Dr. Richard L. Wesenberg, director of radiology at Alberta Children's Hospital and professor of radiology and pediatrics at the University of Calgary, Canada, was guest lecturer for Cobb's Medical Staff at Cobb Memorial Hospital at Phenix City, Alabama. He also addressed Columbus, Phenix City, Opelika and Fort Benning radiologists at the Phenix City Ramada Inn during his week-long stay. Dr. Wesenberg is the son of Mrs. Elverena and the late Walter Wesenberg of Kewaskum.

Dr. Vincent Currier, chief of radiology at Cobb Memorial Hospital, is a personal friend of Dr. Wesenberg. They first met while they were in practice in Baltimore in 1966.

The author of "The Newborn Chest," Professor Wesenberg has written more than 70 articles for professional medical journals and periodicals. The Newborn Chest has been translated into Spanish and is being sold world-wide. Work is now

underway on the second edition of his book.

A native of Kewaskum, Dr. Wesenberg is a 1959 graduate of the University of Wisconsin and graduated from the University of Wisconsin Medical School in 1962.

Prior to accepting his present position in Canada, Dr. Wesenberg was professor of radiology and chief of pediatric radiology at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA) Center for Health Sciences.

Trustee Spoeth Resigns; Old Park Gets New Name

Trustee Carl Spoeth has resigned from the Kewaskum Village Board as of the board meeting July 7.

A portion of his letter of resignation read, "I have elected to resign based on personal reasons and feel fortunate to have had the opportunity to serve as a member of the village board and to serve our community."

Spoeth, age 35, was appointed to the board on July 10, 1979, and was elected to a 2-year term in this year's April election. He replaced Dan Schmidt, who resigned to become Village Administrator. Spoeth served as Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee and was a member of the Administrative Committee.

In accepting the resignation, President Jerry Stollenwerk said, "I'm sorry to see Carl go. He's a very good man. He did a good job picking up the Park Committee chairmanship."

The resignation, of course, creates the problem of filling a vacancy. When Robert Danielson resigned as President in March, Stollenwerk, then a trustee, was chosen by the board as President, and the resultant trustee vacancy was filled by Jeff Rohrer. Advertisements for candidates were published and 2 secret ballots were needed to narrow down a field of 9 candidates.

Trustee Dave Nigh initially wished to go with the same procedure, but Trustee Raynor Herriges wished to have the seat remain vacant until there could be a special election... and let the guy run for office." Herriges asked, "Did you notice how many people were on the list when you appoint somebody... and how many people were running for this seat?" He was referring to the fact that in the regular election, only incumbents were running with no other announced candidates.

Administrator Schmidt pointed out that "In the last 13 months, we've had 4 appointments to the village board which is more than normal." He added that this may create a lack of "harmony" and a feeling by the electorate that they are not being represented in the usual sense.

Schmidt continued that a special election with someone running for a 1-year term as well as other trustees and candidates running for three 2-year terms was feasible. The 1-year term might be filled by someone who wished to find out if they have adequate time to function on the board or by a trustee who wishes to see some project completed but does not

necessarily wish to stick it out for 2 years.

Candidates would file nomination papers for either the 1-year term or the 2-year term in December or January and be placed on the ballot for next April's election.

All board members eventually favored this approach in order to have the public feel more represented and any new trustees feel more responsible and responsive to their constituents.

A liquor license was granted to John Kleinke for an establishment at 1310 Riverview Drive to be known as John and Dee's (formerly Apollo's Lyre).

For a public hearing on the matter, 4 citizens were present to state their desire to have any new proprietors control any trouble from the beginning and to cooperate with the neighborhood. The former owners no longer have any direct connection with the operation of the business.

John Kleinke said he did not plan on having any loud rock bands, which were a nuisance to the neighbors, but rather would feature country-western and bluegrass groups.

Chief of Police Don Hlavaty had no objections to granting

A highlight of the picnic will be another excellent parade at 12:00 noon sharp which will start off the festivities on Sunday. The parade again will be led by the Milwaukee Civic Riders Motorcycle Club and will feature ten or more bands and drum and bugle corps as well as drill teams. Prizes will be awarded for the best floats and kiddies' specialties (groups).

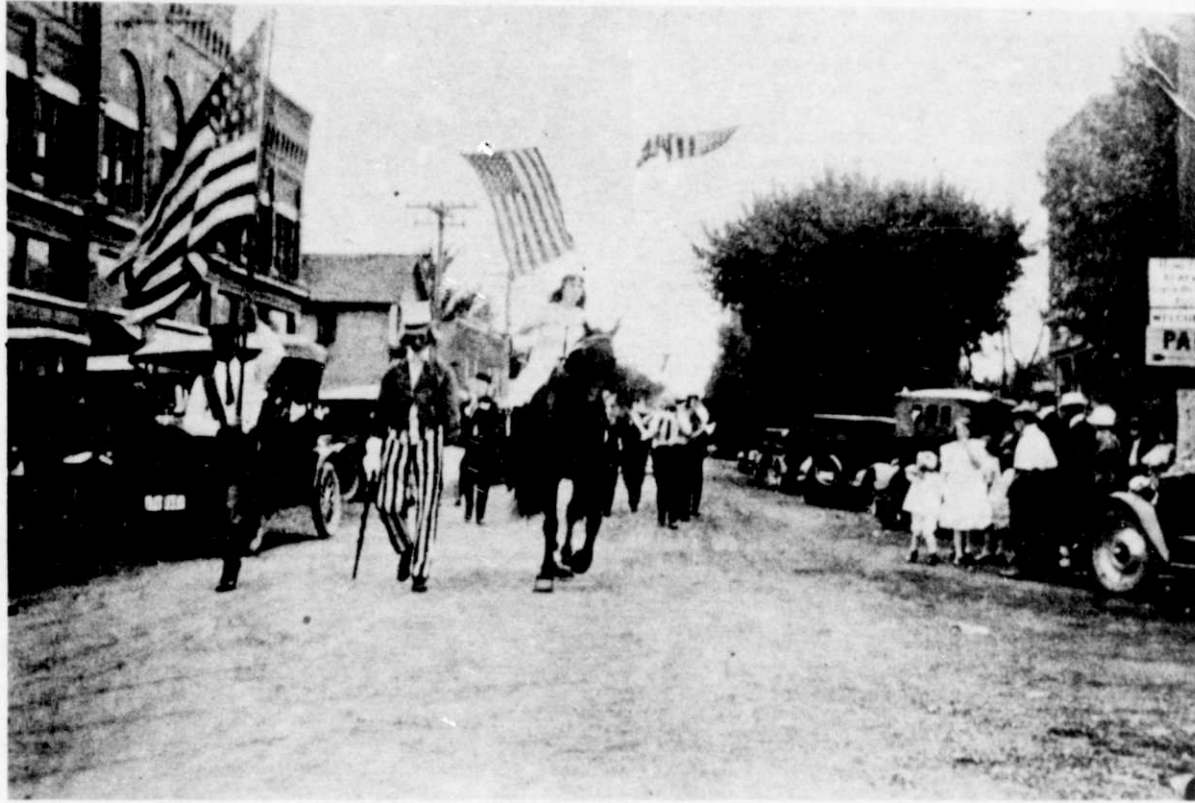

the license. After the board gave its unanimous approval, President Stollenwerk admonished Kleinke to rectify as many of the former problems with that particular tavern as he could and "create the much needed good will."

The issue of sidewalks to Bel-Ric acres was tabled for further investigation. School Board President John Tessar had originally asked the village board to consider the matter as the school district wishes to save about \$15,000 annually on bussing 163 students from the subdivision.

Five different placements of walkways were considered. Four alternatives involved either the east or west side of "45" or the north or south side of "H." The estimated cost for these would range from \$53,831 to \$66,790. Another alternative would be a sidewalk down Milan Drive and an asphalt walkway through an undeveloped area and over a small creek for about \$13,000. The committee and administrator pointed out that serious questions remain as to who would pay for the sidewalk, who would maintain them during the winter, and how would permission be secured for crossing private land.

Leona Thull recently won a "Name the Old Park" contest sponsored by the village through the recreation program. The winning name was "River Hill Park." The Aid Association for Lutherans has agreed to pay for the sign to be erected at the northern entrance to the park.

And yes, the village has received a check from the state for \$92,085.29 which is 84% of the total submitted for reimbursement for the new Kiwanis Community Park. Administrator Schmidt had these wondrous figures committed to memory.

Budget Main Item on School Board Agenda

The Kewaskum Board of Education will meet on Monday, July 14, 1980. Beginning at 8 p.m., the meeting will be held in the district administrative offices.

Once again, a discussion of the budget may be a major agenda item. If the final effects are known, the board will discuss the 4.2% reduction in state spending which was ordered recently. Also in relation to the budget, the board will discuss driver education fees. Bidding of gasoline and fuel oil, short-term borrowing, the health insurance policy and equipment purchasing, along with approval of payroll and vouchers payable, are other items relating to finances in the

district.

There will be a first reading of some policies. A number of these will be updating of old policies. There will also be statements on energy conservation, vandalism and on purchasing procedures.

Graduation, including the date and time for next year, eligibility to participate in the ceremonies and early graduates will be discussed by the board, as will a new athletic code. A request for a school-of-attendance change will be considered as will any recommendations for teacher contracts. Miscellaneous items which arise will be considered. A closed session will be held following the regular meeting to discuss teacher negotiations and administrator salaries under Wis. Stats 19.85 (1)(c).

Of those who had hearing loss due to job noise, 3/4 also had developed high blood pressure. Obviously excess noise is incompatible with good health.

This motorcycle event is scheduled for Sunday, July 27. It starts at 11:30 a.m. in the parking lot of the County Courthouse and will cover approximately 60 miles of county roads, related Mary Vrana.

Written instructions are given out prior to this event. The roads and direction of travel are indicated by using landmarks such as barns, buildings, country schools, bridges and mileage distance between the various landmarks.

This event, remarked Sherry Dricken, is not a race. It takes astute attention to instructions so one does not get lost. There is also no timing done in this event. Prizes are given for the best 5-card poker hands at the completion of the event. Cards are given out at different points on the route. These locations are not divulged prior to the start. This is to ensure that no one skips any portion of the route. Two entrants leave every minute so as to stagger and control the number of cycles on the road at any given time. There are different classes dependent upon if there are single riders or a partner, either in side cars or riding double on the cycle.

The present club is a non-profit organization, incorporated with the purpose to have family outings and appreciate the outdoors as another recreational type of activity. Monthly meetings are held at their local clubhouse. At present there are 25 members from Washington County and other closely adjoining counties. The membership's occupations vary anywhere from mechanics, office worker, to many other professions. All enjoy motorcycling as an athletic, recreational activity. The membership police themselves and anyone that breaks rules, insofar as basic civil rules and regulations, complaints, etc., is expelled from the club.

Hanaway, an attorney, is a former prosecutor, special prosecutor, city attorney and mayor and resides with his wife Jo Ann and their four children in De Pere.

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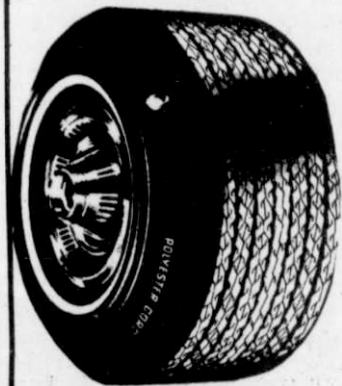

Local Tennis Tournament to Be Held Again

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park and Kewaskum High tennis courts will again be the site of the Kewaskum Area Closed Tennis Tournament, now in its second year. Although there will be some changes in format from last year's tournament, it is still open only to residents of the surrounding area of Kewaskum. This, again, excludes West Bend and Campbellsport, as explained below, and should help make the matches closer, as well as giving the tournament a "local" flavor.

Play this year is regular scoring, the best 2 of 3 sets, with a 9-point tiebreaker played at 6-6 in a set. A best 3 of 5 set finals match is being considered, if time permits. Four tournament officials, Bill Mech, Carl Spoeth, Ron Schmitz, and Jan Rosenthal, will be sharing the duties of answering questions and keeping standings during the tournament. Refreshments are being arranged to be available at the courts.

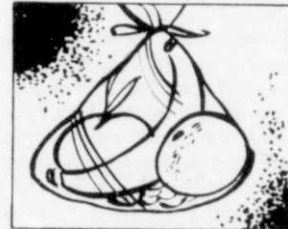
Annual Goofer's Golf Classic Held

Indians Defeat Pewaukee, Hartland, But Lose Big One to West Bend East

In baseball action the past week, the second place Kewaskum Indians rolled over last place Pewaukee and upset last year's co-champion Hartland but lost a crucial game here Monday evening to first place West Bend East, in which the Suns scored all 8 of their runs in the fatal fifth inning.

The Indians had handed East its only loss in an earlier game at West Bend, 1-0. With the victory, the Suns, now 10-1, moved a giant step closer to repeating as Scenic Moraine champs, which they shared with Hartland last year. On the other hand, Kewaskum's record dropped to 9-3, and greatly dimmed their title hopes.

Playing at Pewaukee last Tuesday, the Indians won, 9-5, but the Pirates got their share of hits. Kewaskum also got good hitting from the top of their lineup but again received little help from the remainder of their lineup.

Centerfielder Mike Pettit continued his hot hitting, going 3 for 3, but 2 of them were on bunts. Henry Schilter had 2 hits and Tim Heberer lashed out a triple.

Coach Mike Theiler, with his team in the lead, replaced starting pitcher Heberer with Ken Schuette in the 6th. But when Schuette gave up 4 runs in that inning, Heberer came back to the mound.

On Thursday at Hartland the Indians avenged an earlier defeat by shading the Warhawks, 4-3, to start off the fireworks. This set the stage for their showdown with West Bend East on Monday.

Kewaskum's bats came to life as they banged out 11 hits off 2 Hartland pitchers and scored all 4 runs in the 4th inning. Sophomore Dave Donath led it off with a single, followed by a single by Pettit, a sacrifice bunt and a wild throw scoring 2 runs, a single by Steve Muench, back in his first game since being spiked against Sussex Hamilton early in the year, another sacrifice and Ric Leitheiser's single. When the dust settled 4 runs had crossed the plate, enough for the win.

Kewaskum had other opportunities to score but couldn't push them over. The Hawks played without three regulars and a pitcher who were suspended recently. Another player was benched for coming late to the game.
