Village Drops Issue of Sidewalks to Bel-Ric

By DAN MEILAHN Statesman Staff Writer

The Public Works Committee of the Kewaskum Village Board recommended to drop the issue of installing sidewalks to Bel-Ric Acres south of the village.

The Kewaskum School District had requested the village to consider sidewalks so that \$16,000 could be saved annually on bussing 163 students.

Committee Chairman, Don Mlodzik, said that the committee had looked over the area. considered different locations, the relative costs, and the problem of winter maintenance. He said that in talking to various property owners, there were "quite a few negative comments." He continued that some property owners felt sidewalks should be put in but not necessarily as a path through somebody's land. One alternative had been to have a path extended northward through private property and cross a small stream. The owners of this particular land preferred to have sidewalks installed along their highway frontage instead of the pathway which would have to be eliminated if the land were subdivided. Mlodzik said the committee felt that perhaps sidewalks to Bel-Ric was the wrong approach to the problem. He added that it might be unfair to install walks in one area and not another. The prevailing opinion to the board seems to be that sidewalks should be installed throughout the entire village at virtually the same time.

School Board Raises Driver Education Fee

At the regular meeting of the School District of Kewaskum held on July 14, the School Board approved the immediate increase in the Behind-The-Wheel driver education fee from \$20.00 to \$45.00. This \$45.00 fee is to be charged to all Kewaskum Community High School students who sign up for the Behind-The-Wheel portion of driver education training after July 14, 1980.

In passing the motion the board stated that the Behind-The-Wheel portion of drivers education is offered as a service to the students and is not required for graduation, thus it should be a self-sufficient operation. The \$45.00 fee combined with the \$40.00 per student received in direct aid from the state will cover the estimated cost to operate the program of \$85.00 per student.

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





Second Installment of Postponed **County Property Taxes Due July 31**

Fredric A. Seefeldt, Washington County Treasurer, today issued a reminder to Washington County taxpayers that the second installment of their postponed property taxes is due on or before, Thursday, July 31.

Checks should be made payable to: Fredric A. Seefeldt, Washington County Treasurer. and may be mailed to P. O. Box 518, West Bend, WI 53095. "Taxpayers should be sure to include a copy of their tax bill or the tax key number of the property or properties in-volved," Seefeldt advised. "The tax key number is found in the upper right hand corner of the tax receipts. If we have the tax key number, our whole receipting process is speeded up considerably," Seefeldt said.

The County Treasurer's office has received a number of in-quiries as to whether or not it is acceptable to mail in tax payments, Seefeldt stated. "It certainly is acceptable and it makes good sense given the price of gasoline," Seefeldt said. "We do make it a practice to mail out the tax receipts. I will be hiring two temporary employees to assist in processing the tax

payments received by mail," said Seefeldt.

Seefeldt cautioned those people waiting until the last minute to mail their payments to mail early enough to insure a July 31 postmark. "The Wis-consin Statutes provide that late payments are subject to an interest penalty of 1% per month retroactive to January 1 of this year. The effect of the law is that late payments automatically pick up an 8% interest 'penalty," Seefeldt advised.


Tax payments may also be made in person at the County Treasurer's office, Room 226 in the Courthouse, 432 E. Washington St., West Bend. The office is open 8 a.m. - 12 noon and 1 - 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"At the end of June, outstanding postponed property taxes totaled more than \$6.6 million. Given an average payment of \$400, for example, we are talking about more than 16,600 transactions to be com-. pleted," Seefeldt observed.

Training Available at MPTI for Unemployed

Did you know that the Wisconsin Unemployment Compensation Law encourages the unemployed worker to seek training and retraining? According to the law, "benefits shall not be denied to any otherwise eligible for any week because he/she is enrolled in an approved full-time course of vocational training or basic education which is a prerequisite to such training." The training is intended to increase the unemployed person's opportunities to obtain employment. The training must be approved by the local Job Service-Unemployment Compensation Division. The program should be 10 months or less in length, and should not grant substantial credit leading to a Bachelor's

degree or higher. A person enrolled in an approved training program will not be disqualified for refusal of work. In addition, the unemployed person need not meet the work registration requirements.

Moraine Park Technical Institute offers a variety of educational opportunities in durations of 10 months or less. Moraine Park provides vocational training of various dimensions to meet the education interests, needs, and abilities of unemployed persons. Certificate and Vocational Diploma programs are offered on a full-time and part-time basis. Generally, these programs are one year or less in length. Many of the courses are offered in the evening hours as well as during the day



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Poor Shopping Habits Add Extra Cost to Everyone's Food Bill

Are you a supermarket "caresser?" That's the shopper who loves tomatoes, peaches and green beans so much there is no resistance to squeezing, caressing and pinching them. Or maybe you're run into the "defroster," or the "scatter."

Supermarket vandalism, even though it may be unintentional, directly contributes to the increasing cost of food prices.

Produce managers expect a certain amount of handling in order to make good selections but throw-aways from rough caressing are costly.

You may have seen tracks left by a "defroster" in the store-someone who returns a soggy package to the freezer after it's started to defrost or left itsitting in the canned goods department. You can help by waiting until the end of your shopping trip to pick up frozen or refrigerated items.

Closely related to the "de-froster" is the "scatter."

That's the one who leaves a can of vegetables in the housewares department or a bag of grapes in the bread rack.

A scatter's habit not only adds to food spoilage but also prompts the hiring of extra help to keep shelves orderly.

Also contributing to the food spoilage bill is the "taster. Some shoppers just haven't learned to depend on the silent salesman--the package and its label. Everyone pays for the nibblings of the taster.

Then there are the "punch-When buying meat they ers." feel for hidden bones, pinch for fat and jostle packages to see what lies beneath. The packages eventually break, leak and the meat becomes contaminated and dried out.

Avoid being a puncher by reading the label with grade, cut, quality, price, weight and U.S.D.A. inspection sticker on it. The meat manager will also

help make meat selections.

There are others, like the "pacifiers," who feed unpaidfor fruit and candy to their children to keep them quiet, the 'spillers," who drive their carts wrecklessly and the "checkout jammers," who send the bagger off to weigh a bag of apples or check a price.

These shopping habits add to the store's overhead and help drive food prices up.

PLAN FOR GOOD FREEZER MANAGEMENT

Freezing is the best way to preserve tempting and nutritious foods. It's fun to keep the freezer stocked - for the convenience and enjoyment of the whole family.

The secret for success is a simple management plan, a plan that keeps your storage space working for you. Keep the freezer full of a variety of top quality foods, yet draw from the supply constantly. It is using, not saving, freezer foods that pays.

Here are some ways to save freezer space:

*Freeze only the amount you are sure to use within their recommended storage time.

*Use square cornered containers instead of round. Buy or pack homemade ice cream in rectangular cartons. Freeze casseroles in flat rectangular utensils - they thaw and reheat faster.

*Bone and trim fat from meats before freezing.

*Package steak and sliced meats flat - not rolled.

*To give regular form to shapeless plastic bags, put them inside paper cartons, fill and freeze. Butter, milk and ice cream cartons can be used with a plastic liner.

*Bake square loaf and layer cakes in square pans and square cut cookies and biscuits. They will store more easily in less space.

*Use containers that stack well. Avoid overfilling cartons: to prevent them from bulging. allow them to stack evenly after freezing.

*Use a plastic refrigerator "crisper" or large square carton to confine miscellaneous odd shaped items.

*Have a good supply of containers with assorted dimensions. This allows you to fill your freezer with no leftovers space.

Be sure to package and clearly label and date everything you freeze. Know how long it is recommended to be stored. Post an inventory list close to the freezer. Refer to it when planning meals; using

A Year of Work Goes Into County Fair Exhibits

One of the main purposes of a county fair is to have exhibits that were made by 4-H and FFA members, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and members of other youth groups. It's an opportunity for them to show what they have done. Their exhibits can be judged according to certain standards and the members given helpful comments on how to insprove in the future.

As we view these exhibits we should keep in mind one important fact. Most of the members started out at the beginning of the year with no knowledge or very little knowledge about the project from their leaders and parents. They try to develop the skills so that they could be able to make the articles themselves. In most cases the articles would not be perfect. Instead they are just steps along the way of learning a skill. Some of the articles may have been made by 9 or 10 year olds who are in the project for the first year. Some of them may have been made by older members who had several years of experience in the project.

So as a member brings his articles to the fair, I think he should consider this a learning experience. Listen to the helpful comments and suggestions that the judge will make. Ask the judge questions about problems you may have had in making the article or other suggestions for improvement.

Special Identification Cards Now Available for Physically Disabled

The state department of transportation has implemented a program to issue special identification cards providing special parking privileges for physically disabled persons.

A new state law provided for issuance of the cards to Wisconsin residents who are either temporarily or permanently disabled. Norbert K. Anderson, administrator of the division of motor vehicles, said an emergency rule was adopted June 30 allowing the division to issue them.

When properly displayed on the left sun visor, left dashboard of left front windshield — the motor vehicle is exempt from state law or local ordinances imposing time limitations of parking on any street or highway zone, or municipal parking lot with one-half hour or more limitation. It may be parked in spaces reserved and marked for use by handicapped persons, and is exempt from meter payment when time limitation is one-half hour or more.

Anderson said application forms require a physician's signature attesting to the physical disability which makes the applicant eligible for the identification card. A U.S. Veterans Administration statement providing the necessary information may be used to establish eligibility for an identification card. If the disability is temporary, cards will be issued with

an expiration date.

The cards, which bear the "disabled person" symbol, may be used when parking any motor vehicle, including motorcycles or mopeds. The cards will be especially useful to persons who depend upon friends or neighbors for transportation, Anderson said, since they may be used on any vehicle parked on behalf of the holder.

Anderson said only one card will be issued to any individual, and only to those over one year of age.

Application forms may be obtained by writing the Support Processing Unit, Motor Vehicle Central Office Services, P.O. Box 7911, Madison 53707. Cost of the identification cards will be a one-time charge of \$3.



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

West Bend East's undisputed champions (15-1) also had three players picked on the all-conference team. East's only loss was to Kewaskum in a 1-0 pitchers duel. The Suns' Bill Jr Froehlich, 6-3 senior right sr hander, who leads the league in many categories, was one of sr only two unanimous choices.

The three Kewaskum players selected were:

Pitcher Jeff Geidel, only a sophomore, who chalked up a sr 7-2 record in the Scenic Moraine and 9-2 overall. His earned run average was 2.2. He struck out sr 62 batters in 62 innings while giving up just 23 walks. [The Jr Indians have only three seniors on this year's second place team; all the rest will be back next year, including all three pitchers, which should make for a strong team]. Geidel was the
