## Athletic Code Changed

### School District Will Receive Additional \$103,000 in State Aid

The regular meeting of the Kewaskum School Board was held on Monday, October 15. Among the major topics were the adoption of the proposed revised budget for 1979-80 and a change in the district's athletic code in regard to reporting training violations and due process.

There was some good news for taxpayers when Superintendent of Schools Floyd Brenholt reported that an additional \$103,000 would be received by the district in the form of state aid. This means the previously proposed (in July) tax levy of \$2,301,594.00 would decrease by this amount and be set at \$2,198,208.00. The proposed tax rate would be 9.4127 mills as opposed to the 10.32 mills proposed in July.

The Village of Kewaskum and most of the townships throughout the district will experience only a slight increase in the total dollar levy and a stable or decreasing percentage of the total tax levy. The Town of Farmington will see an increase in its total tax levy from \$503,025 to \$568,761. Brenholt later explained that this is due to a significant increase in that town's equalized valuation because of 1) more construction of

homes in that area, and 2) an overall increase in the value of properties in Farmington.

Brenholt also stated that the state aids increase is due to a higher enrollment than expected. His projection was originally for a decline, however, as of October 15, there were 2,169 students enrolled in district schools - five more than last year. A state formula which takes this into account determines the final state aid dollar amount.

Changes were approved, as recommended by Principal Clark Pearson, in the athletic code. Training rule violations should now be reported in writing by any responsible citizen as soon as possible after the violation. The Athletic Director will then meet with the accused and discuss the violation. The accuser may also be called in to meet with the Athletic Director and the accused. Another change is the guarantee of due process when any charges of rule violation are made. For example, if an athlete is suspended from athletics, he/she or parents may appeal the decision within 14 days. When an appeal request is received by the Athletic Director, he must send by registered mail the specific details of the infraction to the parents. A date for a hearing will then be established

by the principal. The athletic director, principal, athlete, parents, and coach should be in attendance to give relevant testimony. A second hearing can also be requested before the Board of Education, and eventually if there is still a problem, a review by the Executive Office of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association may be requested.

In other action, the board decided to proceed with a Career Education Program to make students at all grade levels more aware of the various vocations available. Federal funds were available for this and a grant of about \$7,600 was secured after George Allmann visited the Department of Public Instruction in Madison.

Business Manager Bob Borch reported on inspections made by the Bureau of Safety Inspection in regard to traces of asbestos found in school buildings. They found some asbestos containing material in the Kewaskum Elementary School heating system. This amount was below current state standards and "encapsulation" by painting or covering surfaces was recommended. The district is now taking steps to eliminate any problem.

There was some discussion on allowing Julie Dettmann to

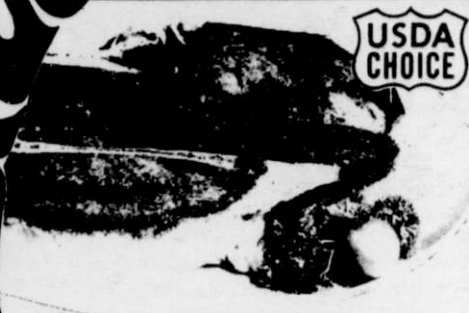

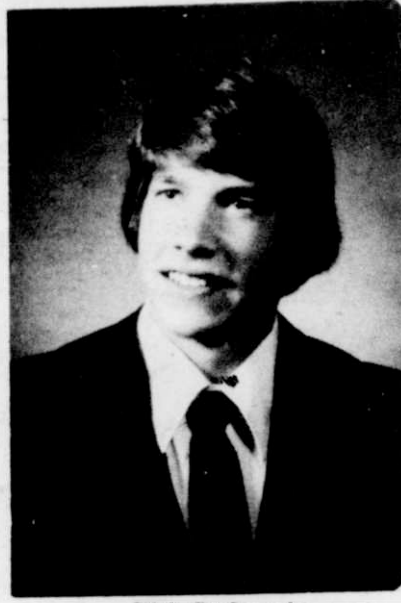

A 4-day unpaid leave request by Dave Wietor was approved as well as a 4-month child care leave request by Gail Filzen. Dave Wietor also had 30 graduate credits approved by the board to put him on a higher salary schedule. 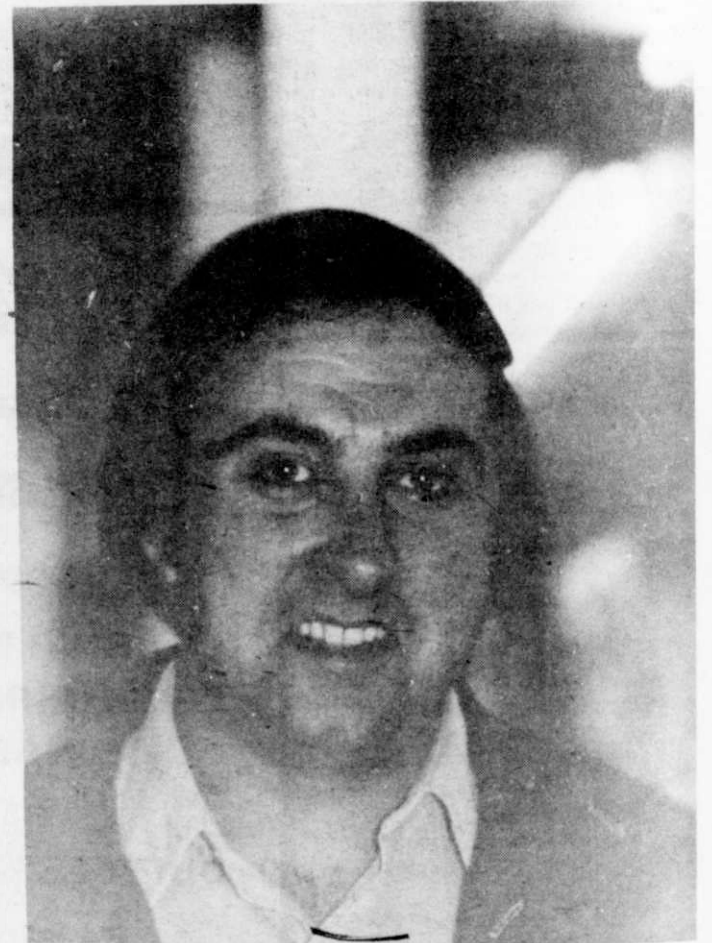

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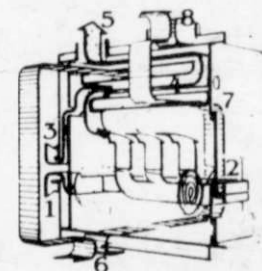

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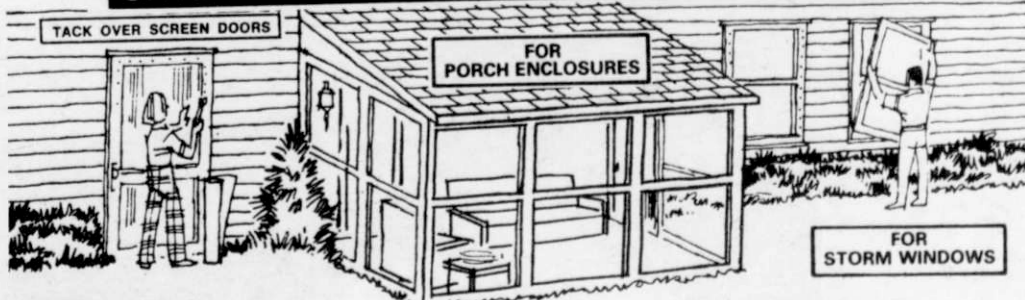
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## Holy Trinity Observes Open House, National School Lunch Week

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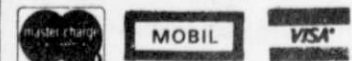

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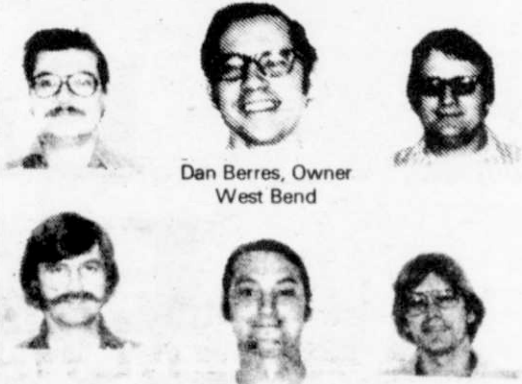

## Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Regular Meeting  
October 1, 1979  
8:00 P.M.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Robert Danielsen presided. All Village Trustee members were present.

As requested by the Plan Commission, a public hearing was conducted to correct the zoning of the William and Kathryn Schaefer property at 1329 Riverview Drive from B-1 to R-2 and to correct the zoning of the village owned property at 1202 Parkview Drive from R-2 to I-1. There were no objections to the zoning corrections as proposed. The hearing was declared closed upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Stollenwerk. Voice vote was unanimous.

The minutes of the meeting of September 17 were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee Spoeth, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

Fire Chief August Bilgo and Building Inspector Henry Becker were authorized to attend the Fire Chiefs' and Building Inspectors' seminar at Wausau. Motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Blumer.

Administrator Schmidt reported that the abutting property owner was in agreement with the proposed reconstruction of the intersection of Second Street and Fond du Lac Avenue. The cost of the necessary surveying and preparation of the required legal papers was estimated at approximately \$200.00. Motion was made by Trustee Mlodzik, seconded by Trustee Blumer that the Administrator be authorized to have the survey made, that the legal papers be prepared and that a cost estimate of the proposed reconstruction be presented at the next meeting. Voice vote was unanimous.

As a temporary measure as suggested by the Police Department, parking will be restricted on the east side of Fond du Lac Avenue south of Second Street up to the Fairmont parking lot driveway. Motion by Trustee Blumer, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

The Park Commission was authorized to expend up to \$400.00 for new trees for the park areas. Motion by Trustee Blumer, seconded by Trustee Stollenwerk. Voice vote was unanimous.

The proposal of the Permutit Company for the Model 200 dewatering equipment for the wastewater treatment plant at a cost of \$25,089.00 was accepted based upon the condition that the contract be amended to require the company to install the equipment on a ninety day (90) trial basis and that the village would not be required to make any payment until such equipment is operating to the satisfaction of the Village of Kewaskum. If such equipment is not operating to the satisfaction of the village at the end of the ninety day period, the company shall remove such equipment at no cost of the village. Motion by Trustee Mlodzik, seconded by Trustee Herriges.

The application of Beverly Rohlinger for a bartender's license was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permit upon payment of the required fee. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Blumer. Voice vote was unanimous.

The revised fire service contract between the Village of Kewaskum and the Town of Kewaskum was approved and will be forwarded to the Town for their approval.

Administrator Schmidt recommended that the village should review the fee charges for various permits and licenses.

The application of Regal Ware for a building permit for a storage building was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permits upon payment of the required fee. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Blumer. Voice vote was unanimous.

# Crippled Indians Give Mayville Battle, Lose 15-7

Kewaskum's disabled Indians gave a battle, Mayville a heck of a fight, mainly on defense, in the last home game Friday night before going down, 15-7.

With their ace running backs already on the shelf, Rod Schultz out offensively with an injury from the week before and Mike Pettit out with a suspension, the Indians lost two more backs, Brian Dreher and Bruce Keller, with injuries during the game. The team is running out of backfield players. As if this weren't enough, center-linebacker Tim Peterson also was hurt.

Lucky Wurtz, all-conference last year, picked up 131 yards on 24 carries, including a 23-yard touchdown run, to lead the Cardinals. With his running backs out, quarterback Joel Herriges was the Indians' leading gainer with 61 yards on 4 carries. Jess Averill added 23 in 10 carries and Randy Heberer 20 on 4 carries.

The players injured really hurt on the offensive unit. In the second half the Indians failed to get a single first down, lost 5 yards on the ground and completed just 2 passes for 12 yards. But the defense hung in there right to the end.

Kewaskum got off to a flying start when after just two plays in the game, quarterback Herriges brought the fans to their feet on a broken play which he turned into a 61-yard touchdown run. On what appeared like a pass play, Herriges saw an opening to his right and ran down the sidelines all the way into the end zone. Heberer's kick made it 7-0. But that was the Indians' only score of the evening.

In another surprise the Indians then tried the onside kick. It didn't go the required 10 yards but one of the Cardinals touched it and Kewaskum's Pete Wiedmeyer fell on it for a fumble recovery. That gave the Indians good field position on their own 47 but 2 penalties, one a 15-yarder for unsportsmanlike conduct from the bench, pushed the ball all the way back to the 26-yard line. This is where Dreher was lost with a knee injury when a Cardinal blocked into him as he punted.

Mayville received the ball on its 40 and moved 60 yards for its first score. On a fake extra point kick, Wurtz passed to Mark Bachhuber for a 2-point conversion to give the Cards an 8-7 lead. A blocked punt gave Mayville another opportunity at the Indians' 12 but Kempf's interception ended the threat.

The Cardinals came close to another touchdown with a half minute left in the half on a 25-yard pass but they were penalized on the play. Wurtz then caught another pass at the 3-yard-line but the half ended, 8-7.

Mayville scored its second TD in the third quarter by moving the ball 53 yards with Wurtz taking it in from the 23. Todd Strook's kick made it 15-7 and that was all the scoring as the

winner ate up the clock in the last quarter. Kewaskum never got past their own 40-yard line in the entire second half.

Offensively Mayville had 15 first downs to Kewaskum's 2 and gained 294 yards to the Indians' 91.

In their final game Wednesday night, the Indians traveled to Germantown to take on the undefeated conference leaders, who are ranked the top team in the state by the WIAA in Division II.

Fond du Lac County - Goose hunting on the Eldorado marsh in the Central Zone has been very good. Late ducks are beginning to show up on Lake Winnebago. Color is peaking in the county. Bluegills are biting on Long and Mauthe Lakes. Grouse hunting is poor. Squirrel hunting is fair in the Kettle Moraine area and should improve as the leaves fall.

Dodge County - Walleye fishing is excellent on Beaver Dam Lake. Success has been high for Canada geese in the Horicon Zone. Good mallard hunting is being found by hunters in corn stubble. Fall color is peaking out in the Horicon area. The Canada goose population at Horicon as of October 15th was 51,300. Viewing is still good on Highway 49 near Waupun and on land adjacent to the refuge.

### Southeast District

Full color throughout the district. Many maples are past the peak of fall color and are losing leaves rapidly. A large buildup of

Canada geese provides for good goose viewing on Highway 28 at the north end of the Theresa Wildlife Area in Dodge and Washington Counties. This area is just west of Highway 41 on Highway 28. Duck hunting can only be considered fair throughout the district. It is hoped that northern migrants will improve the situation shortly.

Fishing generally remains good on all district waters. A reminder that snagging for trout and salmon is NOT permitted in the Root River in Racine County and also NOT permitted in the Port Washington harbor nor Sauk Creek in Ozaukee County. In Lake Michigan and tributary stream fishing, some excellent catches of Chinook salmon were taken from the Root River. Baited treble hooks were being used. Excellent catches of Chinooks were being snagged in Pike Creek in Kenosha County. Snagging success was limited off Milwaukee County with quite a bit of pressure reported in Oak Creek and its mouth.
