## Sunburst Hosts Professional Ski Tour for First Time

Professional skiers from all over the country came to Sunburst Ski Area, Kewaskum, to compete for over \$10,000 in prize money on Saturday and Sunday.

This is the first time the pro circuit has come to Sunburst as the Great Lakes professional skiers tour the state.

The women's final of the Michelob Light Great Lakes Tour on Saturday was won by Stephanie LeMay of Minneapolis. LeMay, a student at the University of Minnesota, defeated second place winner Debbie Flanders of South Pomfret, Vermont, by a narrow margin. It was LeMay's first

professional ski title. Approximately 30-35 women were entered in the competition.

Two-time Olympian Carg Adgate of Boyne City, Michigan, defeated 1980 NCAA slalom champion Brett Williams of Mahtomedi, Minnesota, with a strong comeback in the championship match of the McClay's Classic on Sunday. Fifty-five of the country's top male skiers were entered in the McClay's Classic, the fifth stop on the Peugeot Grand Prix.

### TOWN OF KEWASKUM

The Town of Kewaskum caucus was held at the Labor Center Hall, Kewaskum, on Saturday, Jan. 10, with about 20 residents attending for the purpose of making nominations.

Candidates nominated are: Chairman — George Allmann, incumbent, who will be unopposed.

Supervisors (two) — Daniel Stoffel and Jerome Herriges, incumbents; Donald Nowak and Edward Volm.

Town Clerk — Barbara Hinz, incumbent, who will be unopposed.

Town Treasurer — Dolores Prost, incumbent, who will be unopposed. Marilyn Haug was also nominated but later declined the nomination.

Three persons are running for two supervisory seats there, and two are vying to be constable.

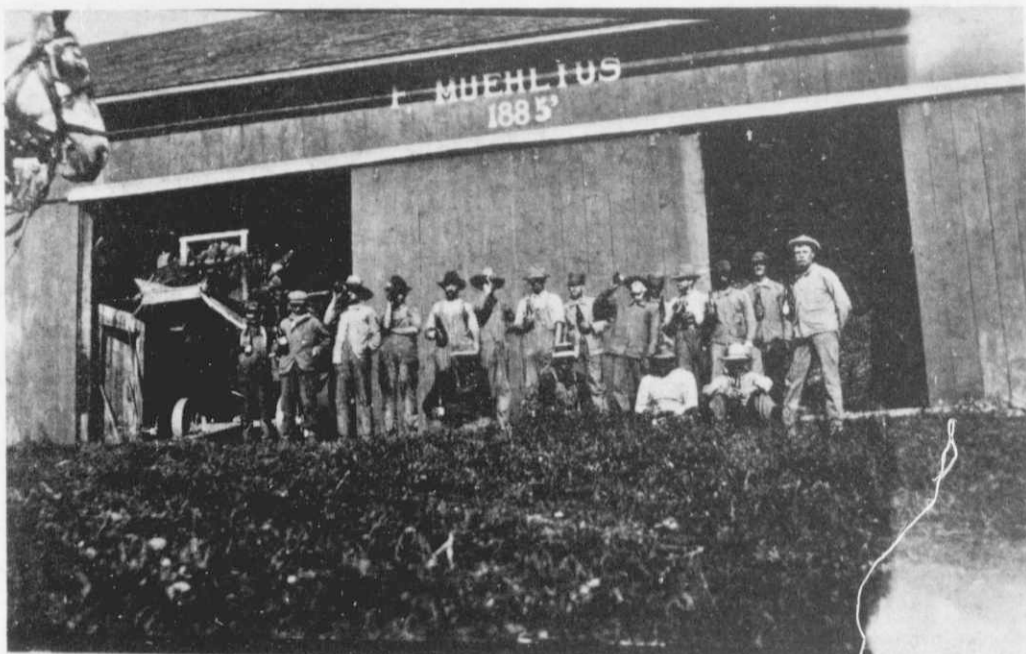

## Brewers' Bando is Milwaukee Chairman

### Cerebral Palsy Telethon This Weekend on Channel 12

Milwaukee Brewer Sal Bando is again serving as the local Honorary Chairman of the "Weekend with the Stars Telethon for Cerebral Palsy."

Bando, a resident of Mequon, will appear at the Marc Plaza Hotel in Milwaukee during the local segments of the telethon, which is broadcast in Milwaukee from 10:30 p.m. Saturday until 6:00 p.m. Sunday on Channel 12.

Bando is consistently active in community affairs, and he has served United Cerebral Palsy as Telethon Chairman for

four consecutive years.

Milwaukee Brewer Jim Gantner and other members of the Milwaukee Brewers, Bucks and Admirals are also scheduled to appear during the telethon.

United Cerebral Palsy produced local and regional telethons until its first national "Holiday Star Telethon" in 1978. Carried by 76 stations nationwide, the program hit a new fund-raising record of more than \$11 million in pledges, including participation by the Milwaukee affiliate.

The second national UCP

telethon, in January, 1980, raised more than \$13 million with the help of 116 affiliated stations.

Ken Bell and Donna Jordan of "PM Magazine" will host local segments of the telethon. John Ritter, Henry Winkler and others will host from Hollywood; Paul Anka and Dennis James will welcome guests in New York including Robert Merrill, Carol Channing and Chita Rivera; and from Las Vegas, special guest Dean Martin will appear with Roger Williams, Buddy Hackett, Andy Williams and others.

Participating local radio personalities include Keith Moore, WISN; Larry "the Legend" Johnson, WZUU; Dave Duncan, WZUU; Bob Barry, WOKY; Steve York, WOKY; Dick and

Ellen Stout, WBCS, and Paul Kelly, among others.

An early morning highlight of the local telethon programming is the finals of the Schlitz Singles Classic Bowling Tournament broadcast for Cerebral Palsy, broadcast live from the Red Carpet Celebrity Lanes at 2:00 a.m. Sunday.

Channel 12's Rod Luck will host these exciting final rounds of a \$4000 tournament which began in December.

Special guests for children have been invited to appear at the Marc Plaza Sunday morning, including Ronald McDonald, magician Jerry McDonauld, the Kids on the Block Puppets, and Bingo the Clown, among others.

Other Milwaukee personalities and officials will help answer celebrity phones and encourage donations at the Marc Plaza. Television viewers will be encouraged to phone in pledges during the telethon, or to make contributions to the "fishbowls" at all 26 Big Boy locations, Southgate shopping center, and the Marc Plaza.

Volunteers from throughout the Milwaukee area will be on hand to man the more than 75 telethons and handle mail responses.

Some 16,000 children and adults with Cerebral Palsy live in Southeastern Wisconsin, and 75 percent of the funds raised locally remain in the area to support the varied programs and services of United Cerebral Palsy of Southeastern Wisconsin.

Ms. Gruhle will receive a certificate from the State Department of Public Instruction.

MADISON, WI—The Village of Newburg, Washington County, has requested approval from the Department of Natural Resources of plans for upgrading the operation and maintenance capabilities of their existing wastewater treatment facility and removing clear water from their sewage collection system. In addition, the existing wastewater treatment facility is programmed for future expansion. The proposed expansion would consist of adding a new rotating biological contactor treatment system to accommodate future growth. Upgrading and expanding the treatment facility is not eligible for Federal EPA or Wisconsin Fund grants. No wetlands would be directly impacted by the proposed projects.

## Youth Camps Looking For Summer Workers

Wisconsin's five Youth Conservation Camps are now looking for young men and women 15 and 19 years of age to participate in salaried summer work camps this summer.

The camps, located near Manitowish Waters, Minong, Montello, Campbellsport and Prairie du Chien, are operated by the Department of Natural Resources to offer a summer work-learn experience in conservation.

Each of the five YC camps will operate separate five-week and six-week sessions during June, July and August. Participants are paid \$3.35 per hour (work is scheduled for 32 hours per week resulting in a weekly salary of \$107.20). A room and board charge of \$27.20 per week will be deducted from the salary.

Work activity offered at the summer camps includes projects related to forestry, fish management, wildlife, re-

creational use areas and ranger stations.

These youth camps enable the DNR to accomplish a wide variety of forestry, fish and game habitat projects and facility maintenance that otherwise could not be done locally if we relied solely on DNR manpower. The camps provide an educational opportunity for participants because of the experiences and associations each youth will find in group work assignments. Ten hours each week are scheduled for en-

vironmental education.

Young people interested in participating in one of the YC camps this summer must apply by March 9 through their high school guidance director, or by writing directly to the DNR Youth Conservation Camp Section, Box 7921, Madison, Wisconsin 53707. Application forms are available at all Wisconsin high school guidance offices. The DNR will notify applicants

in April or May whether they have been selected to attend one of the camps.

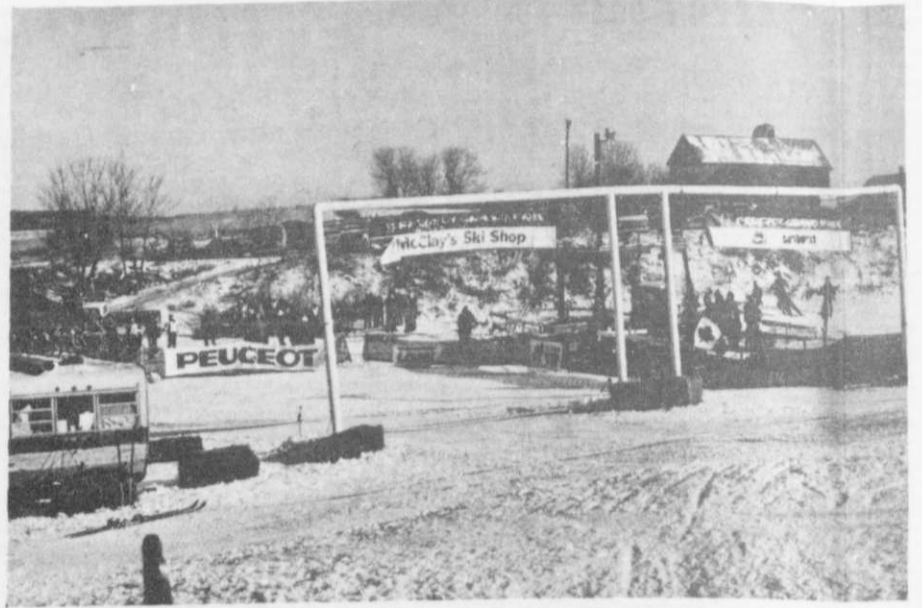

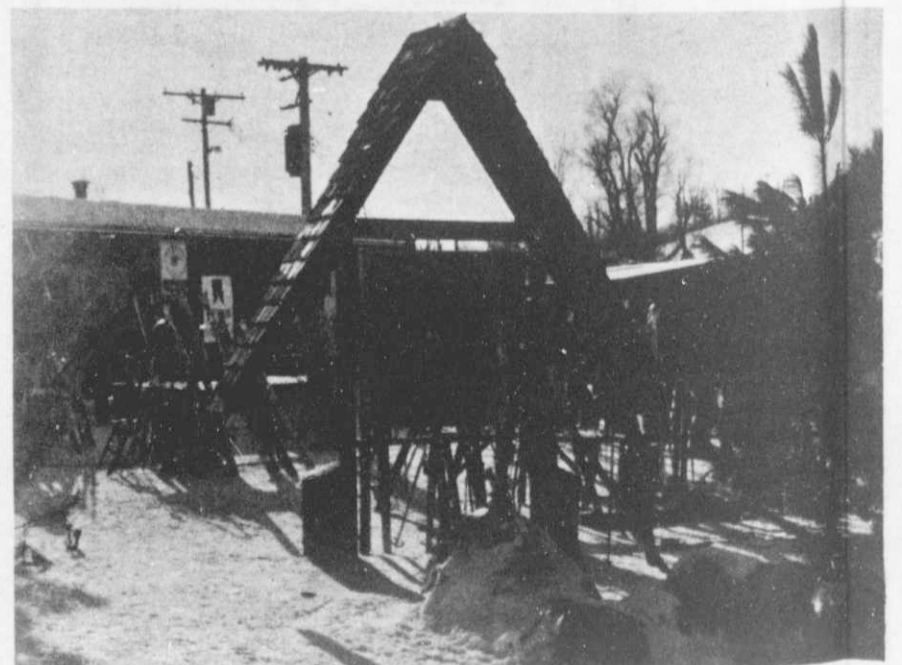
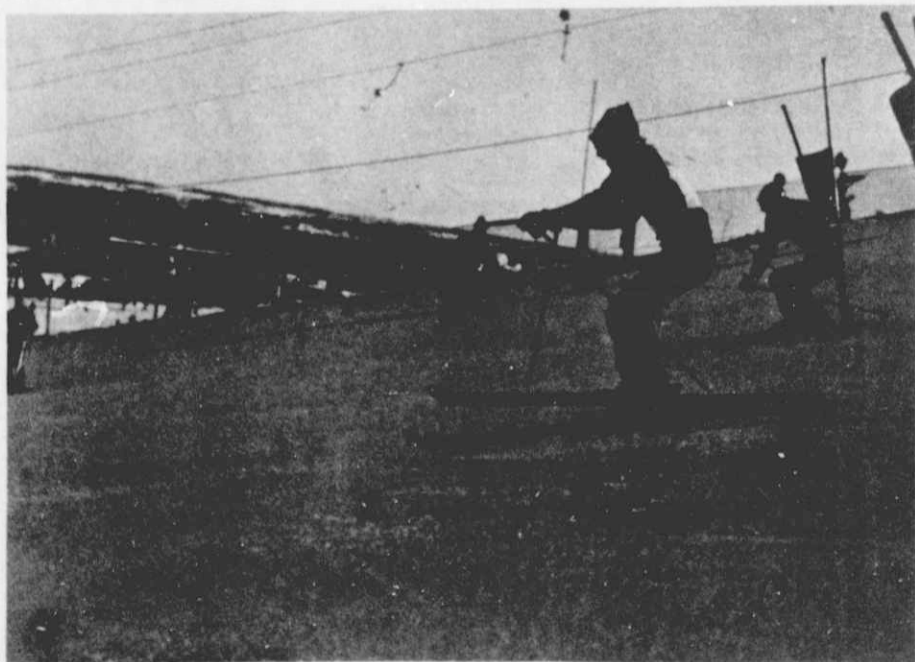

### Hephner Begins Eighth Term As Legislator Jan. 5

State Rep. Gervase Hephner (D-Chilton) began his eighth term as a Wisconsin legislator January 5, when state Supreme Court Chief Justice Bruce Beilfuss administered the oath of office to the 99 members of the Assembly.

"I'm looking forward to a challenging session," Hephner said. "Despite the problems the Legislature will have dealing with this biennium's deficit, and paring down the requests of state agencies for the coming biennium, I think the state will continue to take long strides forward."

Hephner, who ranks third among Assembly Democrats in seniority, said his committee assignments for the biennium will involve areas vital to the state's economic recovery and growth.

"I'm pleased to have been reappointed to the Agriculture and Nutrition Committee, since agriculture is the state's number one industry," Hephner said. "Many of the issues that the committee will examine are quite controversial, such as pesticide regulations and farmland prevention. My first priority, however, will be to make sure we continue on schedule with the construction of a state veterinary school."

Hephner said his emphasis during ten years on Agriculture has been to protect the small farmer from unreasonable and unnecessary government regulation. "With another of my appointments, to the Small Business and Economic Development Committee, I will be able to work towards the same end of the owners of small businesses in the state," he said.

Hephner added that the needs of smaller enterprises have often been neglected. "We must work to preserve the state's small businesses," he said. "They provide half the state's present jobs, and also most of the state's new employment."

Hephner will also serve as vice chairman of the Excise and Fees Committee, of which he has also been a long-term member. "Excise and Fees deals primarily with the important issue of alcohol consumption," he said. "Among the proposals we will be looking at during the next two years will be possible changes in the state's minimum drinking age."

## Early Demand for State Campsite Reservations Brisk

Public use of Wisconsin's state park and forest campsite reservation program increased last year more than seven percent over 1979 and early indications are the popularity of the program is on the rise again this year.

A check of a few state parks the first part of this week found that the early demand for reserved campsites is brisk. Reservation forms for the coming camping season were accepted beginning Friday, January 2.

The early demand for reservations at Peninsula State Park in Door County is significantly ahead of last year. Gary Patzke, park superintendent, said people were lined up at the entrance when the park opened for business at 6:00 a.m. on Friday, January 2. "Our crew worked from then until 3:00 in the afternoon that day confirming 183 campsite reservations," Patzke said. Another 60 reservation requests were received that day. Campsite reservation requests sent by mail began to pour into the park office on Saturday, January 3, when 769 were received with another 359 arriving on Monday, January 5.

Patzke said it will take a few weeks to process that volume of requests, and campers should not become alarmed if they don't receive confirmation of their reservation immediately.

Peninsula is the second most popular park in the state ranking only behind Devil's Lake State Park. About 400 reservation requests were received at Devil's Lake through last Monday and about the same number were received at Governor Dodge State Park. Though more campers use Devil's Lake than Peninsula each season, the early demand for reservations is always heaviest at Peninsula.

Reservations are accepted for the period May through September 30, except at Peninsula State Park where the reservation period extends through October 25.

A total of 29 Wisconsin state parks and forests offer the advance campsite reservation service. Request forms are available at state park and forest offices, DNR District Offices and the DNR office in Madison. A reservation request must be submitted on the DNR form, either by mail or in person, to the state park or forest where the reservation is desired.

## NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that rabies vaccinations and dog licenses are required under the Statutes.

Vaccination by a veterinarian against rabies of all dogs is required (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. If required by the governing body of the city, village or town, the certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs 5 months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$6 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog, or one-half of these amounts if the dog became 5 months of age after July 1 of the license year. The governing body of any town, village or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. A kennel license which is required by owners having more than three dogs on their premises shall cost \$25.

Dog licenses can be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year.

**PENALTY**  
Every owner of a dog 5 months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1 will be assessed a late fee of \$5.

## NOTICE Town of Auburn Dog License Tax

The minimum dog license tax is \$2.00 for a neutered male dog or spayed female dog, upon presentation of evidence that the dog is neutered or spayed, and \$5.00 for an unneutered male dog or unspayed female dog, or one-half of these amounts if the dog became 5 months of age after July 1 of the license year.

All dogs must be vaccinated for rabies and proof shown before licenses will be issued.

A late fee of \$5.00 will be assessed to every owner of a dog 5 months of age or over, if the owner failed to obtain a license prior to April 1 of each year, or within 30 days of acquiring ownership of a licensable dog or if the owner failed to obtain a license on or before the dog reached licensable age.
