Village Board Approves 1981 Budget; Tax Rate Raised to \$23.70, Up 31% or \$5.69 Per Thousand

After a final review of expenditures and anticipated revenues, the Kewaskum Village Board moved to accept the 1981 budget of \$870,660.00 at Monday night's meeting.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said although the Federal Revenue Sharing bill had not been passed by both houses, in all likelihood the bill will be re-enacted. Local governments are being told they may use their 1980 figure in 1981 budget calculations. For Kewaskum this represents a shared revenue of \$55,346.00.

Commissioner Bill Martin presented Resolution 80-6, levying a tax rate of \$27.92 per \$1,000.00 for the year ending December 31, 1980. With a state tax credit of \$4.22, the net tax rate for 1980 will be \$23.70 per \$1,000.00, a raise of 31% or \$5.69 over last year.

Martin also presented Resolution 80-7. This resolution changes the last date on which the first payment of a split

payment may be made. The Board approved a change from January 31, 1981, to February 28, 1981.

Resolution 80-8 was also approved, allowing the commissioner to place on the present tax roll for collection, all delinquent accounts of all departments of the village.

Martin informed the Board that he, Schmidt and Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo attended the Public Service Commission public hearing in Madison regarding Kewaskum's request for sewer and water rate increases. The PSC said Kewaskum would be notified within 6 weeks of their decision. Martin said the PSC recommended Kewaskum come in at least once a year for rate increases. Most municipalities are now doing this because ever increasing costs are outdating previously granted rates. Martin stated Kewaskum's last rate increase was in 1977.

Dan Schmidt asked for approval of supplements to the village's alarm system. The

items include a power failure alarm for the well at the river, a memory system for alarms at the parks and library and a second remote alarm with horn and lights. A primary remote alarm is already in the Municipal Building. Regal Ware said it would permit installation of the second unit in its Guard House, which would be activated only after Municipal Building hours and on weekends. This would allow Regal Ware guards to notify the Kewaskum Police or Sheriff's office if any alarms are sounded. The Board moved to approve the costs of \$370.00-\$500.00, for these additions.

Schmidt said the police contract had not been received by him for presentation, however, it had been accepted in principle and only needed to be signed to complete negotiations.

Police Chief Don Hlavaty requested the Board consider an increase in fees for bike licenses. Hlavaty said the present 50c fee barely covers the costs of plates and handling

registrations. The Board moved to increase bike license fees from 50c to \$1.00 beginning with the May 1981 registration year.

Schmidt said a meeting is set for 7:00 p.m. December 16, with the Village Board and Plan Commission. At this time, Robert Peterson will explain Tax Increment Funding programs.

The Board adjourned to closed session.

The National Association of Secondary School Principals has placed this program on the list of National Contests and Activities for 1980-81.

The National Society, DAR aims to cultivate an appreciation of character building among young people as a basis of good citizenship. Contestants must attend an accredited high school and have four qualities listed to an outstanding degree; Dependability, Service, Patriotism and Leadership. The contest is open to both boys and girls in the senior graduating class and students must be American citizens.

Ken will now compete with other high school representatives from Wisconsin. A pin and certificate is presented to all Good Citizen contestants. The state contest will have 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners with the 1st place winner going on to the division contest. A \$100 savings bond and participation in the National Contest is awarded the state 1st place candidate. The winner of the 1st place National Award receives a \$1,000 scholarship to the college of the winner's choice. The winner is also to be presented to the Continental Congress in April of 1981.

Ken is actively involved in various high school programs. He is currently vice-president of the KHS Key Club, German Club president, AFS president and editor of the school newspaper. He has also contributed to the National Honor Society, pep band, jazz band, school musicals, forensics and a host of other school and community related activities. He was recently chosen as Kewaskum's Kiwanis Student of the month for November.

Future plans for Ken include attending a four-year college and the study of journalism or foreign language.

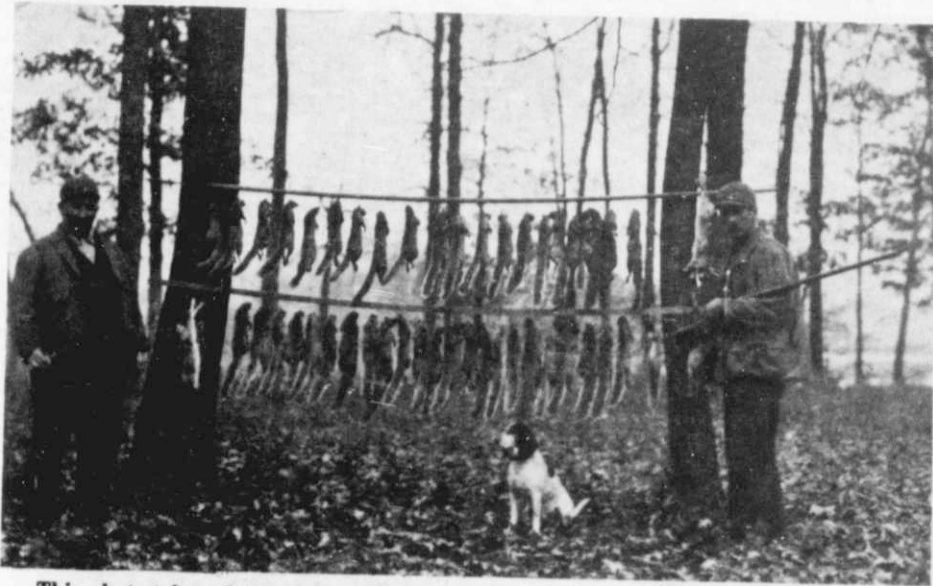

Late Bus Is Discontinued By School Board

At a special meeting Monday evening, the Kewaskum School Board decided to drop the late bus run.

School Superintendent Floyd Brenholt stated that while late bus ridership had increased in the second trial run, there was not a significant improvement to warrant the added cost to keep the bus in operation. Fares paid by the late bus riders covered less than half the expense to keep the route going.

The board tabled decision on a contract with Bray and Associates for assistance in conducting an energy study. The board decided to have a representative from Bray present the proposed study plan at a meeting scheduled for December 8, giving the board an opportunity to ask questions and review the study more thoroughly.

The board discussed the use arrangements for the high school gym by Holy Trinity School and decided the schedule will remain as it is with no changes.

The board adjourned to closed session.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope, or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before election day in the case of applications mailed to the municipal clerk, and 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election in the case of applications made in the clerk's office.

With one exception, the voter who wants to cast an absentee ballot must make a separate application before each election. Voters indefinitely confined to their home or care facility because of illness, age or disability need not file an application before each election; a special statement on the application form can be completed asking that an absentee ballot be automatically mailed to them before each election; if they fail to make and return the ballots sent to them in an election, they must complete another application later on.

Absentee ballots can be voted at home anytime after they arrived in the mail. They can also be voted right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case, the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.

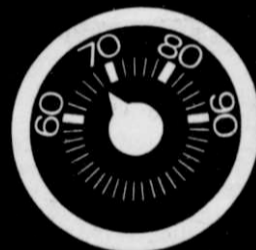

Indians Thumped by West Bend East, Edged by West Bend West

The Kewaskum Indians spent the past week playing their basketball against Little Ten Conference Class A teams at the West Bend fieldhouse, where they were outclassed by West Bend East last Tuesday night, 99-81, and where edged out by West Bend West this Tuesday night, 65-66, in a much closer contest.

A record 65 point output in the first half by West Bend East routed the Indians, who fell behind at that point, 65-27. The Suns started subbing as early as the second quarter and the reserves played as much as the regulars. The Indians didn't play that badly but their shots just wouldn't go in while East was red hot, shooting a sizzling 61 percent in the initial half. Kewaskum made only 9 of 35 for 26 percent.

Late in the third quarter the Suns doubled the Indians in scoring, 80-40. Subs played the final quarter or hustling East surely would have run their score over 100. The victory enabled the Suns to avenge a loss to Kewaskum last season.

The Suns' press, fast breaks, some long passes that led to easy layups and their overall quickness was too much for the Indians, who played poorly on defense.

West took a 16-12 lead in the first quarter, fell behind by as much as three points in the next two periods, surged to a 60-49 lead at one point and then almost gave it back to the Indians in the last quarter.

The Spartans' Tim Buddenhagen led his team's balanced attack with 17 points, followed by DesRosier with 17. The Indians' Jim Rohlinger scored 12 of his 17 points in the last quarter. He put together three long-range baskets and two free throws that helped close the gap to 69-66 in the final stanza. Brian Larsen added 15 points and Dale Wodsedalek 14.

Kewaskum had a slight advantage in rebounds, 38-37, but West outshot the Indians, 45 percent to 41 overall. Although handling the press better, the Indians made too many mistakes.

This Friday Kewaskum opens play in the tough Eastern Wisconsin Conference against Sheboygan Falls here. There are no weak teams in the league, which has some good big players. Tuesday the Indians host Lomira of the Flyway Conference.
