Village Taxpayers Expected to Get \$979,495 State Property Tax Relief

Property taxpayers who live in the Village of Kewaskum are expected to get the equivalent of \$979,495 worth of state property tax relief in 1981, Senator Hanaway said Friday.

The figure is taken from a brand new state computer printout which, for the first time, tries to break out-municipality by municipality-all the various types of state property tax relief.

"Now, for the first time," Senator Hanawy said, "we can see how much state property tax relief the people of the village of Kewaskum are really getting."

"This \$979,495 figure includes all forms of property tax relief. It includes state aid paid to the municipality, aid paid to the school district, the county and aid paid out as a direct credit to the property taxpayer," Hanaway said. "In other words, the dollars are paid out by the state in different ways, to various levels of government, but all the dollars directly benefit the property owner living in the Village of Kewaskum. If these aids were not paid, the property tax bill in the Village of Kewaskum would be substantially higher.

Senator Hanaway said that neither local nor state officials have previously been able to furnish a total aid figure. Figures on the amount of school aid, county aid and shared revenue paid to different governmental units have been available, but had never previously been combined-to reflect the total aid benefiting a particular resident living in a specific community.

Senator Hanaway noted that the total aid figure includes: shared revenue payments scheduled to be paid to muni-

Hlavaty Heads Police Chief Association

Kewaskum Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty last Tuesday was elected president of the Washington County Police cipalities in 1981; general property tax relief paid to municipalities; personal property tax paid to municipalities and countries in 1981 under the aidable revenue formula; machinery and equipment reimbursement; school aids based on 1980 full values, but not including so-called categorical aids which reimburse communities for costs such as bus service and county aids apportioned according to each municipalities share of the county 1980 full value.

Senator Hanaway emphasized the total figure does not mean the municipality will actually receive that full dollar

amount. Rather, he said, what it means is that the property owner living in the Village of Kewaskum will benefit from that amount of state aid.

State property tax relief programs have meant that Wisconsin now relies less on the property tax to raise money than it used to, Senator Hanaway pointed out.

In 1970, Wisconsin ranked 3rd highest in the U.S. in property taxes per \$1,000 of personal income, and 6th in the U.S. in property taxes per capita. By 1978, Senator Hanaway said, Wisconsin had dropped to 17th in both categor-

Question of 30% Tax Increase Clarified by Village Board

The Village Board voted Monday evening to accept Honeck Chevrolet's bid to supply Kewaskum with a 1981 Chevrolet Impala, equipped with police package.

Honeck submitted a low net "no trade" bid of \$7,925.00. Meyer Ford submitted two bids. The first covered a 1981 Ford LTD 'S', with "trade-in" of the present squad for \$7,000.00. Their second bid was \$8,000.00, net without "trade."

Police Chief Don Hlavaty said since the board was considering purchase of a second squad (used) in 1981, he recommended the board accept Honeck's lower "no trade" bid and keep the present squad as a temporary second unit until summer. Hlavaty felt at that time, if the board still wished to do so, they could let bids for a different second unit. The board accepted Hlavaty's recommendation and authorized purchase of the new vehicle. The motion was passed 4-0, with Trustee

Paul Blumer abstaining.

Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo presented a request to obtain bids on a replacement truck for the village's long-bed GMC. Bilgo stated he was looking at used vehicles since the work demands did not justify purchase of a new unit. Bilgo said they have a prospective buyer for the present truck. The board authorized Bilgo to obtain quotes.

ed the Park and Recreation Committee's recommendation to purchase four 5-row by 15-foot aluminum bleachers, two for each baseball diamond. Rohrer said they had received a bid of \$3,360.00, and suggested the board approve purchase since the bid was only good until January 1, at which time the price would increase \$100.00, and these bleachers had backrests on the top row whereas the bleachers considered in the original budget figure of \$3,500.00 did not. Trustee Don Mlodzik made the motion which was unanimously passed. The board approved a contract with Rite-Way Painting, West Bend, to water seal the Fire Station. Work will be done the summer of 1981, at a cost of \$1,850.00.

Mlodzik told the board he had received several calls regarding the 30% increase in village taxes. He stated one woman who called asked why one article in the paper said there would be a 20% increase and then a later article stated the increase had jumped to 30%. Just what had the board done to cause this rise. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said the first article presented only a preliminary figure, at which time he had said all figures were not in. At that time, the



State Real Estate Tax Credit Lands funds into 6 or 12 month was not available. When Schmidt received the 1980 state tax credit rate, it was reduced by \$1.40, thereby causing an increase. Schmidt said the village had actually lowered its preliminary figure of 20% down to 18.5% in the final budget, but the loss of the \$1.40 state tax credit caused the jump to 30%. So, it was not any added dollars from the village, but rather a loss of credit dollars from the state.

In further action, the board ratified the police contract for one year, running from January 1 to December 31, 1981.

Trustee Dave Nigh said the Finance Committee would like the board's approval to look into the possibility of investing some Park & Recreation and Open

certificates to obtain more favorable interest rates. The board agreed with this suggestion and asked Nigh to report his findings at the next meeting.

The board also acted on the Fire Department's recommendation and reappointed Augie Bilgo Fire Chief. This will be Bilgo's second full term as chief.

The Plan Commission and Village Board will meet December 16, at 7:00 p.m. to hear a presentation by Mr. Robert Peterson, Fond du Lac Community Development Director, on Tax Increment Financing programs.

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

TIF Major Topic at Plan Commission, Board Meeting

By GERRY MUELLER Statesman Staff Writer

At Tuesday evening's meeting, Plan Commission and Village Board members heard Robert Peterson, Fond du Lac Community Development Director, tell them just what Tax Increment Financing is and what it can do in Kewaskum. Basically, TIF districts provide a means of obtaining funds which can be used in a community's construction and redevelopment program.

Tax Increment districts are five-year programs which allow a community to develop projects over this period, that otherwise would have to be included in its yearly budgets and in many cases not be done because of lack of funds. This program makes funds available that would not be received through regular lending channels.

Peterson suggested the Plan Commission make what he called a ''wish list.'' This is a tabulation of all the development and reconstruction projects they would like to see done. Then list them in their priorities, so that if and when Kewaskum decided to participate in this program and adopt a plan, they would know just what they can expect to accomplish over this five-year period. Peterson reminded them that once boundaries for a TIF district are set, they cannot be changed. Items may be dropped or changed, but only within the TIF district limits. That is why he recommended listing all anticipated projects in their plan. It is easier to drop them then try and add them.

Peterson showed slides of his TIF district which is the downtown area of Fond du Lac. Their \$10,000,000.00 district was created to help redevelop a dying area by street and sewer improvements, clearing land for new buildings and parking lots adequate to bring people back downtown. Through their program they are generating additional construction from private developers who are now returning to the downtown area. This in turn will bring increased revenues to Fond du Lac.

Cable TV in Kewaskum Possible by Summer of '81

After a presentation Monday evening by Don Jones, River Bend CATV representative, the Village Board decided to make final revisions in its proposed ordinance governing cable TV service to Kewaskum.

Trustee Jeff Rohrer recommended incorporating the changes as soon as possible so a final draft can be presented to the board for possible adoption at their January 5 meeting.

Jones told the board if River Bend received approval by January, 1981, the necessary documents could be submitted to the utility companies and hopefully any necessary work required on their poles could be done without extensive delays. Trustee Dave Nigh asked what kind of completion date they would be looking at. Jones felt if there were no serious delays, service to Kewaskum could be completed in 1981, with service to the first subscriber by late July or early August and service to the last subscriber by fall.

Jones told the board cable TV is the "coming technology." It changes the subscriber's viewing habits. An example he cited was viewing news broadcasts. People find they no longer have to wait for the 6 and 10 o'clock news because you have a channel which provides news and weather 24 hours a day.

The channel which would be furnished for local use would provide new and innovative methods of teaching for the schools as well as opportunities for video presentation of local activities such as sports.

Jones stated their company does not allow "X" rated films, however, they also note in their subcribers TV guide not all programs are for everyone and discretion should be used.

Jones told the board, CATV's present plans are to connect Kewaskum and Campbellsport with one cable and one dish. The main reason being these two cities can receive all Green Bay stations. However, West Bend does not and connecting to the West Bend dish would cause a loss of some of these stations. Jones said River Bend is considering running this same line to Lomira and Oakfield.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt asked where the dish would be constructed as Kewaskum has no land zoned for such an installation. Bob Schaeffer, technical advisor from River Bend, said the installation would be set up outside the village limits since approximately four acres are required for such a site. Jones said site locations are governed by FAA laws and must meet with their approval.

Trustee Paul Blumer asked if cable TV would be available to residents outside the village limits. Jones said their policy was to provide service within one block of the village limits. However, this service cannot be provided unless the township in which these residents live has or adopts a cable TV ordinance. If not, these people would have

to go to their Town Board and request such an ordinance. Village President Jerry Stollenwerk asked how installation would be made from the pole to the residence. Jones said they would follow the utility lines. If service enters the home above ground, so would their service, if buried, their cable would also go underground.

Rohrer asked about their complaint procedures. Jones said the company has a 24 hour a day, 7 days a week service, and their current service call time average is less than one hour.

Jones was asked if there was any chance that commercials would be added at a later date. Jones felt that if such a possibility would occur, it would be on only one channel, since one of the selling points of cable TV is no commercials.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said he would make the necessary changes and present the ordinance at the board meeting January 5.





Most scholars agree that Christ was not born on December 25th. He was not born in what we now measure as 1 A.D. The custom of celebrating Christ's birthday on December 25th originated in Rome in the fourth century of the Christian era, some say in 354 A.D. Some experts say that the Roman monk, Dionysius Exiguus, who made the calculations for the calendar in the sixth century, could have misplaced A.D. by at least six years.

Herod the Great died in 4 B.C., according to the current Gregorian calendar. He is said to have put to death the boy babies in Bethlehem who were two years old and younger. The first Christmas may have been as early as 6 B.C.

If there is a question as to when Christ was born, there is no doubt as to where. Visit Bethlehem and you will find the small grotto, or cave, beneath the Church of the Nativity.





Is Your Holiday Tree a Legal One?

Was the Christmas tree in the trunk of your car obtained legally? All trees in Wisconsin are owned by someone, whether the tree has been sheared and is growing in a plantation or growing wild in the woods.

If the trees are privately owned, whether growing wild or in a plantation, see the landowner and get written permission to cut, and a bill of sale for the tree or trees you take.

If the land you are planning to cut on is in public ownership, you must contact the manager of that property and get permission to cut the trees. You may in many cases have to pay a small fee.

Be certain that the written permission or bill of sale has the date and quantity of trees to be taken.

Under Wisconsin Statutes, forest rangers, DNR conservation wardens, state traffic officers and county and municipal law enforcement officers have the authority to stop anyone hauling any quantity of Christmas trees. It's best to keep your bill of sales or written permission to take trees readily available.

If you know the owner of the land where you have cut the trees and have written permission from the owner, or a bill of sale, you shouldn't have any problems in case you are stopped.



Evergreens Can Be Safely Decorated

Outdoor evergreen trees can be safely decorated if a few guidelines are followed.

The needles of yew, arborvitae, chamaecyparis and hemlock are sensitive to the heat from bulbs. So are pine, spruce and fir

Bulbs of 14 wattage are sufficient, but bulbs should never touch needles. Hang sockets downward to prevent water and snow from collecting in them. Use rubber-jacketed or lacquered cord to connect the lights. Periodically check the position of lights as they may shift in the wind.

TURKEY-VEGETABLE CASSEROLE

- 1-1/2 cups hot chicken broth
- 2 teaspoons butter or margarine 1-1/2 cups Minute rice
- - 1 package (8 oz.) mixed vegetables with onion sauce 1 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1-1/2 cups diced cooked turkey
- 2 slices process American cheese, cut in triangles

Combine broth, butter and rice in 1-1/2-quart baking dish. Cover and bake at 450° for 10 to 15 minutes. Stir and move rice to sides of dish.

Meanwhile, combine vegetables, milk, Worcestershire sauce, salt and turkey in medium saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil; then simmer for 4 minutes. Pour into center of casserole; arrange cheese triangles on top. Bake 2 minutes longer or until cheese is melted. Makes 3 cups plus rice or 4 servings.



Choose Right-Size Turkey This Year

Count on a half pound of whole turkey per serving, and that means about one pound per person if you want second help-ings. Thus a 16-pound turkey will feed sixteen to twenty. But, if you want leftovers, buy a 20pounder, which is a good size for taste and tenderness, too.

A 20-pound bird takes three to four days to defrost in the refrigerator, or about 12 hours in a sinkful of water. In either case, leave the turkey in its original plastic wrapper until it seems thawed. Then unwrap as soon as possible, and pull out the package of giblets from inside the turkey. Often these are still frozen indicating that the inside frozen, indicating that the inside of the turkey is also still frozen. Finish thawing either at room temperature or, if you are not in a hurry, in the refrigerator. Keep thawed turkey under refrigera-tion since it most encoded and the second tion, since it spoils more rapidly than fresh turkey, and plan to roast it within a day, or at most two days, of thawing.


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THE FIRST NOEL

If you want to bake some cookies with the flavor of Christmas, try applesauce cookies. The following recipe will provide about 4 dozen cookies.







The First Santa Was Saint Nicholas

The first Santa Claus probably never saw snow and never traveled more than a few miles from the place of his birth.

Saint Nicholas was born in semi-tropical Patara, Turkey and, though he never traveled elsewhere, he became the patron saint of a dozen or more countries, of all boys, sailors, and others.

Saint Nicholas became the Bishop of Myra (present-day Demre) and, legend says, performed a series of miracles which brought him great fame. He was imprisoned by Roman Emperor Diocletian and released by Constantine, first emperor to embrace Christianity. He died in 342 A.D. and it was centuries before his fame spread to the modern world.

During the 11th century, Italian sailors took his bones from the chapel in Myra which bore his name and brought them to Bari, Italy. The voyage was so pleasant he became the patron saint of the sailors, Southern Italy and Sicily. His fame spread to seafaring nations.

The custom of putting out stockings in Holland came from the belief Saint Nicholas rode a horse on his gift-giving rounds. They put out wooden shoes filled with carrots and hay for the horse.

Early American attempts to pronounce the Dutch Saint Nikolas brought the familiar Santa Claus. The red suit, reindeer and sleigh came in later years.



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POINSETTIAS

The poinsettia is a welcome Christmas gift, but does require some special attention. They will last longer if they have plenty of light, are kept in a cool place and given proper watering.

Proper watering is necessary to prevent leaves from dropping. Water soil thoroughly, until water runs from the bottom of the pot, then allow to become rather dry before watering again.

If you want a candlelight atmosphere for Christmas, don't deny yourself, but exercise proper caution with this potential fire hazard.

CANDLELIGHT

Never place lighted candles on the Christmas tree, or in the window. Do not use candles in any way with decorations that are flammable. Light candles only when someone is in the room and extinguish them when you leave the room or house.

You will need heavy-gauge wire for forming a circular frame or hoop, evergreen branches six or eight inches long, and light, flexible wire for fastening branches to the hoop.

When a hoop is completed, lay an evergreen branch face up on the left side of the hoop and wire the stem tightly to it. Then place the next branch so it overlaps the first, like shingles on a roof, and fasten again. Continue adding branches in a counterclockwise direction until wreath is finished.

Decorate your wreath with cones, berries, nuts, seed pods, dried weeds, bows, bells or other ornaments. It is better not to use spray paint, glitter or artificial snow — your wreath will retain its natural look.

Wreaths, of course, can be hung on doors, in windows or used as table decorations.

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

Next, the goblin met a very rich woman, who was busy knitting. She told him she was knitting a scarf for a sick friend. "Why do you not buy her one," the goblin asked. "Because," the woman replied, "the time and effort I extend is a token of my love and friendship." The goblin placed the scarf on the scales and it weighed to the limit.

Bostonian Fathered American Cards

Louis Prang, of Boston, is generally recognized as "father of the American Christmas card."

Prang, a German refugee, established a successful business selling visiting cards, business advertisements and announcements, both in Boston and in England.

Sold for only a penny, Prang's first Christmas cards were small by present-day standards. He commissioned work from American artists Elihu Vedder, Douglas Volk and J. Alden Weir. "Christmas gathering" and 100,000 other terms.

Cassidy intends DARE to be an accurate account of the "language of the people." He said, "The dictionary will include America's folk language. It's the kind of language you gain from inheritance and not books." Cassidy expects DARE to be

published in 1980. He and his staff of nine have been cataloging words from 1,002 communities since 1970.

So during this Christmas season if you're asked to attend a Californian "Christmas jamboree," be sure to take a present. And if you are asked to take part in a "Christmas affair," don't be embarrassed. You'll probably spend a wholesome evening with pleasant Pennsylvanians.

7. Before connecting decorative lights, check for

frayed or exposed wires and broken or cracked sockets. Never plug more than three sets of lights into an extension cord.

8. Indoor lights should not be used outside.
 9. Turn off decorative lights — indoors and outdoors - when you leave the house or turn in for the night.

10. Remove outdoor lights as soon as the holidays are over. Even weatherproofed lights are not made to withstand extended exposure to the elements. Also, take down the tree before it becomes too dry.



Safety tips given for yule lighting

Lighted candles and Christmas tree lights are potential fire hazards.

Consider the fact that the lights are normally used once a year, but homeowners seldom inspect the lights for possible frayed or crimped wires that could lead to short circuits, or defective sockets that could create special electrical problems of their own.

Here are some safety tips for Christmas tree lights:

*Use only approved electrical lights at all times (UL, Noel, etc.). Use the proper lights for the environment; indoor lights should not be used outside, because they lack weatherproof connections. Lack of proper insulation increases chances of a short circuit of fire.

★ Inspect all lights when unpacking before the holidays. Check for frayed, broken or exposed wires. Look for broken or split sockets. Discard any sets with broken sockets or frayed or cracked wires.

* Inspect bulbs for safe operation. Some lighting sets are wired so that failure of one bulb will not cause others to go dark. In these cases, be sure an exact replacement bulb is used.

In days of old, the Yule Log was brought into the house on Christmas Eve and kindled with a piece of last year's log. It was necessary that the log be very large, so that it would burn throughout Christmas Day. If it died out prematurely, bad luck was foretold for the coming year.

Italy's Befana Brings Gifts

One of the most interesting of our Christmas legends comes to us from ancient Italy.

The Three Wise Men, searching for the Christ Child, stopped to ask directions of an old woman, Befana. They invited her to go with them to worship the new born King, but Befana would not leave until she had swept her house and baked her bread. Impatient, the Wise Men left without her.

When her housework was completed, Befana packed a basket of toys and set out to find the Wise Men. Legend says she never found them, nor the stable where Christ was born and, to this time, each Christmas she searches with her basket of toys, leaving gifts for children along the way.

Mistletoe Subject Of Superstition

The ancient Druids called mistletoe "all heal", believing it had miraculous powers to cure diseases. The Druids probably are responsible for the mistletoe kiss — but custom demanded the mistletoe first be cut with a golden knife and that one berry be removed each time someone kissed beneath it.

According to an ancient Norse myth, mistletoe berries are symbolic of tears shed by Freyja, the goddess of love. Balder, the god of light, couldn't be hurt by anything that grew on — or under — the earth. The evil god, Loki, knowing mistletoe grew neither on earth nor under it, had Balder slain with a spear tipped with mistletoe.

Balder was mourned by all creatures in heaven and on earth, including Freyja, and the tears she shed became the pearly berries of the plant, which even today symbolizes love.

since 1904. The idea was that of a Danish postal clerk, Einar Holboell. Sorting Christmas mail in 1903, Holboell mentioned the idea to his fellow workers as a way to help defray the costs of fighting tuberculosis. The idea reached King Christian, who approved, and the image of Queen Louise appeared on the first seals in 1904.




Washington Began Open House Policy

One roll will make two trees, each seven inches high on its styrofoam base.

COOKIE TREE CENTERPIECE

Materials Needed for Two Trees:

1 roll refrigerated sugar slice and bake cookies

4-inch, 3-inch and 2-inch star shaped cookie cutters or patterns cut from paper

Butter cream frosting, tinted green (about 1 cup)

"Red hots" or other decorator candies

2 round styrofoam bases, each 1-inch thick and 4-inches in diameter

2/3 yard 1-inch satin ribbon (to trim base)

2 8-inch bamboo skewers (from a craft shop)

3 packages Life Savers[®] candies

2 large gumdrops for top stars

TO MAKE THE TREES:

1. Soften cookie dough at room temperature. (For easiest handling, roll out half the dough at a time.) On lightly floured surface or between wax paper, roll dough 1/4-inch thick. For each tree cut out three 4-inch stars, three 3-inch stars and two 2-inch stars. (If dough becomes too soft to handle, refrigerate for a few minutes.) Place stars on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350° for 8 to 10 minutes, until light golden brown around edges. (Do not overbake.) Cool completely on rack.

And it is in dying that we are born to Eternal Life.


