Board Approves Tax Rate Of \$23.63 Per Thousand

The proposed 1980 village budget involving \$1,666,839.87 was approved by the Kewaskum Village Board on Monday, November 26. Along with this a total tax levy of \$963,496.24 was approved with a tax rate of \$23.63 per thousand.

State Tax Credit Cuts Rate to \$18.01

On Tuesday, November 27, the village received a state tax credit of \$5.62 per thousand. When this is subtracted from the previously determined gross tax rate of \$23.63 per thousand, it yields a net payable tax rate of \$18.01 per thousand, which is the relevant figure to the taxpayer. The total levy or the amount of money that the village must acquire remains the same at \$963,496.24.

Initially, a public hearing was held in which questions by board members or the public could be answered. Trustee Jerry Stollenwerk was reassured that the Water Pollution Control Department's budget requests were for the dewatering equipment, sequential sampler, and conveyor belt. Trustee Dave Nigh asked about allotments for police uniforms. Administrator Dan Schmidt replied that there were no set amounts for this in the police contract although \$800 was budgeted.

Richard Schmidt, the only member of the electorate present besides reporters, admonished the board, "Don't run it too tight." He advocated the possible investment of some funds as opposed to a tax cut as last year such that the village would not have to borrow if there is a squeeze on the budget at year's end. He noted that people were commenting that the rate was up from last year. Administrator Schmidt observed that, "We are at the maximum we can levy."

Each item in the budget was not gone over again, but Dan Schmidt recommended one change. He suggested transferring \$2,000 from a building remodeling fund to a streetlight fund, since utility rates may be increasing 8 to 11% and also due to a maintenance problem on Main Street, and some additional lights in Hon-E-Kor Estates and on Braatz Drive.

For 1980, the levy for municipal purposes would be \$263,955 or 27.4% of the total levy at a \$6.47 rate per thousand. The levy the village collects for the county is \$143,597.69 or 14.9% of the total levy at a \$3.52 rate per thousand. The state's portion of the levy is \$10,413.63 or 1% of the total levy at a rate of \$.26. The school's portion of the levy is \$490,103.16 or 50.9% of the total tax levy at a \$12.02 rate. The vocational school's portion is \$55,426.76 or 5.75% of the total levy at a \$1.36 rate.

According to a comparison sheet compiled by Schmidt, the municipal levy is up about \$12,000 from the \$251,712.71 amount in 1979 and the total levy is up about \$34,500 from

The Kewaskum Police Department asks your co-operation in minimizing the tags and tows to keep your streets clean.

1979. Unlike the years of 1977 and 1978, the levy is below the \$1 million mark, due mainly to reassessment. Schmidt explained that in 1977, taxes were based on 45% of equalized valuation, whereas today they are based on 78% equalized valuation. Tax bills are expected to be sent out prior to Christmas.

Comments on the federal revenue sharing expenditures were requested in the agenda. President Danielsen, Clerk-Treasurer Bill Martin, and Dan Schmidt explained that the allotted \$55,000 is already in the budget and that "comments" referred to any changes, recom-

mendations, or other public input, as to the general categories in which any future federal funds may be expended. The board approved their expenditure during 1980 as 85% for public safety and 15% for recreation.

The board voted unanimously to accept the budget and to establish the total levy and the \$23.63 per thousand tax rate. It also approved a motion to establish the last day possible for the first payment of a split payment as February 29, 1980, instead of January 31, 1980. Also, the board agreed to place all delinquent accounts of all departments upon the present tax roll.

In other action, the board approved the purchase of a transformer and a breaker box for the sewage treatment plant at a cost of about \$800, due to an increased demand for power. It was also determined that it would not be that practical to disconnect every other street light or switch to some sodium vapor street lights as any savings in energy would be offset by higher rates or greater capital outlay.

Sanfilippo Announces Candidacy For 53rd Assembly Seat



Jon W. Sanfilippo announced that he is a Republican candidate for the 53rd Assembly District which encompasses parts of Washington, Dodge and Fond du Lac Counties.

When asked why he is seeking the position Sanfilippo cited his concern that there is too much government being forced upon us. Sunny skies and warm temperatures with readings in the 50's and 60's greeted gun deer hunters around Wisconsin opening weekend. Hunting pressure was about the same or up slightly in many areas of the state and in general, registrations were about the same or up compared with 1978. No conclusions can be drawn from that fact because it is obvious that successful hunters registered their deer almost immediately because of the warm temperatures. They were interested in getting the deer to the meat processors as soon as possible to avoid spoilage. It will probably be necessary to wait before any conclusions can be drawn as to the projected total harvest this year. Big game officials predicted 120,000 to 130,000 deer would be taken during the gun season this year compared with 150,000 plus in 1978.

Fond du Lac County — Rabbit, pheasant and deer hunting were poor.

Southeast District

Inland water fishing for wall-eyes and perch has been excellent on Pike Lake in Washington County.

Other fishing is generally good, but fishing pressure is extremely light. The gun deer season opening was fair to good despite the very warm weather conditions and the outlook was good for the final weekend of the season in Sheboygan, Washington and Ozaukee counties. The rest of the counties in the District were closed.

Pheasant hunting may show some improvement as fall plowing and corn harvesting proceed and the birds become more concentrated.

Mid-Monthly Meeting
November 19, 1979
8:00 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Robert A. Danielsen presided. Trustee Herriges was absent. All other Trustee Members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of November 3 were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Stollenwerk. Voice vote was unanimous.

Tom Lawn and Roy Fay, representing the Permutit Company, were in attendance and offered to provide the Village of Kewaskum with a portable sludge dewatering test unit for a period of two weeks at no cost to the village. Motion was made by Trustee Mlodzik, seconded by Trustee D. Nigh that the village accept the offer of the Permutit Company provided that the offer be made to the village in letter form. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" and 0 "Nay" for the acceptance of the offer.

The Board reviewed the Parkview and Main Street school crossing survey prepared by the Police Department. Motion was made by Trustee Spoeth, seconded by Trustee Stollenwerk that the village purchase and install two electric amber flashing warning lights for this intersection rather than provide a school crossing guard. Voice vote was unanimous.

Administrator Dan Schmidt reported the following:

1. At a meeting that he had with a representative of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company, it was indicated that the railway company would have no objection to the installation of either an underpass or an overpass across their right-of-way if and when Reigle Drive were extended northward to meet U.S. Highway 45.

2. A representative of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and a representative of Donohue and Associates met recently at the Municipal Building to review the floodway and floodplain survey being prepared for the Federal Government by Donohue.

3. The installation cost for a street light at the intersection of Edgewood Road and North Avenue would be approximately \$550.00. It was recommended that the light not be installed at this time.

The Administrator was authorized to make application to the Wisconsin Fund for possible funding for the possible rehabilitation of the sanitary sewer on Clinton Street. Motion by Trustee Blumer, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik. Voice vote was unanimous.

Daniel Meilahn questioned the village's procedure in dealing with a citizen's project which was near a floodplain area and the procedure followed in doing a municipal project which was in a floodway area.

Upon the recommendation of the Commissioner, Daniel S. Schmidt was appointed deputy clerk-treasurer who shall act as such officer in the absence of the Commissioner and also was empowered to sign checks in the absence of the Commissioner. Motion by Trustee Blumer, seconded by Spoeth. Roll

call vote in favor of the motion was 6 "Aye" and 0 "Nay."

Trustee Spoeth, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee reported that his committee had met recently to discuss the parks and recreation budget for 1980.

Motion was made by Trustee Stollenwerk, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik that the Administrator submit an application to the State for funding for the 1980 park development. Voice vote was unanimous.

The following ordinance was introduced by Trustee Gerald Stollenwerk:

ORDINANCE NUMBER 79-6

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 7.04 (2) of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be, and hereby is repealed and recreated as follows:

7.04 (2) SNOW EMERGENCY PARKING RESTRICTIONS.

Whenever the Village Board or Village President shall, by reason of heavy snow storm or blizzard, proclaim a snow emergency pursuant to Section 66.325, Wis. Stats., no person shall park, stop, or leave standing any vehicle upon the streets or any portions of the streets during the hours set forth in said proclamation.

Section 2. That Section 7.04 (3) of the Village code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be and hereby is created as follows:

7.04 (3) NIGHT PARKING RESTRICTIONS.

When signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wis. Stats., no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions, vehicles may be parked for a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner is violated thereby.

Section 3. That Section 7.04 (4) of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be and hereby is created as follows:

7.04 (4) REMOVAL OF ILLEGALLY PARKED VEHICLES.

Any vehicle parked or left standing upon a highway, street or alley or other public grounds in violation of any of the provisions of this code is declared to be a hazard to traffic and public safety. Such vehicle shall be removed by the owner or operator, upon request of any police officer, to a position where parking, stopping or standing is not prohibited. Any police officer after issuing a citation for illegal parking, stopping or standing of a vehicle in violation of this code is authorized to remove such vehicle whenever there is a snowplowing or snow removal operation being conducted in the village to a position where parking is not prohibited. The officer may order a motor carrier holding a permit to perform vehicle towing services, a licensed motor vehicle salvage dealer or a

licensed motor vehicle dealer who performs vehicle towing service to remove and store such vehicle in any storage garage or rental parking grounds or any facility of the person providing the towing services. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 7.04 (6) of this code the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of towing and storage.

Section 4. That Section 7.04 (5) of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be and hereby is created as follows:

7.04 (5) REGISTRATION RECORD OF VEHICLE AS EVIDENCE.

When any vehicle is found upon a street or highway in violation of any provision of this code regulating the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles and the identity of the operator cannot be determined, the owner as shown by the ownership registration of the vehicle supplied by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, or a comparable authority of any other State, shall be subject to appropriate penalty.

Section 5. That Section 7.04 (6) of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be and hereby is created as follows:

7.04 (6) PENALTY.

Any person violating the provisions of Sections 7.04 (2) or 7.04 (3) shall forfeit the sum of \$15.00 for each such violation,

plus penalty assessment and court costs and upon failure to pay any forfeiture, penalty assessment and court costs imposed, may be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding six months or until such forfeiture, penalty assessment and costs are paid.

Section 6. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force on December 1, 1979.

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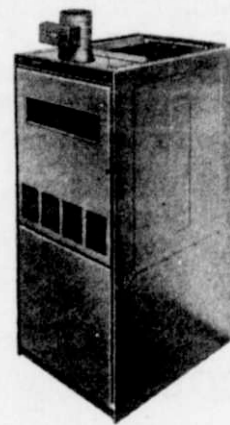

The only survivor of the Battle of Little Big Horn, where Custer made his last stand, was the horse Comanche, whose embalmed body now stands on display at the University of Kansas.

Indians Whip West Bend East With 4th Quarter Splurge, 64-48

The Kewaskum Indians started the season off in the right direction by beating West Bend East of the Little Ten in their non-conference opener here Tuesday night, 64-48.

It was not a ragged game as some openers are, but a well played contest, especially considering the fact that teams were not allowed to hold pre-season scrimmages with outside teams this year. But it was a case of an experienced Kewaskum squad (with 8 lettermen back) facing an inexperienced East team.

The Indians led all the way except for one time late in the second quarter when the Suns tied it at 24-24. Kewaskum was ahead at halftime by 4 points, 28-24, after leading at the quarter by 6, 14-8. In the third period the Indians outscored East by just 1 point, 15-14, to lead by 5. Then in the final stanza, Kewaskum really found the range, hitting on 8 of 13 shots and 5 free throws for a 21-10 scoring edge to put the game out of reach.

The Indians took their 4-point halftime lead on two nifty baskets by shifty guard Henry Schilter in the last minute. After missing his first 5 shots in the opening quarter Schilter turned it on the rest of the way. In the last quarter he hit 9 of his game high 19 points. At one time he scored 7 straight points.

After shooting fairly well the first three periods, the Suns hit on only 5 of 14 shots in the last quarter. In all they hit 23 of 54 for 43 percent. After a weak first period, the Indians improved to bring their percentage to 45.

Behind Schilter's 19 points, Tom Kern and Bob Nigh also hit in double figures. Kern with 13 and Nigh 12. Schilter also sparked the offense and the Indians did a commendable job defensively and in out-rebounding East. Mike Zoelle paced the

suns with 10 points and Bill Zeeb and Pete Neja chipped in 8 apiece.

Both coaches gave most of their players an opportunity to play.

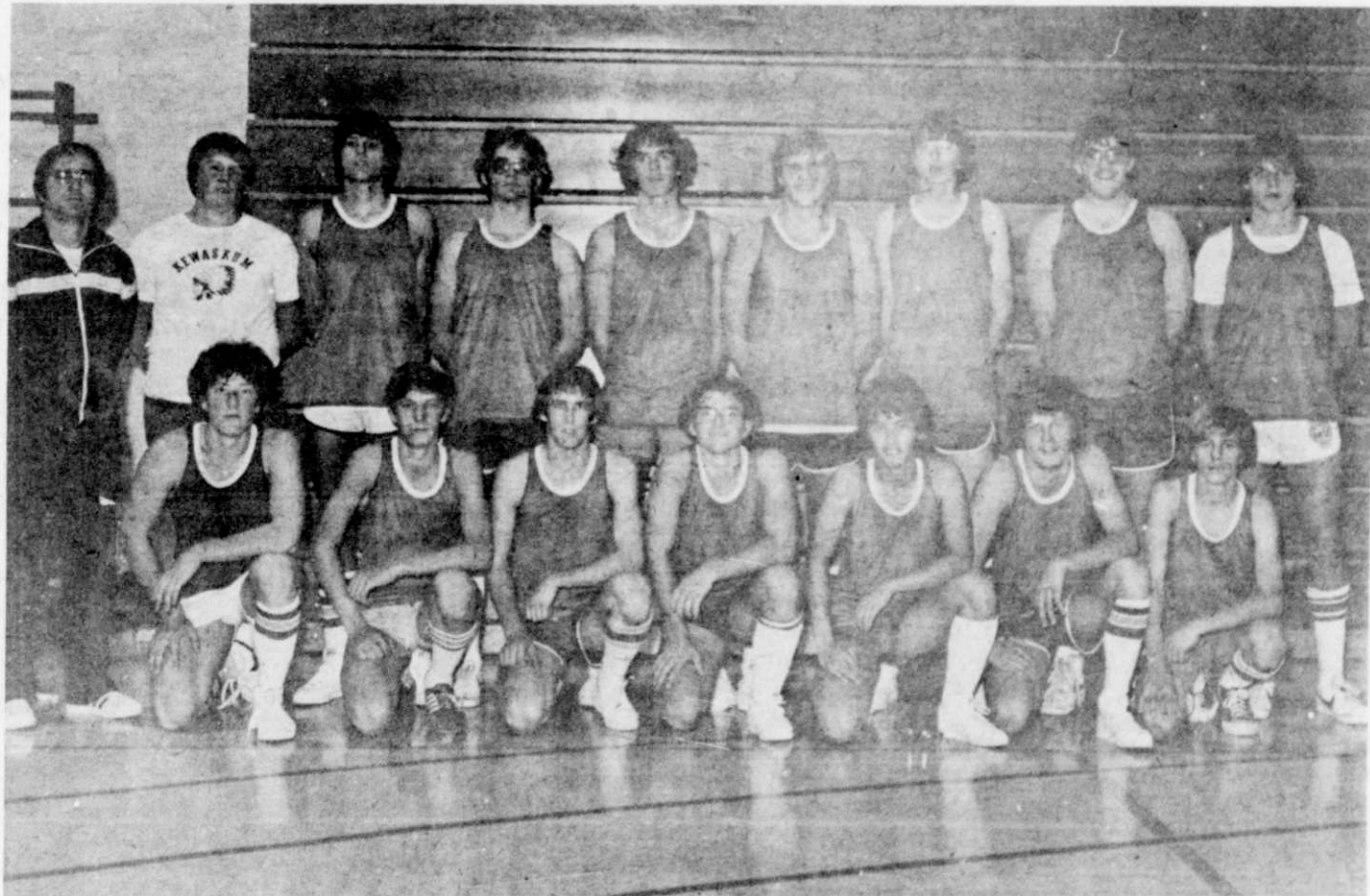

A total of 301 deer were registered in Washington County during the 1979 gun season that ended Sunday, according to Armin Schweingel, district game manager. This is down from about 350 last year.

In both years, the county season opened with a 4-day any deer season and 5-day buck season.

Dorothy Strietzel, West Bend, registered a 10-pointer at the sheriff's department as more women registered deer than expected. An 11-pointer was registered to Paul Boegel, Route 1, Kewaskum, and a 10-pointer to Robin Byers, Kewaskum.

Edwards on Ripon Squad

"We've lost four men who were 26 feet, 8½ inches tall," is the way Coach K. G. "Doc" Weiske sums up his major concern looking ahead to Ripon College's 1979-80 basketball season. The Redmen have five lettermen returning from the squad which tied for second last year in the Midwest Conference East Division.

None of the players lost to graduation or transfer was shorter than 6'4", and this year's squad sports only one experienced big man — 6'6" center Tim Barnes (New Berlin). Barnes was second on the squad in scoring last winter with 367 points, and his 248 rebounds were more than double anyone else on the squad.

"We'll have to rely on our quickness if we're to get anywhere this year," says Weiske, and the people they'll be relying on for that speed are three other returning lettermen — guards Chris Ogle (Oakfield), a senior, and junior Terry Cramer (Mequon), and sophomore forward Ashley Cooper (Oconomowoc).

Cramer led the squad in scoring last year with 404 points and an 18.4 average, and his 98 assists also topped the team. Ogle has been the squad's starting playmaker since he was a sophomore, and Cooper looked occasionally brilliant last year in a substitute's role in 17 games.

The fifth letterman is senior Art Peters (Barrington, Ill.), a 6'4" forward who adds rebounding strength and has looked improved in practice thus far. Tom Edwards, a 6'6" forward and center from Kewaskum, who was injured most of last season, is also expected to make a difference for the Redmen this season. Edwards is the son of Richard L. Edwards, 201 First Street, and a former Kewaskum High School player.

Brian Rindfleisch (Mayville) 6'5" could also see more action as a sophomore. Eleven freshmen have made the roster thus far, and Weiske expects to make use of 6'5" Mark Franzen from Verona, 6'3" Steve Hopp of West Bend, and Dan Husnisk (Antigo), a 6'0" guard whose teammate, Terrell Schlundt, was the biggest recruiting find

for Marquette University this fall. Husnisk and Schlundt both were high school all-conference picks last year.

The Redmen have to start the season with a Midwest Conference game at home against Chicago December 1. "It's unusual," Weiske concedes, "but at least the rest of the conference has to start with league games too." The Redmen will play a total of twelve conference games this year, including two apiece against East Division foes Lake Forest, Chicago, Lawrence and conference champ Beloit, and single games with West opponents Knox, Coe, Grinnell and Monmouth.

Top nonconference games include a trip to St. Petersburg, Florida, for the Eckerd College Holiday Tournament, which also includes William & Lee and Wabash Colleges from the NCAA Division II, plus games against Northern Michigan, St. Norbert, and the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

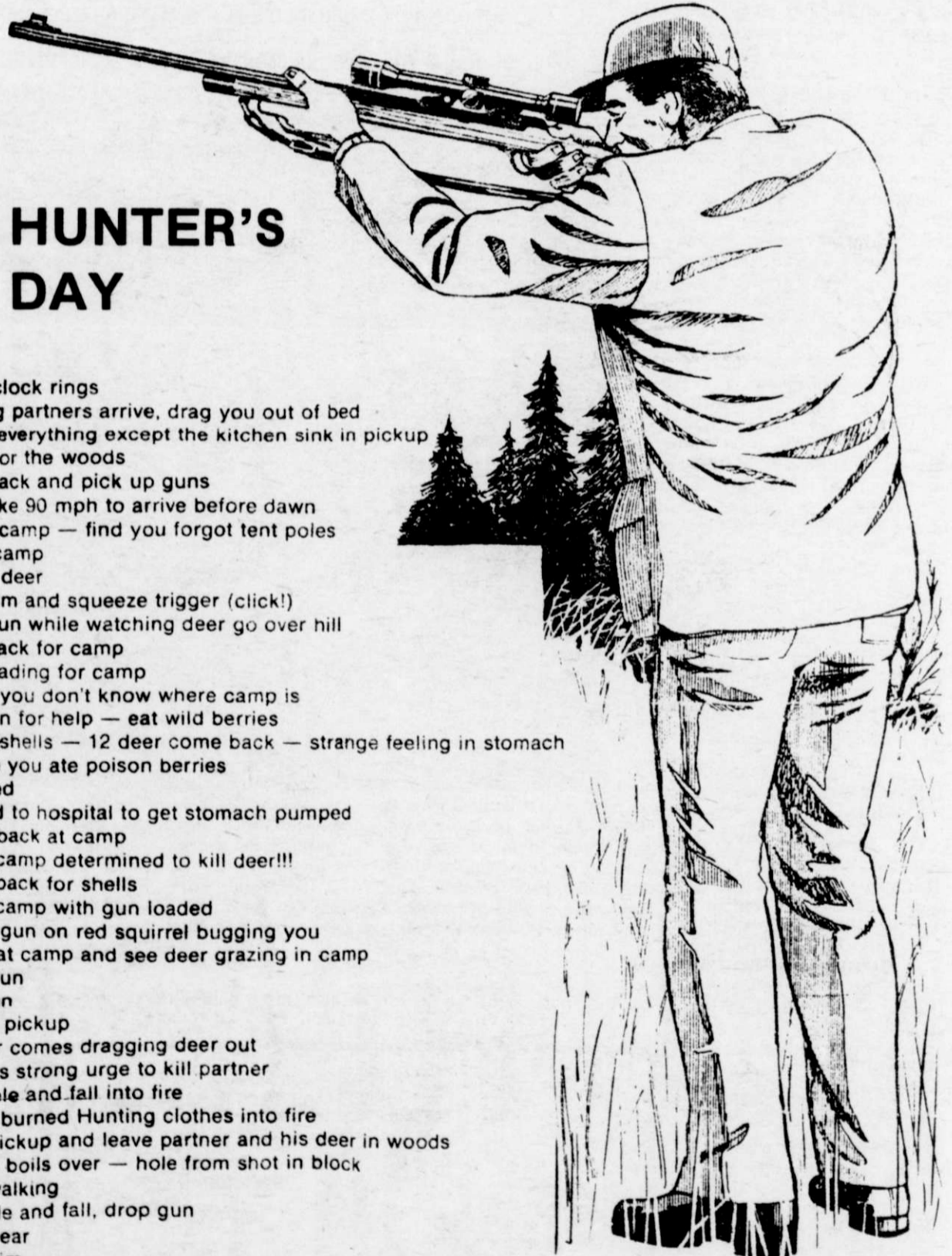
