### 15.75% Increase in Tax Levy Expected

## Propose \$4.5 Million School Budget for '80-81

The Budget Committee of the Kewaskum Board of Education met on Tuesday, May 20, and heard a budget proposal for the 1980-81 school year involving some \$4,550,707.

This represents a \$490,759, or a 12.09% increase in expenditures over last year's \$4,059,948.

As for revenues, General State Aid is expected to increase from \$1,610,796 in 1979-80 to \$1,719,124 in 1980-81. This represents a \$108,328, or a 6.72% increase. Although state aids are increasing slightly, it is not enough to offset the rising costs for school operation.

Therefore, the local tax levy is expected to increase some 15.75% or \$346,225. In 1979-80, the local levy was \$2,198,208 and the proposed 1980-81 levy would be \$2,544,433.

The levy rate last year was 9.4127 per \$1,000, and for 1980-81, it may be 9.905 per \$1,000. According to Business Manager Bob Borch, the levy rate is "strictly a guess" and won't be known exactly until next fall. The State Dept. of Revenue was contacted and estimated that equalized valu-

ation may increase 10%.

The committee will meet again on June 2 to determine a tentative budget that will be presented to the entire board on June 9.

Borch also said the budget will include no expenses beyond those needed to maintain the schools' day to day operation. He asserted this was a "bare bones budget from the start" and asked, "who can afford big items this year?" There are no funds available for the upgrading of the football field or the remodeling of the administrative office.

Superintendent of Schools, Floyd Brenholt, said there were no significant staff cuts or changes for the upcoming year. One position will be eliminated at the Kewaskum Elementary School, but this only means that one teacher will be transferred to the Wayne Elementary School where there has been a resignation. At the high school level, one-half position in agriculture will be cut, but there will be about a two-fifths position added in German and English. Also, one intern teacher in art will be hired for one semester, and two interns in English will be hired - one for each semester.

## Vicar Lindau to Serve St. John Lutheran Church at New Fane

A special service of worship will be held this Sunday at St. John Lutheran Church of New Fane, with a potluck dinner following to welcome Vicar Robert Lindau and his family. Sunday morning worship will be at 9:30 a.m. instead of the regular 8:15 a.m. time.

St. John has been without a pastor since January 1, 1980, when Rev. Arthur Haupt, pastor there for 20 years, accepted a call to Grace Lutheran Church of San Diego, California. During this vacancy, they have been

served by Rev. Robert Wilcken of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Town of Scott.

Vicar Lindau is a student at Concordia Seminary of Fort Wayne, Indiana. He will serve his year of vicarage (or internship) at St. John prior to being ordained. Vicar Lindau will preach at both the 6:30 p.m. Saturday service and at the special 9:30 a.m. Sunday service. Following the Sunday service, the congregation will gather for a potluck dinner to meet and welcome him and his family.

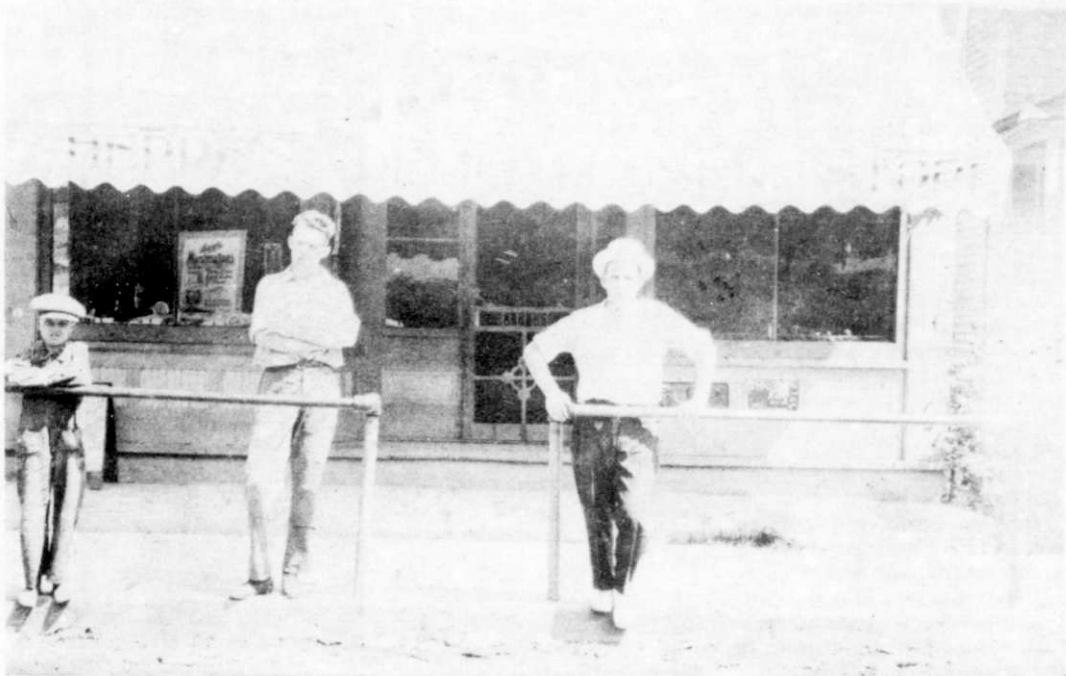

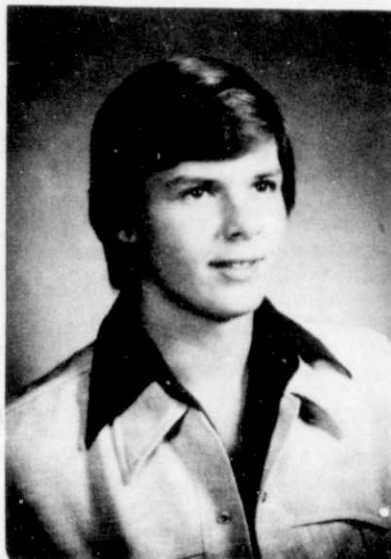

If one stops learning, one stops growing. This is definitely

true in agriculture. Education is a continuous process. I must seize opportunities made available to me to stay on top of constantly changing methods, whether I decide to use them or not. Experience is its own teacher. I have learned many things by past experience and I am sure this is the case in the agricultural field.

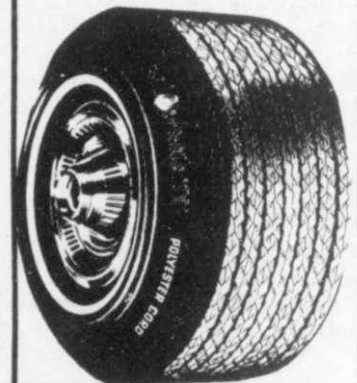

### Seefeldt Announces Candidacy for Full Term as Treasurer

WEST BEND — Fredric A. Seefeldt, Washington County Treasurer, today announced that he will be a candidate for election to a full two year term as County Treasurer on the Republican ticket.

"I am pleased to report that since taking office last fall, cash management procedures have been improved, the maximum amount of dollars were made available to take advantage of record interest rates, and that overall operations of the County Treasurer's office have been strengthened," declared Seefeldt.

Seefeldt has been serving as County Treasurer since being sworn into office September 21, 1979. He was appointed by the Washington County Board of Supervisors to fill a vacancy in the position. Seefeldt was selected from a field of thirteen applicants.

"1979 was a million dollar year for the County Treasurer's office. Interest earned from investments, interest on delinquent taxes and service fees totaled \$1,000,363.45," Seefeldt stated.

"Every dollar that the County Treasurer can produce by prudently investing unexpended appropriations means one less dollar that has to be raised by the property tax in Washington County," Seefeldt commented.

"Record high interest rates presented me with extraordinary opportunities to produce

interest income during the fourth quarter 1979 and the first quarter 1980. For example, I was able to invest \$4 million following tax settlement this year at a weighted average yield of 16.71%," Seefeldt reported.

"I am also pleased with the 1979 audit report which indicates that there have been significant improvements in the operation of the Treasurer's office since I assumed responsibility for its management," said Seefeldt.

A Washington County native, Seefeldt grew up in the Town of Kewaskum and is a graduate of the Kewaskum Public Schools. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree with honors from Lakeland College, Sheboygan, in 1960. He received his Master of Divinity degree from The Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago in 1965.

Seefeldt served as Home Secretary to the late Congressman William A. Steiger from 1969-1979. He has been secretary-treasurer of A. H. Seefeldt, Inc., a Kewaskum insur-

ance agency, since 1965. In 1978, he was the Republican candidate for Secretary of State of Wisconsin.

The County Treasurer is a member of the Board of Directors, Work Adjustment Services, Inc.; the Board of Directors, Lakeland College Alumni Association; and past president and member, Directing Committee, Lutheran Campus Ministry, UW-Oshkosh. He is active in the Wisconsin County Treasurer's Association. He holds memberships in the Ministerium of the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Synod, Lutheran Church in America; the Izaak Walton League of America; the Smithsonian Institute Associates and the Washington County Republican Party.

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage prepaid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election if applying in person, or 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before the election if applying by mail.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.

The minutes of the meeting of May 5 were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik. Voice vote was unanimous.

John Tessar, President of the School Board discussed with the Board the possibility of installing sidewalk to the Bel-Ric

Acres Subdivision with the possibility of eliminating the bus-ing of children to and from this area at an estimated cost saving of approximately \$14,000 per year to the School District. Mr. Tessar also stated that the School Board felt that a more equitable means of cost sharing for the maintenance of the athletic field lights be worked out. Both requests were referred to committee for their recommendation.

Two proposals for the repair of the roofs of two park shelter stands and the roof of number 2 water pump house and reservoir were received and were tabulated as follows: Haug Roofing Co., West Bend \$5,998.00, Dehling-Voigt, Inc., Newburg \$7,160.00.

Motion was made by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik that the proposal of Haug Roofing Co. be accepted. Roll call vote was 7 "Yes" and 0 "No" in favor of the motion.

The Commissioner and the Administrator were authorized to attend the League of Wisconsin Municipalities Clerk's, Treasurer's and Finance Officer's Seminar at Wisconsin Dells on June 17 thru the 20th. Motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Blumer. Voice vote was unanimous.

Administrator Schmidt explained to the Board Members six alternate plans to correct the storm water problem and to eliminate the open drainage ditch on Edgewood Road. The estimated cost of each plan ranged from a low of \$22,310 to a high of \$310,216. It was recommended that alternate plan 4 was the most practical at an estimated total cost of approximately \$127,328. Motion was made by Trustee Spoeth, seconded by Trustee Rohrer that the administrator investigate the possibility of securing financing for alternate plan No. 4. Voice vote was unanimous.

The request for a street light on the south end of Memorial Drive was referred to the Public Services Committee.

Administrator Schmidt reported on the attempt being made by the State Library Board to establish a county wide library system.

Trustee Nigh, Chairman of the Administrative Committee, reported that his committee recommends that the village's sickness, disability and accidental death benefits be updated to provide for weekly benefits of \$150.00 per week for up to 52 weeks and accidental death benefit of \$5,000. 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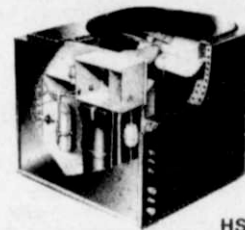
