Record Vote of 1166 Cast in Village; Republicans Sweep All But Two Posts

A record vote of 1166 was cast in the Village of Kewaskum in Tuesday's General Election. At times there were people standing in line to vote. The previous high vote here was 1075 in the 1976 Presidential Election.

Republicans were swept into office except for Representative to the Assembly, 6th District, where incumbent Gervase Hephner Democrat, defeated challenger Patricia Rusch, and District Attorney of Washington

County, where incumbent Democrat Frederick A. Fink, Jr. was unopposed.

Winners in Tuesday's election were:

President — President-elect Ronald Reagan (Republican) won an unexpectedly easy victory over Democratic President Jimmy Carter, with Independent John Adnerson running a weak third.

United States Senator — Democratic incumbent Gaylord A. Nelson was unseated by

Republican Robert W. Kasten, Jr. in a very tight race.

Representative in Congress, 9th District — Republican James Sensenbrenner, incumbent, easily defeated Democrat Gary C. Benedict.

State Senator, 2nd District — Incumbent Donald J. Hanaway, Republican, defeated Michael R. Mullen, Democrat.

Representative to the Assembly, 6th District — Incumbent Gervase A. Hephner, Democrat, beat Patricia Rusch, Republican.

County Clerk — George F. Nehrbass, Republican, unopposed.

County Treasurer — Incumbent Fredric A. Seefeldt, Republican, won a one-sided victory over Carl Chantelois, Libertarian.

County Sheriff — Incumbent Clarence A. Schwartz, Republican, won handily over Theodore L. Griepentrog, Independent.

County Coroner — Incumbent Robert H. Boltz, Republican, unopposed.

Clerk of Circuit Court — Incumbent Republican Jon W. Sanfilippo, Republican, unopposed.

District Attorney — Incumbent Frederick A. Fink, Jr., Democrat, unopposed.

Village Sludge Pit a First in State

Proposed Cable TV Ordinance Presented to Village Board

Joe Harlow, Chairman of the Cable TV Committee, came before the Village Board with a proposed ordinance which would govern Cable television service in Kewaskum. Harlow explained that this ordinance was developed after reviewing ordinances of several cities including Campbellsport, West Bend and Monona.

Village President Gerald Stollenwerk asked Harlow how soon work would begin on cable installation if this ordinance were approved. Harlow said he could not give a definite time schedule since a starting date hinged on when and how much work would be required by the utilities companies in making their poles ready for cable installation. (At a previous Cable TV Committee meeting, a River Bend representative stated work time had run anywhere between four weeks and eight months depending upon the speed with which the utilities completed their work).

Administrator Dan Schmidt apologized to the Board for not

getting this ordinance to them prior to Monday's meeting. Stollenwerk said he would publicly like to thank Harlow and his committee for all their time and work on this project. Stollenwerk felt, however, the Board should review the ordinance more thoroughly before making any moves for its adoption.

Trustee Jeff Rohrer presented a recommendation from the Plan Commission to grant a re-zoning request to the Exodus House for expansion of their alcoholics rehabilitation facility. A public hearing is set for November 17.

Stollenwerk reported that he and Trustee Raynor Herriges had talked with Roger Neumann regarding disposal of village sludge in his new pit. Neumann said the village could continue to haul to his land until the weather gets bad, then they could use his pit during the winter. He requested the village cover the cost of any snowplowing necessary to keep the road to the pit open. Neumann said he would not be willing to enter into a long term contract with

Park and Recreation Committee Reviews Proposed 1981 Budget

Parks Committee Chairman Jeff Rohrer gave a review of the Committee's project for the proposed 1981 budget. The preliminary figure for 1981 expenditures is approximately \$42,000.00.

Projects for consideration at the new park were a pier, basketball backstops, spectator seating, a lavatory, a stripper and paint for the baseball diamond and some tree and grass plantings. A 40 x 100 foot asphalt parking lot which could be used for ice skating at the old park was discussed. It was

noted that ice skating probably would not be allowed on the pond at the new park because four new springs were hit when the diving platform was constructed causing a dangerous situation for skating.

Items projected for the 1982 budget included a shelter, grills, baseball diamond lighting, fencing for the basketball court and playground equipment. Rohrer said estimated costs for lights on the two baseball diamonds was \$47,678.00. He felt if lighting was to be erected, both diamonds should be done at the same time as an economy measure.

Thieves 'Haunt' Haunted House

The Kewaskum Jaycees Annual Haunted House held in the old mill at 1411 Railroad Street on the weekend before and during the Halloween weekend, was broken into by thieves while it was closed last Wednesday night.

The thieves cut wires and stole some of the stereo equipment. No estimate of the value of the equipment, owned by Jaycee members, was given.

Jaycee members were wondering why anyone would do this when the proceeds of the Haunted House go to the Jaycee scholarship fund and other community and youth projects.

The Jaycees set up their sound system again the next afternoon and the Haunted House was open as scheduled Thursday evening.

The Haunted House was open to the public Oct. 24, 25, 30, 31 and Nov. 1 from 7 p.m. until 10 p.m. and on Sunday, Oct. 26, and Sunday, Nov. 2, from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m.

The Haunted House has proven very popular with thousands of persons going through the house. The project needs 25 to 30 men to stage the show.

The Kewaskum Jaycees were the first in the area to sponsor a haunted house.

A blaze discovered early Saturday evening by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Hammes caused extensive damage to their property in New Fane.

The Hammes' were leaving for Kewaskum when Doris Hammes saw smoke coming from their former home located on Highway 'S'. They returned immediately to their new home located a short distance east of the burning structure to call the Fire Department.

Donald Hammes then returned to the burning building to warn his tenants, Howard and Sharon Fry. Hammes and neighbors helped the Fry family remove their possessions while the Kewaskum and Boltonville Fire Departments battled the fire. Firefighters remained on the scene approximately three hours. Kewaskum Fire Chief Augie Bilgo told Hammes the blaze was caused by an electrical short in the walls.

Hammes said damage to the interior was very bad and no estimate of damages has been

made. No decisions on the building will be made until insurance adjustors complete their work.

The property was originally purchased as a home and grocery store which the Hammes family operated until 12 years ago when the grocery business was closed.

The Frys have taken up temporary residence with Mr. Fry's brother.

SMOKEHOUSE ROOF CATCHES ON FIRE

Kewaskum firemen answered another call at 11:05 a.m. Wednesday to the Gilbert Reindl home on Kettle View Drive, Route 2, Kewaskum, located about one mile southwest of the village.

The roof on a smokehouse at the rear of the Reindl home caught fire from a rubbish burner fire. The blaze was spreading to an adjoining garage when the flames were extinguished.

the village at this time. His reason was that since the village had not accepted his original offer when he was planning his pit, he has since constructed a smaller pit than originally proposed and this pit may not be adequate for any long term commitment with the village. Neumann felt he would have a better idea of his ability to enter into a contract after the pit had been in operation for a time.

This pit is the first in the state to be used in conjunction with municipal disposal of wastes. Neumann told Stollenwerk that the idea of pits such as his is growing and possibly in the near future there would be other area farmers with which the village could also contract for sludge disposal.

Stollenwerk said Roger Neumann had been very helpful in trying to work with the village on this problem.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt presented the preliminary figures for the 1981 budget. After a general review Schmidt suggested the Board members review these figures and discuss them with the departments with which they work or get back to him for a more individual clarification on any questions. Schmidt asked the Board to look at these figures to see if and where budget cuts can be made. At this point expenditures exceed proposed revenues by approximately \$100,000.00, depending on state and federal revenue sharing.

Village Clerk Bill Martin said at a recent meeting he attended, Senator Gaylord Nelson stated he had no doubt that the Federal Revenue Sharing program would be approved.

Schmidt recommended the Board hold a special meeting for the sole purpose of reviewing the budget. The Board agreed to meet Wednesday, November 12.

The Board voted to submit Fire Service contracts to the Towns of Kewaskum and Auburn. It was voted the con-

tracts be developed by the formula method rather than the mill rate used previously. Fire Chief Augie Bilgo said that through the formula method a fairer share of the cost of fire protection was paid by the contracting communities. This method also drops the restriction on the number of fire calls in a specific contract before additional charges were made. The new contract would share the costs for services required, the higher the demand for services the greater that community's share would be.

Bilgo said the Fire Department was figuring the cost of a new pumper in their budget to be divided over three years. An estimate of \$60,000.00 was being used, however, since the first \$20,000.00 was included in the budget last year, the cost of the pumper has risen to \$85,000.00. This is \$25,000.00 over the budget. The unit to be phased out was built in 1954, and though it is not worn out, it is obsolete. Bilgo said Madison had purchased a Tele-squitter three years ago with plans to purchase a second but in three years the price of the same unit had doubled.

Bill Martin presented a letter from the Public Service Commission. A Public Hearing is scheduled for November 25, in Madison, on granting of rate increases for Kewaskum sewer and water services. The average private residential increase being considered is approximately 33%.

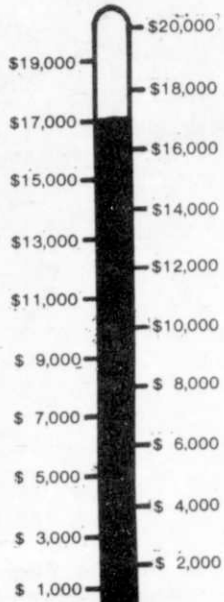
The village voted to approve installation of Sodium Vapor rather than Mercury Vapor lights for the new shopping center parking lot, Timblin Drive and adjacent area.

The Board moved to advertise for bids on a new police car.

The Board adjourned to closed session.

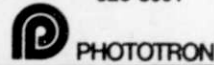

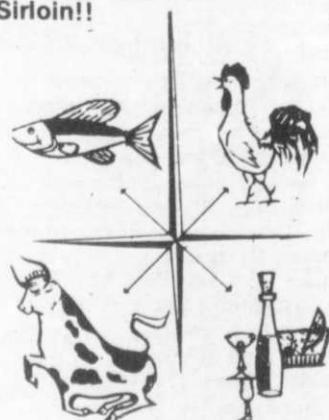

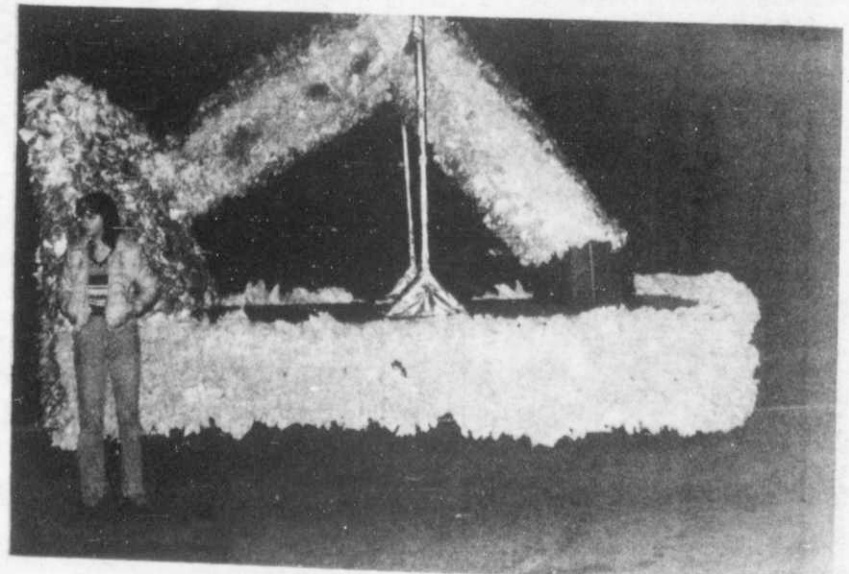

Close Lomira Canning Plant

California Cannery and Growers Friday announced that it will discontinue canning operations at its Lomira plant, but will continue to operate its distribution center at the same location. The center is a key installation in the cooperative's national distribution network.

CCG President Robert L. Gibson said that prospective returns from canned vegetables are not attractive enough to justify operating the cannery.

The cannery closing will affect approximately four hundred seasonal workers employed during the three-month pea, bean, and corn seasons. Most permanent, year-round employees will have an opportunity to find employment in the distribution center. Fruits and tomatoes canned by the grower-owned cooperative in California are combined there with vegetables canned in Wisconsin for distribution in the Midwest market. The distribution center presently employs 120 persons year-round.

CCG opened the cannery at Lomira in 1969. The distribution center which was added later has capacity of approximately 3.5 million cases which can be increased in the present facility. No decisions have been reached as to possible disposition of land and equipment used for the cannery.

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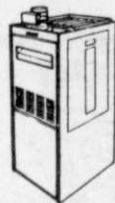

Brownies Visit Humane Society

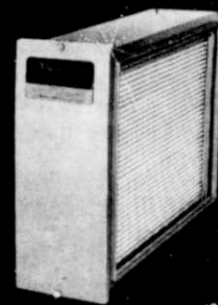


On Oct. 2, Brownie Troop No. 95 from Kewaskum went to visit the Washington County Humane Society.

If such a petition is filed, the bonds shall not be issued until approved by a majority of the electors of the municipality voting thereon at a general or special election."

TAKE FURTHER NOTICE the governing body of the Town of Wayne, Wisconsin, at a lawful meeting held on the 29th day of October, 1980, did also adopt the following resolution:

RESOLUTION RELATING TO WAIVER OF SECTION 66.521(11)(b)1. IN CONNECTION WITH AN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REVENUE BOND FINANCING ON BEHALF OF JACK WALTERS & SONS, CORP.

WHEREAS, this body has adopted a resolution entitled "Initial Resolution Relating to Industrial Development Revenue Bond Financing on Behalf of Jack Walters & Sons, Corp." (the "Initial Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, the Initial Resolution provides that upon certain conditions the Town of Wayne, Wisconsin (the "Municipality"), shall issue industrial development revenue bonds pursuant to Section 66.521, Wisconsin Statutes, as amended (the "Act") to finance a project in the Municipality to be undertaken by Jack Walters & Sons, Corp., a Wisconsin corporation (the "Eligible Participant"); and

WHEREAS, the Eligible Participant has represented that the intended use of the project is for the purpose of manufacturing metal and steel sheets and that the project would consist of an expansion to an existing building and equipment (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, Section (11)(b)1. of the Act contains provisions requiring competitive bidding for certain construction contracts and prohibiting discrimination with regard to the construction and operation of projects financed under the Act; and

WHEREAS, Section (11)(b)2. of the Act empowers the governing body of a municipality to waive the requirements of Section (11)(b)1. with respect to a particular project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

It is the finding and determination of this body that the Municipality will not control the design, costs, construction or operation of the Project; that no public moneys will be expended for the Project; that the Municipality will have no beneficial ownership in the Project; that the primary reason for requiring competitive bidding for construction of municipal projects is to protect the taxpayers against excessive expenditures of public funds and that such reason, although sound as applied to public works, is not applicable to the Project in which no general funds or tax revenues of the Municipality will be used or put at risk; that it would be more efficient and expedient for the accomplishment of the public purposes of the revenue bond issue if the Eligible Participant were to have complete control over the letting of contracts for construction of the Project; and that while an anti-discrimination policy such as that expressed in Section (11)(b)1. of the Act is supported by this body, public policies of that sort applied in the context of a bond financing are more appropriately effectuated by contract with the Eligible Participant. Therefore, the Municipality does hereby waive the provisions of Section (11)(b)1. of the Act with regard to the Project; provided, however, that the revenue agreement to be entered into between the Eligible Participant and the Municipality shall contain anti-discrimination clauses satisfactory to the Municipality.

End Winless Conference Season

Indians Lose Tough One At Kiel in Overtime

Kewaskum came close to winning their first and only conference game of the season at Kiel Friday night but lost a heartbreaker in overtime, 18-12. The Indians finished 0-6 in the Eastern Wisconsin and 1-7 overall, their only victory coming over Slinger in the opening contest of the season, 10-0. Kiel wound up with a 2-4 conference mark.

Coach Mike Fifrick really had a lot of incentive going for him to win this one. He grew up in Kiel, played high school ball there and the football field is named after his late father, who served as principal there. Besides that it was his birthday but it also was Halloween and the goblins played tricks on him.

His Indians apparently had victory in the bag with a six point lead and only 32 seconds left to play. No one believed the Raiders could move the ball 60 yards in that short time. But they did to tie the score at 12-12 and force the game into overtime. Kiel scored again in the overtime for the win.

Neither team scored in the first half, which ended in a 0-0 tie. The Indians had two chances after fumble recoveries by Steve Muench and Jim Krahn, but were unable to capitalize on either one. The first turnover was on the Kiel 44 and Kewaskum moved to the 23 before Randy Heberer fumbled. On the second opportunity the Indians took over on the Raider 41 but couldn't move the ball and were forced to punt.

Kiel showed little offense in the first half except for a drive to Kewaskum's 34, but they fumbled the ball away. The offenses finally got going in the second half.

In the third quarter Heberer broke away for outstanding 90-yard run, the longest of the season to give Kewaskum a 6-0 lead. The Indians had taken

over on their own 6 following a good punt. After gaining 4 yards, Heberer got through the line and outraced the defenders to the goal line. The pass for the extra point failed.

Kiel came back with a drive to Kewaskum's 14 but a penalty ended that threat. The Indians then put on a drive but a Ric Leitheiser pass was intercepted and returned to Kiel's 30. The Raiders completed 3 straight passes to move deep into Indian territory. Kurt Schmitz then took it in from the 3.

Kewaskum drove back and on a big play, a 38-yard completion to Randy Westerman, who made a great catch, moved to the Kiel 16. From there Brian Larsen missed a 31-yard field goal attempt on fourth down.

The Raiders went for broke with a pass but Perry Kempf intercepted on the Kiel 43. On the next play Kempf gathered in a Leitheiser pass for a touchdown. This happened with 32 seconds left and gave the Indians a 12-6 lead.

The Raiders did the short kick back to the 40. Following a 20-yard run by quarterback Chris Konz and a 38-yard pass to Tom Kohlman, Schmitz scored the tying points with 5 seconds left on the clock. Dan Reichardt then missed the extra point to quiet down the excited Kiel fans and send the contest into overtime.

Kiel won the toss but decided to go on defense. On Kewaskum's second offensive play, Schmitz intercepted a badly thrown pass. On second down Konz hit Riesterer at the 4-yard line and he lunged into the end zone for the winning points.

Randy Heberer amassed 148 total yards for the Indians, including his 90-yard off tackle run.

Unbeaten Two Rivers won the Eastern Wisconsin title with a 6-0 record and will move on to the WIAA playoffs. They return

with much of the team which lost to Edgerton 14-0 in playoff semifinals last year. Fullback Don LeClair has rushed for 1,064 yards.
