

Code Adopted by Village Board

its meeting Monday night. The code would pertain to all new one and two-family dwellings, or additions on existing dwellings, built after June 1, 1980. The village had a choice of two sample ordinances suggested by the State of Wisconsin or one recommended by the League of Municipalities. Administrator Dan Schmidt also recommended the latter and this was unanimously approved. If an ordinance had not been adopted by May 1, the state would have had its rates for building inspection apply.

Warning Siren Repaired

The ordinance states that new structures shall meet state standards. It defines terms and grants a certified person the right to inspect buildings. It also calls for the submission of three sets of plans and allows for enforcement and appeal procedures if some items of the code are judged as not met.

Schmidt reported that a certi-

ordinance, it means an increase of \$189 for a building permit and inspections for a single family dwelling. The present average cost is around \$250. The new rate provides for the cost of seven inspections at \$20 each, a fee of \$1.65 per 1000 cubic feet, and other costs.

Schmidt also reported that a letter was sent to Washington County opposing a 3-countywide library system. The cost of this would run double the cost of the present library, although it would provide a bookmobiletype service to 800 families in rural areas.

The board voted to spend approximately \$500 for electical work on streetlights near the Main Street and Hwy. 45 intersection. An old transformer presently supported on a leaning and rotting pole will be eliminated. Power will be provided instead by a Wisconsin (Continued on Page 3)

Electric Power Co. tub transformer located behind Kettle Moraine Electric. This firm will also be doing most of the wiring work with some assistance from the Power Co.

During the tornado alert and hailstorm on April 7, the warning siren on the east side of town did not sound, much to the dismay of some residents. A wire had been disconnected but is now repaired and there was a malfunction in the associated telephone line. Schmidt said he also received one estimate of over \$7,000 for a single siren which would eliminate the need for three sirens in different parts of the village. This is proposed for next year's budget

At the recent auction held at the Paul Auction Co. on Hwy. S, the village managed to sell its 1938 Austin-Western road grader to a Waukesha curb and gutter contractor for \$1250. The village gleaned \$2200 from sales of the grader, welder, leaf vacuum, and other smaller items. It did not sell its electric hoist or O'Brian sewer rodder. \$101 was spent on 18 wood and metal chairs for use in the council room, some counter trim, a basketball, and miscellaneous items.

Schmidt also said that a letter was received from the Environmental Protection Agency in reference to the grant for the sewage treatment plant. Everything was fine after the last audit and they are now closing the account. The grant involved \$292,000 for a plant addition in





In a special session on Thursday, April 17, the Kewaskum Village Board decided to grant the Apollo's Lyre tavern a dance permit for Saturday, April 19. Previously at a regular meeting, the board had denied any dance permits to the establishment until June 30 when the tavern's liquor license is to come up for renewal

The special meeting was called upon the advice of village attorney Jerry Kiefer. He said that the previous denial action was inappropriate for two reasons. 1(No actual notice of that meeting was given directly to the owner-proprietors of Apollo's Lyre. 2(The matter came up under the general topic of appearances by citizens. Kiefer said that any item within this category could be acted upon only if it was of an emergency nature or an item not of considerable importance. He felt the issue of disturbances by some patrons of this establishment fit neither requirement.

Kiefer noted that usually a dance permit is not a board matter, but is received by the village clerk and granted if the provisions of the municipal code are met. Due to the controversy and the citizen appearances, it was referred to the village board for the final decision.

After a lengthy discussion, the board felt it had to grant the permit. This was done with certain restrictions. The village planned to have four of its patrolmen on duty that Saturday night instead of the usual two. This meant two officers inside the building and two in the squad car. Trustee Don Mlodzik also suggested that another two peace officers be present. The final motion to approve the permit had the stipulation that six officers remain until the crowd was adequately dispersed after closing

Trustee Herriges felt that the biggest problem was inadequate parking facilities. There is no designated lot, and parking must be done on public streets.

One citizen claimed the problem was that the type of establishment was not appropriate for that neighborhood. Presently, a dance hall featuring rock bands is a "non-conforming use" according to village ordinances but is allowed to remain in that residential area since it was present before the ordinances were enacted.

Another citizen claimed that nine-tenths of the problem would be eliminated if more bathroom facilities were on the premises, preventing patrons from gathering outside to relieve themselves

Chief of Police Don Hlavaty said that if drinks were not allowed out the door, people would not gather in the street long enough to create disturbances

Village President Jerry Stollenwerk claimed the problem was threefold: 1(loud music; 2(illegally parked cars; 3(noise, loitering, and damge after closing. Stollenwerk also emphasized that the proprietors had a moral responsibility to the neighborhood.

Lyre manager, said that the establishment wanted to comply with ordinances and was willing to do anything to keep peace. He also wished to run a business that would provide the young people with the type of bands they wished to hear.

On Monday, April 21, Administrator Dan Schmidt reported that the Saturday night dance occurred without any major incidents. The police dept. made a few arrests for outside drinking and littering. The crowd was limited to less than 100 and there were no problems with dispersing the crowd after 1 a.m.

ASCS Offers Farmers Two **Program Options**

All farmers growing corn, wheat, barley or grain sorghum in 1980 are eligible to participate in the Wheat and Feed Frain Program according to Ira A. Oelhafen, Chairperson of the Washington County Agricul-tural Stabilization and Conservation Committee

Higher target prices are guaranteed farmers who plant within the normal crop acreage (NCA). Consequently these producers could be eligible for higher deficiency payments as well as higher payments in event of crop disaster.

According to Oelhafen, it appears many farmers have been led to believe there is not a program because there is not a set-aside or divesion requirement. The Farm Bill of 1977 provides price support and targets for years 1978 thru 1981. Disaster provisions were again included for 1980 but will likely be dropped next year.

The question of a set-aside requirement and to what degree is an annual decision to be made by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland. Apparently conditions do not warrant the need for taking land out of production this year.

All farmers will be encouraged to report their acreages to the ASCS office after their planting is complete. The visit to report "intentions" prior to planting is not required, according to Oelhafen.

UW-Center Offers Bird Study Classes

The UW-Center in Fond du Lac is offering a series of classes for the study of our local birds. Classes will be held Thursday evenings at the campus from 7:30-9:00 p.m. beginning April 24 and continuing through the end of May. The classes will be taught by Bill Volkert, local bird expert and member of the Fond du Lac County Audobon Society, O. J. Gromme Bird Club and the

Wisconsin Society for Ornithology. The programs will feature lectures on identification of birds, their behavior, ecology and other topics of special interest. There also will be slide presentations, a variety of displays, and time for open discussion during each class. The classes may be taken individually or as an entire series.

Each class will be supplemented with a field trip every Saturday morning following the lectures. The class will visit unique bird habitats around the area, including Horicon Marsh. Lake Michigan and the Kettle Moraine Forest, and emphasis will be on the application and practice of classroom material. Car pooling will be available for the field trips.


