## Gov. Dreyfus Orders 4.4% Cut in State Aids

### Citizens Voice Opinions on Budget at School Board Meeting

The Kewaskum Board of Education continued to wrestle with its 4.5 million budget at its Monday night meeting, but maintained the decision to present it as is to the annual meeting on July 28.

Although no major expenses or staff changes are expected, the budget means around a 15.5% increase in the local tax levy. The spending limit on a per student basis will be within the 10% increase allowed by the state. The levy rate will remain more stable at \$9.88 per \$1,000 equalized valuation.

A new quirk was introduced to school budgeting when Governor Dreyfus ordered a 4.4% cut in state aids. This may cost the district as much as \$70,000 to \$80,000. Business

Manager Bob Borch reported that the Dept. of Public Instruction recommended that districts follow their normal course of action but point out the state aid situation at their annual meetings. The attorney general is determining if the governor can change what the legislature has enacted.

Supt. of Schools Floyd Brenholt felt that if the 4.4% aid cut was maintained, the district could absorb it without increasing the levy further. He also advocated the use of some of \$500,000 in "back taxes" coming in during August to offset any fund shortage. Brenholt was very critical of the governor, saying, "It's very easy for Dreyfus to sit there and say, 'cut, cut, cut'. Is his department being cut?"

The budget contains a lot of unknown factors due to the

unstable economic conditions. Gasoline prices are anybody's guess and presently the district estimated \$1.60 per gallon for next year compared to about 75c per gallon a year ago. Board President John Tessar pointed out to some citizens that the bussing contract would be increased 11.2% and that teachers were still negotiating with the board and requesting a 12.1% increase compared to the district's offer of 10.9%. Anywhere from 80 - 90% of the budget is fixed; other persons, agencies, or business determine the expenses.

Some suggestions were introduced that would not have been heard in other years. Frank Sell claimed the basic issue in school expense was efficiency. Brenholt took exception to this and pointed out that the district had traditionally

spent \$½ million less annually than the state average. He said, "I think we've tried. We're not given credit for having been frugal and having been more efficient than the average school district over a period of years."

Later the word "efficiency" prodded Board Member Richard Theusch to request a study of the operational costs of each school building in the hope that perhaps one building could be closed down for a time. This was only a suggestion and not a proposal as yet.

School staff had already cut out some \$300,000 in possible supplies and are not increasing the amount spent on supplies. Bob Beisbier, whose main contention was that inflation might

be stemmed by lowering taxes, commented that this supply cutback meant "less waste." Brenholt objected to this choice of words. "I think it's untrue. It's easy for people to sit out there and take shots at us for being inefficient ... for 'wasting money'. I'm not going to sit here and take that kind of statement. We're honestly trying to provide a decent education." He elaborated on his administrative philosophy that education was definitely his prime concern. "You as a taxpayer come secondly, because the kids come first," he realized that taxes certainly make no one happy, but he added that the main reason they were increasing now was due to less spending in the past.

Another idea was mentioned by Dr. Charles Ogi who wished to try full day kindergarten class on alternate days as Campbellsport is doing. This got a cool (Continued on Page 3)

## Start Road Reconstruction On CTH 'H'

Road construction was scheduled to start the week of July 7 on the reconstruction of C.T.H. "H" from CTH "W" to Town Line Road in the Town of Wayne, Washington County, west of Kewaskum. The work will consist of reconstruction of the roadway with grading, gravel and blacktop finished surface.

The work will be performed under a contract let to C.C. Linck, Inc. of Beaver Dam at an estimated cost of \$513,915.00. Financing will be shared on approximately a 75-25 percentage by the Federal government and Washington County respectively, from funds provided primarily by gas taxes. James Zemlock of Waukesha will be the project engineer for the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

C.T.H. "H" will be closed to through traffic during construction operations, with access only to local property owners. It was anticipated that C.T.H. "H" would be closed during the week of July 7 and will be reopened in late fall. Traffic is urged to use caution in the construction zone. A suitable detour will be provided by Washington County. C.T.H. "W" will be kept open to through traffic across C.T.H. "H" during construction operations.

Every possible effort will be made to provide continuous and safe ingress and egress to all business and residential properties during this reconstruction, but pedestrians and motorists are urged to use caution in the construction zone.

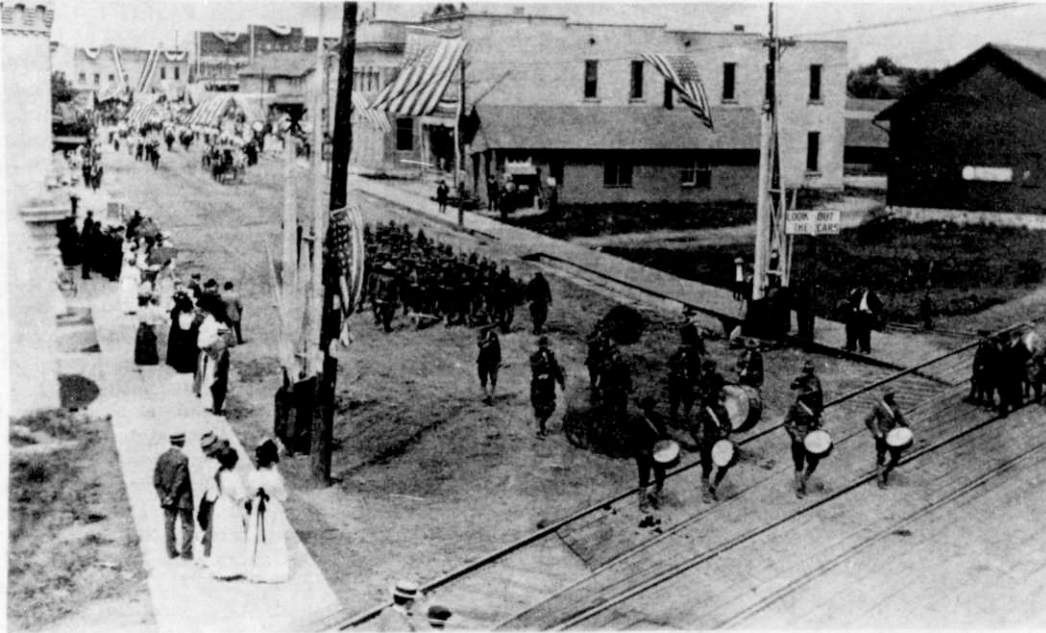

reception and the shorter attention span and need for naps of young children were mentioned. Director of Elementary Education, Richard Zarling, added, "If you're going to start manipulating the hours that kids go to school on the basis of saving dollars, then you're forgetting education; you're forgetting the reason we're here."

Harold Manthei wished to know why teachers' aides were required. Brenholt said they did record-keeping and paper work so teachers could devote more time to the kids. Some aides work in special education programs, providing additional supervision and even instruction or assist in very large regular classes over 30 students. An aide also functions as the librarian at Farmington to eliminate the need for an additional librarian. Nineteen aide-secretaries throughout the district earn between \$3.27 and \$4.29 per hour with no real fringe benefits.

She also questioned the need for specialists and particularly the reading specialist. He claimed that if the teachers were truly adequate, they would teach all children reading and writing without the need for a specialist. Brenholt explained that the specialist does more diagnosis of reading problems and works primarily with the teachers.

Sometime during the lengthy meeting, Beisbier stated that there should have been 200 people present to voice their opinion. From the looks of things, the annual meeting should rival the Republican National Convention in attendance, as more taxpayers wish to have their viewpoint known.

In other action, the board accepted the resignation of Joanne Vogt, a business education teacher at KHS. She will be married and is moving. Teacher contracts were approved for Melody Dietrich who attended UW-Oshkosh and Cynthia Greve who attended UW-Stevens Point, both in the Learning Disabilities in the special education department.

Kindergarten sections were approved by the board. Wayne Elementary would have 24 students. Kewaskum Elementary

would have 65 students, 2 of which transferred from Wayne. The major shift would be of a "pocket" of 8 kindergartners in the Boltonville area who would be bussed to Beechwood, leaving 26 in Farmington's section and giving Beechwood 22.

Behind-the-wheel driver's ed. fees were increased from \$20 to \$45 and go into effect at the start of the 1980-81 school year. The total cost for driver's ed. per student is about \$85.00 with the state usually paying \$40 and the rest picked up by the district or students. Board members could not see having to presently make up \$25 per student. KHS Assistant Principal Roy Esser quipped that fee payment would be no problem - "That's the easiest fee there is to collect."

The bidding of gasoline and fuel oil was approved and bids will be opened on August 11. Borch said that he had called Washington, D. C. and was informed that the district could go out for bids and could accept the lowest one. But if this bidder cannot continue to supply the district, the distributor who was furnishing fuel during a "base period" of November '77 to October '78 would have to be engaged. Les Strobel has been the distributor the last 2 years and "Quickflash" would be the base distributor which the district is legally bound to if any other supply dries up.

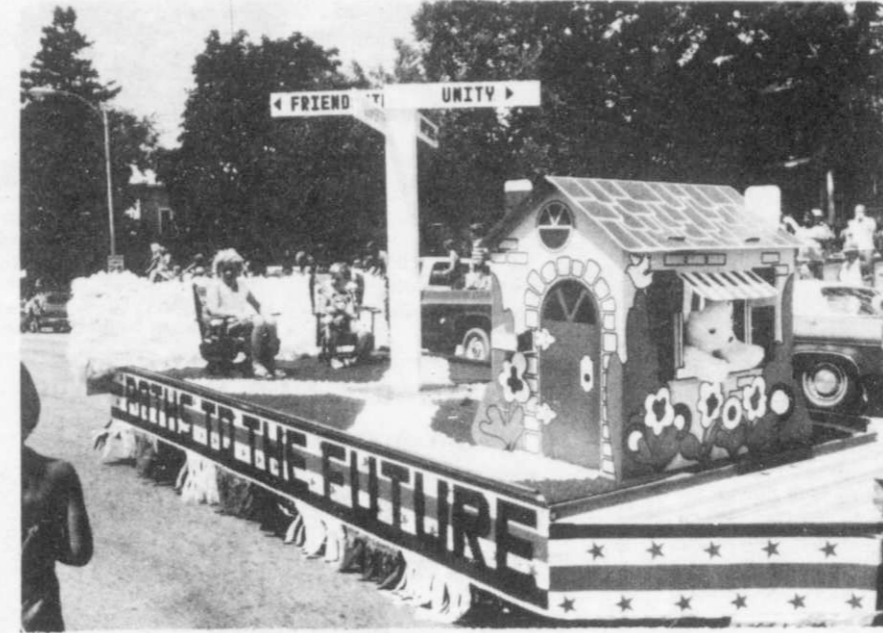

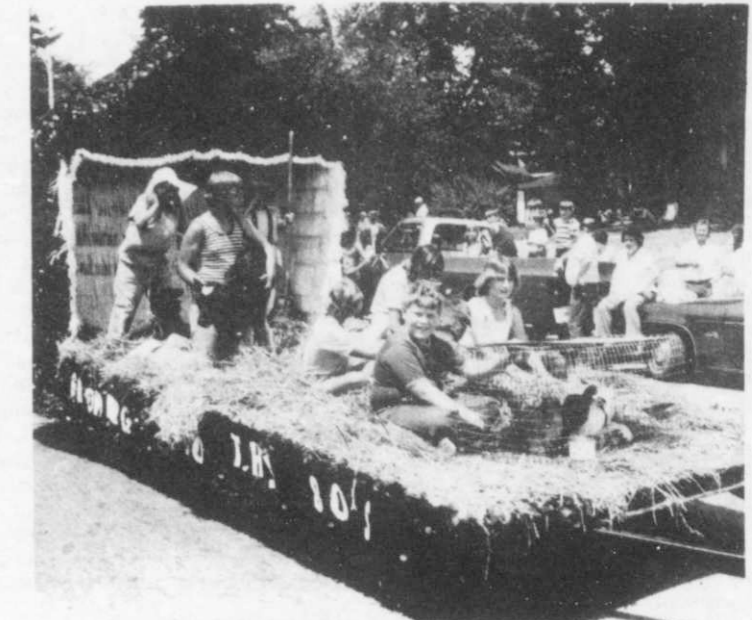
