Scouter, Deaf Since Birth, Wins George Meany Medal

Although Milt Kreif has to depend on other people to put his thoughts into English, his actions speak a language of their own.

Earlier this fall, the Washington County Central Labor Council paid tribute to what the AIW Local 865 member has been saying all these yearsthe Council gave Kreif its George Meany Award for service to Scouting, one of labor's highest honors.

The 56-year-old West Bend resident was born and raised on a farm near New Fane. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. Albert Kreif, Sr. He has five brothers, Karl, Albert Jr. and Jerry of Kewaskum, Harold of Eden and Edwin of Waubeka.

Kreif, who has been deaf since birth, communicates best in sign language; his wife, Mildred, often serves as his interpreter. In a recent interview at the West Bend Co., where they both have worked since 1947, the couple talked about Kreif's work in Scouting. His present position is assistant

"I never had a chance to be a Scout when I was young," he said through his wife. "There wasn't much that could be done for the deaf in those days.

But when the couple's son, Tom, was old enough to join Troop 780, Kreif had an opportunity to participate as well. He taught himself knot-tying through the pictures in the manuel; he took an interest in the Council's camp, and he accompanied the troop on dozens of campouts.

The response of the Scout's themselves has been "fantastic," Mildred Kreif reported. While some adults feel awkward around a man who can't hear, "that's never been a problem with the kids. They seem to adjust really well."

Acceptance hasn't always come so easily. Kreif's academic background is slim; after the third grade his parents enrolled him in a lip-reading school in Fond du Lac, one of. the few opportunities that existed for deaf people in those

RAISE APPEALS FILING FEE TO \$50 Plan Commission Discusses Alternate **Proposal to Railroad Underpass Here**

In a briefer than usual session, the Kewaskum Plan Commission met on Tuesday, November 27. An alternate proposal to a railroad underpass along a possible extension of Reigle Drive was discussed. The commission also made a recommendation to raise the appeals filing fee from \$25 to \$50.

Administrator Dan Schmidt again reported that he had met with Leo Tieman of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad who indicated that an underpass north of town would be acceptable to the railroad. The village would have to bear the entire cost of about \$500,000 which would not include an approach. Schmidt said some funding for this may be available through the Safe Transportation Act. An arrangement whereby the railroad would assume up to 5 percent of the cost if the village closes down one of its other crossings was deemed impractical. The railroad also said that an overpass at grade level would be acceptable.

Charles Miller suggested that the northwesterly extension of Reigle Drive should probably exit on the Old Fond du Lac Road near the "pheasant pens" just south of McElhatton's residence, instead of exiting south of the small creek north of the village. Miller pointed out that no underpass would then be needed since the road would never cross the tracks. He also noted that if there were an underpass, the road might lie so low that pumping of drainage water would be necessary. He also claimed that cars would not be backed up from the possible intersection with "45" when Regal Ware changed shifts. Miller said this alternate route would be a "safer approach to the highway" and that it was 'the quickest and cheapest solution." President Danielsen concurred that "Charlie's suggestion was very good" and then enjoined Administrator Schmidt to determine exactly

which property owners would be involved in such an undertaking, although obviously no actual committments could be made at this time. Schmidt was also directed to check into any possible grants for roads and bridges (when crossing the small creek) and to contact the village engineers, Foth and Van Dyke of Green Bay, as to their suggestions.

Schmidt also reported on the three railroad crossings within the village. The C&NW claims they were "fixed" on July 3. and the Dept. of Transportation re-affirmed this. The village informed both the Dept. of Transportation and the railroad that it was dissatisfied with the work. The railroad's latest proposal is that during 1980 and 1981, it would completely "rehabilitate'' the track zone of the three crossings by replacing the ballast and ties, and substituting welded continuous rail

Board Discusses Fire Contract With T. Kewaskum; Hears Reports

The Kewaskum Village Board meeting of Monday, December 3, was a straightforward session that stuck to the new agenda format and consisted mainly of reports of officers and committees

Prior to the meeting, officials of the Town of Kewaskum met with the board to discuss their fire contract. The town had wished to negotiate for fire protection on an hourly basis. however, it was determined that in the long run, this would cost more than the proposed contract for 18 fire calls at \$28,648. For any additional calls, the town would pay \$4.00 per manhour to the village's volunteer fire department. The town has until January 1, 1980, to officially approve the contract.

There being no public hearings or appearances by citizens at the regular meeting, various department heads reported on the latest developments. Village Commissioner Bill Martin stated that the tax roll data had been delivered to the computer section at Waukesha, and the prepared bills would hopefully be sent out no later than December 17, 1979. Superintendent of Public Works Augie Bilgo reported that the salt situation now looks okay. The village will be using a combination of finer sand and salt which is stored in bags and purchased from a local distributor

ditioner will be postponed until after the first of the year, since it will be running at Hillshire Farms in New London during December. The pilot project will be operated in the village shed with the sludge being transported from building to building. Albers said most of the monitoring system had arrived except pressure switches. The telephone lines are being worked on, and the entire unit will be ready sometime this month.

days. While lip-reading equipped him to cope socially, thirdgrade reading skills at first seemed to put the good jobs out of his reach. He applied to the West Bend Co. but was turned down; he ended up working in a bakery.

That's when he met Milly. Eventually she found a job in a woolen mill, and he joined her a few months later. They were married in 1944. When the mill burned down in 1947, they both went over to the West Bend Co., which hired Milt this time because of a solid recommendation from supervisors at the mill.

At first he was a gas welder at West Bend, attaching spouts to coffee pots; then he moved to a post as material handler, his present position. He's a charter member of Local 865, and has won several awards from the company for safety and production suggestions.

In the interim, Mildred has moved up to foreman of the department she works in.

for the sectioned rail, and laying stabilization fabric. The village must arrange for any detours, remove debris from the crossing and replace any asphalt. Charles Miller suggested that it be spelled out that the grade of the track should not be raised, because the roadbed was poor and that continuous rail was no solution in itself. Roger Strack advocated a more permanent concrete crossing instead of bituminous "frosting.

The commission agreed to make a recommendation to the village board to raise the fee for filing an appeal with the Board of Appeals to \$50. The charge is presently \$25 or \$5 for each of the five members. Schmidt justified any increase by saying that the fee should at least cover the cost of a Class II publication of the notice of the hearing and the cost of a secretary to record the proceedings. Miller warned that the fee should not be excessive or prohibitive to anyone seeking an appeal, and Schmidt noted that other additional fees for permits are often involved. The commission unanimously agreed on the \$50 amount, however.

Schmidt informed the commission that the DNR and Donohue and Associates had finished the remapping of floodplains and floodways around Kewaskum as it related to flood insurance. Elevation statistics for the creeks north and south of the village are now available. Nothing was changed in reference to the Milwaukee River. Although not a direct concern of the Plan Commission, Dan

Schmidt confronted Charles Miller, who is also a County Supervisor, in regard to Kewaskum possibly being placed on a lower priority for snow plowing of its major highways. Schmidt explained that a county crew would be plowing Highway 33 West-prior to '45' into Kewaskum and another crew would be plowing '144' prior to '28' East into Kewaskum. Supposedly, a Fond du Lac county plow would come down '45' as far as the overhead. This last arrangement was unsatisfactory to some village officials. Miller explained that the state determines priorities and that county crews were reduced from 9 to 8 due to less township plowing. He agreed to make some calls to see what could be done.

The commission voted to cancel the December meeting unless some urgent matter arises.

be restricted during school hours. Presently, there is congestion with buses and cars posing hazards to children. The board approved the placement of "no parking" signs on the west side.

Administrator Dan Schmidt repeated the report on the railroad crossing situation that he made at the Plan Commission meeting, and asked that the board determine priorities as to crossing repair. Trustee Dave Nigh suggested that the Second Street crossing be repaired first due to its proximity to Regal sing last. Trustee Carl Spoeth noted that a passable detour crossing would be required crossing improvement.

The board approved a \$25 rent increase per apartment unit at the village's Fond du Lac Avenue property near the fire station.

Schmidt also informed the

board that expenses were prorated for various departments according to a formula determined by the Finance Committee in 1958. 25% is for water; 25% is for sanitation; and 50% is for general purposes. He suggested this be referred to the Administrative Committee for review


Paul Blumer, Chairman of the Public Services Committee, recommended that two streetlights be installed at Edgewood Road and North Avenue and at Edgewood Road and Braatz Drive using overhead wiring instead of buried cable. Cable would cost \$523 plus the \$6.03 monthly charge, whereas single strand overhead wiring on village property would involve \$144 per year. Carl Spoeth wondered if there were any considerations for going to underground cable throughout the village. Schmidt explained that newly developed subdivisions must go to cable but the presently involved subdivision could be excepted.

Jerry Stollenwerk reported on the Plan Commission's suggestion of extending Reigle Drive

northwest to exit on Old Fond du Lac Road in order to save the \$500,000 required for a railroad underpass. Trustee Raynor Herriges noted that this had been suggested years ago and that he still thought it was a good idea.

In new business, the board approved an amendment of the zoning ordinances to increase the Board of Appeals hearing fee to \$50 as recommended by the Plan Commission. In miscellaneous business, the board directed Dan Schmidt to attend a Risk Management Seminar in Milwaukee on February 7. President Danielsen admonished the board to read over the Kewaskum Police Association contract which will be on the December 17 agenda, particularly as it related to accumulated sick leave pay. And, of course, Raynor Herriges moved to adjourn.

Home Energy Conservation

The role of energy conservation in solving our nation's energy problems has become increasingly important. It is the cheapest, quickest, safest, and most environmentally sound method to reduce our energy consumption and our dependence on imported oil.

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American homes consume the equivalent of 8 million barrels of oil a day, just slightly more than we now import from OPEC nations. Many of our dwellings were built in the days of cheap, plentiful energy, so energy conservation techniques in their design and construction were not considered.

Unfortunately, too many major home modifications to conserve energy are beyond the financial reach of most families. I am happy to report, however, that a House subcommittee has studied this problem and identified a variety of home conservation measures costing less than \$100 each that together could save an average of 25 to 30 percent on annual fuel bills. Here are the subcommittee's suggestions:

1. Install a water flow controller. A small plastic device inserted in a shower head can save up to 4,000 gallons of hot water and \$15 to \$50 in fuel bills a year. COST: a few dollars.

2. Reduce temperature on hot water heaters. Cutting the setting from 140 to 160 degrees to 110 to 120 degrees can save \$10. to \$20 per year. COST: five minutes of your time.

3. Add hot water heater tank insulation. Reducing the heat loss from this tank can save \$10 to \$20 per year. COST: under \$5.

4. Use cold water for laundry. Doing the wash in warm water

and rinsing it in cold water can save \$20 to \$50 per year. COST: zero.

5. Plug the fireplace damper. Reducing the heat loss by tightly shutting the damper can save up to \$45 per year. COST: minimal

6. Adjust your furnace for maximum efficiency. Clogged flame jets, etc. can increase fuel consumption. Proper adjustments and cleaning can reduce it. Savings and cost vary with the condition of the furnace.

7. Set the thermostat back. A 10 degree setback at night can save 10-25 percent on heating bills. COST: zero.

8. Use shades and drapes. These can help reduce the heat loss in winter and cool air loss in summer, to save \$15 to \$30 a year. COST: zero.



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
