No Fast, Easy Solution for Bel-Ric Sidewalk/Bussing Problem

The School Board Transportation Committee and Village Public Works Committee met Monday evening in the hope of resolving the problem of bussing 161 children from the Bel-Ric subdivision.

The committees met to find a solution that would save the Kewaskum School District approximately \$16,000 a year in bussing costs.

These children are within the two-mile walking limit. However, due to the hazardous situation of having to walk along both county highway H and U.S. 45, these children are being bussed.

The School Board is not

asking for sidewalks within the subdivision, only some type of walkway, not necessarily side-walks, that would allow stu-dents to go down "H" and '45" until they reach existing sidewalks on the west side of 45.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated the cost to install sidewalks along "H" would run approximately \$52,300.00, the major expense being the storm sewers and curbing which would be re-quired before any sidewalk construction. Construction of sidewalks along Hwy. "45" from the Behnke property north would cost approximately \$27,000.00.

National Merit Scholarship Exam Scheduled at High School

Michael Theiler, guidance counselor at Kewaskum High School, has announced that juniors will be able to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this fall. The test, co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, is an important step in making college

Scheduled for October 21 at Kewaskum High School, the PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical aptitude two abilities important in doing college work. The test can also lead to other opportunities for high school students. For example, students can ask to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service which helps colleges learn about students like them.

By taking the PSAT/NMSQT, they can enter the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corp. and can get a good idea of what the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like.

Along with their score re-

ports, students will receive a copy of ABOUT YOUR PSAT/ NMSQT SCORES, a booklet that contains valuable how-to information about: estimating SAT scores; finding out where to get and how to use detailed information about colleges and financial aid; and planning for financing a college education.

Also, students can use the college Board's College Handbook, to compare their scores with those of enrolled students at more than 2,800 colleges and universities.

Theiler was also pleased to announce that Darla Bader, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Myhal, 7926 Sandy Ridge Road, Kewaskum, has been named a semi-finalist in the National Merit Scholarship Corporation competition. The semi-finalists, named in every state, represent the top half of one percent of the states' high school senior class. The semi-finalists will be competing for about 4,500 merit scholarships to be announced and awarded next spring.

Darla is the first KHS student in the last four years to receive such a high standard of achievement.

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



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

have children walk down "H" to Milan Drive with easements from adjoining property owners to construct a walkway to the existing sidewalk.

Village Board member Mlodzik stated he had several calls and Dan Schmidt had a letter from the Meilahn family stating they would not give any easements across their properties.

Dr. Ogi suggested contacting District Director Dan Rodenkirch to see if an easement across the AMPI Milk Transfer property could be obtained. It was also suggested that the state be contacted about developing some type of path or walk across the section of state-owned land on "H" and "45."

An alternate route would be to have students walk down "H" to "45," north on the shoulder to the existing sidewalk. The major stumbling

block to this proposal was the 45-mile-per-hour speed limit on "45" to "H." The state will not approve any route unless the speed limit is reduced.

A request to the Department of Transportation, approximately one month ago, asked for a speed reduction from 45 to 30 mph. Dan Schmidt stated action on this request could take from 18-24 months. The state also said they would not even review the request until Minz Supply opened their new store.

If approval is granted, the Highway 45 route would be reconsidered. Superintendent Brenholt said the "45" route would be acceptable if the speed limit is reduced.


Dr. Ogi requested another meeting be held to see if we are progressing or standing still on this problem. Dan Schmidt said he would set up another meeting date and contact the School



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
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KHS to Present 'Li'l Abner'

INITIAL RESOLUTION RELATING TO INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REVENUE BOND FINANCING ON BEHALF OF REGAL WARE, INC

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin (the 'Municipality'') is a municipal corporation organized and existing under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Wisconsin and is authorized by Section 66.521 Wisconsin Statutes, as amended (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Act"),

(a) issue revenue bonds to finance all or any part of the costs of the construction, equipping, reequipping, acquisition, purchase, installation, reconstruction, rebuilding, rehabilitation, improving, supplementing, replacing, maintaining, repairing, enlarging, extending or remodeling of a project which qualifies under the Act and the improvement of the site there-

for; and (b) enter into a revenu agreement with an eligible participant pursuant to which the eligible participant agrees to cause said project to be constructed and to pay the Municipality an amount of funds sufficient to provide for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and interest on said revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, Regal Ware, Inc., a Wisconsin corporation (the "Eligible Participant") has been considering undertaking a project in the Municipality, and the Eligible Participant has represented to the Muncipality

that it would be an encouragement and inducement for the Eligible Participant to proceed if the project could be financed with revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Eligible Participant has represented that the intended use of the project is for the purpose of manufacturing and warehousing of cookware products and that the project would consist of a building addition and equipment (hereinafter called the Project''); and

WHEREAS, the Eligible Participant has estimated that the cost of the Project would be approximately \$1,000,000 but, with allowance for modifications, design changes, and inflation could be as high as \$2,000,000; and

WHEREAS, prior to the date of adoption of this Resolution, a statement which provides a good faith estimate of attorney fees which are expected to be paid from proceeds of the revenue bonds has been filed with the Clerk and with the Department of Business Development of the State of Wisconsin, or its successor; and

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest of the Municipality to promote, attract, stimulate, rehabilitate and revitalize commerce, industry and manufacturing, to promote the betterment of the environment and the economy of the Municipality and to stimulate a large flow of private investment funds into the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding and determination of this body that the Project is a qualified "project" within the meaning of the Act and that the Eligible Participant is an "eligible participant" within the meaning of the Act; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding and determination of this body that the Municipality would derive public benefits from the Project and its operation, including by way of illustration but not limitation the following: the provision and retention of gainful employment opportunities for the citizens of the Municipality; the stimulation of the flow of investment capital into the Municipality with resultant beneficial effects on the economy in the Municipality; and the preservation and enhancement of the Muncipality's tax base; and


WHEREAS, it is the finding and determination of this body that the public interest will be served if the Municipality were to encourage and induce the Eligible Participant to undertake the Project in the Municipality;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. Subject to the conditions specified in paragraph 2, the Municipality shall pursue and consummate a financing having the following elements:

(a) The Municipality shall issue revenue bonds pursuant to the Act at one or more times in one or more series in such





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
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aggregate principal amount not in excess of \$2,000,000 as the Eligible Participant shall request; providing, however, that the actual aggregate principal amount shall not be greater than the then estimated aggregate cost of providing the Project and paying the costs incident to the financing thereof (said bonds being hereinafter called the "Bonds").

(b) The Bonds shall be limited obligations of the Municipality payable by the Municipality solely out of revenues derived from the Eligible Participant or otherwise provided for pursuant to the terms of the loan or similar agreement (hereinafter called the "Revenue Agreement'') to be entered into between the Municipality and the Eligible Participant.

(c) The Revenue Agreement shall require the Eligible Participant to acquire, construct or install the Project and to provide the Municipality with revenues sufficient to pay when due the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds.

(d) The Bonds shall have such maturities, interest rates and redemption limitations as the Eligible Participant and the initial Bond purchaser(s) shall propose

2. The issuance of the Bonds by the Municipality shall be on the following conditions:

(a) The Bonds shall not constitute an indebtedness of the Municipality within the meaning of any State constitutional provision or statutory limitation.

(b) The Bonds shall not

constitute or give rise to a pecuniary liability of the Municipality or a charge against its general credit or taxing powers.

(c) The Eligible Participant shall be responsible for finding a purchaser or purchasers for all of the Bonds

(d) Prior to the issuance of the Bonds: (i) the electors of the Municipality shall have been given the opportunity to petition for a referendum on the matter of the Bond issue as required by the Act; (ii) either no such petition shall be timely filed or such petition shall have been filed and said referendum shall have approved the Bond issue; and (iii) this body, by further resolution, shall have authorized and approved the terms of the Bonds and the Revenue Agreement.

(e) The Bonds shall be issued pursuant to the Act, and the delivery of the Bonds shall be accompanied with the unqualified approving legal opinion of Messrs. Foley & Lardner or such other nationally recognized firm of bond at-torneys as shall be acceptable to the Municipality and the Eligible Participant.

3. All out-of-pocket costs in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds shall be paid either from the proceeds of the Bonds or by the Eligible Participant.

4. The Clerk shall cause notice of adoption of this Resolution to be published once in Kewaskum Statesman (the Municipality's official newspaper, for the publication of notices pursuant to Chapter 985 of the Wisconsin Statutes), and shall cause evidence of publication (including a copy of the notice as published) indicating the date of publication of such public notice to be filed with the Secretary of Business Development of the State of Wisconsin or such Secretary's successor within 10 days following publication of such notice.

5. This Resolution is an

"initial resolution" within the meaning of the Act and official action toward issuance of the Bonds for purposes of Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

6. This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its passage and approval. Unless the Bonds shall have been issued prior thereto, the authorities and authorizations given by this Resolution shall expire on the second anniversary date of the date of adoption of this Resolution or on such later date as this body may specify by resolution adopted either before or after such date

RESOLUTION RELATING TO WAIVER OF SECTION 66.521(11)(b)1. IN CONNECTION WITH AN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

REVENUE BOND FINANCING ON BEHALF OF REGAL WARE, INC.

WHEREAS, this body has adopted a resolution entitled "Initial Resolution Relating to Industrial Development Revenue Bond Financing On Be-half Of Regal Ware, Inc." (the "Initial Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, the Initial Resolution provides that upon certain conditions the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin (the "Municipality") shall issue industrial development revenue bonds pursuant to Section 66.521. Wisconsin Statutes, as amended (the "Act") to finance a project in the Municipality to be undertaken by Regal Ware, Inc., a Wisconsin corporation (the "Eligible Participant");

WHEREAS, the Eligible Participant has represented that the intended use of the project is for the purpose of manufacturing and warehousing of cookware products and that the project would consist of a building addition and equip-ment (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, Section (11)(b)1. of the Act contains provisions requiring competitive bidding for certain construction contracts and prohibiting discrimination with regard to the construction and operation of projects financed under the Act;

WHEREAS, Section (11)(b)2. of the Act empowers the governing body of a municipality to waive the requirements of Section (11)(b)1. with respect to

a particular project; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. It is the finding and determination of this body that the Municipality will not control the design, costs, construction or operation of the Project; that no public moneys will be expended for the Project; that the Municipality will have no beneficial ownership in the Project; that the primary reason for requiring competitive bidding for construction of municipal projects is to protect the taxpayers against excessive expenditures of public funds and that such reason, although sound as applied to public works, is not applicable to the Project in which no general funds or tax revenues of the Municipality will be used or put

at risk; that it would be more efficient and expedient for the accomplishment of the public purposes of the revenue bond issue if the Eligible Participant were to have complete control over the letting of contracts for construction for the Project; and that while an anti-discrimination policy such as that expressed in Section (11)(b)1. of the Act is supported by this body, public policies of that sort applied in the context of a bond financing are more appropriately effectuated by contract with the Eligible Participant. Therefore, the Municipality does hereby waive the provisions of Section (11)(b)1. of the Act with regard to the Project; provided, however, that the revenue agreement to be entered into between the Eligible Participant and the Municipality shall contain anti-discrimination clauses satisfactory to the Municipality.

2. The Clerk shall cause the foregoing resolution to be published together with the public notice required by the Initial Resolution.

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




