Only 194 Votes Cast in Village: **Kasten Wins**

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The only contest was for United States Senator on the Republican ticket, where there were four candidates. Village voters followed the trend in the county and state by nominating former Rep. Robert W. Kasten Jr. to oppose Democratic Senator Gaylord A. Nelson in the November 4 election.

In Washington County the voter turnout was estimated at only 15 per cent.

Kasten won out over three other Republicans who were also seeking the right to challenge Sen. Nelson in November. They were Douglass Cofrin, Russell A. Olson and Terry J. Kohler.

With about 69% of the vote reported Wednesday morning, Kasten had 39% compared with 28% for Kohler, his nearest challenger. Next were Cofrin and Olson

Kewaskum has moved into the Eastern Wisconsin Conference this year and Slinger is now a member of the Parkland Conference, following the disbanding of the Scenic Moraine. The level of competition should be about the same, with one or two strong teams.

EDITORS TOUR EASTERN WISCONSIN SCHOOLS

For a Labor Day ride, the publishers of the Statesman made a get acquainted tour to learn the locations of the schools and their football fields in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, of which Kewaskum is a new member this year. We started out at Plymouth and Sheboygan Falls, then headed north to Two Rivers, [a long trip of about 70 miles from Kewaskum for the Indians], then back down to New Holstein and Kiel, and over to Valders [which dropped out of the conference this year] and ending up at Chilton enroute home. found that some of the schools have fine football facilities, similar to the Scenic Moraine, especially the city of Two

Last year Kewaskum's lack of depth contributed heavily to the team's poor 2-7 record (1-6 in the Scenic Moraine) but this year Head Coach Mike Fifrick has more depth. His squad of 42 players includes 12 seniors, 24 juniors and 6 sophomores. Fifrick said that for a successful football program about 33 juniors and seniors are needed so you're three deep at all positions.

clude Two Rivers, Plymouth, Sheboygan Falls, Kiel, Chilton and New Holstein. Two Rivers is the largest school with an enrollment of about 1065. Then comes Plymouth 1009, New Holstein 850, Kewaskum 804, Sheboygan Falls 680, Kiel 655, and Chilton 550.

Fifrick, beginning his second year as head coach, has just six lettermen and a few other regulars returning. Lettermen include seniors Randy Heberer. LB and FB; Perry Kempf, E and LB: Steve Muench, T: Roger Gavin, T, and Brian Dreher, FB and LB, and junior Dave Donath, HB and LB.

Of these lettermen, two of them are already out of action. Dreher will miss the first few games while recovering from a separated shoulder and real tough blow was Donath tearing ligaments in his knee in an intra-squad contest. A two way starter, Donath underwent knee surgery and is expected to be lost for the season.

Besides having more depth, this year's team has much more needed size. Last year the biggest player was only 182 pounds. This year 5-9, 230pound Dick Thompson, 6-1, 220-pound Ken Schuette, 6-0, 208-pound Jim Simon, 6-1, 192pound Doug Petsch and 6-0, 185-pound Dale Remmel will help the line.

Hephner Objects to Lower Temperatures of Milk

A regulation proposed by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection directing dairy farmers to decrease milk temperatures an additional five degrees should not be approved, according to State Representative Gervase Hephner (D-Chilton).

Citing added costs for the dairy farmer and increased energy consumption, Hephner called on Senator David Berger (D-Milwaukee) and Representative William Rogers (D-Kaukauna), to oppose the regulation when it comes before their Joint Committee for the Review of Administrative Rules (JCRAR).

The regulation requires state dairy farmers to cool Grade A milk to 45 degrees (F) instead of the present 50-degree (F) standard.

The extra cost for Wisconsin's dairy farmers would be over \$1 million, Hephner said, and, the additional electricity required to cool the milk another five degrees would light 25,000 homes for a month and heat the water, as well.

"What's worse," Hephner said, "suggestions for lowering the temperature to 38 degrees (F) have surfaced. This is absurd, it would cost our dairy farmers over \$2.5 million."

Department officials contend that 94 percent of the dairy farmers in the state already meet this regulation, cooling their milk to 45 degrees. "If this is the case, why adopt the regulation in the first place?" Hephner argued.

The Assembly Committee on Agriculture already opposed adoption of the provision. Since the Board of Agriculture continues to support the regulation, however, it will hopefully be consumer nor the beforced to bear

considered at a public hearing before JCRAR.

In urging the committee to kill the regulation, Hephner stressed, "The proposed regulation will ultimately shift the cost of cooling milk onto the shoulders of the consumer through higher milk prices—a price increase that neither the consumer nor the farmer should be forced to bear."



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

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If you planted tomatoes in your garden this year, you probably are in the midst of a bumper crop of ripe tomatoes. Don't panic. Even though they are very perishable once they are ripe, there are many quick and easy ways to preserve their summer freshness and flavor for year round use.

Start with high quality fruits. Allow your tomatoes to ripen on the plants. However, do not allow them to ripen to the point of cracks as this may allow for contamination with disease organism or insect larvae and would not be suitable for preservation. If you find hard, discolored area or blossom end rot, it is not recommended to use for canning or juice but could be used fresh for paste or catsup once the spot is removed.

When canning tomatoes you usually can figure a yield of 15-20 quarts of canned tomatoes from one bushel (53 lbs.) of tomatoes

When choosing the method you wish to preserve tomatoes, consider the cost, time and energy required and your preferences.

There are two methods of canning tomatoes: either the boiling water method or the pressure canner method. NEVER use the open-kettle canning method for tomatoes. he danger in this method is that you cannot raise the temperature high enough and uniformly enough to destroy microorganisms. Also, tomatoes may be contaminated by air which remains in the jar between the liquid and the lid.

In recent years with new varieties of tomatoes available which are lower in acidity, canning methods had to be changed in order to assure a safe product. Therefore, it is essential to change methods of canning to insure that food

poisoning does not occur. The food poisoning which could occur from improperly canned foods is botulism. Botulism is potentially a fatal poisoning. If botulism microorganisms are not destroyed in canning, it will grow and produce a harmful substance.

The safest method is to use a pressure canner. You may pack the jars either raw or boiling for processing in a pressure canner. Process at 5 pounds of pressure for 10 minutes for both pints and jars. Start timing your processing time as soon as the pressure reaches 5 pounds.

If processing in a boiling water bath, add 1/4 tsp. per pint or 1/2 tsp. per quart of citric acid to each jar. There also is available a canning tablet which has salt and citric acid which can be added. Bottled lemon juice can also be used. You will need to add 8 tsp. of lemon juice per quart of tomatoes. A new product called A.C.M. (ascorbic citrus mixture) can be added. Use 1/2 tsp. per quart.

Process raw pack tomatoes in boiling water bath canner for 30 minutes (both pints and quarts) and process hot pack tomatoes in boiling water bath canner for 15 minutes (both pints and

The above method of canning should be followed also for canning tomato juice, as well as canning tomatoes

When canning tomato paste or tomato sauce, a pressure canner must be used.

Tomatoes can also be safely frozen. The most acceptable method you will find is stewed, pureed or juice.

Whole tomatoes tend to crack and collapse completely when

To freeze tomatoes for stewing, use only sound, fully ripe, highly colored tomatoes. Wash them thoroughly and scald them to loosen skins. Remove skins, cores and any green parts. Quarter tomatoes and using low heat, simmer 10-20 minutes until tomatoes are tender. Cool quickly by placing into small pans in ice cold water. Package the cooled tomatoes in rigid, moisture-vapor proof containers and fast freeze. Label with date and contents.

To prepare tomato juice for freezing, use only sound, fully ripe, highly colored tomatoes.

Wash them thoroughly and scald them to loosen skins. Remove skins, cores and any green parts. To thin the juice, add 1/4 to 1/2 cup water for each two quarts of tomatoes.

Heating tomatoes is necessary to inactivate an enzyme that is released when you cut or crush the fruit. This enzyme destroys vitamin C and causes the juice to separate or settle. Therefore, with low heat, simmer 5-10 minutes until parts separate easily when poured through a strainer, sieve or food mill. If desired, add 1 tsp. salt to each quart of juice. Pack cold into rigid, moisture-vapor-proof containers, leaving 1' space. Label with date and

If you have a blender, pureed tomatoes freeze well. Use 3-4 raw tomatoes, peeled and cored. Place them in an electric blender, add 1/2 medium onion, 1 seeded green pepper, 1 tsp. salt or 1 tblsp. sugar and salt mixture. Celery and carrots can be added. This puree is a good base for spaghetti sauce, as an addition to chili or meat loaf, or can be consumed as a beverage, with or without diluting. You can freeze this mixture without heating because ingredients are broken up and the product is handled rapidly and in small amounts. When frozen, the pulp separates from the liquid and flavor does not remain acceptable over long storage. But if you heat it to boiling, it will have a better consistency and flavored blend. Cool the heated mixture quickly in refrigerator or in small pans of ice

cold water before packaging and freezing.

Be safe, not sorry and use only recommended methods of processing your fruits and vegetables

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


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The Department of Natural it has awarded Washington and ask to application. Resources recently announced improve 11 failing septic systems.

The Wisconsin Fund provides grants to cover 60% (\$3,000 maximum per system) of the cost of replacing or rehabilitating residential or small commercial septic systems. Only failing systems-not new oneswith county or state enforcement orders against them are eligible. Seasonal homes and small businesses with average daily wastewater loads of more than 2,100 gallons are ineligible

The DNR has awarded more than \$1.3 million for work on 765 septic systems. Counties that have received Wisconsin Fund grants so far are: Columbia, Crawford, Dane, Grant, lowa, Iron, Jackson, Marathon, Monroe, Oneida, Pepin, Pierce, Portage, Richland, Sauk, Sawyer, Vilas, Washington and Waukesha.

Interest in the Wisconsin Fund grant program continues to grow. Twenty-four counties have passed resolutions to participate and have adopted 3-year maintenance/inspection programs.

The question that arises once a county agrees to participate in the Wisconsin Fund program is "How do I get my name on the application?"

Before a county can submit grant applications on behalf of its residents, it must meet statutory program requirements. The county must have a sanitary code that calls for inspection of all new septic systems every three years, whether the property owner had received state funds or not.

Once the county board resolves to participate in the program, an application listing individual properties and grant eligible costs is sent to the DNR for review. If approved, the DNR makes a grant award.

When qualifying property owners learn their county is considering applying for a

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grant, they should contact the county zoning administrator and ask to be included in the

The DNR reminded property owners with eligible systems that they have 12 months from the date of the enforcement order to complete work on their systems. The county must submit the grant application to the DNR within that same 12 month period.

After work on the septic system is completed and paid for, the property owner must provide the county a copy of the cancelled check and paid invoice, which will be sent to the DNR. The department will make a grant payment to the county, which will in turn reimburse the property owner.

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

Donald Woller from Foth & Van Dyke and Associates recommended the 100% payment of the DCG-200 and a partial payment on the MRP-36. 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
