Sign-up for Swim Passes, Swim And Tennis Lessons Scheduled

The Village of Kewaskum has scheduled the sale of season swim passes, swim lesson registration and tennis lesson registration for May 23, 27, 28, 29 and 30, from 3:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. and May 24 and 31, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Municipal Building. Future dates will be announced. The beach is scheduled to open May 31, with the swim lesson scheduled to begin June 16.

Daniel Schaefer Receives Doctor of Philosophy Degree

Bethany Lutheran Junior College in Mankato, Minnesota, followed by the University of Wisconsin-Madison where he received his bachelor's and master's degrees in meat and animal science. In Urbana, Illinois, Dan completed the courses necessary for a Ph.D. and then spent thousands (according to his wife, tens of thousands!) of hours in the laboratory until his research project was completed. His thesis was titled "Determination of Ammonia Saturation Constants for Several Pure Strains of Predominant Rumen Bacteria."

At Purdue University, Dan is responsible for establishing a research program in the combined areas of rumen microbiology and ruminant nutrition, developing and teaching a graduate level course in rumen microbiology, and supervising a ruminant nutrition laboratory. This past semester, he taught one-half of a course in introductory animal science for 180 students.

Dr. Dan is married to Gail Kottke of Fond du Lac and they have one son, Jeremy Paul Ray.

Dan is appreciate of the encouragement and support offered to him during his schooling by numerous members of the Kewaskum community. Although he rarely finds someone who knows the location of his hometown, he does tell them that he is a Kewaskum native.

Daniel M. Schaefer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Schaefer of Route 2, Kewaskum, formally received his doctor of philosophy degree during commencement exercises at the University of Illinois on May 18, 1980.

Sidewalk Issue Brought Up Again

Improved Storm Sewer System on Edgewood Road Mulled by Board

The Kewaskum Village Board, at their meeting Monday night, agreed to look into means of financing an improved storm sewer system along Edgewood Road.

Last September a petition from residents along Edgewood asked for improvements to eliminate the hazards associated with an open ditch between the 2 lanes of the street. This winter, residents also complained to the board about flooding as a result of culvert freeze up within the ditch.

Administrator Dan Schmidt, Supt. of Public Works Augie Bilgo, and the Village Engineers, Foth and Van Dyke of Green Bay, all recommended one alternative that called for installing a 48" storm sewer that would increase to 54" near the northern lower end of the street. The present ditch would then be filled in, eliminating the dangers of possible drowning, weeds and animal pests.

The sources of the drainage problem are many. The grade of the ditch is very slight - only 38 inches of drop from the southern end to the northern end. The elevation of the land in the area is 950 feet at Brooklane Dr. on the south, 947 feet near the mid-section of the street, and 949 feet near Knights Ave. at the northern end. The present culvert widths go from 36" on the south to 48" and then back

to a smaller 42" on the north. Also impeding the drainage is silt which washes in from the sides of the ditch and from the surrounding wet lands to eventually plug culverts at intersections crossing the ditch.

Schmidt presented 6 proposals for dealing with the problem. The first proposal called for a larger diameter storm sewer able to handle a 10-year peak rainfall along the entire length of Edgewood, but was the most costly - a possible \$310,216. The second and third proposals were for paving the ditch with concrete or asphalt, but water flowage in the area is so constant that this is impractical. The fourth proposal of a smaller enclosed storm sewer was the most practical and average in cost - a possible \$128,328. A fifth proposal called for 2 side-by-side storm sewer pipes, first at the intersections and later along the entire length of Edgewood - at a possible cost of \$247,118. The sixth proposal

Memories...

Back in September of 1929, through the efforts and courtesy of the H. J. Lay Lumber Company of Kewaskum, the big fir log of the West Coast Manufacturers Association stopped in the village for about a half hour to give local people an opportunity to pass through it. Both the high school and parochial schools closed to enable the students to see this wonder. Since the log started on its travel through 32 states, more than a million and a half people viewed it. The log is cut from an immense Douglas fir tree in Washington that was 311 feet high and more than nine feet in diameter. E. A. Wade, who is in charge of the log, had to cut about 20 feet from the butt in order to get one not more than eight feet in diameter, which was as large as he would be permitted to travel with on some highways. The tree yielded

nine more logs, each 22 feet long and contained in all some 50,000 board feet of lumber, enough to build four six-room houses. Wade named the tree "Columbus," for by counting the annual rings of growth, he discovered that the tree was 434 years old when cut in 1926, "born" in 1492, the year Columbus discovered America. It took three men five weeks to hollow out the log, used in making his home. When their work was completed the interior of the log consisted of a wardrobe, two folding beds, dining table with folding seats at each end, eight-drawer cabinet with work table, two cupboards, china closet, gasolene cook stove, electric lights, electric heater and fan. Several hundred people passed through the log here.

Conduct Drug Investigation In County

Friday, May 16, 1980, brought to a close a drug investigation conducted in Washington County for the past year and a half. Several officers from Washington, Sheboygan and Waukesha counties working undercover wrapped up their investigation, requesting warrants on fifty (50) individuals which involved 107 charges in a four county area.

The operation being named "Whisk Broom" went into effect on Friday, May 16, 1980, at 10:00 a.m. with officers from Washington County, City of West Bend, City of Hartford, Villages of Germantown and Kewaskum, as well as officers from the Sheboygan Police Department assisting.

The sweep has included several search warrants, as well as body warrants, and some confiscation of motor vehicles. Types of drugs involved that were sold to undercover agents during this period were: marijuana, hashish, speed, cocaine, LSD, codeine, crystal meth and sensimillia. Amounts ranged from small amounts of marijuana to pounds; grams of cocaine to ounces; one hit of LSD to purchases of 1,000; and one or two hits of speed to purchases of over 200.

The Sheriff's Department was concerned about the drug sales in Washington County and instructed the investigators to concentrate their efforts to the people selling the drugs at a profit. For the past year and a half this was done. The Sheriff's Department and District Attor-

ney's office worked continually with the investigators involved, keeping them abreast of recent court decisions, investigative methods and proper procedures in order to have the investigation become a success. The rapport and cooperation with other agencies within as well as outside the county was at its best.

Hopefully the success of this investigation will remove a quantity of dope pushers from the streets and instill in the minds of others who might have avoided being caught, that Washington County will not be green pastures for this kind of activity and chances are that if they continue they also will end up in jail.

was merely replacement of 2 smaller storm sewers at intersections, but this didn't really solve any of the problems.

The 4th plan allowed for drainage into the storm sewer through drainage manholes. There would also be a 51" drop and it would intersect a small stream at the north end at an angle to facilitate drainage, although an easement would have to be obtained from Nick Stoffel for this. The southern intake area would be completely sodded to prevent erosion.

Schmidt and Bilgo cautioned that the 4th alternative would not solve all the problems: Every 2 years, there may be a rain of 1 inch per hour which the storm sewer could not handle immediately.

Schmidt said the potential cost could be reduced by having village personnel and a contractor, Nick Mueller, shoot the grades and eliminate the 16% engineering cost. Two members of the village crew might also assist in cleaning out the present pipes for relocation, building new manholes, and backfilling. Surprisingly, Mueller had stated the work could be done in 10 work days and Schmidt reported, "we could possibly do the project for \$60,000 . . . if everything would go good." Some pipe could be obtained cheaply from Armco of Illinois - the virtual inventors of culvert.

Board members and Dave Berndes, an Edgewood area resident, were impressed with the presentation and proposal. But Trustee Paul Blumer had the clinching question of where the village would come up with \$60,000. Schmidt had said there was only about \$3,000 in the Village Improvement Fund, but he said a loan from the Kewaskum branch of West Bend Savings and Loan was a possibility. Another means of financing was general obligation bonds through the Tax Incremental Financing Program if that is approved for the village.

The board admonished Schmidt to further investigate the financing of the project as described in the recommended 4th proposal.

John Tessar, President of the

Kewaskum Board of Education, wished the board to consider once again the extension of sidewalks to the southside subdivision of Bel-Ric Acres. Tessar said that 5 or 6 years ago, another school board member, Dr. Charles Ogi, had inquired about sidewalks as a means of reducing bussing costs. Tessar presented some present figures showing that the school district could save \$16,000 annually by providing a safe walkway to school. He said 163 school children are bussed this year from Bel-Ric at a cost of \$73.91 per day and \$13,303.80 per year. With an approximate \$1,040 for gas, the total cost of transportation was \$14,343.

For the 1980-81 school year, the bussing cost for these students would be \$14,799 plus about \$1,664 for gas, bringing the total transportation cost to \$16,463 - an increase of about \$2100 from last year. Tessar wished to know, "what are the plans for the future for sidewalks . . .?" He referred to sidewalks leading to Bel-Ric and not necessarily sidewalks within the subdivision.

Trustee Raynor Herriges said that 5 years ago the board had looked at the problem and "didn't know where to go with sidewalks," as the terrain does not lend itself to sidewalks without additional improvements at high cost. He also wondered how they would be cleared each winter morning by 7 a.m. Trustee Dave Nigh was in favor of sidewalks but said they should be installed throughout the entire village if they are put anywhere at all. Village Board President Jerry Stollenwerk referred the issue to the Public Works Committee.

Tessar also wished to have the village board consider a different cost sharing ratio for replacement of burned out lights on the athletic field used mutually by the village and the school district. This year 23 bulbs are being replaced by the school at a cost of \$516.75. Tessar said the village uses the athletic field all summer for baseball leagues and that the school district shouldn't get this "big bill."

Trustee Dave Nigh claimed only 2 leagues use the field and that perhaps increased charges

to athletic events were in order. He didn't wish to see much more money spent on this older facility. Stollenwerk turned this matter over to the Parks and Recreation Committee.

Carl Spoeth, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee, reported that the picture identification card-season swim passes would be available Friday, May 23, Saturday, May 24, and Tuesday, May 27 through Saturday, May 31, at the Municipal Building. This year, instead of wearing a patch, swimmers must present a card which must be checked in a basket. As a disciplinary action to any misbehaving swimmers, the ID may be taken away for a few days. A lost ID will cost \$1.00 to replace.

Spoeth said the beach in the new park would open on May 31 with swim lessons starting on June 16. Lessons will be for 4 week periods and specific times have not been determined. Tennis lessons will start June 9.

The board also agreed to have an article published encouraging citizens to report any vandalism in the parks.

Upon the recommendation of Augie Bilgo, the board approved a bid of \$5,998 for the re-roofing of 2 shelters in the old park, pumphouse 2, and the reservoir, by Carroll Haug and Sons. This includes a gravel surface, asphalt, and insulation board.

Bilgo added that bids for asphalt village streets will be opened June 2. The resurfacing of Prospect Drive will be listed as an alternate bid when the Town of Kewaskum engages its asphalt contractor.

Schmidt reported that the new Permutit sludge condition-

er will finally be in operation on Tuesday or Wednesday of this week.

Village Commissioner Bill Martin and Administrator Schmidt were authorized to attend the League of Wisconsin Municipalities seminar at Wisconsin Dells June 17 through June 20.

Administrative Committee Chairman Dave Nigh recommended, and the board approved, an updated disability, life, and accidental death insurance policy for village employees through Blue Cross-Blue Shield. This would cost the village \$183.75 per month or \$1598 per year, just under the \$1600 allocated in the budget.

Mrs. Jean Moe will be refunded some \$550 in overpayment of taxes due to an error. A sale of some property was somehow not recorded and she was overcharged for the past 3 years.

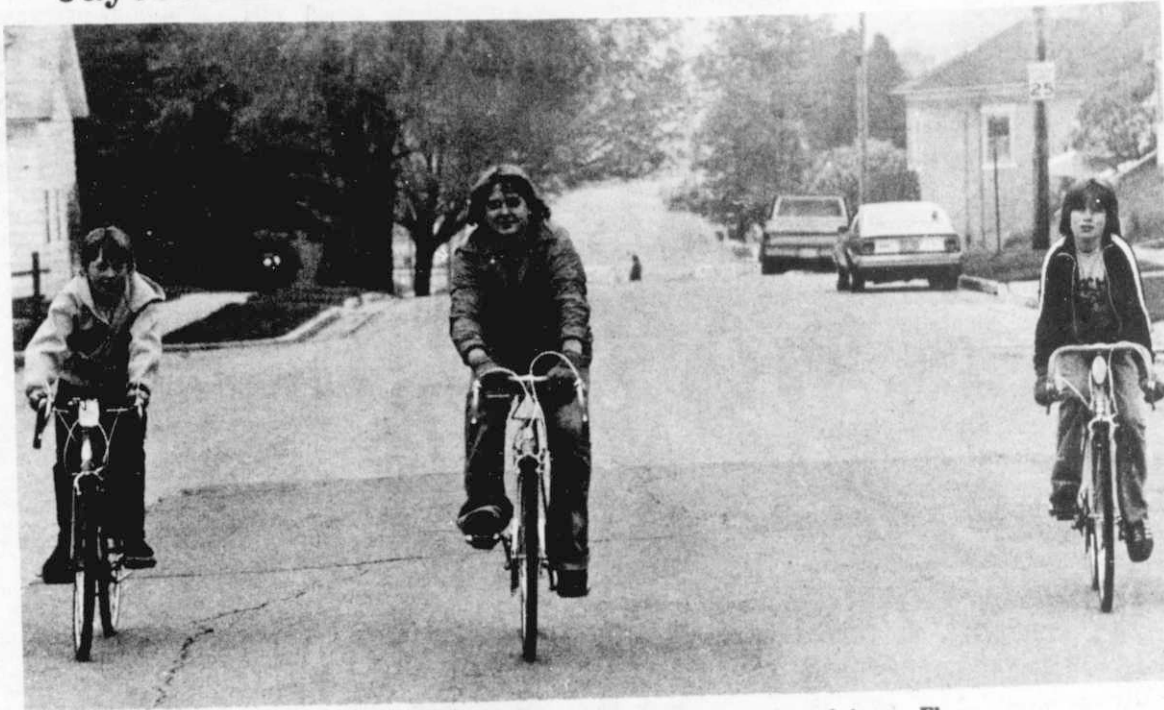

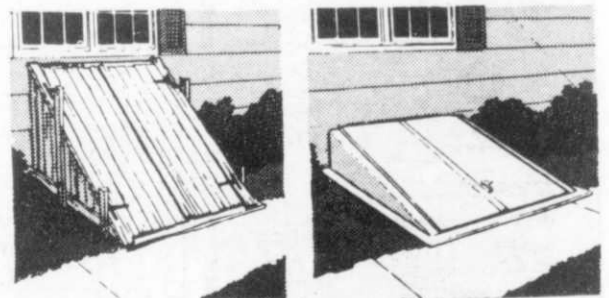

Have you ever wondered about these different cheeses? How they are made? Why so many kinds? Why they taste so different? What they are made of? Where they are made? Who makes them?

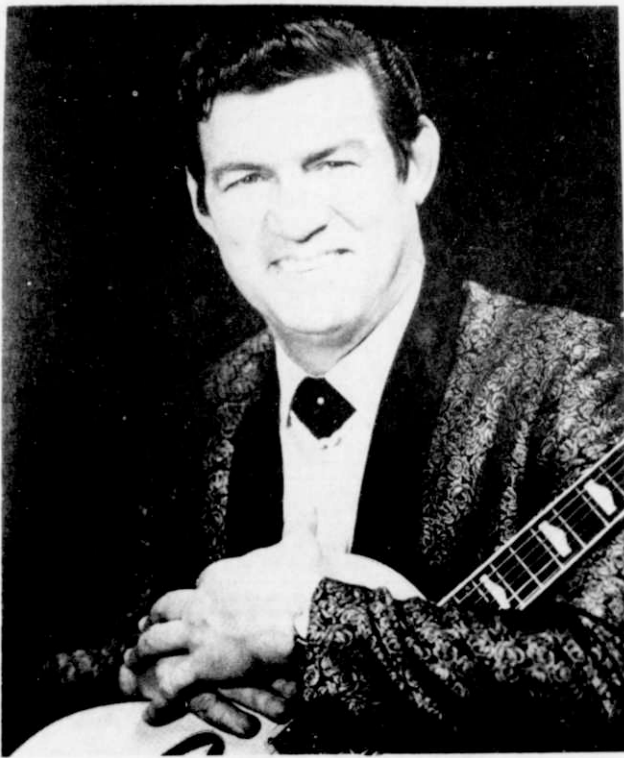

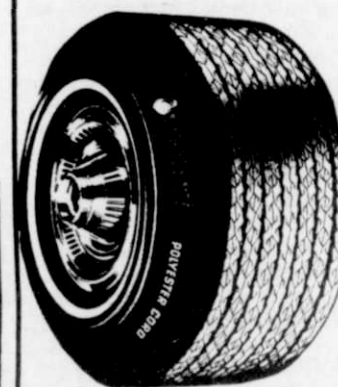
The three "CERTIFICATE OF MERIT" awards will be presented as a result of a near-fatal car/pedestrian accident on January 13, 1980 on Hwy. 60 near Slinger. The 61 year old, seriously injured pedestrian victim, reportedly stopped breathing as he lay injured along-side the roadway. Three ladies who happened upon the scene, before ambulance and police arrived, were attending to the victim, when he apparently stopped breathing.

Their quick, effective efforts of administering CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) reportedly restored breathing to the victim, who was transported to the Hartford Memorial Hospital to recover from his serious injuries. Washington County

Sheriff's deputies arrived on the scene in time to witness the successful efforts of the three ladies in reviving the victim. The deputy sheriff's in turn recommended the ladies receive the "CERTIFICATE OF MERIT" award.

Sheriff Schwartz noted that this is one of the many life-saving acts that occur each year. Unfortunately, not all are brought to their attention. Fink to Seek Re-election As District Attorney

Fred A. Fink, Jr., District Attorney for Washington County, announced that he would again seek re-election to the position as the county's chief prosecutor. Fink cited the importance of maintaining continuity, experience, and professionalism in the protection of the public and in prosecution of lawbreakers as the basis for his decision to seek a third term as District Attorney.

"By seeking re-election as Washington County District Attorney, I intend to continue to pursue the efficient and aggressive prosecution of offenders that this County has had historically. With the vast population increase in the County, the rise of crime, and the rapid changes in the criminal law, it is important to have a career

prosecutor, a specialist, as District Attorney. I feel that I can provide those important facets to prosecution in this county. In addition, the close working relationship which has been developed between the Office of the District Attorney, the various law enforcement agencies of the county, and the Courts, will be continued. This is of vital importance, for, with such uniformity of approach, the criminal justice system may then efficiently proceed to serve and protect the citizenry of the County."

Fink has been a prosecutor the vast majority of his legal career. Prior to his election as District Attorney in 1976, and re-election in 1978, he served as Assistant District Attorney for Washington County and in the Dane County District Attorney's Office. Fink has prosecuted all types of major criminal cases in his years as a prosecutor.

Fink has long advocated the necessity of providing the public with more efficient and professional prosecutorial services. He has been outspoken in this regard in his positions as Legislative Chairman and Vice-President of the Wisconsin District Attorneys Association. Fink currently serves as Secretary of that group, and will be its President in 1982.

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. Facilities for Handicapped At State Parks

Thirty-seven state parks and forests have specially designed picnic facilities to accommodate physically handicapped individuals and their families. In addition, 28 state parks and forests provide campsites that are designed for use by the physically handicapped.

These campsites and picnic facilities are located relatively close to restroom facilities that are considered barrier free. Hard-surfaced paths have been constructed for those requiring wheelchairs and others with walking impairments. Parking lots have specially reserved handicapped parking stalls located convenient to the picnic areas. In addition, most parks have made modifications to water fountains, telephones and other facilities to accommodate handicapped persons.

Information on the location of facilities for the handicapped in state parks and forests is available at park and forest headquarters. Inquire when you arrive.

Campsites with special facilities for the handicapped may be reserved in advance under the advance campsite reservation program. Regular advance campsite reservation application forms may be used to reserve these sites.

State parks and forests with these handicapped facilities are identified in the new State Park and Forest "Visitors Guide" which can be obtained by writing to DNR, Box 7921, Madison, WI 53707. State Parks and Forests with handicapped facilities are also identified in the 1980-81 Official State Highway Map prepared and distributed by the Department of Transportation.

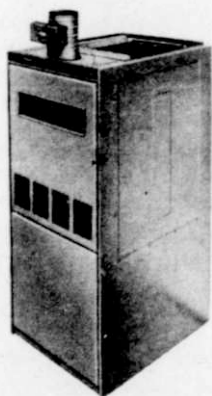

Indian Girls 4th, Boys 5th in County Outdoor Track Meet

The Washington County Outdoor Track Meet was held at Germantown last Wednesday. Germantown, led by two of the fastest prep runners in the state, Jerry Vance and Todd Hernandez, won the boys' end of the meet with 117 points. Kewaskum placed fifth with 55. West Bend East took the girls' title with 128 points. The Kewaskum girls wound up fourth with 64.

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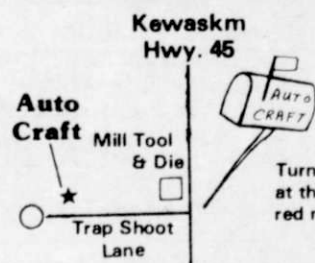
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Golfers Second in Quadrangular; Tip Kettle, Green Lake

Scott Stern, Kewaskum, brought in his 6.5 lb., 31 3/4 northern just under the deadline. He made his catch in the Milwaukee River in town.

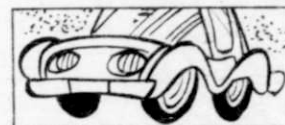
Donald Koerble, Long Lake, won the bass category with a beautiful 3.3 lb., 18 1/2" large mouth taken on Long Lake.

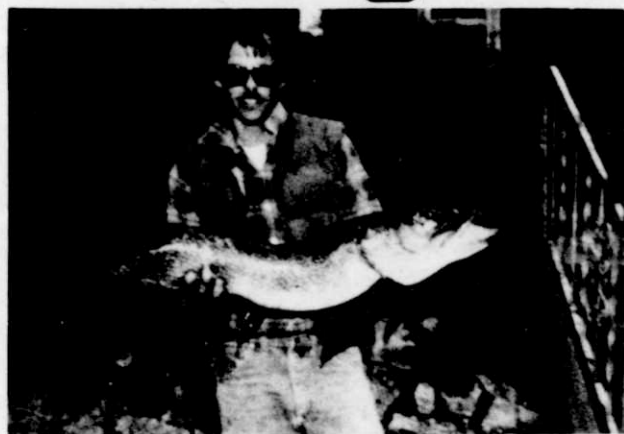
