## Exodus House Plans Purchase of Kleineschay Property for Expansion

Thor Otto, Director of Exodus Transitional Care Facility, appeared before the Kewaskum Plan Commission Tuesday evening. Otto is requesting approval of re-zoning the property at 1338 Midland Avenue from R-2, to B-2 or R-4.

Exodus House, a half-way house for recovering alcoholics, has an opportunity to purchase the Kleineschay property directly behind their present facility. Otto said with the purchase of this property, the half-way house could increase their facilities from 16 beds to 24 beds. It was noted Exodus House has a continuing waiting list of men who are asking to stay at the home. Otto stated by law they cannot exceed 25 beds or 1% of the village's population.

Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling said he had not received any negative remarks or complaints regarding Exodus House and recommended the Commission consider a change to R-4 zoning rather than B-2 thereby keeping the property classified residential. Other members of the Commission said they also had good reports on the home both private and from the Chief of Police.

Commission member Charles Miller suggested Otto poll the neighbors and explain this expansion program so there would be no questions or misunderstandings later.

The Commission moved to recommend re-zoning and a public hearing to the Village Board. The next Board meeting is scheduled for November 17.

President Gerald Stollenwerk asked Commission members for recommendations of future projects to be considered for a possible TIF program. Top priority by all the members present was extension of Reigle Drive. Zarling also felt that construction of an interceptor sewer be considered part of any plans to extend Reigle Drive. He felt that eventually there would be development in that area and if these two projects were combined, it would save the village money. Other future projects suggested were getting more water pressure to the south end of town especially now with the added demands of new construction, repair and remodeling of the Municipal Building, and a second bridge in Kewaskum to allow for better

access to the east side of town. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt reported Beechwood Nursing Home had made application to the South East Health

Systems as the first step in the possible construction of a 74 bed facility in the Kewaskum area. So far no other action has been taken on this project.

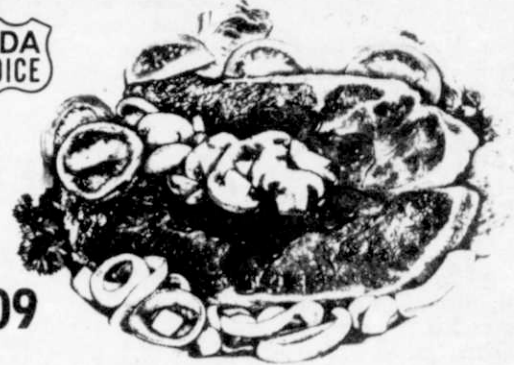

## Open Letter to the 6th District

October 26, 1980  
Chilton, Wisconsin

**Dear Voter:**

The 1980 election is an important year for a number of reasons to the people of the 6th Assembly District. Probably the most important reason is reapportionment (which is the establishment of the boundaries for each legislative district in the state). Who will represent you is very important in the 1980's with other issues as capital gains, product liability, taxation, inflation, farm issues, labor law reform and a host of other issues.

This campaign has been very trying by an opponent who, at public forums, cannot debate or even discuss the issues and has resorted to personal attacks on my character. Let me state that I had decided and will not lower myself to personal attacks on any candidate. I have been urged to respond, especially by friends and my family who have worked hard on this campaign, to the personal attacks upon myself by my opponent.

FIRST — Paying taxes as a legislator is an automatic payroll deduction from my paycheck. You notice my opponent cites only three years out of 14 years that I have been in public office and paying taxes. In 1976 we had a drought in the state of Wisconsin and a severe loss as a farmer. SECOND — She takes small clippings from a large article and states I am an ineffective legislator. My job is not to seek chairmanships, glory, popularity, greed or fame, but to REPRESENT THE 6TH ASSEMBLY DISTRICT. Chairmanships are fine, but as a freshman legislator she would not be one because no person even after 20 years in the legislature as a member of the minority party is a chairman, that's the system.

THIRD — An effective legislator is not decided by a radical left wing newspaper, and quoting out of it is like asking your dog to make snowballs. The PEOPLE DECIDE in the district who has done the job, not the speaker or a staff person, or in this case a left-wing reporter.

FOURTH — Her charge about passing bills as a measure of success. I have introduced bills NOT FOR MYSELF but at the request of the people in the district. Some bills pass and some do not because of the governor vetoes, etc.

FIFTH — She states she is pro-life, but refuses to admit that I am the pro-life endorsed candidate.

SIXTH — My airplane case was settled out of court against Mr. Hanson, the pilot of the plane, and I never received a single penny from the state because of the accident. This is public record, and not a half truth statement by my opponent.

SEVENTH — FINANCES FOR MY CAMPAIGN have come from voluntary contributions, and not from millionaires like many of her dollars are. I have no I. O. U.'s, but she will to those large millionaire executives, who she has sought out as her friends in this campaign. My money has come from friends and neighbors who are farmers, laborers, senior citizens, and small business persons.

I thank the people in the district for their support in the past, and my family thanks you for the courtesy extended to them as they knocked on your door. You are a great and wonderful people, and I have faith and confidence in your decision on November 4th. I need your continued support as Independents, Republicans and Democrats.

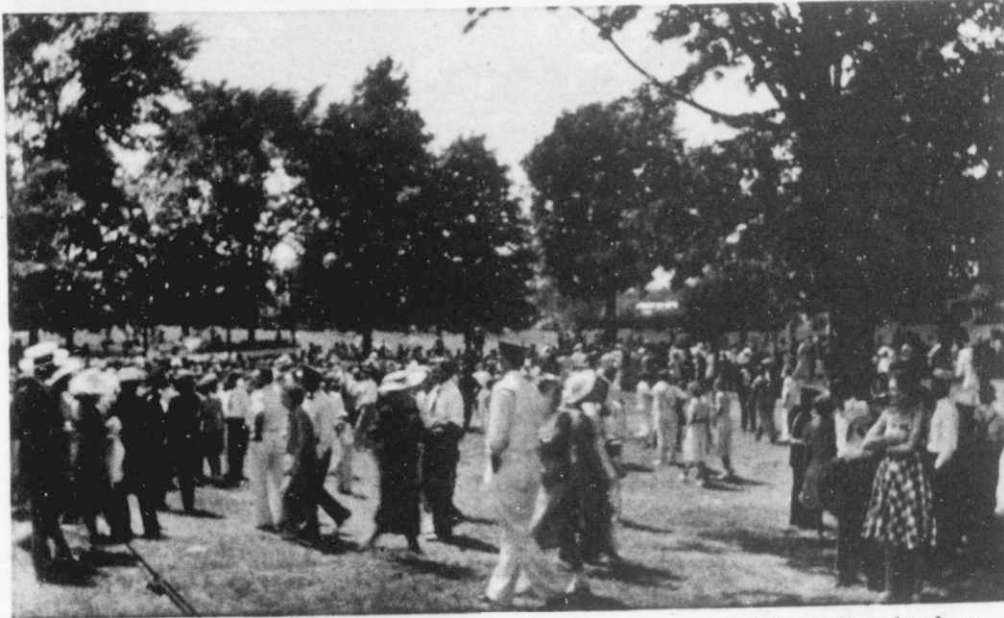

The students left Kewaskum Wednesday afternoon by school bus to Milwaukee, where they boarded a plane to Washington, D.C. and started the tour as soon as they arrived there. They boarded buses and toured the Marine Memorial (flag-raising at Iwo Jima), Jefferson and Lincoln Memorials, the Congressional Library and other sites before checking into their motel.

The next day the group traveled to Mount Vernon where history came alive as they traveled the same roads as our first president. They witnessed the impressive Change-of-Guard Ceremony at the Arlington Cemetery. The Smithsonian Institute kept the attention of the group for most of the afternoon.

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

If an elector wishes to vote for all candidates nominated by any party, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the circle or depress the lever or button under the party designation printed at the top of the ballot. Unless a name has been erased or crossed out, another name written in, a mark placed to the right of a candidate for the same office in another column or a sticker applied, a mark in the circle at the top of the column is a vote for all the party's candidates listed in the column. If an elector does not wish to vote for all candidates nominated by one party, the elector shall make a cross or mark in the square at the right of or separately depress the levers or buttons next to each candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote, or shall insert or write in the name of a candidate.

In presidential elections, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the set of candidates for president and vice president for whom he or she intends to vote. The vote shall be counted for all the candidates for presidential electors of those candidates.

On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the answer which he or she intends to give.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two ballot clerks or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her ballot, the elector shall leave the machine or booth, and where paper ballots are used, give his or her name to the inspector in charge or the ballot box, hand the inspector his or her folded ballot to be placed in the ballot box deposit any unused ballots in the blank ballot box, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist in marking the ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.

**Sensenbrenner Tells Students Increase in Military Pay Needed**

People claiming the only weakness of the U.S. military is a lack of new weapons systems are wrong, U.S. Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. (R-Wis.) told a group of West Bend West High School students last Tuesday.

Just as important to the strengthening of American defenses to restore their former

equality with those of the Soviet Union is an increase in the pay for military personnel, Sensenbrenner said.

Sensenbrenner pointed out to the students that there are many cases of enlisted personnel receiving food stamps to supplement their meager military pay.

"I seriously doubt the quality and motivation of military personnel having to resort to food stamps to get by," Sensenbrenner said.

The all-volunteer army has been successful in providing

manpower, Sensenbrenner continued, but that may change unless pay scales for enlisted personnel are substantially increased.

We can continue to avoid instituting the draft if we provide more incentive for new recruits than the prospect of subsistence living on food stamps," the Republican lawmaker said, "I believe better pay is a far preferable alternative for meeting our person-

nel needs than is having to draft our young people."

**All Dogs Must Be  
Vaccinated Against  
Rabies; Clinic Nov. 1**

Assembly Bill No. 751 which  
was signed into law by the  
Governor of Wisconsin on May  
17, 1980 requires that all dogs  
in the State of Wisconsin be  
vaccinated against rabies.

Chapter 289 Section 8.95.21  
(2) (a) reads:

"Requirement for vaccination.  
The owner of the dog shall  
have the dog vaccinated against  
rabies by a veterinarian within  
30 days after the dog reaches 4  
months of age and revaccinated  
within one year after the initial  
vaccination. If the owner obtains  
the dog or brings the dog into  
this state after the dog has  
reached 4 months of age, the  
owner shall have the dog vaccinated  
against rabies within 30  
days after the dog is obtained or  
brought into the state unless the  
dog has been vaccinated as  
evidenced by a current certificate  
of rabies vaccination from this  
state or another state. The owner  
of a dog shall have the dog  
revaccinated against rabies by  
a veterinarian before the date  
that the immunization expires  
as stated on the certificate of  
vaccination or, if no date is  
specified, within three years  
after the previous vaccination."

Chapter 289 Section 38 states  
"Transition provision; rabies  
vaccination. The owner of a dog  
5 months of age or older which  
was not vaccinated against  
rabies in the previous 3 years  
shall have the dog vaccinated  
against rabies by a veterinarian  
on or before March 1, 1980,  
within 30 days after the dog  
reaches 5 months of age, or  
within 30 days after the dog is  
obtained or brought into this  
state, whichever is later."

Chapter 289 Section 41 (2)  
states in part:

"...section 38 of this act takes  
effect on the day following  
publication"

This law was published on the  
day following signature by the

Governor.

What all this means is that it  
is required by state law that  
your dog be vaccinated against  
rabies - and the law is now in  
effect.

It is your responsibility as a  
pet owner to comply with this  
law.

In order to help pet owners  
comply with this new law, the  
Washington County Humane  
Society has scheduled a Rabies  
Clinic on November 1, 1980.  
The Rabies Clinic will begin at  
1:00 p.m. and will be held at the  
shelter, located at 3650 Hwy.  
60, Slinger. The cost for each  
shot will be \$4.00. If there are

## Be A Responsible Hunter

"With the hunting seasons now in full swing, actions by hunters are highly visible," noted Homer Moe, DNR Hunter Education Coordinator, "and there are several things hunters should keep in mind as necessary to responsible conduct in the field."

"They need to plan their hunting trips carefully and carry with them reasonable expectations as to the amount of game they will bag," Moe said. "This involves a knowledge of the environment, wildlife habits and habitat, and specifically, of the area to be hunted."

He said that another important aspect of the hunt is coordination among hunters in the same party. All should know what role each will play and the location of each other member in the party during the hunt. "In recent years," Moe pointed out, "80 percent of hunting accidents involving two persons occurred among members of the same hunting party."

"Responsible hunters practice in the known safety precautions in handling firearms including being aware of what is in their line of fire and not shooting at game that is out of range of their gun," Moe said. "They pass up shots that would not result in a clean kill and properly retrieve, field dress and utilize all game they harvest," he continued.

"If you hunt on private land," Moe emphasized, "get permission from the owner in advance of going onto his property." "And, while hunting on private land, remember, the land owner, on whose property most of our wild game is raised, rightfully expects all invited guests, including hunters, to be totally responsible citizens."

"Don't you be the one to disappoint him," Moe concluded, "and, remember, all other hunters will be judged by your actions and activities...the future of hunting is up to you."

## 3 Area Runners In New Glarus Marathon

Three area runners completed the marathon course at Sugar River Trail, New Glarus, recently.

Rick Stenanovic, 18, of Kewaskum, who is now a student at UW-Madison, finished his first marathon in three hours, 11 minutes, for 98th place in a field of over 500.
