Boys Take a 3rd, Pettit 4th, Girls Relay 6th

Kewaskum Girls State Champions In 1600 Meter Relay Track Event

Kewaskum and Washington County athletes made impressive showings in the WIAA State Track Tournament held Friday and Saturday in Madi-

Kewaskum, West Bend East, West Bend West, Slinger and Germantown all qualified athletes Friday for Saturdays finals.

Representing the Scenic Moraine Conference, Kewaskum's girls 1600 meter relay team brought home another state championship, Germantown's Jerry Vance successfully defended his title in the 300 meter low hurdles (Class A), and Slinger's Cathy Branta, for the second year in a row, was a double winner in the 1600 meter run 3200 meter run.

Kewaskum's winning runners in the 1600 meter relay event were Laurie and Barb Wilson, Diane Bremser and Julann Zemlicka, the same foursome that took a first in the mile relay in 1978. Last year, Laurie Wilson injured her knee, and with Carrie Dreher filling in, they placed sixth.

The Indian girls had only the third best time in Friday's trials and had their work cut out for them in order to win the event Saturday. Their championship time Saturday was 4:04.03, slightly higher that Friday's 4:03.18, but the wind may have been a factor in the higher time.

The Kewaskum boys 880 relay unit, coming up with a new school record, took a third in the 800 meter relay event with a time of 1:32.90, and just got nipped in the last 10 yards for second. 384 of the American Legion School Board Struggles With \$4.5 Million Budget

The Kewaskum Board of Education wrestled with a bleak \$4.5 million budget situation for the coming year at its June 9 meeting. No substantial cutbacks could be approved by the budget committee, and the rest of the board was admonished to look over computer printouts and come up with any possible suggestions for the next meeting on June 23.

Prior to the main business of the meeting, the Outstanding Young Educator Award was presented to John Stephani, a 4th grade teacher at Kewaskum Elementary School, by John Meilahn, President of the Kewaskum Jaycees. Mr. Stephani said he was surprised and very honored to receive the award. He accepted it in behalf of the students, parents, and fine staff he has worked with at KES.

Budget Committee Chairman John Tessar reported that "The committee could not come up with a heck of a lot." The only recommendation they could make was to cut \$7,000 by discontinuing a late bus which

would affect about 65 students in extracurricular activities. The only other cut was an anticipated \$3,000 savings on language arts texts. Tessar said that each classroom, each extracurricular area, and each sporting event had been scrutinized. Some \$300,000 had already been cut by staff and administrators before the budget went to committee.

With these minor changes, the 1980-81 budget will be increased by \$480,789 or 11.84% to \$4,540,707. The General State Aids will increase \$103,257 or 6.41% \$1,714,053. This means that the remaining 5.43% of the total increase will most likely come from the local tax levy of some \$2,539,504. This is up \$341,296 and the increase in the levy appears to be 15.52%.

The reasons for the tight budget are inflation, a smaller increase in state aid than usual, and a past history of the district to spend considerably less per student than the state average.

"Inflation has finally hit the Kewaskum School District,

exclaimed Tessar. The prime example of this is gasoline prices. In 1979-80, \$87,000 had been budgeted with \$98,000 being the anticipated actual expenditure. For 1980-81, \$160,000 has been budgeted. Cost increases run across the board. For example, the newly approved bussing contract with Johnson Bus will increase 11.24%, utility costs will increase over 20%, and a 10% increase in support personnel salaries has been approved. Most of the budget involves fixed costs over which the district has no real control. Supt. of Schools Floyd Brenholt said that those items that the district has control over as additional workbooks or audio-visual equipment have already been cut.

State Aids are based upon enrollment which is presently increasing slightly, although a declining enrollment is expected in about 4 years. Although the aids will increase by 6%, Tessar noticed that "State Aid is not keeping up with inflation," which he estimated at 18%. Brenholt commented, "If the state is allowing a 10% increase in spending, then why aren't they increasing their state aids 10½%? The state isn't maintaining its share.

He blamed some of the budget problems on the fluctuating nature of state aids. He said that local tax levies had varied between being up 20.5% in 1973-74, because, "Every year the state changes the share it pays."

Brenholt also commented that the Kewaskum District has consistently spent considerably less per student than the state average - about ½ million dollars less each year when totalled. He said those districts which were near or above the state average can now make further cuts whereas Kewaskum can not.

Brenholt said that Kewaskum had been within the 9½ limit increase per student set by the state, but because of increasing enrollment, the increase per student may be over 11.8%. He said that the district is allowed to increase its expenditures the same amount that the state average increases. Like many other districts, Kewaskum will be appealing its increase in

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expenditure on gasoline.

At a recent budget committee meeting, school building principals attended to comment on equipment replacement, staff and extracurricular travel, and field trips. Equipment includes only a few new items - e.g. an automatic tire changer for high school use, about 100 new desks which either must be replaced or refinished at additional cost, and athletic uniform replacement for \$4,450. Many uniforms get double duty and are worn for different sports as girls volleyball and basketball.

The principals and committee agreed that at least 1 field trip per class per year should be maintained at a total cost of \$7,167. Travel between schools by specialists - art and music teachers and special educators-is necessary at a cost of \$8,061.

One major necessary repair item is a leaky roof in the old high school gym. Estimates on this range from \$8,000 for an aluminum emulsion and fiberglass sheeting installation to \$13,200 for a plastic type coatting.

Board member Richard Theusch mentioned that some 1/4 million dollars in back taxes coming in this August might be used to offset the tax levy for next year. Brenholt said this was a possibility but that there would then be about a \$100,000 increase in the following year's budget. Theusch also added that this might mean payroll could not be met sometime in the fall without taking out a loan at a certainly high interest rate. Brenholt noted that this amount should really be used in about 2

years to assist with debt ser-

About 10 citizens concerned about the budget were in the audience. Joe Miller was concerned about the use of 6 vehicles throughout the district and wondered if they were an expense in the summer. Business Manager Bob Borch assured him that during the summer, insurance was cancelled and the keys were locked up so that they were no expense.

Harold Manthei, in an impassioned declaration, claimed it was worth \$16,000 to bus children from Bel-Ric Acres for educational purposes as opposed to bussing athletes to distant cities within the conference. He suggested less emphasis on sports and more on basic education as they have done in Ohio. "We don't need any more basketball, football, baseball - we need kids that are educated, that know something when they're out of school."

The board members will peruse the budget prior to the next meeting. When the board approves an acceptable budget, it will be presented to the public at the annual meeting in July. Tessar welcomed budget-related suggestions from anyone.

In other action, the board elected Jean Goeden on a unanimous ballot as its new Vice President. The position is now required by the state in the event that the President is unable to preside.

Mark Roth, 25, will teach middle school language arts and be head boys track coach. He attended UW-Madison and UW-La Crosse.

At the high school, Therese Rosenthal, 25, will be the new German and English teacher as well as AFS advisor and German Club advisor. She attended UWWC and UW-Oshkosh.
