Lions Club Chicken Bar-B-Q, Kettle Revised Athletic Code 20 Plus 2 Run, Golf Tourney Sunday

On Sunday, August 17, the Kewaskum Lions Club will hold its seventh annual Kettle 20+2 Run. There will be 20 kilometer, 7.5 mile and 3.5 mile races.

Race time is 9:15 a.m. with registration from 7:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. Pre-registration is \$4.50 and registration on the day of the race is \$5.50.

There are 20 divisions for men and women in these races. Trophies, medals and ribbons will be awarded for places one through ten and free chicken dinners will be given for places one through five in each divi-

Last year the races were hit by rain and co-chairmen



School Board Reviews

The Kewaskum Board of Education reviewed a revised athletic code at Monday night's meeting and will reconsider it after several alterations are

The code lists training rules in effect at all secondary schools within the district for athletes during both the school year and summer vacation. The 4 basic rules are: no smoking; no drinking of alcoholic beverages; no unathorized use of drugs; and the maintenance of general conduct to not discredit the athlete, parents, or school.

All athletes would be required to travel to and from out of town contests with the squad. They must also be in attendance for entire school days prior to and following an athletic event. This is to prevent skipping and the possibility of a sick player participating.

During out-of-season times, a first violation of the code would result in suspension from one scheduled contest of the next season. The second violation

would result in a 9-week suspension from events. sequent violations would mean a suspension of one calendar year. Violations of rules 4, 5 and 6 would result in disciplinary action to be determined by the Athletic Director and the head

For in-season times, the first violation of the first 3 rules would mean a suspension for one-ninth of the total number of scheduled contests. A second violation result in a 9-week suspension and a third violation would involve a year's suspension. Once again, for rules 4, 5 and 6, disciplinary action would be up to the Athletic Director and head coach.

The major changes from the old code are the distinction between in-season and out-ofseason athletes. Also an addition of a "good behavior" clause was demanded by the WIAA. This would allow an athlete's record to be considered clear if 2 years elapse from a violation without an additional violation occurring.

Sen. Gaylord Nelson Guest at County Labor Council Meeting in Kewaskum

Senator Gaylord Nelson was a special guest at a meeting of the Washington County Central Labor Council at the Labor Hall in Kewaskum

Jack Reihl, Secretary-treasurer of the State AFL-CIO had invited Nelson to attend a social hour on Monday evening.

The audience of union officers and stewards heard some brief remarks by Nelson, who is seeking his 4th term in the U.S.

Although reporters missed his original talk, Senator Nelson was kind enough to comment during an interview on the present recession and unemployment. He favored more public works programs, saying In the situation of a recession like this, there are important public works problems, things that ought to be engaged in. He spoke of billions of dollars in bridges and sewage treatment plants that presently need to be built in Wisconsin. He advocated, "This is the time to release the highway funds to repair those roads and build the bridges to create employment.'

Recently there was a deferral on releasing funds, but Nelson said he introduced a resolution to override the deferral and got \$44 million released for the construction of sewage treatment plants. He said 80 or 90 communities in Wisconsin could use such updated facilities. He cited Hayward in particular where a new school and a

prospective industry need the sewage facility before they can begin operation.

About his resolution, he said, "I did that because I thought it was poor fiscal policy to postpone starting construction of these sewage treatment plants. Secondly, during this recession, this is the kind of constructive work to create jobs that we ought to pass.

Another economic measure to spur domestic employment that Nelson advocated was a temporary ban on imported vehicles. He said the U.S. "ought to negotiate temporarily a limitation on Japanese auto imports. He added, "Ordinarily, I wouldn't support that...but we can't afford to let a major industry be permanently crippled. There are too many jobs and too much involvement of our economy." He continued that, "...every other manufacturing country in the world has limitations on the imports...all of them...including Japan.'

Nelson was asked if he had any role in the Democratic Convention, and he replied he was not a delegate this year, although he had attended 6 National Conventions and 27 State Conventions.

When asked about the "Billygate" situation, Nelson replied that really nothing had been disclosed on any corruption on the President's part. He realized, "The hearings aren't over yet," but doubted if anything seriously incriminating would come out of them.

have Principal Clark Pearson include a statement that the awarding of letters may be endangered by any infraction. Letters are granted according to requirements set up by the individual coaches.

A lengthy and lively discussion centered around whether or not students going into a bar without drinking should be considered in the code. A question arose if attending wedding dances where beer was served would constitute a violation. Eventually it was decided that if students were with their parents, this would be acceptable and would be explained in the athletic handbook rather than in the code.

Board member Charles Ogi declared that the truth concerning any athletic codes was that they are set up with good intent but in reality are not obeyed, and citizens as well as school personnel may tend to "wink at" violations. He claimed it was "hypocritical" and added, "It's like putting a 30 mph speed limit on a superhighway. Nobody pays attention to it. Kewaskum Education Association President Bob Getter was equally adamant about this, saying, "Why the heck don't we take a stance sometime and say, 'no, we're not going to ignore Board member Jim Oelhafen reminded the board that its function was to merely set policy and take it from there.

Ogi also questioned if the code should extend to other extracurricular activities. The other board members felt it should only concern WIAA activities.

A gasoline bid of \$1.00357 per gallon was accepted from O'Connor Oil Co. of Fond du Lac. Business Manager Bob Borch had sent out notices to 14 vendors and got only 4 replies. The bids were all for prices as of August 1, 1980.

A fuel oil bid was accepted from Strobel Oil of Kewaskum. Five bids were received and if oil was consumed at the same level as last year, Strobel's total price would be \$29,456 compared to O'Connor's \$29,688.

In the event that neither oil

company can supply petroleum products, the school must resort to obtaining fuel from Quickflash of West Bend which is the "base distributor."

John Engelhardt and Sons, Inc. were awarded a milk contract with bids of 12½c per ½ pint homogenized milk and 13½c per ½ pint chocolate milk compared to 14c and 15c bids from Cedarburg Dairy.

Graduation next year will be on the last Friday of school or June 5. Pearson claimed that thought had been given to changing it to a Sunday to avoid the inevitable conflict with track sectionals. The board wished to try Friday for another year.

It was agreed that students who do not graduate will not be allowed to participate in graduation ceremonies as some parents had requested.

The board upheld its policy of allowing early graduation. Last year, 32 students completed their required 20 credits and were allowed to matriculate a semester early provided the parents signed a statement that the student had found employment. Pearson said the school urged students to stay 4 full

years, but, "Those that really want out, you can't teach them anything anyway." Board President John Tessar said, "I don't think we can question the parents if they give approval."

In 1977, 52 students graduated early when only 18 credits were required. The increase to 20 credits has created the preferred reduction in early graduations.

There was a first reading of lunch policies and changed rates for the coming school year. A daily ticket would cost 95c, up 10c from last year; a weekly ticket would cost \$3.75 for elementary students and \$4.00 for secondary students compared to \$3.25 and \$3.50 last year. Adult meals would cost \$1.10, up 10c from last year.

The only question arose on milk which doubled from 5c to 10c. Richard Zarling, Director of Elementary Education, said that kindergarten fees had already been approved at \$6.00 per semester. Without changing these and using the new price schedule, the district would lose \$6.00 per year per student on milk. Finally a new

kindergarten fee of \$8.00 was approved to avoid subsidy of the milk and cracker program. Borch again explained that the food service is a non-profit self-suppporting venture which usually has a cash base left over annually. This year it started with \$1600.

A teacher contract was approved for Judy M. Greatens who will be teaching Business Education at the high school as well as being a cheerleading and FBLA advisor. Lisa Hammer will be teaching 6th grade and graduated from UW-Oshkosh. Irene Stradtman was also hired as a ½ time kindergarten teacher.

The board approved the purchase of a bass guitar for \$500

and a bass drum for \$410. The guitar is needed in September for the Jazz Ensemble and the drum replaces a rapidly deteriorating percussive monstrosity. A piccolo and tenor sax purchase will be postponed.

Substitue teacher pay was changed to \$19 per ½ day and \$35 for a full day. After 10 days of subbing, the pay increases to \$40 per day. After 20 days, the pay is comparable to the regular salary schedule at a BA base.

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
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Early Farm Days Held







4-H Leaders Plan For 1981 County Fair

The 1981 County Fair is still almost a year away but it's not too far to be thinking about it. The main topic at the 4-H Leaders meeting on Wednesday, August 20, at 8:00 p.m. at the West Bend Marine Bank will be suggestions for the 1981 County Fair. Now, while the 1980 Fair is still fresh in their minds, the leaders want to remember those things that went well which they would like to see repeated. They also want to be making suggestions for improving in the future. Mary Lynn Prost, the president of the Washington County 4-H Leaders Association invites all adult and youth leaders of the county to attend and participate. John Kohl, chairman of the county fair committee will be on hand to listen to the leaders comments and answer questions.

Other business at the leaders meeting will include an explanation of the 4-H Exploring project. Leaders of 4-H Exploring groups are invited to bring examples of things their members have made to more vividly portray the project. Other business includes reorganizing 4-H clubs, re-enrolling members for 1981 and nominations for officers of the County 4-H Leaders Association for the coming year.

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"In general, to use vitamin C for colds and similar illnesses, I think you need from 250 to 1000 milligrams a day," writes Dr. Lawrence E. Lamb in his health column. "Less than 250 won't help much, and more than 1000 won't give any added benefit."

"Some studies suggest that Vitamin C does help prevent the severity of colds, but there is doubt that large doses actually prevent colds," writes Dr. Lamb. Nevertheless, he states, "I don't think anyone is going to have any trouble from doses of 1000 milligrams a day or less."
