


Village of Newburg Seeks DNR Approval for **Upgrading Wastewater Treatment Facility**

MADISON, WI-The Village of Newburg, Washington County, has requested approval from the Department of Natural Resources of plans for upgrading the operation and main-tenance capabilities of their existing wastewater treatment facility and removing clear water from their sewage collection system. In addition, the existing wastewater treatment facility is programmed for furture expansion. The proposed expansion would consist of adding a new rotating biological contactor treatment system to accommodate future growth. Upgrading and expanding the treatment facility is not eligible for Federal EPA or Wisconsin Fund grants. No wetlands would be directly impacted by the proposed projects.

The Department has made a preliminary determination that an Environmental Impact Statement will not be required for this action. In addition to our findings, the U. S. Environ-mental Protection Agency is also proposing a Finding of No Significant Impact.

Work activity offered at the summer camps includes projects related to forestry, fish management, wildlife, recreational use areas and ranger stations.





Hephner Begins Eighth Term As Legislator Jan. 5

State Rep. Gervase Hephner (D-Chilton) began his eighth term as a Wisconsin legislator January 5, when state Supreme Court Chief Justice Bruce Beilfuss administered the oath of office to the 99 members of the Assembly.

"I'm looking forward to a challenging session," Hephner said. "Despite the problems the Legislature will have dealing with this biennium's deficit, and paring down the requests of state agencies for the coming biennium, I think the state will continue to take long strides forward."

Hephner, who ranks third among Assembly Democrats in seniority, said his committee assignments for the biennium will involve areas vital to the state's economic recovery and growth.

"I'm pleased to have been reappointed to the Agriculture and Nutrition Committee, since agriculture is the state's number one industry," Hephner said. "Many of the issues that the committee will examine are quite controversial, such as pesticide regulations and farmland prevention. My first priority, however, will be to make sure we continue on schedule with the construction of a state veterinary school."

Hephner said his emphasis during ten years on Agriculture has been to protect the small farmer from unreasonable and unnecessary government regulation. "With another of my appointments, to the Small Business and Economic Development Committee, I will be able to work towards the same end of the owners of small businesses in the state," he said.

Hephner added that the needs of smaller enterprises have often been neglected. "We must work to preserve the state's small businesses," he said. "They provide half the state's present jobs, and also most of the state's new employment."

Hephner will also serve as vice chairman of the Excise and Fees Committee, of which he has also been a long-term member. "Excise and Fees deals primarily with the important issue of alcohol consumption," he said. "Among the proposals we will be looking at during the next two years will be possible changes in the state's minimum drinking age."

Public use of Wisconsin's state park and forest campsite reservation program increased last year more than seven percent over 1979 and early indications are the popularity of the program is on the rise again this year.

Gary Patzke, park superintendent, said people were lined up at the entrance when the park opened for business at 6:00 a.m. on Friday, January 2. "Our crew worked from then until 3:00 in the afternoon that day confirming 183 campsite reservations, Patzke said. Another 60 reservation requests were received that day. Campsite reservation requests sent by mail began to pour into the park office on Saturday, January 3, when 769 were received with another 359 arriving on Monday, January 5.

Patzke said it will take a few weeks to process that volume of requests, and campers should not become alarmed if they don't receive confirmation of their reservation immediately.

Peninsula is the second most popular park in the state ranking only behind Devil's Lake State Park. About 400 reservation requests were received at Devil's Lake through last Monday and about the same number were received at Governor Dodge State Park. Though more campers use Devil's Lake than Peninsula each season, the early demand for reservations is always heaviest at Peninsula. Reservations are accepted for the period May through September 30, except at Peninsula State Park where the reservation period extends through October 25.

A total of 29 Wisconsin state parks and forests offer the advance campsite reservation service. Request forms are available at state park and forest offices, DNR District Offices and the DNR office in Madison. A reservation request must be submitted on the DNR form, either by mail or in person, to the state park or forest where the reservation is desired.

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that rables vaccinations and dog licenses are required under the Statutes

Vaccination by a veterinarian against rables of all dogs is required (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rables by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. If required by the governing body of the city, village o. town, the certificate of rables vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued. presented be issued

All dogs 5 months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$6 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog, or one-half of these amounts if the dog became 5 months of age after July 1 of the license year. The governing body of any town, village or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. A kennel license which is required by owners having more than three dogs on their premises shall cost \$25.

Dog licenses can be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year

All dogs must be vaccinated for rables and proof shown before licenses will be issued.
