Despite the fact that there was no opposition for the Kewaskum Village Board and County Supervisor Charles Miller was unopposed, with the only contest being for School Board Member, there was a heavy village turnout at the polls in Tuesday's Spring Election. A total of 711 votes were cast, which is about 75% of the eligible voters. Apparently the Presidential Primary brought out the voters.

Even though the scattered totals from the towns of Scott, Mitchell and Ashford had not been reported yet Wednesday morning, in the Kewaskum School Board race, incumbents John Tessar and Richard Theusch were obviously the winners. Unofficial totals gave Tessar 1,709 votes and Theusch 1,637. Challenger Margaret McFadden came up with 1,106 for a good showing.

In the village Tessar led with 531 votes, followed by Theusch with 441 and McFadden with 365. Tessar was also high in the Town of Farmington with 442 votes, compared to 430 for Theusch and 267 for McFadden. In the Town of Wayne, his home area. Theusch led with 279 votes, as he did in the Town of Barton with 261. Tessar had 264 and 261 respectively.

Theusch will be starting his fourth three-year term and Tessar won a second full term.



# 4-H Livestock Projects Will Be Discussed at West Bend Meeting

There's more to 4-H livestock projects than dollars and cents. Every livestock project member should learn about keeping track of income and expenses, but members, parents and leaders should also consider the many other lessons to be learned from a livestock project. Carl Hirshinger, UW Extension livestock specialist will be discussing livestock project on April 10. It will be at 7:30 p.m. at the 4-H Office in West Bend.

Four-H livestock projects often involve a one-to-one relationship between a project member and a parent or leader. This close relationship provides many opportunities for both youth and adult to learn.

Often people focus only on such areas of 4-H livestock projects as buying the animals and weighing them for performance traits, and training, fitting and showing, which are considered fun. Many times, however, the real learning experiences in livestock projects aren't so much fun.

The daily routines of feeding, watering and otherwise caring for animals may not be fun, but they do teach responsibility. That assumes the member does the work and does not leave it all to his or her parents.

Learning to handle responsibility prepares youngsters for the working world.

Parents and 4-H leaders can help members learn about proper animal nutrition, health care management and animal growth.

County rate-of-gain trails help members learn how management and selection play roles in growth.

Members learn to identify differences between animals, which are especially important. Researchers have found a positive relationship between animal frame—bone structureand ability to grow rapidly.

Livestock project members can learn about marketing. This is the weakest area of most Wisconsin youth livestock programs. There is much more to marketing than selling animals

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at a local fair auction, often above real market values. Members may learn more when their animal doesn't make county fair auction requirements and is sold through regular market channels.

Livestock projects develop patience in 4-H members. Anyone who has taught an animal to lead has learned about patience.

Members can learn about the livestock industry. They can participate in various livestock associations and often get involved with people raising the same kinds of animals.

Members can also learn about science and technology. They discover and learn to appreciate the role research plays in meat animals production.

Livestock project members can learn about food production. The main reason for livestock production is to produce high quality meat from forages and grains.

Livestock projects can involve the entire family. Families learn to divide responsibilities and to work together.

Showing at the county fair highlights the year for most livestock project members, but shouldn't be an end in itself. Shows are a good opportunity to compare skills and animals, to make friends and to learn from others.

# Recycled Materials — A Way to Save Energy

by Beth Stoffel Recycling Chairman Kewaskum Jr. Woman's Club

This article is the third in a series of four articles on recycled materials.

The Kewaskum Recycling Center has been taking in glass since it opened in 1974. In that time 56½ tons of glass have been recycled. In recent years the clean, color-separated glass has been sold to Re Com Inc., a glass recycling firm of Brookfield.

Re Com takes our glass and using a patented process removes the metal contaminants and labels and crushes the glass into chunks no larger than ½ inch. This product, called "cullet" is the material that is sold to glass manufacturers.

Common glass is made by

Custom Pinstriping

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heating a mixture of silica, common sand, limestone and soda ash to 2900 degrees F. in a glass making furnace. It can also be made by leaving out the soda ash and heating to 3000 degrees F. This is where the recycled "cullet" comes in.

Soda ash acts as a flux allowing the mixture to melt at lower temperatures. But since soda ash is mined in Wyoming it is becoming increasingly expensive to use as transportation costs rise. In glass making furnaces, cullet acts like soda ash in that it also allows melting at lower temperatures. So with the costs of natural gas (to heat the furnaces) and soda ash rising, glass manufacturers are using more cullet to replace some soda ash.

According to Brenda Norris, mix and melt supervisor of Anchor Hocking Glass Go., their company used to run about 5% cullet in its glass making furnaces. It is currently using 35% cullet in its amber glass furnace and 15% in its clear glass furnace. She said, one furnace runs at 2770 degrees F. and the other at 2720 degrees F.

Cullet picks up heat and


carries it throughout the melting raw material, reducing its operating temperature. Also using less soda ash reduces air pollution.

So using the cullet saves energy at the furnace, saves energy used to transport the soda ash from Wyoming and saves energy it takes to mine the raw materials. As energy becomes more and more precious in the years ahead any way to save by reusing available resources will put us ahead and make us more competitive.

My last article will deal with recycling tin cans.

# AROUND THE COUNTY

EASTER EGGS AND POULTRY

The egg is not the bad guy it used to be; it is especially useful during the period of healing from illness when there is a greater need for good nutrition and even for cholesterol.

Each person needs 2000 milligram of cholesterol per day for the proper functioning of the brain and nervous system and manufacture of hormones. We need cholesterol and if we don't eat it the body will manufacture it. The 250 milligrams of cholesterol in each egg goes a long way to provide a source of this essential nutrient.

Recent research by the American Egg Board indicates that one egg per day will not adversely affect a person's cholesterol level.

In a small percentage of our population the body has trouble making the best use of fats and cholesterol. These people need to watch their intake of cholesterol. There is no reason why the rest of us should be deprived of a high quality protein food.

At a low cost, eggs provide a source of quality protein-they have a good balance of essential amino acids, some fat and about 80 calories. They are low in Vitamin C.

Poultry and eggs continue to be two of the most effective weapons against the high price of protein. Use them in nutritious, yet cost-conscious holiday

Consumers can take better advantage of these bargains when they know which quality factors to look for in these products. Just by checking label information, consumers can predict for themselves the tenderness, meatiness and appearance of poultry, and the interior quality of eggs.

Poultry contributes to a healthy diet because the meat is naturally lean. There are two U.S. Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) insignias you may see on poultry. One is the inspec-

tion mark, which means that the bird is safe and wholesome to eat. The inspection mark does not tell you anything about the tenderness or meatiness of the bird. For information on these factors, look for the USDA grade and class of the bird.

All poultry sold in consumer markets has been inspected for wholesomeness, and the inspection mark is displayed on many consumer packages. But not all poultry is graded for quality. Consumers should look for the grade mark for information about the meatiness of the bird. U.S. Grade A chickens. turkeys, ducks and capons are the meatiest and have the fewest tears in their skin.

Tenderness is predicted by the class and age of the bird. Young birds, usually labeled as broilers, fryers and roasters, are the most tender. Older less tender birds, which are good for stewing, baking and soups, are often labeled as stewing hens.

Government grading also helps the egg buyer make informed purchase decisions. Eggs contain cholesterol, but they are also good sources of Vitamins, minerals, and protein. They can be eaten in moderation as long as overall cholesterol intake is not exces-

The three consumer grades of eggs, U.S. Grade AA, A and B, describe the interior quality of the egg and the appearance and condition of the shell. The higher the grade, the higher the yolk and white of the egg will stand when broken out of the shell. U.S. Grade AA is the most attractive, but the lower grades are equally nutritious and fine for colorful Easter

The labeled size of eggs actually describes the weight of a dozen eggs, not necessarily the physical dimensions of the eggs. Extra large eggs weigh 27 ounces per dozen, large 24 ounces and medium weigh 21 ounces per dozen. By calculating the cost per ounce, consumers can determine their best

Dear Editor

How much does your phone mean to you?

Did you know that the Wisconsin Public Service Commission is considering Local Measured Service (LMS), which is, really, every call a toll call for all Wisconsin residents?

One of the last chances you will have to say anything about it will be April 10 beginning at 10:00 a.m. in the P.S.C. Hearing Room, 4802 Sheboygan Avenue which is just off University Avenue on the west side of Madison (look for the "Hill Farms State Office Building' sign).

The Wisconsin Telephone Company and its followers, without using figures, claim LMS will be cheaper for 60% of the people and more expensive for 40%. Actually, it is a new way for these companies to get their feet in the door for later rate raises. People will be confined in communications more than ever, forced to make an economic determination each time the phone is picked up. (Please note: Wisconsin Telephone Company has "limited calling" available to customers cheaper rate already, so who needs LMS?)

Wisconsin Telephone Company claims it will make LMS optional, and those who want flat rate service can have it. We now know that they plan to eventually double or triple the flat rates, creating an atmosphere whereby people will eventually choose LMS.

LMS sounds fair enough: everyone pays for what he or she uses. The problem is: those who are confined depend heavi-Iv on the phone, and community volunteers who use the phone in civic responsibilities will not be able to afford adequate functioning, just to list a few cases.

The telephone companies may try, in the face of opposition, to give us a watered-down version such as that they are already pushing on Wisconsin businesses. The best policy is to not allow this service in any form to be introduced. We do not want to lose our inherent right to use phones in necessary everyday functioning as members of our communities.

In my research I have discovered that AT&T, the largest company in the world (and that netted \$5.67 billion last year), has had a master plan for promoting and setting up LMS since before 1977! Throughout the U.S. people are fighting it. For instance, Virginia passed legislation prohibiting the phone companies from giving businesses LMS.

Wisconsin will not benefit from LMS, because it will add to our inflation in at least three ways: (1) prices and services (to help pay for businesses' phone bills), (2) taxes (to help pay for institutions' phone bills), and (3) our own phone bills. Please make your voice heard on April


