long as I represent the Ninth District," Sensenbrenner pledged.

The first part of the meetings will be open for discussion of issues with Sensenbrenner. The second part of the session, the twenty-third Sensenbrenner has held around the district since January, will be open for anyone having a problem with a federal bureaucrat to meet personally with Sensenbrenner and his staff to seek a solution for it.

Sensenbrenner has invited all area state legislators to participate in the forum by responding to issues and problems related to state government and its operations.

Sowing a Prairie



The Cedar Lake Home Campus added a third acre of natural Wisconsin prairie. It was sown at the lakefront near the Living Sanctuary site.

About a half dozen people, recruited from the community volunteer Forest-Trails and Prairie Committee, helped sow the 98 varieties of prairie seed. Eventually there will be an authentic Wisconsin Prairie gracing the meadow at the lake with flowers blooming spring through fall. Some of the prairie grasses will grow to a height of twelve feet.

When completed, the Living Sanctuary, planted one year ago, will be at the center of the prairie. The Living Sanctuary is made up entirely of native trees and shrubs. Its growth will take several years to create the gothic cathedral effect and natural canopy over the seating area.

The administration at the 215 acre Cedar Lake Home Campus is deeply concerned with keeping the natural beauty of the lakefront and the surrounding countryside. The Forest, Trails and Prairie Committee helps the Home plan and utilize 90

acres of its woodland and prairie for residents, staff and community members both for today's use and for the future.

"Few youngsters of this generation have seen an actual Wisconsin prairie which was so common years ago when much of the state was covered with a wide variety of prairie plants," said one committee member.

The Forest-Prairie Committee will be dedicating the Living Sanctuary and Prairie on Sunday, August 19, at 6:30 p.m.

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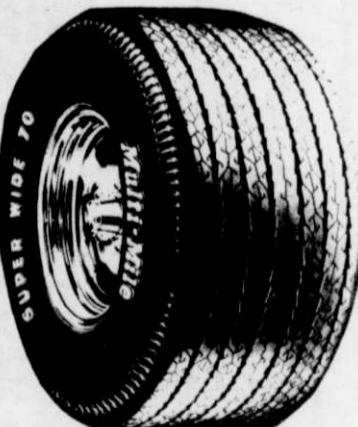
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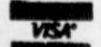


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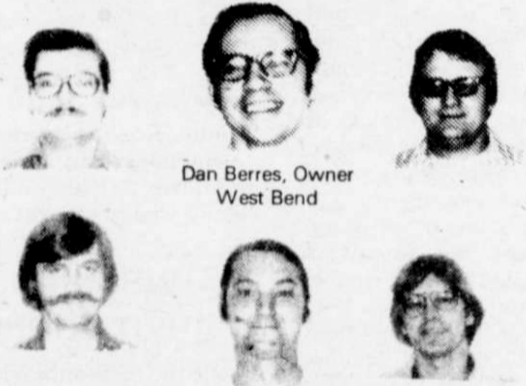

ORDINANCE NUMBER 79-4

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE THE POSITION OF VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 1.08 of the Code of the Village of Kewaskum is hereby created to read as follows:

1.08 VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR

- (1) CREATION OF POSITION. The position of Village Administrator of the Village of Kewaskum, is hereby created.
- (2) APPOINTMENT. The Village Administrator shall be appointed by the Village Board for a term of one year.
- (3) DUTIES. The Village Administrator shall assist the Village Commissioner, shall act as an administrative assistant to the Village President, and shall carry out such projects designated from time to time by the Village President or the Village Board.
- (4) FULL TIME POSITION-COMPENSATION. The position of Village Administrator shall be a full time position. The compensation therefore shall be set by the Village Board.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances contravening the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. If any part of parts of this ordinance are invalid, it shall not invalidate the entire ordinance.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on July 20, 1979.

Mailing Tips from Postmaster Beesten

Contacting your post office about holding or forwarding mail before leaving on vacation will turn out to be time well spent, Postmaster Frank Beesten reminded residents of Kewaskum.

"Letting mail or newspapers overflow a mailbox literally advertises that a house or apartment is empty and unguarded," Postmaster Beesten said, "and amounts to an open invitation to burglars."

The postmaster suggests that householders ask a friend or neighbor to empty their mailbox daily when they're going to be gone for a relatively short time, have the post office hold the mail as long as 30 days, or have it forwarded to a vacation address.

The postmaster also offered some other tips for vacationers: —Buy enough stamps or post cards and other correspondence before leaving on vacation.

—Remember to use the right amount of postage—ten cents for post cards and 15 cents for letters that weigh one ounce or less. For letters that weigh more than one ounce the additional postage is 13 cents an ounce.

—Make sure that you deposit mail where it is most frequently picked up; when possible, at post offices or in downtown, business district collection boxes.

—Take along an address book that includes Zip Codes of those you plan to correspond with.

Postmaster Beesten also says taking the time to write legibly will help immensely in getting cards and letters to their destinations more quickly.

Saturday night Goeden made another trip to Escanaba, Mich-

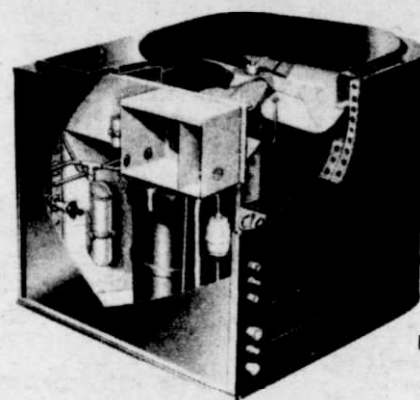
igan, and this time he had a little more luck. He was 1st in time, 3rd in the Australian Pursuit and 3rd in the feature.
