The Kewaskum Fire Department and Rescue Squad received a new safety and rescue tool on Thursday evening, November 15. The Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum donated the \$5,981 necessary to purchase the Hurst "Jaws of Life" extrication device which can save victims from the jaws of death when

trapped in a damaged automobile or other accident.

Rescue Squad Captain, Michael Fierke, was extremely enthusiastic and appreciative about the tool. He declared that the village's rescue team "is VERY grateful for this" and thanked the Kiwanis profusely. He noted that this was their second donation to the Fire Department, the first being for a "Resusci-Annie" with a re-

cording device for practicing CPR. For an official presentation of the check, the Kiwanis was represented by Dennis Connor, President; Ronald Johann, Treasurer; and Gene Bohn. Among the thankful firemen accepting the check were Chief Augie Bilgo, Assistant Chief Don Ehnert, Rescue Lieutenant Larry Williams, and

NO PARKING FROM 2 TO 6 A.M.

Winter Parking Ordinance Approved by Village Board

On Monday, November 19, the Kewaskum Village Board approved a revised version of the new winter parking ordinance. Signs are being posted at the village limits proclaiming a parking ban during the hours of 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. from December 1 to April 1 to allow for more efficient snow removal. A period of only 3 minutes parking is allowed for actual loading or unloading of passengers during these times. The owners of illegally parked cars will be requested by the police to move their vehicles. A fine of \$15 plus any penalty assessment or court costs will be imposed and the car may be towed away upon the order of an officer when the vehicle directly interferes with snowplowing or hauling operations. The same penalties apply during a snow emergency when the parking ban hours may be ex-

The board heard at length a proposal from Permutit Co. to bring in a pilot project sludge conditioner for two weeks to demonstrate the effectiveness of the unit before a full-scale unit is installed. The board approved this method of guaranteeing the equipment's ability to maintain a consistency of sludge that could be hauled in a dump truck. It also endorsed testing the actual unit for 100 calendar days for mechanical soundness with Permutit agreeing to replace any parts and to remove the equipment if the village was not satisfied.

The proposed 1980 village budget involving a total of \$1,665,574 was explained by Administrator Schmidt. The taxpayers will be responsible for a total of \$963,497. A budget summary is published in this week's Statesman, and a public hearing and possible acceptance of the budget will occur on Monday, November 26, 1979, at 7:00 p.m.



Firemen Become Familiar With Operation of New 'Jaws of Life' Device

(Continued from Page 1)

Ron Naab, of the Hurst Safety Products Division, explained the operation and uses of the deceptively small device which can rip off a car door, cut off a car roof, or cut into metal like a can opener. The equipment consists of a power unit with a 5 horsepower Chrysler engine and a rescue tool unit of 2 - 2 foot titanium alloy "jaws." When the jaws are held much like a chain saw and braced against the thigh, a rescuer can outwardly direct a virtual irresistable force of 12,000 pounds per square inch, in a pincer motion to perform whatever rescue tasks he may desire. This immense force is achieved through a hydraulic system that generates and maintains a pressure of 5,000 p s i. The engine and pumping unit is connected to the jaws by a 16-foot double hose. Four to five quarts of aircraft hydraulic fluid are used within the system, although any liquid could be used.

Various attachments allow the "Jaws of Life" to perform many rescue operations, some of which were later demonstrated on a junked car in the fire station. The regular tips are used for prying or otherwise opening a space up to 32 inches. The jaws can be directed towards bolt heads of door hinges and easily break it off to allow entry or can be plunged into a concrete block wall, and through its outward pressure, gouge out a 32-inch hole for ventilation or escape. The unit can also act as a jack to lift machines or cars off of victims. A cable and bar cutting attachment which fits between the


jaws can shear off 8-inch rods or the roof supports of a car when the pressure is directed inward. As was demonstrated, the roof can then be bent back by 2 or 3 people to allow access for rescue. Another tip allows the jaws to cut out a 1-inch strip in one direction for entry through a steel building, granary, or a locked fire door. The jaws can be hooked between two chains one around the car's steering column and the other around the car's stabilizing rods - and generate an inward force to pry the steering wheel upward and away from a victim's chest. Most of the above rescue tech-

niques were performed on an unsuspecting Ford Falcon amid the discordant creaking and crumpling of steel and the throbbing of the small engine.

Naab saw that each fireman present had a chance to use the tool and encouraged them to use the "Jaws of Life" in a creative manner to overcome obstacles during a rescue as quick as possible. As an observer, it was very reassuring to know that this equipment is available for a rescue within the Kewaskum area. We are indeed fortunate to have only the third "Jaws of Life" within Washington County.



Our Farmland is in Danger

With all the talk about our scarce energy resources, we often forget that the U.S. has a valuable natural resource in its farmland. We grow a wide variety of crops that have made us food self-sufficient and a major exporter of food commodities, a large factor in holding down the inflationary trade deficits created by our oil imports.

However, we are gradually losing our farmland and that should cause great concern. Between 1967 and 1975, it is estimated that over 31 million acres of farmland was converted to nonagricultural uses - shopping centers, residential tracts. industrial developments, etc. and the loss continues at over 3 million acres a year.

Thus far, we have been fortunate that new farm methods irrigation, new crop varieties, fertilizers, etc. have maintained commodity production at excellent levels. But if we are to ensure our future strength in food production now 20 percent of the world's total - we must take steps to stop the loss of farmland.

The Department of Agriculture has recognized that need, and has adopted policies to protect farmland, such as in its loans to rural communities and industries. But other governmental units have not been so farsighted.

Some have advocated federal land use controls as a means of stopping the loss of farmland,

approach, just as I did in the Wisconsin Legislature when Wisconsin enacted a system of agricultural land taxation and use policies. The last thing we need is more government control of how we use our farm and other lands. What we do need are policies to encourage the continued use of farmland and make it more productive.

In that vein, I support the "Agricultural Land Protection Act of 1979" (H.R. 2551) now pending in Congress. It would do several things

First, it would require the federal government to develop policies for federal projects which would protect farmland, but also be consistent with state and local policies. Second, it would authorize the Soil Conservation Service to provide help to local governments in protecting farmlands. Third, it would establish 50/50 matching grants for demonstration study and testing programs for farmland preservation. Last, it would establish a commission to gather data on U.S. farmlands, to be shared with state and local governments.

H.R. 2551 is an important step in curbing loss of farmland, and deserves passage.

Agricultural Lands Board Reviews Zoning Maps for Town of Kewaskum

The Agricultural Lands Preservation Board certified seven more county agricultural preservation plans at its November 2 meeting, bringing to 12 the number of Ag plans certified for county participation in the permanent phase of the Farmland Preservation Program.

Certifications were given to Barron, Dodge, Dunn, Juneau, Polk, Rock and Sheboygan Counties. In some instances, approvals were preliminary pending adoption of the plans by county boards.

Jim Johnson, director of the Farmland Preservation Program in the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, points out that a certified plan allows farmers in rural communities to obtain long-term contracts and receive higher levels of tax credit. Certification before the end of the year allows individuals to claim the higher credit against 1979 property taxes. Landowners in Rock and Sheboygan Counties now join seven other counties where exclusively zoned farms qualify for tax credits without a Farmland Preservation Contract.

that it is very pleased with overall participation in the program to date. Even though the program is only two years into its initial "start-up" phase, 47 counties are already preparing, or have completed. Ag plans, and many are developing local zoning ordinances to help implement the plans.

According to Johnson, about 80% of Wisconsin's farmland is now covered by county programs.

In other action, the board certified a new zoning ordinance for the Village of Soldiers Grove, and reviewed zoning maps for the Towns of Barton and Kewaskum in Washington County.



Farmers Expand Storage Space

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) helped 48 county farmers add much more storage space to their farms during the 1978-79 period. Many others are to be disbursed after completion.

Ira A. Oelhafen, Chairperson of the ASC committee, said funds are still available for farmers who wish to build additional facilities or to expand their present storage structures. Loans are also available for building high-moisture forage and silage storage space and solar grain drying systems.

HELP

"Adequate on-farm storage and drying facilities provide farmers with greater crop handling and marketing flexibility at harvest time," Oelhafen said. Farmers can reduce field losses by harvesting when the crop is ready, and can store crops in good condition until prices rise

ASCS will loan farmers up to \$50,000 on structures adequate to store two years' crops, with 15 percent down and 10.5 percent interest. Loan payment terms allow for a maximum of seven equal annual installments over a period of eight years.

Oelhafen further pointed out that farmers will probably want more storage in years to come because the ability to hold on to
