Firemen-Legion Picnic July 12-13

The annual Kewaskum Firemen-Legion fund-raising picnic will be held in the village park on Saturday evening and Sunday, July 12 and 13.

Saturday night there will be women's water fights at 6:30 p.m. In the beer garden Rock and Roll music will be supplied by Danny and the Sunliners from 7 to 11 p.m. All of the rides, refreshment and food stands will be in operation.

A highlight of the picnic will be another excellent parade at 12:00 noon sharp which will start off the festivities on Sunday. The parade again will be led by the Milwaukee Civic Riders Motorcycle Club and will feature ten or more bands and drum and bugle corps as well as drill teams. These include the Kewaskum High School Band, Hartford Municipal Band, Old Mapleton Circus Band, Georgie Girls, Royal Knights Drum and Bugle Corps, West Bend Patriots, Wisconsin Lutheran Adult Band, Wisconsin Lutheran Cadet Band, Royal Vanguard Color Guard, and the Random Lake High School Band.

Other units will include beautiful floats, baton twirlers, majorettes, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, comic entries, orchestras, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations and more.

The parade will form on the high school campus and adja-

cent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up no later than 11:30 a.m. Persons wishing to enter the parade should contact Bob Staehler, parade chairman. Theme for this year's parade will be "LOOKING TOWARDS THE 80's." Businessmen, industries and organizations are urged to enter a float. Prizes will be awarded for the best floats and kiddies' specialties (groups).

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps in the park. There will be continuous music throughout the afternoon and evening. In the beer garden, music will be by Syl Groeschel's Orchestra from 2 to 6 p.m. and Bernie Fechter and his orchestra will entertain Sunday afternoon on the stage. In the evening Wisconsin's Kings of County Rock, featuring Ida Red, from 7:30 to 11:30 p.m. will play in the beer garden.

Men's water fights will again be held at 6:30 p.m. Sunday with neighboring fire departments competing.

Advance tickets are on sale for \$800 in cash prizes and 106 valuable merchandise prizes. Tickets may be purchased for \$1.00 from firemen and Legion members as well as at some area establishments.

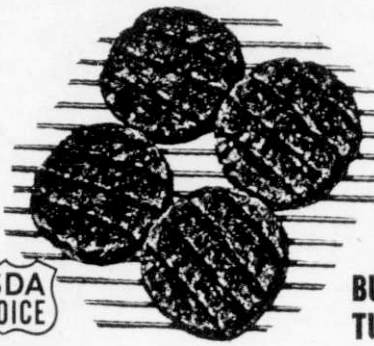

This year's recipient is a 4th grade teacher at Kewaskum Elementary School, John Stephani. Mr. Stephani is 29 years old and has a wife, Kathleen, and two children, Mark (4 years) and Amie (8 months).

He received his bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin-Superior in 1973 and his master's degree from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh in 1978.

The Jaycees "Outstanding Young Farmer" award is presented annually to a local farmer between the ages of 18-36, who exhibits progress in farming for both himself and his community.

This year's award was presented by Jaycee President John Meilahn at the annual FFA awards banquet on May 7 to Michael Lettow.

Mike's farm, which he bought from his father in September, 1973, consists of 200 acres, 20 of which is rented, 33 milk cows and 39 head of young stock. He has a very complete soil conservation program: 64 acres of land are farmed in contour strips with a 2-1-3 rotation (i.e. 2 years of corn, 1 year of oats, then 3 years of hay); he has 11 acres set aside for wildlife, 4 acres of protected woodlot, and he utilizes approximately 15,000 feet of drainage tile to prevent soil erosion.

Mike's name is now added to a list of impressive young farmers which includes last year's winner of the award, Dennis Terlinden.

If you happen to see any of these three fine young men on the street or in a local shop, congratulate them on their awards and also for helping to make Kewaskum a fine place in which to live.

County Fairest Of Fair Contest

If you are single female resident of Washington County and will be 18 to 22 years of age by January 1, 1981, you are encouraged to enter the Sixth Annual Washington County Fairest of the Fair Contest. It will be held on Wednesday night, July 26, at the county fairgrounds in Slinger. The young lady selected will be the official hostess of the Washington County Junior Fair. Her duties will require her to be present Thursday through Sunday at the fair to hand out ribbons, make various appearances and announce stage shows. She will also be eligible to participate in the state contest at the convention of the Wisconsin Association of Fairs in January of 1981. The winner of the state competition will be the Fairest of the Fair at the Wisconsin State Fair in 1981.

Judges selected for the competition will choose the qualified young lady who can best reflect warmth, friendship and intelligence through her personality, poise, appearance, community activity, and speaking ability. It is not to be confused with a "beauty" contest.

These are the guidelines and qualifications each candidate must meet:

- This contest is open to all girls who have been a resident of Washington County for at least one year prior to entry.

- This girl must reach her 18th birthday by January 1, 1981. Therefore, being eligible to compete in the State contest, but must not have reached her 22nd birthday by the same date.

- Contestant agrees that the time, manner and method of judging shall be solely within the discretion of the rules and regulations set forth by the Fairest of Fairs Committee of the Wisconsin Association of Fairs and that the decision of the judges shall be final.

- This girl must be single and remain single while competing at both the county or district fair and the Association Convention Contest. The girl who is chosen at the State Convention must remain single during her tenure as queen, and is she is married, the first runner-up will take over as queen at the State Fair.

- Contestant agrees that if she is selected as winner of the contest, she will not sign a management contract with any

individual or corporation, and that she will not give any written or verbal endorsement, or make a personal appearance for any mercantile commodity or commercial organization nor will she permit any photographs to be used without the written permission of the Fairest of Fairs Committee.

- This girl may be an entrant in only one county or district fair which she considers to be her "home" fair. A contestant must reside in the county she represents. The only exception: she may reside in an adjoining county if the majority of her activities are in the county in which she enters the contest.

Applications must be returned by July 14, and submitted to the Washington County Fair Office, P.O. Box 537, West Bend, 53095. Crop Reporting Deadline July 21

The cooperation of many farmers coming in to report their 1980 plantings according to schedule has helped our staff handle the job according to Donald E. Sampson, director of the Washington County ASC office.

About 500 producers have reported to date. The final deadline is July 21, however early reporting is strongly urged. Sampson said all the townships were scheduled thru July 3. Final efforts are now being taken to encourage every-one to report.

By simply reporting their acreages timely, farmers are eligible for the three benefits of the Feed Grain and Wheat Programs. These are target price protection, disaster protection and price support loan eligibility.

When grain prices fall below the target prices established, deficiency payments are triggered. Such payments would be mailed next winter to all eligible producers automatically. Anyone suffering significant crop damage should file for disaster. Also producers request price support loans at their pleasure after harvest.

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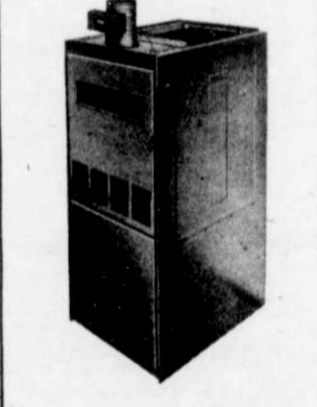

Catholic Stewardship Appeal Surpasses Goal in Washington County, Archdiocese

In spite of the current economic situation, the 1980 Catholic Stewardship Appeal has surpassed its goal of \$4,200,000.00, Norbert J. Stefaniak, general chairman, announced this week.

At a meeting of district and county leaders of the annual fund drive on June 25, Stefaniak presented the latest progress report showing \$4,213,017.00 in gifts and pledges.

It indicated that all 13 districts of the ten-county archdiocese have already exceeded their 1980 goals and that each of them has also established a new dollar record.

Washington County has already raised \$163,711.00, which is 104% of the goal of \$158,000.00. County leader for the drive is Leo F. Schlaefter of West Bend. He was assisted by associate leaders Jerome Krantz of Allenton, Erwin J. Benka of Hartford, Robert Kirst of Kewaskum, and James A. Spella of West Bend.

In a letter published in this week's "Catholic Herald Citizen" Archbishop Rembert G. Weakland thanked the thousands of donors throughout the

archdiocese for having expressed their confidence and their desire to serve others through their gifts. He said, "Ever since I arrived here in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee I have been overwhelmed by the kindness and generosity of the people. This year again I have been witness to that goodness."

General chairman Stefaniak also expressed thanks to all volunteers and to the 286 parish pastors, associate pastors, and other parish staff members.

The headquarters of the appeal is located at the Archdiocesan Office of Development, 345 N. 95th Street, Milwaukee.

Stefaniak said he found working with the office and its director, Gerald M. Schaefer, "an enlightening experience."

Schaefer, host of the meeting of appeal leaders, also spoke to the group. He indicated that the Archdiocese of Milwaukee is unprecedented in its high percentage of pledge payments. Almost 80% of the pledges are already paid in full, while the rest are scheduled for payment on a regular basis through 1980.

Schaefer emphasized that al-

though the drive has achieved its immediate goal of \$4,200,000, the 1980 Stewardship Appeal does not officially close until the end of the calendar year, December 31, 1980.

He explained, "I want to emphasize that new contributions are earnestly sought throughout the remainder of 1980. Pledges will be paid throughout the remaining six months and new gifts will also be received. Many persons find the early months of the calendar year difficult for making contributions and therefore prefer the last half of the calendar year as more favorable financially."

He indicated that new contributions are needed since the annual inflation rate is far higher than the 5% increase reflected in the \$4,200,000 goal over the 1979 goal of \$4 million.

In their comments both Stefaniak and Schaefer pointed out the Catholic Stewardship Appeal provides the basic funding for the agencies, charitable works, and programs of the archdiocese.

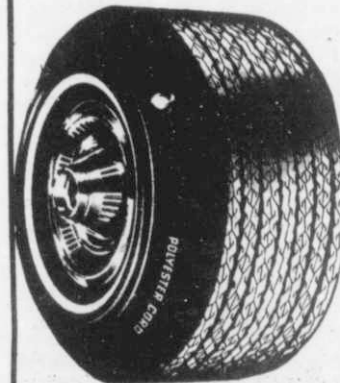

ELECTION NOTICE VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage prepaid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election if applying in person, or 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before the election if applying by mail.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.

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Julie Larson Olympic Midwest Judo Champ, Reaches National

The 1980 AAU Olympic Midwest Judo Championships were held June 21 at the Wauwatosa West High School. Competitors who placed first in their state participated from Nebraska, Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin.

Participants from the West Bend Judo Club were Lynn Roethke, placing first in the 135 lb. division and Julie Larson of

Kewaskum, first in the 125 lb. class. These first place winners will advance to the national competition to be held in California sometime this August, representing Region 7.

Julie and Lynn also traveled to St. Louis, Missouri for the United States Judo Association National Championships which were held June 27-July 1.

Stiffer Penalties For Deer Shining, Illegal Possession

Minimum penalties for deer shining and the illegal possession of a deer carcass are now five to 10 times higher as the result of recent action by the Wisconsin Legislature.

The new law provides for a minimum forfeiture for shining deer or bear of \$1,000 plus a 75 per cent natural resources assessment for a total of \$1,750. Previously, the forfeiture for that offense was \$200 plus the assessment for a total of \$350.

The forfeiture for illegal possession of a deer carcass was \$100 plus the 75 percent assessment for a total of \$175. Under the new schedule, the minimum forfeiture is \$1,000 plus the assessment for a total of \$1,750, or ten times the amount of penalty prior to passage of the new law.

In both cases, the penalties could be higher when other costs are added.

The law providing the stiffer penalties was passed earlier this year by the Legislature and became effective upon publication in the official state newspaper on May 6 of this year.

And for the first time in Wisconsin, under provisions of the new law, shining wild animals even though no weapon is present is now a violation of the law at specified times from September 15 through December 31 each year. The times are 10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. The forfeiture for violation is up to \$1,000 plus the 75 percent assessment.

Law enforcement officers on official business and hunters who are legally hunting racoon, foxes or other unprotected animals in season or training dogs for such activity are exempt from this provision of the law.
