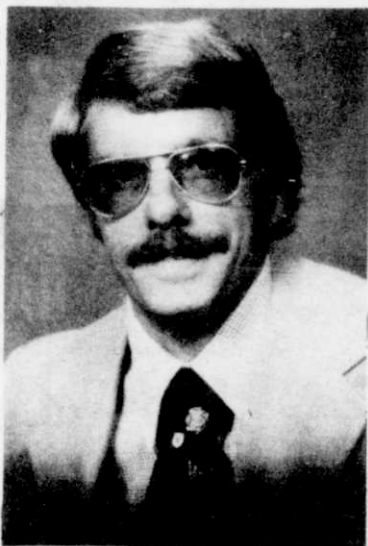

Curriculums Approved at Meeting of School Board

In a drawn out Kewaskum School Board meeting on Monday, August 27, the Health, Social Studies, and Language Arts Curriculums were approved in rather short order. There were several items discussed which were not on the agenda as a conflict between cheerleading and girls' golf, and a debate over a possibly attempted amendment on math scheduling several meetings ago.

The health curriculum as outlined by Mr. Wuebben, Mrs. Filzen, and Mike Miller was approved along with possible approval of the entire curriculum at a later date. The social studies curriculum sparked some discussion between the board and Norma Jean Serwe, a member of the former implementation committee, as to what a curriculum exactly should be. Several board members were uncertain and a dictionary was later brought out,

but the definition was not publicly read. Serwe claimed a curriculum should specify times allotted for teaching various minimum competencies in any subject. This is so the high school and middle school students will be similar in background when arriving from the various "feeder" schools. She wanted to know if some students weren't presently being short-changed in this matter. KEA President Bob Getter took exception to this and resented the supposed "implication" of improper teaching. Supt. Floyd Brenholt finally stated that any curriculum was a written program of study items for a year and "that's what we've got here." Shortly thereafter the social studies curriculum was approved.

George Allman presented the philosophy behind the Language Arts curriculum written by Mary Dahlmann, Don Potter, Linda Sydow, Denise Leone, Jan Rosenthal and Barbara York. He stated it was not

Local residents are eligible to receive blood anywhere in the United States. There is no charge, only the processing fee.

Donors in good health, from 18 to 65 years are generally eligible. You may donate at age 17 if your parent or guardian signs a consent form available at the drive. You may donate every 10 weeks or 15 times per year.

60th Anniversary

The family of Wilmer and Viola Prost, 303 Forest Avenue, Kewaskum, cordially invite all of their relatives and friends to an OPEN HOUSE in honor of their 60th Wedding Anniversary at the Peace Church Fellowship Hall in Kewaskum on Sunday, September 9, from two to four o'clock in the afternoon.

A plaque reading, "In recognition of 25 years of teaching excellence in the Kewaskum School System" was presented to Eugene LaMarche after the annual staff breakfast on August 23. Roy Esser, who represented the Board of Education, made the presentation and described LaMarche as a teacher who expected the best from his students and usually got it. He further described him as a very congenial person with high moral standards. Esser also quipped that "Gene" probably had the cleanest pipe in town.

LaMarche's professional history was recapped at the breakfast. He was raised in Stevens Point and later attended Central State Teacher's College, there majoring in Conservation and Biology with minors in History and Psychology. Prior to this, he was stationed in the South Pacific for three years as an army radio operator.

In 1954 Principal Clifford Rose hired LaMarche to teach history and biology. About three years later, he began teaching driver's education. Presently, he resides in Kewaskum and devotes most of his time to teaching.

The Kewaskum Education Association represented by Chester Czoschke, presented LaMarche with a gift of a director's chair. Czoschke added that it was a privilege to recognize "Gene" and that he appreciated working with him. Another comment here was about his verbatim story-telling ability in regard to army experiences.

At a later date, LaMarche indicated that his interests include fishing (for muskie), cross-country skiing and working on a private cabin. It had been rumored that he was an excellent saxophone player and indeed did have a high school dance band and another band in his army outfit, but he declared

he hadn't picked up the instrument in years.

LaMarche was asked if the youth had changed in 25 years. He stated that the innate intelligence of youth has not changed but that "young people today are a lot...freer," and that they are "better informed...due to communication." The most rewarding aspect of teaching for LaMarche was looking back and seeing that he had influenced a person in some manner and helped him or her to grow up.

As for changes in education, he stated that in biology, "descriptive" biology involving anatomy has now given way to an "ecological and biochemical" approach which stresses the relationships between aspects of the environment. He mentioned how his biology class had changed to an open-ended concept whereby conclusions reached during lab work were only springboards to other questions.

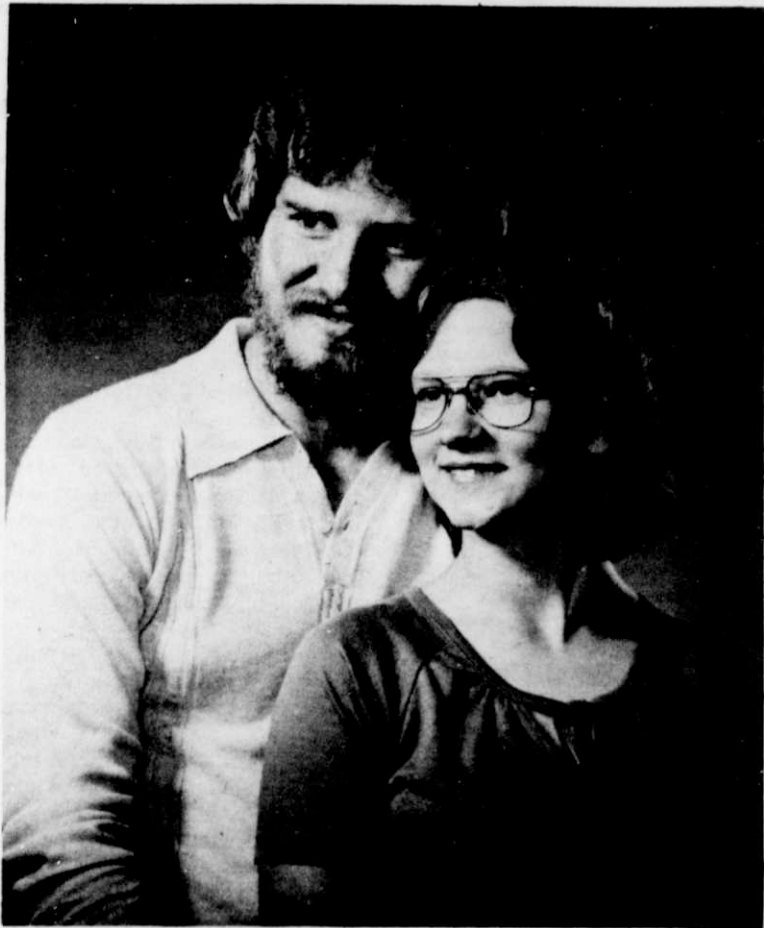
Jon Etta Has Grand Champion Carcass Hog at State Fair

Northern pike fishing has been picking up with some good catches reported from Pewaukee Lake in Waukesha County. Big Cedar Lake in Washington County, Lake Geneva in Walworth County and Eagle Lake in Racine County. Walleye fishing continues fair. They are being taken from Geneva and Delavan Lakes in Walworth County, Oconomowoc Lake in Waukesha County and Pike Lake in Washington County. Panfish fishing continues to be good on the Fox River in both Racine and Kenosha Counties. Panfish fishing is generally

good throughout the District with nice catches of perch reported from the Sheboygan Marsh in Sheboygan County and Pike Lake in Washington County. White bass are biting well in most district waters.

Lake Michigan fishing for trout and salmon was very good this week off McKinley Park in Milwaukee County. Most of the catch consisted of Chinook salmon with some browns, lakerson and rainbows taken. Bad weather last weekend kept boats off the lake off Racine County and success was poor to fair. Pressure was light off Kenosha County, but some good size Chinooks were taken offshore on J-plugs.

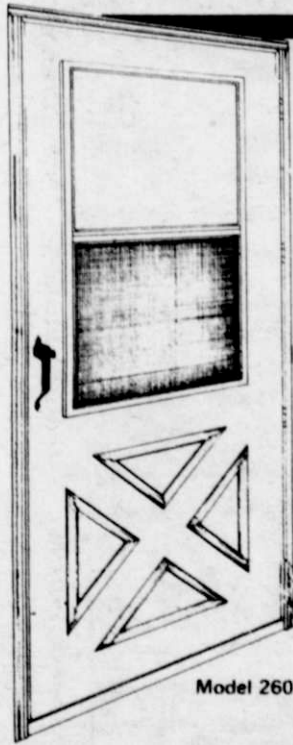

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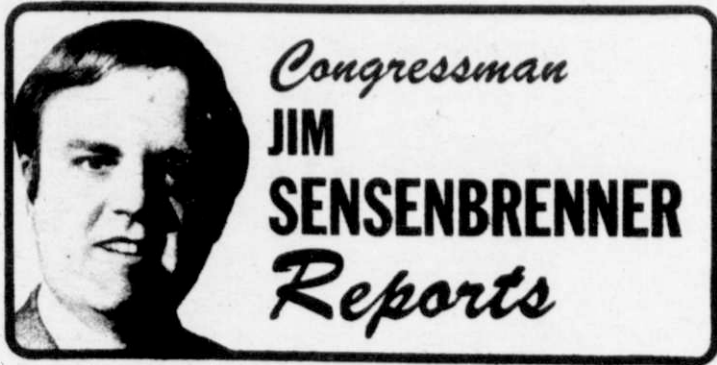

A Bushel for a Barrel? — A Second Look

Higher prices and tighter supplies of gasoline, fuel oil, diesel fuel, and other petroleum products have given birth to the idea of using our "food power" to retaliate. It's an appealing idea. Proponents say the U.S. could increase grain prices in the same way OPEC nations have boosted their oil prices. The goal: to persuade OPEC to reduce or at least freeze oil prices. Many of us feel helpless and frustrated as we try to deal with shortages and high prices. Using our abundance of resources in response seems a natural reaction to the problem.

The House Agriculture Committee has held hearings to determine the feasibility of such a scheme. Farm group officials said they would like to trade a bushel of their grain for a barrel of oil, but admitted that it probably would not work. Why?

First, OPEC nations have relatively small populations, with minimal demands for food as compared to our thirst for their oil. Their share of our wheat, corn, and soybean exports has not exceeded 17% of our supply since 1973. Second, the U.S. does not control the world's grain market in the same way and to the same extent that OPEC nations control the oil market. We have many competitors on the world market, unlike OPEC does. Were we to increase grain prices dramatically, as part of a "bushel for a barrel" plan, other food-exporting countries would likely step forward with ready supplies to sell at lower prices.

That being the case, some have suggested that the United States and the other major grain-exporting countries band together to form a food cartel similar to OPEC's oil cartel. But there is no evidence that Cana-

da and Australia, the other major world wheat producers, are inclined to do so, mostly because they are not as energy-dependent on OPEC as we are.

In short, "bushel for a barrel" is an appealing idea that our agricultural and diplomatic experts say will not work. They are especially afraid that such a plan would result in OPEC retaliation through even higher oil prices or another oil embargo, which would further devastate our economy. In addition, we cannot risk any major reduction in our farm exports, which totaled \$30 billion last year, for any reduction in them would add to our already huge trade deficit. The larger this deficit, the weaker our dollar becomes and the greater our inflation grows.

Thus, the answer to our energy shortages does not appear to lie in a "bushel for a barrel" confrontation with OPEC. Rather, it lies in a comprehensive national energy policy that will promote domestic production of oil and encourage development of alternative energy resources. With such an effort, we can end our dependence on other nations and gain greater control over our own future.

book-oriented but concept-oriented and stressed the skills that a student could master, recognize, or be introduced to at any of the grade school levels. For secondary levels, an overview of what the teacher should cover each year was included and was according to the syllabus that the North Central Accreditation Association has accepted. Board President John Tessar thanked Mr. Allman for his excellent presentation and the curriculum was passed.

The issue of whether an attempted amendment was ruled out of order in regard to math scheduling was tabled. After listening to tapes, board member Charles Ogi felt a possible amendment to schedule math uniformly for grades 1, 2 and 3 and uniformly for grades 4, 5 and 6 should be reconsidered. It was pointed out that school has already begun and any rescheduling is highly impractical. Brenholt mentioned that the whole procedure could be gone through again, but the results would not likely be any different - to have math scheduled at the discretion of each elementary school principal.

There was acceptance of the lunch policies and increased prices for the coming year. Weekly tickets would now be \$3.25 for elementary students and \$3.50 for middle and high school students. There was also public clarification of the self-sufficient nature of food services and that equipment in this area is purchased from lunch ticket income.

The policy on the sex education screening committee and the allowance for parents to sign their children out of the unit was approved. Tessar announced the citizen's advisory committee that would screen materials. The members are: Rev. Hoencke, Ed Christie, Cathy Tiemann, Mrs. Kough,

and Mrs. Jean Becker with Jean Goeden representing the school board.

Bob Schmidt was present to ask the board to reconsider allowing cheerleaders to partake in sports, and in particular, golf at this time. Presently, cheerleaders may not participate according to a school policy set by coaches and possibly a cheerleading committee. This is to prevent "conflicts" between any two activities. In golf this year, there would be no conflicts. A motion was introduced to allow cheerleaders to also compete in golf this year and was defeated by a 4-2 vote.

Seven recommendations were approved which allow for placement of those special education students who cannot be served by this district, in other programs in other districts as they become available. The law dictates that the district be responsible for and take the initiative for the suitable education of any handicapped children residing within the district.

There was approval of four requests by families to have their children begin school here although moving into the district later. They would be responsible for transportation and tuition if the date of moving is later than the end of the first quarter.

A teacher contract was approved for Linda Lohr who will be the Title I language and reading specialist at Farmington Elementary.

The number of kindergarteners in the district is increasing with over 30 in classes at Farmington and Wayne. The board decided that if this situation still existed next Tuesday, transportation of some kindergarteners to Kewaskum Elementary should be authorized rather than hire any additional aides.

In one of the more light-hearted moments of this meeting, Jean Goeden was seen transporting a large cake into the superintendent's office. The

Indians to Play Last Season in Scenic With New Coach, 15 Lettermen

Kewaskum will open its 1979 football season at 7:30 p.m. this Friday when it entertains Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference in a non-conference game. The Cougars have a strong nucleus of senior letter winners and some all-conference players back, and are picked as one of the favorites in the Flyway.

The Indians squad of 42 will have a new head coach in Mike Fifrick, a native of Kiel, where he participated in football, basketball, golf and baseball for the Raiders before graduating in 1969.

This will be Kewaskum's last year in the Scenic Moraine Conference, which will break up at the end of the 1979-80 school year. Kewaskum will join the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, which includes Kiel among its members. Fifrick admits he is looking forward to getting back to that conference.

Fifrick confesses he's pretty much in the dark as far as the Scenic Moraine is concerned but he did spend some time scouting Scenic teams for schools he was with.

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Fifrick served as assistant coach at Chilton one year, Lake Mills four years and

Nicolet one year before taking the head job at Kewaskum. He also served as an assistant coach for the North-South all-star football game at Oshkosh.

Fran Charland, last year's head coach, remained as Fifrick's varsity assistant. But he injured his leg while running with the players at the end of practice Thursday. He underwent surgery Friday and will be in a cast for some time.

Other coaches are Jim Westphal and Pete Gasser, JV's, and Don Liebetrau and Perry Koth, freshmen.

Fifrick has some veterans back from last year's team and hopes to improve on last year's record when the Indians were 1-8, their only win coming over North Fond du Lac in a non-conference game. There are 15 lettermen back but the problem is lack of numbers. There are only 15 seniors and four juniors out.

Senior letter winners include: Jesse Averill (5-8, 163), halfback; Steve Beck (5-9, 148), guard; Scott Brendemihl (6-1, 154), end; Mike Ciha (6-0, 156), guard-tackle; Tim Davis (6-0, 175), guard; Joel Herriges (5-11, 146), quarterback; Tom Kern, (6-4, 175), tight end; John Melzer (5-11, 155), tackle;

Tim Peterson (5-11, 165), center; Mike Pettit (5-10, 175), fullback; and Rod Schultz (5-10, 165), halfback.

Junior letter winners are: Brian Dreher (5-10, 156), end-halfback; Randy Heberer (5-11, 148), wingback; Perry Kempf (6-0, 176), end; and Steve Muench (5-10, 186), tackle.

Davis, Herriges, Kern, Melzer, Peterson, Pettit, Schultz, Heberer, Muench and Brendemihl started over half the games last year. Fifrick hopes his juniors and seniors hold up because he can't afford any injuries. There are 25 sophomores out but the coach would like to keep them on the JV's as a unit.

Fifrick is pleased with his backfield of Herriges, Pettit and Schultz with their speed. The new coach will go with a multiple offense, with most players seeing double duty because of the lack of depth. Kern and Brendemihl are a pair of rangy receivers. Kewaskum's lack of size and depth in the line concerns Fifrick.

VILLAGE SPONSORING TENNIS TOURNAMENT
