

The new store is a 100 ft. by 120 ft. building which has been erected this fall on a 1.5 acre plot. Ken Weddig is manager of the lumber and hardware dealership which will be housed under one roof. It is arranged so trucks can drive through the enclosed yard for lumber pickup. Parking for 50 cars will be available.

The new facility will be a complete home center in the area. All lines of merchandise as hardware and paint will be expanded as well as providing new lines of building and home improvement materials. Regal Ware, Inc. purchased the former Minz Store and lumber yard site from the H. J. Lay Lumber Co. The store will be remodeled to include a new entrance and parking lot on the west side of the building. Regal plans to move their outlet store to this location in the spring of 1981. The Regal Store is presently located at 143 Main St. The lower photo shows the old Otto E. Lay residence on the site as it was being torn down to make room for the new Regal Outlet facility.

West Bend, Cable Television To Hold Dedication, Open House

The dedication of the West Bend Cable Television system will be Friday, December 5, at the cable television communication center.

A public open house of the million dollar cable system will be Saturday and Sunday, December 6 and 7, at the cable center, 1021 S. Main.

Guest of honor at the dedication will be Paul Hornung, former Green Bay Packer Golden Boy (practice, practice, practice!!!!!!) and now a sportscaster for CBS and WTBS in Alanta, the Superstation carried to West Bend by satellite.

West Bend Mayor Jack Pick and City Council members will cut the ribbon and push the button to activate 30 Zenith television sets in the cable center each tuned to a different station on the cable system, and 21 FM stations including WFMT, a Chicago classical music station.

The Cablevision system began service to the first subscriber, Milton Beth, 931 Terrace Drive, West Bend, on October 30, 1980. New subscribers in Phase One are being installed at the rate of fifteen homes each day.

Residents in Phase Two are

Winter Parking Goes Into Effect Dec. 1



Aide Requires

More Volunters

Through the Tax-Aide Program retired people are given cost-free assistance filing their uncomplicated Federal and State income tax returns. Tax-Aide, which is under the supervision of IRS and the Wisconsin Department of Revenue, is sponsored by local units of NRTA/AARP (National Retired Teachers Association and American Association of Retired Persons).

"Citizens of Milwaukee, Madison, LaCrosse, Green Bay, Wausau, and Superior — some of the larger cities—benefitted from the Tax-Aide program because local people volunteered their help,'' said Jos. B. Spatz, Wisconsin Overall Tax-Aide Coordinator. ''There is no valid reason,'' says Spatz, ''why retired people in smaller communities can not also enjoy the same free counseling as do those living in the larger cities.''

Tax-Aide started in 1968 at Washington, D.C. where 4 counselors aided 75 persons filing their Federal Tax returns. In 1980, after all returns are tabulated, it is anticipated that the 10,250 counselors will have assisted with 850,000 returns, according to the National TaxAide Coordinator, Wm. C. Mc-Morran. "In Wisconsin," says Spatz, "207 volunteers assisted filing 9,792 Federal and State returns in addition to giving assistance by phone and going to shut-ins for a grand total of 12,042 tax returns."

If you filed your own income tax returns without help from others; if you can spare 4 hours a week during the filing season; and if you attend the instruction-workshop which stresses tax benefits for the elderly; then you qualify as a counselor. Special Meeting of Board of Education

A special meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education will be held on Monday, December 1, 1980. The meeting will be held in the district administrative offices and will begin at 8 p.m.

Late bussing is the primary purpose of the meeting. Earlier, the board had decided to try three weeks of late bussing during the winter activity season to see what kind of ridership there would be. Those three weeks will be up December 1. and the board will decide whether to continue the program.

A further discussion of a proposed compulsory attendance policy will be held. A definition of an excused absence is a major part of that policy, and the board will discuss this question.

New business will include a request for a leave, some recommended high school curriculum changes and an extracurricular assignment change. A contract with Bray and Associates will be recommended for board action. The contract will be for assistance in doing an energy study for the district. This will include cost estimates for various suggested improvements which would result in energy conservation.

A closed session will be held following the regular meeting to discuss personnel questions, including the dismissal of a custodian.





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Symphonic Band, Jazz Band, Pit Band, and Honors Band.


Ken was a student council representative during his sophomore and senior years and his junior year. During his

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

"Puppyland" Under New Management

Most local residents are familiar with "Puppyland" an animal shelter located on Hwy. "D" north of West Bend. Joe and Renetta Koelsch, founders and managers of Puppyland Humane Society, Inc. were well known not only in Washington County, but in all surrounding counties as well.

Joe and Nettie spent many years caring for unwanted, stray, and abandoned animals. For many years Joe had a dream of building a shelter for animals. In 1970, his dream came true. The shelter was built with Joe's savings and donations from local friends and residents. That shelter has provided a temporary home for thousands of homeless animals each year.

Joe did his best, but always

the shelter was full, overcrow-

ed, and many animals had to be

kept outside or in smaller buildings. Always there were more animals coming in and not enough being adopted. The dog population alone, was usually over 60 and at times, went over 100.

Late in 1979, due to ill health, Joe was no longer able to care for the animals. Several young people kept Puppyland operating, but none were aware of how to cope with problems in a shelter.

Joe Koelsch died on July 21, 1980. Three days before his death, Joe requested that Gerhardt Gall, a retired Army Sergeant be made a board member and manager of Puppyland.

Gall required no salary because of retirement and Mrs. Renetta Koelsch would provide free room and board in the Koelsch home. This arrangement allows Puppyland to remain with no paid employees.

Keeping in mind that Joe Koelsch never wanted animals destroyed, Gall, in the past few months, has formed a plan, that allows animals to be sheltered indefinitely, and owners are guaranteed their animals will not be destroyed.

Puppyland only accepts animals from owners who will actively sponsor the animal until its adoption. Owners who do not care enough to support their animal, are referred to the Washington County Humane Society in Jackson.

Most litters of puppies are accepted at Puppyland, however, owners are requested to donate the cost of immunization.

Gall, with the assistance of Dr. Charles Ogi, DVM, has initiated improvements which control disease, and the use of modern cleaning equipment to bring the shelter standards up to a comfortable and disease curbing environment.

Puppyland has been and still is under contract to Washington

County for stray dog control and boarding. At present the contract results in a loss rather than a gain of funds. All other funding comes from donations of animals owners and adoptors, plus support from local businesses and industry. People do care about animals and when Puppyland asks, the response is usually overwhelming.

The future sees a new shelter to be located behind the present structure by spring, 1981. This building is being donated by a single individual animal lover, through the persistant efforts of

Renetta Koelsch. Many funds will be needed in the future to equip the building with modern kennels and facilities. Individual membership with Puppyland is available to any interested persons.

Puppyland has an open door policy. Anyone may visit at any time, and volunteer help is always appreciated. If puppyland and the memory and dreams of Joe and Nettie Koelsch are to continue, your support is needed.







Fred C. Schroeder, Former Assemblyman, Others Die

Frederick C. Schroeder, 70, died while serving with the U.S. of 2472 State Hwy. 143, West Bend, was dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital. West Bend, Wednesday night, Nov. 19. He died of a heart attack while playing cards with friends at a home on Lighthouse Lane

Schroeder, a staunch Republican and prominent dairy farmer, served 12 years as the state representative from the 12th Assembly District which includes the southern and eastern portions of Washington County and the Mequon-Thiensville area in Ozaukee County. He was first elected in 1964 and was re-elected in five succeeding campaigns before retiring from office in 1976.

Schroeder was chairman of the Assembly's Commerce and Manufacturers Committee, and held membership on the Agriculture Committee, Excise and Fee Committee and Committee to Visit State Properties. He authored and successfully promoted a number of bills as a member of these committees.

He was a dairy farmer and dairy operator for nearly 40 years before he took his place in the Legislature, A son, William, now operates the farm on which his father lived on all his life.

Following Schroeder's retirement to the 228-acre farm in the Town of Trenton, he remained active in Republican Party politics and gave some advice to his successor. John Merkt. He also continued his involvement with farm youth and overseered the dairy cattle activities at the Washington County Fair.

Schroeder was born Jan. 19. 1910, on the Schroeder homestead, where he lived until his marriage to a Kewaskum girl. Magdelen "Molly" Weddig, in West Bend on Sept. 26, 1931. After their marriage they settled on the homestead.

He and his father and brother owned and operated the Schroeder Dairy for many years. The Schroeders were also nationally known for their purebred Holstein cattle

ASC Ballots Mailed

For Annual Election

Ballots have been mailed to all known eligible persons for the annual election being held thru December 1, according to Ira A. Oelhafen, Chairperson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

ASCS, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is responsible for farm program administration. On the local level, ASCS operates under a farmer-elected committee system. This year's elections are by mail ballot between Nov. 21 and Dec. 1.

Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in these farmer committee elections: any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or sharecropper who is eligible to participate in any ASCS program.

Several general provisions relate to ASC voter eligibility. A wife who operates a farm with her husband can vote if her name is on the deed of conveyance. Any person under 18 year of age can vote if he or she runs a farm, and a legal guardian who runs a farm for a child can vote for the child. No person can be denied the right to vote because of race, sex, color, religion, or national origin. A person may cast a ballot in any county in which he or she is an eligible ASC voter, but he or she cannot vote in more than one community in the county. If an eligible voter has separate farm interests in more than one community in the same county only one ballot is issued.

Stuffed Toys Are Recalled

The U. S. Product Safety Commission has announced that the highly popular "Pot Belly" line of children's stuffed animals is being recalled by the importer because the toys may present safety hazards which could injure young children.

According to Mary K. Ryan, consumer protection division administrator with the Wisconsin Dept. of Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection, testing by the CPSC revealed that a substantial percentage of the toys tested contained sharp wires in the stuffing.

More than 5 million of the five different types of "Pot Bellies" have been sold nationwide in a variety of sizes since late in 1976. The toys are distributed to more than 2,800 toy stores, department stores and other retailers by the Daekor Division of Hudson Brands, Ltd., of New York City. The CPSC also discovered

through testing that the "bean variety of smaller Pot bag' Bellies presents another hazard in addition to the potential presence of small wires. The bottom of the bean toys are stuffed with crushed walnut shells which could be swallowed by children if the toy animals come apart at the seams.

Consumers are being urged to return their Pot Belly stuffed animals to the retailer where they were purchased for a full
