Village Administrator's **Duties Are Expanded**

At Monday night's meeting, Village Board President Gerald Stollenwerk announced that as of October 20, 1980, Dan Schmidt will serve in his capacity as Village Administrator on a full-time employee

Among Schmidt's added duties will be the coordination, direction and supervision of all

village departments with all departments reporting directly to him, rather than the Village Board. Schmidt's salary will be increased to \$19,250.00 per

The Village Board feels with this personnel realignment, there will be better coordination and communication between all departments and employees as well as more efficient use of village manpower and equipment resources.

Village May Lose Federal Sharing

Dan Schmidt reported on the status of the budget. No exact figures are available at this time. The county will not project their sharing figures until the middle of November. Tax bills will be running into December because all the necessary Revenue Sharing information is not available. The village was notified by the state that due to the census and budget cuts, Kewaskum's original funding has been cut by \$53,000.00, from \$278,000.00 to \$224,-792.00. On the Federal Revenue Sharing, Kewaskum will receive its last payment of approximately \$55,000.00. The Federal Funding program has expired

and unless Congress re-enacts this bill, there will be no future Federal Revenue program. Since the program went into effect with the state cut of \$51,000.00 for 1981, and a loss of Federal Revenue Sharing, Kewaskum could be looking at an approximate deficit of \$100,000.00 for the 1981

The Board approved issuance of a Class "B" Liquor and Malted Beverage license to Thomas Gundrum. Gundrum will become the new proprietor of the Homestead Supper Club, leasing the business from present owner Robert Klein.

No Application Made Here for Nursing Home

Dan Schmidt said he had received several inquiries about a proposed nursing home in Kewaskum. He said that no one, including himself or the Planning Commission had been contacted regarding such a project. The story carried by WBKV and the West Bend News was considered to be a rumor which started because the Beechwood Nursing Home has made application for a 74-bed full care facility in Washington County. The same application had been made to Sheboygan County but it was denied because of adequate facilities in that county. For this eason, Beechwood Nursing Home then applied to Washington County were statistics show a need for such a facility. However, to date, no such project seems to be in the planning and nothing is zoned in the village to accommodate such a facility.

Jeff Rohrer reported the Parks Committee received a state check for \$14,472.79, as reimbursement for park pro-



time, to provide the additional money required to operate this project. It was noted that Sheboygan County wanted to drop their program because of the cost.

Charles Schultz submitted his resignation from the Board of Appeals due to conflict of interest in some cases. The Board accepted the resignation and appointed John Tessar to fill the unexpired 2 years of the term. Richard Schmidt was appointed to replace Tessar as alternate.

Dan Schmidt read a letter from the Board of Appeals to Peter Knaup approving his variance request to build a 25-unit elderly housing unit in the Meadow Creek Apartments Complex. The Board moved to grant the variance.

Dan Schmidt presented figures from disposal companies for removal of sludge from the treatment plant. Waste Management Control submitted a price of \$400.00 for one 12 cubic yard container emptied once a week, plus a poundage charge. Schmidt said two such units per week would be needed, and the second container would be "slightly less" than \$400.00 Diamond F submitted a bid of \$300.00 per 15-20 yard load plus \$1.75 per gallon.

Paul Blumer felt both of these bids were out of the question. Schmidt suggested contacting Roger Neuman to see if some solution can be worked out with him. Stollenwerk and Blumer said they would talk with Neuman. Dan Schmidt thought Kewaskum could bag the sludge and sell it like Milwaukee, however, he was told by the DNR an order had been issued to Milwaukee stopping further sale of Milorganite. Permutit Corporation requested payment of the final 20% owed on the dewatering unit. The Board approved payment.

The meeting adjourned.

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

Born in Milwaukee on September 25, 1920, he came to





Sensenbrenner Speaks at Local **Chamber of Commerce Meeting**

Conservation programs have same government-backed supreduced American's energy consumption, but now it's time to embark on a "crash" program to develop new U. S. energy resources and more tax incentives for their use, U. S. Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. told the Kewaskum Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, October 15, at their monthly meeting at the Savings and Loan meeting room.

Asserting that conservation can reduce consumption only so much, Sensenbrenner said emphasis must now shift to perfecting alternative energy sources like solar, geothermal, and wind energy

'We have created a national Synthetic Fuels Corporation to accelerate the development of fuel from semi-conventional sources like coal, oil shale, and tar sands," Sensenbrenner said, "Now we should use the

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port for private sector development of solar and other renewable energy resources.

Sensenbrenner explained that Congress created the Synthetic Fuels Corpation to finance the construction of synthetic fuel plants by private industry and the marketing of the fuels they produce.

Also needed, according to Sensenbrenner, are more incentives for homeowners and businesses to invest in the installation of alternative energy equipment, such as solar heaters or windmill electric generators.

He suggested that incentives for using solar and other new system could come in two forms: tax credits for home installations much like those allowed now for energy conservation devices, and new accelerated depreciation sched-


ules for businesses installing alternative energy such systems.

"It's not easy to organize a get-out-the vote effort in Wisconsin's rural areas, but we're trying a variety of things to get people interested and to the polls on election day, "Rohde said.

The former Farmers Union president said the committee's activities include distributing and putting up barn signs, making telephone calls, placing bumper stickers on tractors and other farm vehicles, talking at farm meetings and distributing special literature that emphasizes farm and agricultural issues.

He said that the farm committee's efforts were boosted by recent news reports that less than 50 percent of those eligible plan to vote and a commitment from Carter's national and state headquarters to actively pursue the rural vote in Wisconsin and elsewhere "There really are a lot of votes out there to be won," he said, "and with such a clear choice, President Carter should win most of them."

Local media in the area played a news release from the 6th Assembly District Republican candidate on her campaign finance disclosures. Her statements on the effect of special interest influence in political campaigns, however, not only show the political naivete on the part of my opponent, but they also represent one of the worst cases of political demogoguery I have ever heard.

The part of her release that I find particularly improper is her claim that I am "an ineffective legislator whose vote has been bought and paid for by special interests." I resent these dirty campaign tactics which ignore the real issues.

The fact that my opponent is now questioning the integrity of the organizations and individuals who have pooled their nickles and dimes into political action committees leaves one to wonder just who she is going to represent. No one knows what my opponent stands for. And she, herself, hasn't made the issues of her campaign very



services last Friday night for the first time in many years, when the section of the line from Waucousta to Dundee was put in service. It is reported that when company representatives who promoted the line in Dundee talked to residents of the vicinity they were told that many years ago Dundee had a central power station in the mill there, a generator being connected to the water wheel at the mill, and that a power line ran from the village to Campbellsport. Water power development at Dundee is one of the oldest in the state, but no records are available locally to determine when the power was used to generate electricity or when the service was halted. 

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

Indians Give Sheboygan Falls Scare, Lose 14-6

Coming up with one of their best performances of the season, the fired up Kewaskum Indians came close to upsetting favored Sheboygan Falls in their homecoming game here Friday night but ended up on the short end again, 14-6. It was the fifth straight setback in the Eastern Wisconsin for the last place Indians.

With a solid first half effort, Kewaskum held the Falcons to a 0-0 score at the intermission before a homecoming crowd. All of the scoring came in the second half. An 83-yard play action pass from quarterback Ric Leitheiser to Perry Kempf with 3:54 remaining in the fourth quarter had brought the Indians to within a point at 7-6, after the Falcons had scored in the third period and kicked the extra point. Then Leitheiser's pass intended for Kempf on the two-point conversion try was batted away by a defender, leaving the Indians trailing by one point. Falls added an insurance score on a 15-yard run with 1:21 to play in the last

The Indians failed on two good scoring threats in the scoreless first half. On the first starting from the Falcon 48 yard line, they moved all the way to the Falls 12 yard line before fumbling, with Keith Thomas recovering for the Falcons. After making only two yards on three downs, Falls was forced to punt again. Kewaskum got the ball on their opponents' 45. With hard running by Randy Heberer the Indians picked up first downs on the 29 and 15 but the drive stalled. On fourth down Brian Larsen tried a 25 yard field goal but it was wide to the right

Inspired by outplaying the Falcons in the scoreless first half, the Indians took the ball to start off the second half. But after a couple short gains a Leitheiser pass was intercepted by Tim Huibregtse, who brought it to the Kewaskum 40. A couple of first downs and another on a face mask penalty gave them the ball on the one yard line from where John Blust took it over. Blust carried the ball seven times in the eight play Falls drive. This put Falls ahead, 7-0.

After Larsen couldn't handle a snap on a punt situation, the Falcons took over deep in Kewaskum territory again. After one first down, Jeff Wollert carried to the two but a clipping penalty brought the ball back to the 23. Then Kempf intercepted a pass at the six to end the threat. Two runs by Scott Stoltzmann gave the Indians better field position. Then Leitheiser hit Kempf on a long 83 yard pass for Kewaskum's only score.

The final Falcon score came with just 1:21 remaining when Dean Schlegel scampered 14 yards to highlight a 57 yard drive which was helped by two 15 yard Indian penalties.

Blust was the game's leading ball carrier with 148 yards in 30 carries for the Falcon ace. Randy Heberer led the Indians with 113 yards in 24 attempts.

The Indians have this week off when they have a bye in the schedule in the seven-team conference. They will close the season at Kiel next week. Kiel has won only one game to date.
